Conservation Program Available for Farms and Forests

Due to the recent government shutdown, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has extended the signup deadline for their most popular conservation program. Farmers and forestland owners now have until December 20th, to apply for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

"EQIP remains our most powerful tool for getting conservation on the ground," according to Michael Stinebrink, NRCS District Conservationist, in Rhinelander. "Our office is now open and we are working on the backlog of requests as quickly as possible."

The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) offers \$20+ million in flatrate payments, to Wisconsin farmers and forestland owners, for more than 90 conservation practices. Eligible projects include fencing, watering systems, and pasture planting for grazing systems; tree and shrub planting; invasive species control; manure management; erosion control; seasonal high tunnels (aka "hoop houses"); and most practices that are included in a forest management plan, including Managed Forest Law (MFL) plans. Incentive payments are also offered for developing forest management plans and farm nutrient management plans, or plans to reduce energy use or transition to organic agriculture.

Letter to the Editor:

First of all, I'd like to commend the *Pioneer Express* for opening a forum in which we can discuss the "Proposed Off Road Vehicle Park" which promoters are trying to establish here in Forest County.

As I said in my letter to the Editor last week, I still have many unanswered questions concerning The "Off Road Vehicle Park" project, so far, all the feedback I have received to my letter last week, asking questions about the O.R.V. project have been positive, so I'll ask a few more.

Just what type of vehicle is an Off Road Vehicle? Specifically what type of vehicles are the proponents of the proposed O.R.V. park trying to attract? I also had questions about just what is an "Off Road Vehicle Park", so I simply turned to a Google search, for "Off Road Vehicle Park" there is much information about such parks on- line, and here is just a short list of the things I found.

Most of the parks I saw, are located on State owned land and are administered by the various States. In a quick search, the smallest park I located was 80 acres, the largest 360 acres. All the parks website's I visited have very strict rules for vehicle equipment and safety devices, and all have very strict rules for operating your vehicle within the park. The vehicles shown in the majority of the pictures associated with the sites, are homemade 4x4 vehicles very similar to me to the early "Brush Run" vehicles I raced with in the 70's and 80's, and most are truly Off Road Vehicles, never being designed to operate on any type of Public roadway. Were not talking your average ATV or UTV here!

All the pictures of vehicles operating in these parks showed the vehicles operating in extremely difficult terrain, and of course, buried above the tops of the tires in mud. As a former Brush Run racer, I have not so fond memories of Carters Field, and the Milwaukee Loop, of the original Brush Run course, in which the mud and water would pour into our vehicles, sometimes waist deep. Great "fun" then, but think of the environmental damage being done, by this type of vehicle, in today's world..

If I am correct in assuming the proposed O.R.V. park will be located on the former "Argonne Block" {No one has told me any different}I'd like you all to think about the fact that a very large portion of this site consists of wetlands, many swamps, creeks, and marshes, wet year round, and all draining into the Otter Creek, and the Peshtigo River, which run through the middle of this block.

While Consolidated Papers were the stewards of this block they went to great efforts to construct year round logging roads on this property, roads that we all have enjoyed traveling on (when the gates were not locked), How long do you think Consolidated's road system will hold up to "Extreme 4x4's" being operated on them in wet conditions? (Think environmental catastrophe).

If the "Argonne Block" becomes a for profit O.R.V. park, will the rest of us be locked out of the recreational uses of these roads and trail systems, that we currently enjoy? All you hunters and fishermen that currently use this road system, are you going to have to pay to use the new "Park"?

I highly suggest to all of you interested in learning more about just what an O.R.V. park is, do your own research. I also found it interesting that the same Google O.R.V. park search turned up various parks that had been closed or never opened, due to public dissatisfaction and public input, all there for the reading. I think we could also tap into our friends living down in the Mountain and Lakewood area, where these types of vehicles had been operated on National Forest and private lands. Its my understanding that these areas formerly used by O.R.V.'s have been closed because of the severe damage being done to the environment by these O.R.V. vehicles.

As Mike said in his opinion piece, apparently Forest County is looking into becoming involved with the O.R.V. Park, I highly suggest that any of you having questions or concerns about this proposal, contact your county board member to see what their take is on this issue. I've made my stand, I'm not interested in my tax dollar becoming involved in any way with an Off Road Vehicle Park, and I have serious concerns (and questions) about this proposed (but now confidential)project. I appreciate the public forum. Jim Odekirk County Rd. O, Cavour To the Editor:

The 2014 Forest County budget will soon be completed. As usual, it will include costs for services that most of us take for granted—police protection, tax collection, road maintenance, even the cost of keeping the jail running. All these jobs are done well and the costs are essential and unavoidable.

Next year's proposed budget includes a contingency (.008 of the tax levy) designed to assist our county's economic future; an investment that will actually produce revenue to future county budgets, therefore providing tax relief to taxpayers. We can leverage that contingency to get grant support from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to complete work that volunteers cannot provide such as engineering, legal, etc.

Back in 2006, the Wisconsin DNR Board issued a mandate that a Motorized Recreation Area (what some call on Off-Road Park) be developed somewhere in Wisconsin. A few people, generally those that don't think Wisconsin exists if you can't see it from the top of the Capitol dome, have been working very hard to locate the park in the southern part of the state. Other counties, having recently learned about the millions in annual impact that these parks produce, are now scrambling to get plans developed within their area.

Forest County's Board wisely made an Off-Road Park a priority in its Comprehensive Plan, and made it the number one goal in the Recreational Plan. A local organization, Wisconsin Off-Road Vehicle Park, Inc. (WORVPI) has invested years of hard work and money into working with Forest County to build the "Lambeau Field for Off-Road Parks" right here in Forest County. Many local organizations have provided countless volunteer hours to help support this endeavor.

In order to determine if a park can be successful here requires planning and studies of feasibility. WORVPI invested significant time and capital with two respected organizations, North Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, Inc., and the Ripon College Creative Enterprise Center. Years later, these reports reveal that not only will a park provide millions of annual economic impact to the county (and even an economic halo effect upon the region) but \$300,000 in local sales tax impact for Forest County each year. Even more significantly, the park's economic impact is projected to add an additional 340 jobs to businesses (and new businesses) within the county. For a change, local businesses can begin to truly envision having their tills become fuller from one year to the next rather than (in some cases) try to hang on with thinner sales receipts annually. We need to grow our tax receipts, rather than drawing from the property taxpayer.

Forest County's population declined 7% from 2000 to 2010. According to Wisconsin's Department of Administration, it has continued to decline in the past three years. Median household income in the county ranks 68th out of 72 Wisconsin counties. The poverty rate has skyrocketed over 35% in the past decade. We seem to have more burials than baptisms, and it is not because Forest County is not great—Forest County IS great. It is about jobs. If our youth cannot find jobs here, they go elsewhere. The parents ARE also going elsewhere—in just the past dozen years, the student population—our future-- among the four Forest County districts has declined a staggering 21.6%! One district, Goodman-Armstrong, declined over 40%.

Don't accept these declines as fate: just because a dwindling economy is occurring in many rural areas, does not mean we have to accept that in Forest County. We can build for the future. We can have those things such as hunting and silent sports that we hold dear and still take an unobtrusive four mile square in a county of nearly 670,000 acres and have a place where people with pockets full of money come, have fun, empty their pockets, and head back home. It is hard to imagine that there is a grocery store (where they still exist), motel, cstore, restaurant or hardware store that is not interested in more business.

To turn around Forest County's population decline requires many initiatives. We cannot focus on just one thing. In





Bill Bates joined the Navy in 1950 at the outbreak of the Korean War. Because he was mechanically inclined, the military put him to work on ships. His primary assignment was in the engine room of the USS Tingey DD #539, San Diego. Bill was below deck for most of his Korean tour, but in his words, "You do what you're told."

As a guardian, I had this opportunity to ask a number of veterans, including those from Forest County, what they "did" during their war. Frequently, their answers began with," I just..." It is easy to understand a veteran's humility when the memorials we visited were overflowing with crosses, headstones, names and numbers of the dead, numbers of the wounded and symbols representing lives lost in our nation's wars, but the story doesn't end there.

Win was struck by the varied and fitting nature of each memorial. In every case, the artist, "Conceived of a unique and impressive way to honor our veterans." Bill found, " Raising of the flag on Iwo Jima", the Marine Memorial, particularly inspiring. Later, I learned Bill's brother was just over the hill when the flag was raised on Mt. Suribachi. Jack survived when so many others perished. While at the Marine Memorial, we were treated to a performance by a silent drill team. The soldiers allowed the veterans to handle their weapons and young and old service men and women had time to talk with one another after the demonstration. Brigadier General Daniel O' Donohue spoke to our group and as part of his message he said, "We stand on the shoulders of heros!" His words were the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown, the General stood at attention and saluted our veteran heros.

Both Homer and Norm commented on the organization required to host our flight. "We knew exactly what to expect," Norm said, "Remarkable!" And it truly was!

Honor Flights are hosted by volunteers and funded by donations. Lorraine Van Kampen, lead volunteer hostess for our flight, was an amazing woman to behold. She worked tirelessly with her team, they have hosted 21 flights to date, to schedule flights and tour busses, process registrations and pair veterans with guardians, provide information, arrange wheelchairs and delicious food, secure medical staff and make sure every veteran traveled comfortably and safely.

Men and women guardians were also an important part of the flight. While the flight is free for the veterans, guardians or guardians' sponsors, pay for their flights. Fares collected help offset some of the cost of the trip. More than half of the guardians were non-family, and one man said he waited five years to be called. Another waited three and a half years and was already putting coins in a piggy bank in hopes of being called again. While spouses cannot travel with their veterans because they are usually too close in age, free agent guardians wait to perform this small act of service. Their smiles during the trip were infectious.

All four Forest County veterans were overwhelmed by the homecoming they received upon returning to the Appleton Airport. The entire length of the airport was filled with family members and patriotic citizens ready to give the veterans the "Welcome Home" they may never have received when they were mustered out at the end of their service. Bill said he attended a special veterans' gathering some time ago and the guest speaker mentioned every war but Korea. "We were the forgotten war, and I have to say it hurt. The reception at Appleton made up for that.

For me, the most remarkable outcome of this trip was the change in the attitude the veterans expressed at its conclusion. Again, they were not concerned for themselves, but for our country. Bill said, "There must have been one hundred and fifty kids from Minnesota at the the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. I think I shook every kid's hand." Homer said, "It gave me a feeling that there is a future for this country." Win said, "In Vietnam era, we were divided in opinion. The younger set didn't favor the war and they may have been right, but we were concerned about those who didn't get a lot of public support when they came home. The citizenry in this country has matured to the point that they know warfare is not ever what we'd like, but sometimes it's a better choice when freedom or a democratic way of life is threatened." Norm said," I was happy for the show of interest in our people and for what the service has been doing. I could not believe they could get that many people together to welcome us."



Crandon site manager Pat Raml is at 715-478-0742 (home) or 715-478-3040 (site). Serving at 12:00 p.m. throughout the Northwoods, said Nicolet College President Elizabeth Burmaster.

"Together, the two classrooms will support delivery of state-of-the-art instruction toward information technology and manufacturing credentials," Burmaster said. "Instead of students traveling to campus, we're taking some of the classroom instruction to them, which makes this training available to people in a whole new way."

One mobile classroom will function as a traditional lecture classroom outfitted with nextgeneration TelePresence conferencing technology developed by Cisco Systems. The second mobile classroom will operate as a flexible lab that will be outfitted for manufacturing and IT instruction.

Both mobile classrooms are expected to be operational sometime next spring.

Nicolet is also developing specialized curriculum to fit the new instructional model that includes industry recognized credentials in IT and electromechanical technology, sometimes known as mechatronics.

"The instruction will feature a series of modules that students will be able to complete with anywhere from 18 to 36 hours of instruction," said Nicolet Vice President of Teaching, Learning, and Student Success Kenneth Urban. "Each module will build on what was learned previously. This will give students the opportunity to earn industry-recognized credentials which eventually can lead to an associate degree."

Students will be eligible to receive credit for prior learning, including skills they've learned previously on the job or in the military.

Nicolet received letters of support from a number of area businesses which were submitted with the grant application process. Those businesses included One Prospect Technologies, Printpack, and Drs. Foster and Smith.

"(We) recognize that a trained and educated workforce is vital to Wisconsin's economic future and ability to compete in a global economy," wrote a representative from Printpack in the company's letter of support.

The instruction, offered year-round with multiple start dates, will be available throughout the Northwoods for incumbent workers as well as those looking to enter these fields. Both manufacturing and IT have been identified as high-growth fields in the state.

The grant Nicolet received is part of the \$23.1 million grant the U.S. Department of Labor recently awarded to a consortium of the 16 colleges in the Wisconsin Technical College System.

It's the third installment of the multi-year, nearly \$2 billion federal initiative designed to increase community college credential attainment in high-priority economic sectors. In the previous round, the technical college consortium won an \$18.3 million grant to expand innovative programs that produce high-skilled workers in advanced manufacturing.

"Collaboration within our system has allowed us to leverage more than \$41 million to address the strategic needs and priorities we've identified with our workforce and economic development partners," said Wisconsin Technical College System President Morna Foy. "That's pretty exciting for Wisconsin."
