Truth, Trust and Transparency. These are the required foundation of any relationship including personal, employment, business and political. If any one or more of these conditions are compromised or out of balance the agreements and goal of a positive outcome will eventually fail.

The topic on many peoples mind is the proposed off-road vehicle park that would reside on 10,000 acres of land in Forest County. The Wisconsin Off-road Vehicle Park Inc. (WORVPI) has been working on the project for many years and is getting closer to making it a reality,(per their public statement December 5th 2013 channel 12 Rhinelander news). WORVPI hired North Central Regional Planning and Ripon College to produce studies and business plans. As of the time of this writing, only select bits and pieces of these reports have been released to the public and to the new Forest County ORVP Oversight Committee . The partnership of WORVPI - Forest County Economic Development Partnership, and some select members have the complete reports and business plan including financials, but they cannot share the information to the public as they are tied to a non-disclosure agreement with WORVPI.

The history of the public taxpayer involvement of a proposed motorized recreational area park, MRA, can be traced to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. As recent as, November 30th of 2010, Forest County received a letter from the secretary of the WDNR Matt Frank, I quote. "The DNR is taking the lead in bringing a wide variety of partners to the table in seeking and eventually developing a motorized recreation area in Wisconsin. I have asked my staff to seek counties and municipalities that have potential sites, supportive communities, and active stakeholders who can together partner with the DNR to move towards the end goal of having an MRA. Given your high interest in this concept, we will continue to pursue possible opportunities in Forest County to make the goal attainable. " End quote. This letter followed Forest County Resolution 22-2010 that was submitted by the Economic Development Committee: in support of working with the DNR on a MRA.

Resolution 08-2011 passed the Forest County Board of Supervisors 21 to 0 and adopted the Forest County Comprehensive Plan, the plan states on page 19 and 20, Economic Development line 13-Work with state, federal and local governments to locate a destination for a MRA in the county. As of this writing the taxpayers have no information about a partnership with the state DNR.

We don't know what we don't know. The "we" is the Forest County taxpayer and public as a whole including the off road park customer. The WORVPI proposed MRA plans have been released to the public in a promotional slide show and select information disseminated to the television, radio, newspaper media and off-road web sites. The slide show presentation gives a few economic impact numbers from the Ripon school study. 300 thousand dollars in Forest County sales tax revenue, 340 jobs will be created and 28 million dollars in economic impact to Forest County. Projected numbers of guests to the park have been reported from 30,000 to 50,000 per season. The Study from Ripon College reports the average off-roader will travel 300 miles to visit an off road park, the study can be found on the WORVPI web site. Also on the site is some information from a study done by North Central Regional Planning.

After I saw the presentation and projections including the economic impact to Forest County I thought it could be just the shot in the arm the area needs. But being a business person I knew that these predictions had to be shored up with data included in a complete business plan. I wondered about, cost of land, development, infrastructure, overhead, personnel, insurance, safety, advertising, board of directors, heavy equipment, lighting, communications, profit and loss projections, and property tax impact. The more I thought about the MRA, the more questions arose, Who is WORVPI? What is their expertise in a project of this magnitude? How much are they investing and what is their risk? Where will the park be located? Why 10,000 acres? How have other parks done? How did WORVPI arrive at the projections and when can I see the financial underpinnings of your projections? I asked and waited, then asked again and waited. Hello! Still waiting!

Culture, Tradition, and the Environment. I can't help but put all of this into one thought as they are all entwined. The Sokaogon were appointed guardians of the resources at the dawn of time, The Potawatomi,

Keepers Of The Fire, I quote from the Potawatomi Tribal Constitution "The health and integrity of the land and all its components cannot be separated from the health and continued existence of the Potawatomi people." End quote. With the proposed size of the MRA park it is impossible not to build trails on or near to environmentally sensitive areas in Forest County. These areas include lakes, ponds, trout streams, wetlands, and all levels of animal forest habitat.

As a child I can remember learning from my grandfather how to fish for minnows in swamp creek, seine for wigglers in the Rat river, pick leeches under rocks on the shore of Lake Metonga, go fishing for perch and walleye. And when we had more than enough for our table he taught me to share the bounty with the neighbors at Smith's resort. The traditions of hunting, fishing and gathering of food and medicine, from the woods, waters, and land is what binds all of us a family in Forest County.

Protection of the environment for future generations should be our number one goal! Which brings me back to the question, 10,000 acres? why when the county already has many miles of trails and fire roads open for 4-wheelers. Please don't get my rant as against 4wheelers, quite the contrary. Forest County is proud of the off-road tradition as the world's number one off-road race track. The hundreds of people that donate their time is priceless, not to forget the sacrifice and vision of the core investors. Forest County and its towns have opened up many roads and trails to ATV and UTV use. Forest County has two state trails shared by snowmobiles and ATV's, the Wolf River and Nicolet Grade. There are not any other 4wheeler venues in the Midwest like Forest County and in addition is supported by Forest County business people, summer residences, two native tribes and their investments.

I have talked with many taxpayers in district 16 and they have overwhelmingly let me know that they are uncomfortable with the WORVPI planned park and want to see a referendum. The reason is, lack of information and transparency from the WORVPI group and Forest County Economic Development Partnership. I am going to be painfully blunt here. The planned secrecy to out-smart environmental groups or to protect from land speculators while keeping the Forest County taxpayer in the dark and alienated is just poor strategy. Taking money from Jeep people for a VIP membership before WORVPI has purchased one acre is just odd? Not having a limited partnership with private investors, no Federal or Wisconsin DNR funding is bad . Asking a county with a small population of less than 10,000 for additional money or land is unreasonable. Telling everyone that the ORVP is the best thing to come along for jobs, will save the schools, the Lambeau Field of off road parks, is bad business. WORVPI and FCEDP refusing to release to the public the complete NCRP study and the Ripon study, that is now having the original financial data reworked, has led me to this conclusion.

I will support the feelings and request of the taxpayers of district 16 and work with supervisor Bill Chaney and others to sketch out a referendum question on the proposed Off Road Vehicle Park, and try to get it on the ballot.

Another Firewood Story


We had 40 acres. All summer long Duane and I scoured the forty for dead wood. It usually run about 2-4" in diameter. We hauled it to one of two roads where our dad would have us load on a trailer on the weekends and haul home. We then cut it with a swede saw. One year, he bought a load of hardwood pulp that we also cut with a swede saw. We learned that if we twisted the saw, it would break the blade. No more cutting. After we broke the third blade, dad bought the new blades out of our allowance. We each got \$.25 a week. A new blade cost \$.35. We very seldom broke a blade after that. We thought we were in heaven when dad hired Deward Ison to cut the wood on a buzz saw on the back of a Ford (I think) tractor.

When I came home from the army, Dad had put in oil heat. After getting married and paying the high cost of LP, I burned wood for many years.





Wisconsin needs an off road vehicle park for many reasons!



Oh yes, the much touted study by Ripon College, paid for mostly by Plum Creek Timber, of which portions can also be found at Wisconsin Off Road Vehicle park's website.

Just because other rural counties are suffering similar declines does not mean that we need to accept this as our fate.

Nearly ten years ago conversations started about the prospect of one or more off-road parks in Wisconsin. In 2006 the Natural Resources Board unanimously voted to seek the development of one or more in Wisconsin. The park proposal, which is still being finalized, has been many years in the making. Based on the success of other parks and the results of the feasibility study, it offers great potential for economic impact for existing and prospective new businesses, and probably most important, job

Because we all care about the future of Forest County we encourage everyone to stop speculating about the proposed park, financing, and impact until the details are provided at the conclusion of the scoping phase. There are many speculations being presented as fact that are just simply incorrect.

The fact is that public dollars are constantly invested for economic development purposes. Neither Lambeau Field nor Miller Park would be what they are if it were not for public investment for economic development. Crandon's Main Street was certainly revitalized due in part to public investment and the results are remarkable, with positive feedback that still continues today.

We encourage everyone to allow the scoping phase to be completed. Forest County Board Chairman, Paul Millan, promised a public meeting on the matter before anything was decided. Some inaccurate perceptions have been created as of late, in lieu the fact that the presentation that was made to the county board clearly stated that the scoping phase was designed to answer all questions of concern.

Finally, the biggest benefit of the county demonstrating leadership on this endeavor is the opportunity to control the outcomes. The tax base of municipalities may be impacted, both favorably and, if the county is not there to support the outcome, possibly unfavorably. If a private venture comes in and builds a parkwhich could very likely happenthe county will be able to do little to support the municipalities' impact.

As for the talk of referendum, the last time that happened in Forest County, at least to our knowledge, voters decided to turn over half the land mass of the county to the United States Forest Service. With harvest levels at a fraction of what they were 40 years ago, and mills running short of material to process, it is hard to imagine that anyone would conclude that it was a good deal for Forest County in the long run.

Several of our fine board members have invested a considerable amount of time and effort on this project because we truly feel this would be a great fit for Forest County; and, bring about a much-needed positive economic impact. It is disheartening to work so diligently on something only to have that work needlessly maligned.

Please allow the county and the various groups, this one included, do their work. There will be a public meeting and the facts will be presented.

Family-focused youth prevention programs more effective

Programs aimed at reducing underage alcohol and drug use typically zero in on young people themselves. But positive parenting and strong relationships between parents and youth are more effective at steering teens away from risky behaviors, research shows.

"Many prevention programs focus on youth only, and most have small effects," says Karen Bogenschneider, University of Wisconsin-Extension family policy specialist and Rothermel Bascom Professor of Human Ecology at UW-Madison. "Programs that change family dynamics proved nine times more effective than approaches that focus on individual youth."

Bogenschneider says that professionals who educate or deliver services to families endorse the effectiveness of family-focused approaches. And public programs and policies supporting strong family relationships provide a good return on taxpayer investment. "It's hard to overstate the important role that families play in raising young people who will be able to contribute to a strong society and a sound economy," she says.

One effort that has shown positive results in Oconto County is the "Strengthening Families Program 10 to 14," says UW-Extension Family Living Agent Donna Doll-Yogerst.

According to Doll-Yogerst, UW-Extension trains local family professionals to conduct the "Strengthening Families" program with Oconto County families.

Youth who participated were less likely to use alcohol and other drugs, were less aggressive, had fewer behavior problems and were more able to resist peer pressure," says Doll-Yogerst. "Parents who took part were more affectionate with their children and set more appropriate limits."

What's more, cost benefits analysis shows that for every \$1 invested in the program, nearly \$10 is saved in future costs such as drug treatment, lost future earnings and time in the juvenile justice system.

Doll-Yogerst says that UW-Extension programs in every Wisconsin county are designed to strengthen families through educational programs that are tested and based on research.



What causes fever?

When you're infected by bacteria or viruses, your immune system fights back with fever. A high body temperature is part of your body's natural defense system. Here's how it works:

Fever - When bacteria or viruses multiply in your blood stream, your white blood cells release natural fevercausing chemicals. These chemicals trigger the hypothalamus, a thermostat inside your brain, to adjust to fever levels. A temperature above 99 to 99.5°F is considered a fever.

Chills - Just before fever occurs, chilling begins. Your body may shiver or you may feel chilled. Involuntary muscle contractions produce heat, raising your body temperature to the new level set by the hypothalamus.

Sweats - When the fever breaks, sweating starts and cools your body. The fever-chilling-sweating may recur several times during an infection.

Note: Normal body temperature may vary during the day and is usually highest at night.

Dry mouth causes?

Almost everyone has experienced a dry mouth when they're anxious. But frequent dry mouth could mean your salivary glands aren't producing adequate saliva. This condition is xerostomia, and it can lead to trouble tasting and swallowing and an increased risk of tooth decay. Persistent dry mouth should be evaluated by your health care provider.

Reduced saliva can be caused by:

Health conditions. Your mouth can dry out from snoring, breathing with your mouth open, or using tobacco. Decreased saliva production is associated with injuries to the head or neck or disorders such as diabetes, AIDS and Parkinson's disease.

Treatment side effects. Several medicines can produce dry mouth. These include medicines used to treat high blood pressure, depression, anxiety, diarrhea and muscle spasm. And cancer chemotherapy or radiation can change the amount and thickness of saliva.

Extreme cold temperatures result in changes for trucking industry

Changes allow transport of heavier loads of fuel, other energy resources, milk commodities

Due to the extreme cold weather, the Wisconsin Departments of Transportation (WisDOT) and Administration (DOA) have determined an energy emergency exists and effective immediately, have authorized motor carriers to transport overweight loads of energy resources such as fuel and oil, along with milk commodities.

During an energy emergency, after consultation with DOA, WisDOT may waive the divisible load limitation of348.25 (4) and authorize for a period not to exceed 30 days the operation of overweight vehicles having a registered gross weight of 50,000 pounds or more and carrying energy resources or fuel or milk commodities regardless of the highways involved to conserve energy.

Such authorization may only allow weights not more than 10 percent greater than the gross axle and axle combination weight limitations, and not more than 15 percent greater than the gross vehicle weight limitations under 348.15 and 348.16.

WisDOT will also allow carriers transporting energy resources to self-declare and temporarily suspend rules related to hours of service and driver qualifications (as allowed under Wisconsin Administration Code Trans 327.09 (6)).


