Nicolet College awarded nearly \$2 million in state Fast Forward grants

Workforce training at Nicolet College will get another big boost thanks to nearly \$2 million in Wisconsin Fast Forward grants from the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development.

The \$1,921,544 in funding will expand academic opportunities in five areas: Business, Welding, Information Technology, Health Care, and Early Childhood Education. "Workforce training is at the heart of what we do at Nicolet and the Fast Forward grants will go a long way in helping Nicolet meet that mission," said Nicolet Interim President Kenneth Urban. "These grants will directly benefit our students by giving them the exact skills they need to be successful, while businesses in the region gain a skilled workforce to drive economic development."

The bulk of the funding will go to expand the times classes are offered to include more evening, weekend, and online options; purchase high-tech equipment; and expand curriculum to offer more short-term training academic credentials. The credentials can be earned in one to two semesters to quickly move students into employment while allowing them to work towards a two-year associate degree.

The grants to Nicolet are part of the \$28 million the Department of Workforce Development awarded to the 16 colleges in the Wisconsin Technical College System. It is estimated the money will help train nearly 5,000 more workers state-wide in high-demand fields.

Good nutrition essential for older adults

UW-Extension offers tips for encouraging older adults to eat well

Eating well and getting enough nutrition to maintain a healthy weight can prove to be a challenge for older adults. Many individuals simply find they don't have the same appetite they did when they were younger. And while the body needs fewer calories later in life, not eating enough can cause an unwanted weight loss.

Judith Knudsen, family living educator with Brown County UW-Extension, says there are other age-related changes that can affect older people's appetites and nutrition levels. "Food may not be as appealing if the senses of taste and smell are not as sharp as before," she says.

Older adults might not realize when they are thirsty and a dry mouth may create problems with teeth and gums. Muscle loss can contribute to difficulties chewing and swallowing.

If you are caring for an older adult who could benefit from consuming more nutritious foods, Knudsen offers some tips.

--Serve soft and easy-tochew foods such as mashed sweet potatoes, cooked pasta, canned fruits, scrambled eggs, pudding, yogurt and cheese. "Make smoothies for breakfast," suggests Knudsen.

--Prepare hearty soups and chunky stews with plenty of well-cooked vegetables.

--Offer high-calorie snacks when gaining weight is a priority.

--Make lunch the main meal of the day and serve colorful foods

--Provide plenty of water and fluids to increase hydration.

--Encourage an older adult to eat smaller, more frequent meals rather than sticking to a rigid schedule of three meals a day.

"Make eating and preparing food easier by using kitchen tools and utensils specifically designed for older adults or people with disabilities," says Knudsen. "Ask an older adult to help you prepare a meal or snack."

In vite family members or friends to dine with older adults to make eating a more pleasurable experience. And every so often, leave cooking and clean-up behind and plan to dine out as a special treat.



Maintaining A Mental Edge

Following a healthy diet, exercising regularly, watching your weight and managing stress will keep your body strong and healthy and keep your mind healthy too! The following principles of eating can build and maintain a healthy brain:

- Eat a low fat diet and reduce saturated fat by limiting full-fat dairy products and fatty
 - Eat a nutrient-dense diet. Make every bite count when choosing what to eat.
 - •EX: whole grain bread (nutrient-dense) vs. white bread (less nutritious).
- Eat a balanced diet of real food. Choose whole grains, vegetables and fruits along with low fat dairy and meats and stay away from processed foods.
- Avoid low calorie diets. These may affect memory, attention and reaction time. If you need to lose weight, do so gradually.
 - Eat breakfast. You'll be sharper all day.
 - Keep lunch light. A high fat or high calorie lunch can make you less alert.
 - Eat whole wheat bread, along with a little protein, a serving of fruit and vegetables.
- Eat more Omega 3 fatty acids. Fish (tuna, herring, halibut, salmon or sardines), flaxseed and canola oils, wheat germ, green leafy vegetables, and nuts (brazil nuts and walnuts), are high in Omega 3 fatty acids which can enhance brain function and fight against depression.
 - $\bullet \ Choose \ plenty \ of \ iron-rich foods. \ Iron \ transports \ oxygen \ to \ brain \ cells.$
 - Iron-rich foods include lean meats, beans and iron-fortified cereals.
- Include vegetables and whole grains daily, especially dark leafy greens and a variety of whole grains (for Vitamin E).
 - Drink a cup of green or black tea or coffee daily (for caffeine).
- Don't forget fiber. Soluble fiber stabilizes the blood sugar which is better for brain functions.
 - Munch daily on a handful of nuts (particularly almonds, walnuts and pecans).
- Substitute olive or canola oil for other vegetables oils (for vitamin E and Omega 3 fatty acids).
 - Exercise a minimum of 30 minutes most days of the week.

Hunters, trappers reminded that Aug. 1 is deadline for many season applications

MADISON - Aug. 1 marks a key deadline for many hunters, trappers and spearers in Wisconsin as fall approaches.

Those planning to participate in fall turkey, bobcat, fisher, otter, wolf or Upriver Lakes sturgeon seasons must have their permit applications submitted by noon Aug. 1.

Permit applications can be purchased through the Online Licensing Center on the DNR website, at all authorized license agents, at DNR Service Centers (Hours for service centers vary; check the DNR website for service center days and hours of operation; DNR Service Centers are not open on Saturdays), or by calling toll-free 1-877-LICENSE (1-877-945-4236).

Fall turkey

There will be approximately 96,700 wild turkey permits available to hunters for the fall 2014 turkey hunting season - the same number of permits offered in 2013. Please note that this number is preliminary and may be revised following review. Any fall turkey permits remaining after the initial drawing will go on sale at 10 a.m. on Aug. 23.

Leftover fall turkey permits will be sold by zone until sold out or the season ends. Hunters who receive fall turkey permits in Zones 1-5 will be able to fill their unused permits during the extended season in the zone where the permits were issued. Season dates are as follows:

Sept. 13 to Nov. 20 for all seven of Wisconsin's management zones; and an extended fall turkey season for Zones 1-5 from Dec. 1 to Dec. 31.

Canada geese

The Natural Resources Board will set waterfowl season dates at its Aug. 13 meeting. It is important to note that Horicon zone hunters no longer need to apply in advance for hunting tags. Hunters in this zone will simply need to indicate their zone preference when they purchase a license. Licenses are available for purchase at any time prior to hunting.

Season dates for waterfowl vary annually and will not be available until the Natural Resources Board acts in



Bobcat, fisher and otter

The approved quotas for bobcat, fisher and otter will be available on the DNR web page in late July - no major changes are expected from last year. An additional Southern bobcat zone (all of Wis. south of Hwy 64) has been approved for 2014. Those interested in hunting and/or trapping bobcats will need to apply to a specific zone (north or south) and time period (period 1 or 2) for the upcoming season. Bobcat applicant preference points will continue as in the past.

Final permit numbers will be known in August and drawings for all three species will take place in late August or early September. Season dates are as follows:

bobcat hunting and trapping: Period 1: Oct. 18 to Dec. 25; Period 2: Dec. 26 to Jan. 31, 2015; fisher (trapping only): Oct. 18 through Dec. 31; and otter (trapping only): North Zone Nov. 2, 2013 through April 30, 2014; Central & South zones Nov. 2, 2013 through March 31, 2014.

The total wolf quota has been set at 156, but the quota available to state-licensed hunters and trappers may be adjusted depending on state response to tribal declarations. The Department will maintain a 10-to-1 license-to-quota ratio.

One-half of available permits will be issued randomly among all permit applicants and the second half will be issued through a cumulative preference point drawing. Successful applicants will be notified by letter and may also check their drawing status through the DNR website or any licensing agent. It is the applicants responsibility to know their drawing status. Applicants who are not successful in the drawing will be awarded a preference point toward future drawings.

Wolf season will begin in all zones on Oct. 15 and run until the zone is closed by DNR or the last day of February, whichever occurs first. The department has the authority to close hunting zones when quotas are met or if deemed biologically necessary.

Wisconson State Patrol Law of the Month Motorcycle riders are required to have a motorcycle license

As motorcycles continue to grow in popularity among men and women of all ages, there also is a growing need to prevent motorcycle crashes. Last year, 83 motorcyclists died in Wisconsin traffic crashes and nearly 2,000 were injured.

To help prevent deaths and injuries, the Wisconsin State Patrol urges riders to get trained and get licensed. About 35 percent of motorcyclists' fatalities from 2003 to 2012 involved riders who had not completed the safety training or skills test required to obtain a motorcycle license.

A regular Class D driver's license for operating automobiles and light trucks is not sufficient for motorcycle operation. Motorcycle riders must also have a Class M motorcycle license. Riders who do not have a valid motorcycle license may receive a citation costing \$200 per violation.

"Too many people continue to ride without a motorcycle license," says State Patrol Captain Nicholas R. Wanink of the North Central Region/Wausau Post. "It's a serious problem especially for those who have not ridden a motorcycle for several years and are beginning to ride again. Riding a motorcycle requires more physical skill and mental concentration than driving a car, so riders need to get trained and get licensed for their safety and the safety of others on the road."

Obtaining a motorcycle license is not complicated. Motorcyclists must pass a written test and a road test at a DMV service center. Motorcyclists who successfully complete one of the following Wisconsin Motorcycle Safety Program courses do not have to take the road test at the DMV to get their license.

· Basic Rider Course for Motorcycles

· Basic Rider Course for Scooters

Basic Rider Course for Three-Wheel Motorcycles (trikes)
 Basic Rider Course 2 (for intermediate or advanced level riders)

This is surprising news to the riparian owners on Lake Lucerne and the people of Forest County. I made an inquiry to the DNR Fisheries Biologist , Greg Matzke who told me there are no plans to remove the Bass from Lake Lucerne next year .

We further talked about if there is an abundance of bass in the lake it is possible to remove the size limit and control the population by fishing. But first someone would present a resolution to do so at the spring hearings, and then the DNR would survey the lake to estimate abundance, size structure, body condition and growth of the population in Lake Lucerne.

Greg said there are three lakes in Florence county are going through the process right now which includes:
-Regulation change proposal, if the data supports the change, this could be done in April 2015 for Lake Lucerne.
-Then the regulation change question would be asked at the spring hearings and put up for a vote. First chance for Lake Lucerne would be April 2017

-If vote passes, new regulation goes into effect May 2018

All this would hinge on a survey of adult bass in Lake Lucerne of 3 to 5 per acre and the willingness of the public to engage in the process of size limit removal.



New crossbow deer hunting season for 2014



New in 2014, a crossbow deer hunting license is available for any qualified hunter to purchase. Previously, only disabled hunters could use a crossbow under the authority of an archer license.

The crossbow deer hunting season will run concurrent with the regular archer season. During open firearm seasons, a gun deer license will authorize bow and crossbow use. Crossbow licenses include one statewide buck tag and one Farmland Zone antierless tag. It is important to note that persons purchasing a traditional bow and a crossbow license will receive only one set of tags.

To help transition into this new season, the department is hosting an online crossbow chat at noon on Thursday, July 24. DNR regulations experts will be on hand to answer all crossbow-related questions.

The crossbow chat will kick off a series of chats that will help make sure hunters are aware of rule changes associated with this year's deer season.

The next chat, which will cover bonus antlerless tags, will take place at noon Aug. 12. Additional chats aimed at answering general regulations questions are scheduled for Sept. 2 and Sept. 9 at noon. For more information, search the DNR website dnr.wi.gov for keyword "chat."

Hunters are also encouraged to check out the frequently asked questions page for more information regarding rule changes. The FAQ feature provides brief responses to a wide variety of deer hunting questions, ranging from deer management unit boundaries to antlerless permits. To view the FAQ page, visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "deer."

Those interested in receiving email updates on crossbow deer hunting can sign up to receive occasional email reminders about season dates, regulations reminders and other important information. Visit dnr.wi.gov and click on the email icon near the bottom of the page for "subscribe for updates for DNR topics," then follow the prompts and select the "Crossbow Deer Hunting" distribution list.







THE RECALL ELECTI

There are two sides to every story. Here is the other side. For over 1 year a small fraction of the American Legion Post 94 members along with Commanders Jim Gunderson and Trent DuFour have been trying to coerce the City of Crandon into selling them property using bullying tactics. They used an extortion plot by threatening to close an alley that has been used by over 11 business places for over 100 years. Closing this alley would also put the US Post Office in jeopardy of being closed or moved to either Argonne or Laona. Even though the committees and council voted to sell a \$50,000 building to the Legion for a very reduced price of \$30,000, the Legion still has not followed up with the proper committees to negotiate the final details of this purchase. As chairman of the public property committee, I met with Jim Gunderson and we talked at length about a compromise that would benefit both the businesses and the American Legion. I discussed this with the mayor and he suggested I take this to the committee for their input and recommendations. This meeting never happened. Jim Gunderson came to me two days later and told me to hold off because he needed to talk to Trent DuFour. He told me Trent was putting up the money for the building and Trent had to go along with our compromise or the Legion wouldn't be able to complete the purchase. After that I invited the Legion Commander to two different committee meetings to further discuss this. No one representing the Legion came to either meeting. Keep in mind that this purchase to the Legion is tax exempt, resulting in no further revenue to the city. If the offer of \$50,000 would not have been interfered with by the Legion, the city would have \$50,000 in funds to be used to help reduce costs to the taxpayers. The city would have one more business in town that provides new jobs. This business would also be paying property taxes to the city every year. Even though all decisions and votes on this sale have been exclusively between the American Legion, committee, and city council in which the Mayor has no vote, except in case of a tie, which never happened, the Mayor is still being blamed for holding up this sale.

Now on the recall election. This was started by three individuals who are either members or have very strong ties with the American Legion. The members who filed the recall document as the recall committee members are Larry Alsteen, Bob Keller and Ron Eveland. They also circulated the petition for recall signature or had someone circulate for them. I talked to people who were called from City Hall and asked to support this recall. I talked to people who were also asked by former Mayor Gary Bradley to sign the petition and support this recall. The only candidate to come forth and oppose Mayor Jaeger in the recall is Dennis Rosa, who happens to be the City Clerk, Cindy Bradley's ex brother-in-law and former Mayor Gary Bradley's son-in-law Dennis Rosa, who has lived in the area all of his life in the Town of Crandon, not the City of Crandon. He recently moved into the city so he is now a city resident. I question why we need someone from across the line to come into Crandon and run our bushiness and city for us.

Now to address the "no" vote I made twice during special council meetings. The first special meeting that was called ordering the re-election. I had no problem with this because the signatures were all in order and papers filed properly. What made me vote no was the advice to the council from the City Attorney. She said the council was requested by state law to order this election by a council vote. 

Sheboygan alligator finds new home

The alligator recently caught near the Sheboygan River has found a new home at the Chicago Herpetological Society.

Sheboygan police officers and sheriff's deputies responded to reports of an alligator sighting on the morning of Sunday, July 20. After capturing the animal, it was turned over to Michael Clutter, a Department of Natural Resources conservation warden.

"I sent several emails to zoos and other animal rescues looking for a home for the alligator. Staff at the Milwaukee County Zoo suggested I contact Small Scale Reptile Rescue and they offered to take the animal," said Clutter.

Small Scale Reptile Rescue is a Milwaukee area organization that works with shelters and animal control agencies to assist in the rehabilitation and finding suitable homes for abandoned and seized reptiles. The organization sends alligators to alligator farms but will not allow the general public to receive them. The organization transported the animal to t h e Chicago Herpetological Society this past Tuesday evening.

State law regulates the introduction, stocking and release of wild animals, and violators can face a forfeiture of \$539.50 for the release of a wild animal. The incident remains under investigation. Anyone with information is asked to contact the DNR at 1-800-TIP-WDNR.




Concerts on the Riverwalk moves back to the
