#### May's Bar celebrates 75 years Charlie & Ethel's kids are throwing a party!


Most businesses are started with success in mind, and to many, a ten-year run would make them feel successful. May's Bar, in the Wolf River Valley just west of Crandon, has certainly been successful. After 75 years, it feels more like an institution than a bar business. The bar was the idea of Charlie May, along with his wife Ethel, they not only ran a bar, but a farm as well. In their spare time they had kids.

Construction of the log building began in 1939, and in 1940, Charlie was ready to open the doors. Louie McMillion, an established saloon owner in Crandon gave Charlie a case of beer and two bottles of booze to get him started. It was, after all, the tail-end of the Great Depression, and a gift like this was a great gift indeed. It worked, as the tavern was successful, and so was the farm he started to help things out. Charlie explained it; "I run the farm to keep the bar going, and I run the bar to keep the farm going." While it sounds silly at first, it was a practical move. If one business was slow, the other could pick up the slack. An interesting note to the opening is that Whoopee Cowboy (Ernie Wilson) and Max Scharf provided the live music.

May's Bar was sort of a community project. Logs for building were cheap and readily available, so a log building it was. Friends showed up to help with the building. There were many who helped out, unfortunately, their names are lost to time, but we do know that Valentine Richie was there to help, Russell Johnson was the head carpenter, and Clyde Wilbur was on hand. During the building project, Clyde was given the name Deep Purple by Charlie. Clyde didn't like the nickname, but it stuck. He couldn't remember why Charlie stuck him with the name, and neither could Charlie. The song, "Deep Purple," was popular at the time, and probably had something to do with it, but we will never know.

### Brush Run Racing this weekend in Crandon



It's a phenomenon that started nearly half a decade ago in the backwoods of northeast Wisconsin. It has evolved into a major stop in America's off-road racing calendar.

As it has since 1970, this weekend Crandon International Raceway will be the epicenter of the short-course off-road racing world as it gets ready to host the 22nd annual Forest County Potawatomi Brush Run event. Held at the legendary facility's purpose-built race track located in the heart of Wisconsin's scenic Northwoods, the Brush Run schedule features nearly three full days of TORC PRO and Crandon Sportsman racing from Friday, June 26th through Sunday, June 28th.

The weekend's on-track action will culminate late Sunday afternoon with the 22nd Annual Forest County Potawatomi Community Cup race. Pitting the TORC PRO 2WD and TORC PRO 4WD classes together on the same track with a staggered start, the intense annual race offers a total cash prize package of \$24,000, with the winner picking up a healthy \$15,000 pay day. In addition, the winner will receive valuable product bonuses from Lincoln Welders and MasterCraft Safety.

On Saturday and Sunday the stars of The Off-Road Championship (TORC) series presented by Amsoil will take to Crandon's legendary high-speed dirt track including the ultra-competitive PRO 4WD, PRO 2WD and PRO LIGHT truck classes. Leading the field will be Wisconsin native CJ Greaves, who leads the PRO 2WD division while second in the PRO 4WD points battle behind father Johnny Greaves. Kyle Hart, whose father Marty is also a short-course racing legend, comes to the Brush Run weekend atop the TORC PRO LIGHTS points standings.

This weekend's Crandon Forest County Potawatomi Brush Run represents Rounds 7 and 8 of a 16-race 2015 TORC season. As is tradition, TORC and Crandon Sportsman Off-Road Series racers will conclude their year at Crandon International

### The Good Ol' Days of Horse Logging

My Grandpa Monte died in 1963, when I was sixteen years old. We lived in a small town in northeast Wisconsin named Argonne. Grandpa was one of the last blacksmiths in the area. His shop was behind his home on the main street of our little town of 300 souls. At the time, I didn't realize how unique it was to have a grandfather with a working blacksmith shop. He was technically retired from the county highway department, but he had a thriving business making horse drays, horse shoes, skidding tongs, chain hooks and a number of other tools used by loggers at that time. Grandpa had spent many years working as a teamster, driving logging sleighs, and had owned his own team that he contracted out to logging companies. He had also worked as a camp blacksmith a number of times.

When Grandpa passed on, he left at the time that a big technological revolution was to take place in the woods. The beginning of the end of horse logging had started with hydraulic loaders mounted on the back of crawler tractors, and a weird looking invention from Escanaba, Michigan called an Iron Mule was to gradually take the place of ol' Dobbin. Each year, there were more loggers who talked to their banker about purchasing iron, and gradually, loggers using horses and mules became a rarity.


Our modern loggers, except for a few old-timers, have no idea what life was like for a logger in the horse days. Like today, the business got in your blood, but the lifestyle was very different. I started my career in the woods looking up a horse's tail in 1965, and worked with horses off and on until 1980. In fact, it was because I had experience with horse logging that I got the break needed to start my own logging business. We were cutting big pine logs, the kind you can brag about in the tavern. We should have been making lots of money, but the cable skidder we were using was plaguing us with small breakdowns. The state forest ranger was on the job, and heard me launch a tirade at the offending piece of yellow iron. I said, "I could make more money here with a three-legged horse than this \$!@%\*& thing." He asked me if I knew how to skid with a horse, I answered in the affirmative, and he said to call him in breakup, as he had a horse-logging job for me. I did call, and before long, I was cutting some huge popple and birch and putting wood on the road with two new partners called Babe and Charlie. Myself, Babe, Charlie and an assortment of helpers put wood roadside for the better part of three years, and I look back at those days with great fondness.

For you young "Paul Bunyans," who have never experienced the life of a horse logger, keep reading. You might think that you wouldn't like to log with a horse, but I think if you did, like me, you would look back on the experience as one of the better ones in your life. Working with animals was all consuming. You lived your job, so it helped to like it! Unlike a piece of machinery, you couldn't shut off the engine and start it up again on Monday morning. Horses and mules have to eat, just like your kids, everyday. On Saturday and Sunday, the old cream cans that always rode in the back of the pickup were filled at a spring or creek on the way to the job. In the winter, a hole often had to be chopped in the ice so the water could be dipped. A 55 gallon barrel was usually used to water the horses on the job site. Cut in half through the middle, the barrel made two useful water tanks. While the horses inhaled from five to ten gallons apiece, the barn was shoveled, hay was shook up on the end of a fork to get rid of as much of the dust as possible and the oat box was filled. The horses were put back in the barn, tied to the manger pole and the job was done. Often, a few cords were cut and skidded on Saturday morning, but not usually on Sunday. Taking care of the horses on the weekends was often a pleasant experience. During grouse season or trout season, you could hunt or fish your way home, sometimes stopping off for a few beers, and sometimes a lot of beers!

Good horses and mules were treasured by their owners. Many a tear was shed when a favorite horse died or became too old or sick to work, and many old horses were kept in the pasture for years by sentimental loggers who thought they had earned a "retirement" and kept them fed and watered until they couldn't get up one morning. A good friend of mine had a horse that died in the woods, and he dug a grave for his old work partner. One of the other men on the job mentioned that he could probably get a few bucks for the hide and was told in hard tones that this horse had earned the right to be buried in his hide.

There was many an argument a few decades ago over which animal was best in the woods; a horse or a mule. Certainly, there were advantages with both. While I never skidded with a mule, I saw them working on occasion. One of my first jobs cutting in the woods was skidded with mules. I was a real greenhorn at cutting timber and stretched the truth a little to get the job. When my employers started to skid my strip, I never heard so much swearing and rough language in my life, and I had heard plenty. I thought that it must be very difficult to work a mule, and was told that they weren't swearing at the mules, the mules knew how to do their job. Later that day, I was looking for another place to cut timber.

#### For Old Time's Sake



That pickup not running right lately? Do the repair bills make you want to weep? What you need is a yoke of oxen! These fellows posed for a photo on the corner of Madison and Lake Avenue sometime around 1908. Of course, they wouldn't have known what a pickup truck was at this time, but were likely proud of their oxen.

There were some advantages to having oxen. They always started whatever the temperature happened to be. You could grow the "fuel" they burned, and if they died, you could always eat them. Then again, you didn't want to be in a hurry!

Most mule skinners said that a good mule would pull more and work harder, pound for pound, than a horse. A good mule was a joy to work with and easier to care for. A horse has to be fed oats in measured amounts. Too many oats and horse would get sick, swelling with gas until they almost exploded, but a mule could be fed by putting the whole bag in the manger, and the mule would only eat what he needed. From the stories I've heard, however, a good mule was harder to find than a good horse.

Everybody knows that a mule is known for his stubbornness. Frog Lyons, told of a white mule he owned that could skid pretty good, with the only drawback being that he often tried to kick your brains out when you bent over to hook up a drag of wood. Frog said he could tell when the mule was going to kick, and he was fast enough to hook the chain and get out of the way, but a friend who tried to skid with the mule was bigger and little slower and sometimes was kicked twice before he could get out of the way. One morning when they arrived at the job, they found the door kicked off the barn. The white mule had escaped. By looking at the shoulder of the road they were able to pick out a hoof print here and there. About ten miles from the job site, they found tracks that turned into the road leading to the Three Lakes Airport. They found the mule standing in the middle of the runway, and he had resisted all attempts by airport workers to make him move. Planes were waiting to take off and other airplanes had to be diverted to neighboring airports, not wanting to run their propeller into the side of a mule. Frog said he wasn't hard to catch, and when they fastened the lead rope, he went peacefully. Not wanting to walk the ten miles or so back to the job, they tied the mule to the back of the truck with the intention of driving slowly back. This was not to be. The old mule didn't mind being led by a man, but he wasn't about to be led anywhere by a truck. He planted his feet and was being skidded down the blacktop. Frog said that he didn't want to have a mule with legs worn down to a length of six inches, so the two loggers took turns walking the mule back to the job, with each man walking a mile and driving a mile. This mule was sold to the first interested party.

Another friend also had a white mule. I don't know how reliable the animal was in the woods, but one year, after spring break-up was over, it was time to go to work. The mule was in the pasture and my friend tried to catch him and take him to the job. There was a rodeo that morning, with a mule being chased around the pasture by a logger who was getting red-faced and angrier with each step. Finally, he walked to the house, unlimbered his deer rifle and shot the mule dead, where he lays to this day in an unmarked grave. This friend was one of the first in our area to invest in an Iron Mule.

Stories abound about smart mules and dumb horses. Someone once said that a mule was a horse with a brain. I have seen plenty of smart horses. There were many horses that would walk themselves back to the sawyer, who hooked him up to a drag and sent him out to the pile, where another man unhooked the wood and sent the horse back. Most horses didn't do this, of course, and had to be driven.

I have seen more than one old horse who would fake it. After being hooked up to a heavy drag, the horse would look like he was straining every muscle he had to move the log, but with no success. On closer inspection, the slack wasn't taken out of the heel chains. My old Belgian, Charlie, would fake pulling, complete with grunts and trying different angles on the pull. I never hit that horse in the years I had him, but the sound of a switch breaking usually sent him on his way to the landing without difficulty. When he persisted to pretend to pull, I would shake my fist in front of his eye and threaten to punch him between the eyes and other threats that can't be printed in this magazine. This always worked.

Charlie was a free spirit. He always knew when quitting time was close, and if you didn't tie him when you were piling pulpwood, he ran to the barn with the singletree bouncing along behind. He would be standing in the barn looking at the oat box, and he wasn't about to go back to work. When feeding Charlie on the weekend, you couldn't tie him. He liked to roll on his back, grunt, groan and and wave his hooves till he was satisfied. The barn was shoveled, feed put in the manger and then you had to get out of the way and shut up. Charlie was always anxious to go back in the barn and get his oats, but you had better not tell him to go in the barn, because then he wouldn't, and you couldn't catch him. I experimented with this trait of his. I would wait until everything but his hindquarters were in the barn and then order him to go in the barn. He would jump backwards and refuse to enter, even though he wanted his oats. It was a battle of wills that he always won. The only way to get him in the barn was to start the truck and slowly drive off. I would observe him in the side mirror, watching the truck leave and savoring the victory over the man who made him work, only then would he run into the barn and plunder the full oat box.

Charlie was over twenty years old when I bought him. He had been well taken care of and was in good shape, but skinny. A horse's teeth will continue to grow through life, making sharp points that prevent them from grinding their grain into digestible pieces. Because of this, I had a local horse handler file his teeth occasionally, and I



#### Nicolet College Board approves **2015-16** budget

The Nicolet College Board of Trustees recently approved the college's budget for next year which is projected to slightly reduce the tax on a \$100,000 home from \$37.40 this year to \$37.08 in 2015-16.

The final tax rate won't be known until October when the state releases final property valuation figures. The projected tax levy is based on an estimated valuation increase of 1 percent in the district. Last year valuations increased 1.75 percent.

The total budget unanimously approved by the board is \$35,821,178, a 0.44 percent decrease from the previous year.

At the June 15 meeting the college reported it will receive \$2.3 million in state and federal grants to continue to advance academic initiatives in 2015-16.

"The college continues to work hard finding ways to expand the job training necessary to advance economic recovery in the Northwoods," said Nicolet Interim President Kenneth Urban.

The grant funding will allow the college to add the new Electromechanical Technician credential this fall and expand academic offerings in Information Technology, Welding, Early Childhood Education, Business, and Marketing.

The funding will also allow the college to expand use of its next-generation TelePresence technology to deliver instruction remotely to locations in Minocqua and Tomahawk. This fall Nicolet will offer 42 classes at the college's Lakeland Center in Minocqua and 15 classes at its outreach center in Tomahawk using this technology.

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





You may have noticed the number of traffic fatalities being displayed on message signs along major roadways around the state. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) is using this somber message to remind everyone that driving is the most dangerous activity most of us perform each day.

Last year, Wisconsin had 496 traffic fatalities, which was the lowest number of deaths and the first time below 500 fatalities since 1943. However, at the midway point of this year, traffic fatalities in Wisconsin are up significantly compared with the same period last year. This substantial increase in traffic deaths includes motorcyclists, pedestrians, and bicyclists as well as drivers and passengers in cars and trucks.

To reverse this tragic trend, WisDOT is intensifying its traffic safety efforts. Along with other engineering improvements, we will continue to add rumble strips to highways to help prevent drivers from crossing into oncoming lanes of traffic or running off the road. We will work diligently with our law enforcement partners to put more officers on the road for traffic safety enforcement in areas and at times when crashes are more likely to occur. We will maintain our education and public outreach efforts to motivate motorists to make better decisions and take responsibility for their actions behind the wheel.

But WisDOT and our traffic safety partners also need your help to prevent crashes. As we enter the busy summer travel months—typically the months with the highest number of traffic fatalities—we urge you to buckle up, slow down, pay attention and drive sober. We also need you to share the road with motorcyclists, bicyclists and pedestrians. Above all, we need you to drive as if your life—and other lives—depended on it.

At the time of the building project, Charlie and Ethel Gumm May had been married about five years, having tied the knot back in 1934. Ethel taught for a time at the Wolf River School that used to be on Old 8, and Siding One School as well. Carol May Barker was born when the bar was being built, and Patsy May Wilson was born two years before. Jack and Charlene May Tupper were already born. It takes faith and guts to attempt a project like this in bad times, but things did get better.

Eventually, living quarters were added, and gas pumps were installed. Phil, Tom, Bonnie, then the twins, Bob and Bill also came along. Bill said that self-serve gas stations may have been a more recent innovation, but it was always that way at May's Bar. You just walked in and told Charlie what the total was and paid for it.

Through the years, Charlie and Ethel ran a place that made everybody feel welcome. Charlie was known for his many funny stories and quips, but Ethel could hold her own in that department too. Charlie loved practical jokes, and was good at pulling them off. He helped his friends if they needed help. He saw the humor in everyday life and passed that humor on to all who came in the door. He was always open, and years back, when it was late at night and all of the gas stations were closed for the day, everybody knew you could fill up at May's Bar. When asked why he was always open, he replied; "You can't sell gas through a closed door!"

Charlie and Ethel actually gave this area about five miles from Crandon a geographical location. The area came to be known as "The Valley," and this part of the Town of Crandon became an unofficial community.

In 1970, he sold the bar to his son, Bill. He stayed on to tend bar, and told Bill, "I will work until I get enough to drink." Charlie did sip a few while he was working, but he was still a bargain.

In 1971, Ethel suffered a stroke and was confined to a wheelchair, but still spent time in the bar visiting with customers and telling stories until her death in 1978.

Charlie passed on in 1982. Bill and Bonnie, however, do a pretty good job of taking his place and providing high quality BS.

An event like this doesn't happen every day. In fact, it takes 75 years! The Mays are holding a party to celebrate this momentous occasion on July 3rd, starting at 3:00 p.m. There will be food, live music and then a DJ, and, no doubt, plenty of refreshments.

We are sure Charlie and Ethel would approve!

#### Good Ol' Days Horse Logging cont

always fed him ground oats and corn instead of whole oats. Every month or so, I would split a pound of chewing tobacco between Charlie and Babe's oat boxes. This kept parasites from taking up residence in them. As a result of taking care of them, both of my horses stayed in good shape.

When I bought Charlie, in mid-summer, he was skinny, having competed with riding horses for his oats at his previous home. I showed Charlie to my dad and said, "Isn't he a great looking horse!" My dad agreed, but I could tell he was lying. That fall, we had finished a job and brought the horses home for a few days. Dad thought I had bought a new horse. When I told him that was Charlie, he couldn't believe it. He said he complimented my horse a few months back so he wouldn't hurt my feelings. Good feeding had paid off.

Babe was a gentle animal who would greet you with a "nicker" and often would nuzzle you in the morning, when you opened the barn door. She always came when she was called. Charlie had a malicious streak. In spite of his advanced age, he would have cleared the neighbor's five-strand barbed wire fence if it would have been an inch lower, and I wouldn't have had to replace the five fence posts he knocked over. When we kept the horses at home during breakup or between jobs, we kept them in a tenacre pasture behind our house that was surrounded by a single strand of electric wire. The only reason Charlie stayed in the enclosure was because Babe was there, and he would follow her anywhere. If we wanted to catch Charlie, we would catch Babe and Charlie would follow. My wife and I like to reminisce about the time Charlie leaped the electric wire. He whinnied at the house and pranced around the yard, looking at the window to see if we were watching. On a hunch, I wouldn't go outside to chase him. After awhile, he gave up and jumped back in the pasture.

Both of these horses were easy to handle and knew how to skid wood, often "teaching" a new employee how to do the job. I might have logged with horses for many years to come, if it wasn't for the Forest Service. While the Forest Service rangers liked the job you could do with a horse, they had an aversion to roads and thought a quarter mile was a normal skidding distance. Horses work effectively out to 300 feet or so, and after that production drops to nothing. While I did get jobs on some sensitive sites from nervous landowners who didn't want a big machine on their land, these jobs became few and far between as I used up prospective landowners.

Selling those animals was like selling a good friend, but 3,200 pounds of horseflesh to take care of each day was impossible. We made sure they went to responsible owners and went back to iron.

There are still loggers out there who use horses, but they are few and far between. There are advantages to horse logging. While production doesn't match a skidder, the cost of putting a cord of wood on the road is less. At one point in my logging career, I was making a \$2000 a month payment on a Tree Farmer forwarder. The thought occurred to me that my horses, portable barn, harness, single trees, chains and tongs hadn't cost \$2000! But, I didn't have to drive to the job site to feed the skidders on weekends, and it was easier to hire help to work with machinery than with horses. It was easier to clean up my language after the horses were gone too.

Most horses were trained by men who used an expletive before or after each command. Horses learned the command and curse together. At one time, we had taken in an old work horse that wasn't being fed very well. She was a skinny, white mare named Molly, with a big long head, and she wasn't easy on the eye. My wife, Linda, would feed her a ration of grain while I was at work. The grain was kept in a shed, and when Linda went in the shed, Molly would force herself in the door and would refuse to move. Linda would give her the command "back" and nothing happened. When she told me that it didn't work, I said, "You have to swear at her and she'll move." My unbelieving wife tried this method the next day, and she said Molly jumped backwards at the command with a healthy curse attached. It's all in the training.

No doubt you mechanized loggers of today will be telling of the old ways of logging someday. You'll explain that you logged with wheeled machinery that actually touched the ground and didn't hover. You may have to explain that a saw had teeth and mechanically cut through the tree, and that 'anti-matter wood slicers' weren't even imagined. But, I don't think any of you realized what a joy it was to work with a good horse. There were no roaring diesels in the woods, and when there were no chainsaws running, you could hear the birds singing, the harness squeaking and the heel chains jingling. Piling pulpwood by hand and walking fast behind a horse kept loggers in great physical condition. (You could always tell the guys that traded their horses for a skidder by the size of their belly.) A skidder never nickers a "hello" in the morning or affectionately nuzzles your shoulder when you 'fuel' it up, and when you cuss that skidder, it can't hear you, but a horse can.

So to you guys that are still using a horse, you have my admiration. I remember walking in a tavern one afternoon, and another logger sniffed and said I smelled like horse manure. I replied, "Yes, and it smells a helluva lot better than hydraulic oil!"



School District of Crandon meets the HealthierUS School Challenge



The School District of Crandon is making national news by working to support and improve the health of our children and our community. As part of their efforts, healthy items are featured on their menus and physical education and activity emphasized. Their efforts are part of the HealthierUS School Challenge (HUSSC).

The HUSSC application process was completed by the School District of Crandon and Crandon Elementary, Middle and High School were all selected for a Bronze Award. Special recognition is due to the school nutrition staff for their efforts in achieving school lunch menu changes leading to the HUSSC Bronze awards received.

The HealthierUS School Challenge is a voluntary national certification initiative for schools participating in the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. It supports First Lady Michelle Obama's Let's Move campaign by recognizing schools that are creating healthier school environments through their promotion of good nutrition and physical activity. Sponsored by the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), the initiative encourages all schools take a leadership role in helping students to make healthier eating and physical activity choices that will last a lifetime. Schools, such as Crandon Elementary, Middle and High, that champion the HUSSC work hard to make changes to their school environment in order to (1) improve the quality of the foods served, (2) provide students with nutrition education, and (3) provide students with physical education and opportunities for physical activity.

Ultimately, FNS would like to see all schools receive a HUSSC award at any one of the four levels of superior performance: Bronze, Silver, Gold, or Gold Award of Distinction. Schools awarded receive a monetary incentive (Bronze \$500, Silver \$1000, Gold \$1500, and Gold Award of Distinction \$2000), an award plaque signed by a USDA official, a banner to display in their school, and their name listed on the Team Nutrition Web site.

To qualify for an award, a school must submit a formal application and meet basic criteria set forth by the FNS. The HUSSC criteria reflect the recommendations of the 2010 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, and the Institute of Medicine (IOM) published recommendations (April 2007) for foods that should be served outside of the organized school meals program. HealthierUS Schools must meet additional criteria demonstrating its commitment to a healthy school environment, as well as implement a local school wellness policy, as mandated by Congress. Schools receiving a HUSSC award commit to meeting the criteria throughout their four year certification period.




ranging from the dulcimer, banjo, and ukulele to a mandolin, fiddle, and accordian.




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
