Senators Johnson, Barrasso introduce gray wolf delisting bill

Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) and Sen. John Barrasso (R-Wyo.) introduced legislation this week that directs the secretary of the Interior to reissue final rules related to the listing of the gray wolf in Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota and Wyoming under the Endangered Species Act of 1973. The bill serves as the Senate companion to the bipartisan House bill introduced by Reps. Reid Ribble (R-Wis.) and Cynthia Lummis (R-Wyo.) earlier this year.

"After over 30 years of needed protection and professional pack population management, the wolf has made its comeback," Johnson said. "In 2011, the administration's Department of the Interior determined the number of wolves in the western Great Lakes states to be sufficient and growing and made the correct decision to delist them as an endangered species. President Obama's own Interior secretary applauded the decision, saying, 'Thanks to the work of our scientists, wildlife managers, and our state, tribal, and stakeholder partners, gray wolves in the western Great Lakes region are now fully recovered and healthy.'

"Unfortunately, in late 2014, a liberal judge in Washington, D.C. overruled the administration's wildlife experts in the field and returned the gray wolves to the Endangered Species List. It's obvious the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service judges its past delisting decision to have been correct, and the ongoing efforts in Wisconsin and elsewhere to properly manage the wolf levels are working well. Simply put, wolves in these four states are no longer endangered and do not need the protections the ESA afforded them in the past.

"Our bill's language does not modify the Endangered Species Act, nor does it prevent the Fish and Wildlife Service from ever returning the wolf to the endangered list if it determines the population is again threatened and in need of federal protection. I strongly agree with Wisconsin's farmers, ranchers, loggers and sportsmen that future gray wolf listing decisions should come from the experts, and not from judges.

"Several important strides have been taken this year to once and for all give the final say on the gray wolf's status to our expert researchers inside the state Department of Natural Resources and the Department of the Interior. I'm glad to be a part of this important effort, and it is my hope that all senators from these four affected states will join Sen. Barrasso and me in this effort. "

"Wyoming has honored its commitment and put together a solid and working plan to protect the state's wolf population. Even the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service agrees that wolves should be delisted in Wyoming," said Barrasso. "This is just one of many legislative opportunities we'll continue to pursue until Wyoming's wolf management plan is protected and fully implemented."

Gun deer season opens Saturday Registration has changed

DNR press release

MADISON - Wisconsin's nine-day gun deer season opens this Saturday, November 21, and state wildlife officials say if summertime observations and reports from the public are any indication, 2015 is shaping up to be a good deer hunting year in many areas across Wisconsin.

In 2014, hunters across the state adapted to a number of new deer management regulations. In 2015, the biggest change is hunters' deer registration is going entirely paperless, and can be completed by phone or over the Internet. Hunters can register deer online through gamereg.wi.gov or by phone at 1-844-426-3734.

"Registering your deer has never been easier," said DNR Secretary Cathy Stepp. "Hunters will also have the option of registering electronically at a participating in-person registration station or you can still go to any of your favorite spots after the hunt and register anywhere there's a phone or a computer with internet access." For a list of participating businesses in your area, search the DNR website for keywords "deer registration."

Wisconsin's four Deer Management Zones and Deer Management Units have not changed in 2015. DMUs follow county boundaries in most cases, and nine DMUs are split by zone boundaries. New for 2015, there are DMU and land type-specific antlerless permits to help more closely manage deer populations on each land type with the hope of enhancing the hunting experience on public land.

All hunters will receive a Farmland Zone Antlerless Deer Carcass Tag with the purchase of each deer hunting license (archer/crossbow and gun). This tag must be designated for use in a specific zone, DMU and land type (public access or private) at the time of issuance, or may be deferred until a later date with payment of a \$2 convenience fee.

With each deer hunting license, hunters will receive one Buck Deer Carcass Tag valid statewide and one Farmland Zone Antlerless Deer Carcass Tag valid in the zone, county DMU, and land type (public access or private) of the buyer's choosing at time of license purchase. Farmland Zone tags may not be used in the Northern Forest or Central Forest zones, but bonus antlerless tags may be available in these zones. All Bonus Antlerless Deer Permits are zone, DMU and land-type specific. Bonus permits cost \$12 for residents, \$20 for nonresidents and \$5 for youth (ages 10 and 11).

Bonus antlerless deer permits are valid only in the Zone, DMUs and land type (public access or private) indicated on the carcass tag. Tags are limited, including 13 counties in part or whole where zero will be available.

Twelve county DMUs, in whole or in part, are designated as buck-only units. All buck-only units are restricted to the Northern and Central Forest zones. Only the Buck Deer Carcass Tag issued with each deer license is valid in these DMUs, with some exceptions for youth, Class A and C disabled and military hunters.

Everyone in the area is invited to attend. In past years, over 200 people have come for the great turkey meal with all the fixin's and the great desserts.







Deer hunters can get their deer tested and help with CWD surveillance

MADISON -- State wildlife officials will continue testing harvested white-tailed deer for chronic wasting disease this year. This testing is part of the state's ongoing efforts to monitor the status and spread of the disease in Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources will be testing deer from select areas of the state. Surveillance will focus on adult deer, since older deer are more likely to have the disease.

A map of the 2015 CWD sampling area [PDF] can be found at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "CWD."

The department will continue to collect samples from deer harvested in Dane, Iowa, Rock, Walworth, Washburn, Juneau, Adams, Portage and Marathon counties. New for 2015, wildlife staff will be sampling in the

Fairchild/Augusta area in Eau Claire County, where the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection discovered a CWD-positive deer on a private deer farm earlier this year. In Marquette and Green Lake counties, samples will be collected at select taxidermists throughout the deer hunting season.

"With electronic registration fully in effect this deer season we would like to remind deer hunters that there are still in-person locations available for them to have their deer sampled for CWD," said Tami Ryan, DNR wildlife health section chief.

The department works closely with a number of private businesses throughout Wisconsin to offer CWD sampling, and is currently piloting a self-service kiosk program in 2015 in parts of southern and northern Wisconsin. Kiosks are currently open around the clock, and sampling materials and tools are available onsite. CWD tests and kiosks are free of charge, and test results will be sent within three to four weeks

For information regarding where to take your deer for sampling, search keywords "CWD sampling" or contact the DNR call center at 888-936-7463. Hunters are reminded to contact sampling stations in advance to verify hours of operation.



DNR Bobcat Researchers Looking for Trapper Assistance

RHINELANDER, Wis. - Trappers who incidentally capture bobcats in 12 northern counties are encouraged to contact Department of Natural Resources staff and participate in a bobcat research project. The bobcat monitoring project began in early 2014 and seeks to better understand populations and habitat preferences of Wisconsin bobcat.

"Trappers can help by allowing us to radio-collar any incidentally captured bobcats before they are released," says Nathan Roberts, large carnivore and furbearer research scientist.

This research will help the department better understand the northern zone bobcat population size and status; and ultimately inform the annual quota setting process. For the 2015-2016 trapping season, research efforts are focused on a 12 county area of the Northwoods and includes Ashland, Florence, Forest, Iron, Langlade, Lincoln, Oneida, Price, Rusk, Sawyer, Taylor, and Vilas counties.

Harvest data from Wisconsin's 2014-15 bobcat seasons has shown that hunters and trappers harvested 274 bobcats. This marks the fourth year of expanded bobcat harvest and includes results from the newly opened southern bobcat harvest zone. The Department of Natural Resources works in partnership with the Wisconsin Trapper's Association to monitor and improve regulated trapping opportunities in the state.

"The Wisconsin Trapper's Association highly supports bobcat research in the northern bobcat zone," says Scott Zimmerman, president of the Wisconsin Trapper's Association. "With research like this, it can only help with quotas. The WTA strongly encourages trappers to report any incidental bobcats that they may catch."

In the event of an incidental bobcat capture in the 12 county area, DNR staff will promptly work with participating trappers to determine if the bobcat is a good candidate for the research project. Interested trappers can contact department researcher staff by calling 715-401-1051.

Does Turkey Really Make You Tired?

Will you suffer from 'turkey coma' this holiday season? That lethargic feeling you get after a hearty Thanksgiving meal is as traditional as the holiday itself -- and it's usually blamed on the bird. But is the turkey really guilty as charged?

Thanksgiving is a food lover's dream. Besides turkey, there's bound to be some honey-glazed ham, corn bread stuffing, or green bean casserole on the table. And you just have to have a piece of pumpkin pie, right?

But by the time you've eaten your second (or third) helpings, fatigue kicks in, leaving you motionless on the couch -- and wondering if there wasn't a sleeping pill hidden in one of those bountiful dishes.

This post-dinner yen to fall asleep is known as a "turkey coma," because it usually happens on Thanksgiving or some other big-meal winter holiday that includes the big bird, leaving some to speculate that turkey is the cause of the drowsiness.

Before you make this Thanksgiving main-dish staple your go-to cure for insomnia, however, you may want to hear why experts dispute this theory.

The Tryptophan Effect

Many believe that turkey's sleep-inducing powers come from its high levels of L-tryptophan. Commonly known as tryptophan, it's an amino acid that helps the body produce serotonin, a known sleeping aid.

This explanation may appear to be a no-brainer, but according to Judith Wurtman, PhD, former director of the Research Program in Women's Health at the MIT Clinical Research Center and co-author of The Serotonin Power Diet, your body doesn't absorb this protein so easily. Tryptophan needs to reach your brain directly in order to produce serotonin, and even though turkey contains high levels of tryptophan, other amino acids found in turkey have a much greater chance of reaching the brain. "Tryptophan is the least available amino acid in nature," says Dr. Wurtman.

So while it's true that your body absorbs tryptophan when you eat turkey, you're also digesting other amino acids -- in much higher concentrations. All of

these chemicals are scrambling to reach your brain, and since strength comes in numbers, tryptophan is ultimately shoved aside in your bloodstream by other, more abundant amino acids.

The Truth Behind This Turkey Tale

If you're still convinced that eating tons of turkey on Thanksgiving will prompt some shut-eye, recall the last time your daily turkey sandwich made you doze off during a post-lunch meeting at work.

Nothing yet? Maybe it's time to re-examine your idea of what constitutes a sleep-inducing meal.

"You have to think of what else you're eating," Wurtman says. "Desserts, creams, butter, rolls, squashy, cranberry sauce -- you're getting a lot of other foods that are high in fat and carbohydrates. The turkey's an afterthought!" Both fat and carbs will make you sleepy; the combination is especially zzz-inducing.

According to the Calorie Control Council, Americans typically consume more than 4,500 calories (229 grams of fat) on Thanksgiving Day. Compare that to the daily caloric needs of someone who's moderately active and weighs 145 lbs.: Such a person needs 1,774 calories per day to maintain their current weight, based on targets from My Calorie Counter. So it's easy to see why a turkey-day feast could lead to a post-dinner slump. In just one day, you could be consuming more than 2.5 times more calories than usual -- and your body will need to work overtime to process all that extra grub. "The blood is diverted to the digestive system, where the food is being dumped for digestion," Dr. Wurtman says. This diverson causes blood to flow away from your brain, which can make you feel tired. "You might feel as if your brain is stuffed with cotton."

In addition, those extra carbohydrates (we're looking at you mashed potatoes) will trigger a spike in your insulin levels, pushing other amino acids into your cells and away from your bloodstream. That gives the serotonin-producer tryptophan the rare opportunity to enter your brain uninterrupted.

Fatty, carby foods aren't the only sleep triggers. That cocktail before dinner, those glasses of wine or hard cider you had with your meal, the after-dinner drinks -- all add up to that lazy, tired feeling.

In fact, it's the turkey that will actually keep you awake and alert. Turkey may be one of just a few sources of protein in a traditional Thanksgiving dinner -- instead of draining your energy, protein is more likely to boost it. Turkey-Day Tips that will Keep You on the Ball

Wurtman claims that her family never gets tired after Thanksgiving dinner. The key is managing your carbohydrate and fat intake, she says, so you can keep your energy levels stable.

Snag a few of her best tips that'll give you zip, not zap:

- Stifle the stuffing. There's no need to eliminate this popular side dish -- but you may want to cut back on the bread and oil that make it a common carbohydrate culprit. Veggies mixed with fresh herbs and spices can make a wonderful alternative.
- Include some simple sides. Wurtman loves to roast sweet potatoes and carrots with a hint of olive oil. This allows the veggies to caramelize, a preparation method that brings out their natural sweetness while adding a crisp and crunchy texture.
- Nibble on the center of that pie. Pie crusts harbor some serious carbs, so if you limit yourself to the filling, you can satisfy your sweet tooth without the dreaded aftereffects.
- Cut back on appetizers. Meal starters such as creamy dips combined with tortilla chips and crackers and cheese are sneaky sleep-inducers. Shift the focus to the main event to avoid getting tired before the entree is served.
- Chug, chug, chug -- water, that is. It's easy to forget about H2O when you're surrounded by alcoholic and other beverages, but it's best to keep a glass of water by your plate to sip between bites. "Alcohol shouldn't be a substitute for water," Wurtman says.
- Get moving. Instead of plopping on the couch after dinner, take the dog for a walk or the kids out to play. "It's a great excuse to get some fresh air," she says.

Preserving your post-dinner mojo will give you the oomph to power-clean the kitchen afterward, but you'll also have the energy to hit the stores at midnight if you're so inclined. Why not start a new tradition? Instead of being the first in your clan to fall asleep, you could be the first in line to take advantage of Black Friday steals.

Assembly Republicans Focus on Forestry

Legislative Tour Highlights Economic Benefits of Northern Forests

Thirteen Assembly Republicans representing districts that cover all corners of the state met in Antigo on Thursday for a behind-the-scenes tour of northern Wisconsin's logging and forestry industry. The tour was organized by Rep. Mary Czaja (R-Irma) and Rep. Rob Swearingen (R-Rhinelander). They were joined by eleven colleagues, including Assembly Speaker Robin Vos (R-Rochester), Assistant Majority Leader Dan Knodl (R-Germantown), Joint Finance Co-Chair John Nygren (R-Marinette), and Forestry Chair Jeff Mursau (R-Crivitz).

The group began the day in Tomahawk, with a visit to a cut site operated by logger Paul Roberts. Legislators had the opportunity to observe Roberts and his team harvesting timber and to hear the history of Roberts Logging that stretches back to the late 1800s. Industry professionals Henry Schienebeck of Great Lakes Timber Professionals Association and Jane Severt of Wisconsin County Forests Association also participated in the tour and shared their expertise with the group.

The tour continued on to Antigo where Kretz Lumber company president Troy Brown hosted a workinglunch question and answer session followed by a full plant tour for the group. The representatives had a firsthand look at the unique lumber handling process that sets apart Kretz maple woods as the finest in the industry and also focused on the critical need for a consistent timber supply to produce high-quality wood products for cabinetmakers, furniture, flooring, window and door manufacturers.

A visit to the Packaging Corporation of America mill in Tomahawk was the third and final stop of the day. Mill manager Adam Webster opened with a brief presentation of PCA's leading role in the corrugated cardboards market and took the group on a step-by-step tour of each phase in the production process. Webster echoed the comments of Brown from earlier in the day, that one of the single biggest challenges facing Wisconsin mills today is a dependable and adequate wood supply.

Representatives Czaja and Swearingen expressed gratitude to those legislators from other parts of the state that took the time to learn more about Wisconsin's northern forestry industry. "Here in the northwoods we understand forests are not only for recreation but are also a vital part of the economy," said Czaja. "I sincerely appreciate my colleagues from other regions of the state, especially those from more urban areas, recognizing that

we need to support our timber producers and ensure the local economy here in the north can compete and remain

Swearingen reflected on the day and said, "Today really was what being a representative is all about. We had the opportunity to showcase the tremendous potential of Wisconsin's forests and I think the group really recognized how important the northern region is to making our state thrive.'

According to the DNR, forestry is the number one employer in seven northern Wisconsin counties and is the state's second-largest manufacturing employer. The combined job total for all aspects of the forestry industry including forestry and logging, pulp and paper, sawmills and wood products is over 62,200 employees at 1,462 establishments. The average wage is \$49,583 and total wages contribute \$3.1 billion per year to Wisconsin's

Deer Registration Using the New Game Reg System

MADISON--With the launch of the GameReg system and electronic registration, hunters now have until 5 p.m. the day after harvest to register a deer. This rule applies for all deer hunting seasons.

"Previously, hunters could register their deer by 5 p.m. the day after the close of the nine-day season, regardless of the date of harvest," said Matt O'Brien, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources administrative warden. "The new registration deadline is a bit of a change for 2015, so hunters should make sure they are up to speed before the nine-day gun deer hunt."

After tagging a harvested deer, hunters can visit gamereg.wi.gov or call 1-844-426-3734 to access the game registration system. Hunters may also register their deer electronically at a participating registration station. Upon completion, hunters will receive a 10-character confirmation number to write on the carcass tag as proof of registration. This tag should remain with the deer until the meat is consumed.

To help make sure hunters are ready for another nine-day deer hunt, the department will host a chat Nov. 16 at noon. Questions related to harvest registration, safety, regulations or any other deer season topic are welcome. To participate or view the transcripts for previous chats, visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "chat."

Hunters may also find a variety of deer season materials, including season structure maps, frequently asked questions and helpful links at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "deer." To learn more about GameReg and electronic registration, search keywords "electronic registration."





Life-inspiring That Tree photo presentationfree Dec. 8



For 20 years professional photographer Mark Hirsch drove by the large bur oak and never really gave it much thought. Just another tree growing next to a cornfield, a fairly common sight near his home in picturesque southwestern Wisconsin.

It wasn't until 2012, while recuperating from a near-fatal car accident, that the tree finally caught his attention. He photographed it for the first time, setting off a year-long project that would change his life and go on to capture the attention of national media across the country.

Everyday for a year, he took a photo of the tree, in all weather, using only an iPhone. He posted the daily photos to a Facebook page dedicated to the project. The page quickly drew a large following, prompting Hirsch to assemble the photos and publish the highly-acclaimed book That Tree.

He'll give a presentation on the project and talk about the personal lessons he learned along the way at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, December 8, in the Nicolet College



Theatre.

The event is free and open to the public. In 2013, CBS Sunday Morning ran a feature on Hirsch and his project.

"That Tree," he said on the show, "taught me to slow down, take time to look around, and appreciate the almost (but not quite) hidden beauty that abounds in our world - sometimes even in your own backyard."

The evening at Nicolet will start with an opening reception at 6 p.m. for an exhibit of his photographs in the Nicolet College Art Gallery. This will be followed by a presentation in the Nicolet College Theatre at 7:30 p.m. The exhibit will run through Wed., December 30, and will be free and open to the public.

Both the Nicolet Theatre and Art Gallery are located in the Learning Resources Center on the Rhinelander Campus, one mile south of the city just off of Hwy. G.
