Crandon International Joins Red Bull Signature Series To Create First-Ever Off-Road Racing "World Cup"

Providing the dynamic motorsport of short-course off-road racing the most impactful news in years, legendary Crandon International Raceway has announced a new, long-term association with Red Bull Media House. The partnership will create an independent motorsports event that will be part of the internationally renowned Red Bull Signature Series, a collection of the most progressive and innovative events in action sports. Set for Sun., September 4 at Crandon's legendary "Big House," the new Crandon World Cup® will be part of a 47th annual Labor Day race weekend that attracts more than 45,000 fans to the 400-acre facility over four days of racing.

Hosted and sanctioned by Crandon International Raceway, the event has been created to attract the world's best off-road racers and teams to compete for coveted Crandon World Championships® in a variety of PRO-level classes. For the first time in the sport's nearly 50-year history, short course competitors from all sanctioning bodies around the country can race at Crandon on a completely level playing field with no concerns about points, season championships or other hindrances out of their control. The event will be brought to an international audience via the Red Bull Signature Series live on Red Bull TV and as a highlight program on NBC.

There will also be an audience sing-along of patriotic standards, like "America the Beautiful" and "She's a Grand Ole Flag." The show is under the direction of Josh Jameson.

Popcorn and peanuts will be sold during the evening to raise money for area scholarships.

On Saturday, July 16th, the ever popular Cowboys return to Laona, Wisconsin. They will lay in wait until the Lumberjack Steam Train chugs in from the depot on Highway 8 and attempt a robbery! Don't worry, they never seem to get away with any valuables, but their horses, gear, and vintage clothing and guns make you think the calendar has been turned back to the days of Butch and Sundance!

Each year, the Cowboy Re-enactors pay a visit and "rob" the Lumberjack Steam Train. The two weekends they will camp on the museum grounds are the upcoming July 16 and again on October 1. The re-enactors aren't just cowboys and western villains. You will see the ladies wearing vintage clothing, the preacher may be aboard, and the sheriff is usually there to exchange gunfire and save the day.

This year is special for the Lumberjack Steam Train. This Vulcan steam engine was built in 1916, and this is the 100th Birthday of the faithful old engine. How does a vintage steam train reach the age of 100? It takes plenty of loving care that includes lots of new parts, paint and polishing. You may even have a piece of birthday cake celebrating the 100th birthday of the Lumberjack Steam Train.

When you take the ride, you will arrive at the Camp 5 Museum and you can tour the logging museum, learning about logging days of yore. The kids love the petting zoo, and if you want a unique shopping experience, stop in the Cracker Barrel Gift Shop. On the Green Treasure Forest Tour, you will learn about modern logging practices and sustainable forestry.

This year, as the growing season progresses, everybody will enjoy the corn maze, which for some reason, will be in the shape of the centenarian Ol' 4-Spot, the Lumberjack Steam Train.

Visitors will find that these rough and tumble cowboys and their ladies are quite friendly, after they finish robbing the train. Be sure to strike up a conversation.

The Lumberjack Steam Train has been selected as one of the top 10 Natural Attractions in Wisconsin by Agapevoyage.com. There is a membership program that helps support this unique attraction that offers membership advantages you might like to check out.





A Look at Sawmills

I would like to say upfront, I like sawmills. I love to watch a sawmill turn round, long irregular logs into flat, precise boards. I like the sound of a sawmill, the activity of the workers as they make the mill function, the head sawyer as he makes instant decisions as to how to turn a log into boards with least amount of waste, and the complete utilization of all of the raw material, whether it be sawdust heading for a boiler somewhere or the bark for landscaping. As an old sawmiller once said, if we could record the noise of the mill and sell the tapes, everything would be used.

Sawmills are fascinating, but the few times I worked in a mill, I couldn't wait to get back to the woods and cut the logs. I never caught the "sawmill bug" that has affected untold numbers of people, including those individuals that buy the portable band mills for sawing their own lumber. For the most part, I think they haven't saved anything on their building project when you consider the cost of the mill and the time spent procuring logs and running the mill. But, they had the joy of doing the sawing and watching boards come from a log.

Where I live in the Lake States, and this is probably true wherever there were virgin forests and enterprising individuals, the first mills, or at least the ones that are remembered and written about long after their demise, were the big mills that were owned by a corporation or partnership of individuals who could raise the capital needed to buy timberlands and all of the machinery. These are the mills that created communities. They brought civilization to primitive spots in the Northwoods of the Lake State. Contrary to what the ladies in a historical society might think, it wasn't the first clothing store or the opera house that heralded the beginning of polite society, it was the sawmill and the ability to create nice frame houses that brought on the growth of communities and the niceties of life.

As I am most familiar with where I grew up and still live, I will use Forest County as an example. Forest County is located in northeast Wisconsin. The northern border butts up to Michigan's Upper Peninsula. For football fans, we are a little over a hundred miles north of Green Bay. Those who write about the first logging in the Lake States usually wax eloquently about the big pine trees and the river drives, and most don't realize that there were huge areas of prime hardwoods too. The difference was that hardwood logs don't float very well, and driving them down the rivers didn't work at all. Besides that, I have read where the market for good hardwood lumber was poor and the price didn't justify logging it on a grand scale. Around the beginning of the 20th Century, however, that changed. Styles in furniture and woodwork demanded hardwood, and it might be a safe assumption that other sources in the eastern states was getting hard to come by. The price went up, and the beginning of hardwood logging spurred the development of train tracks and trains poking their way into the northern hardwood areas of our county. It should also be noted that in the Upper Peninsula, mining had brought railroads and development long before our little corner of the world was noticed. People of European origin had just started poking around our resident Chippewa Indians in the 1870's and 1880's, and while the pine loggers had cut off what small pine stands the area had along the Wolf River drainage, they didn't stay. They were there in the late fall, and left by the river for the sawmills of Oshkosh with the spring thaw. Their logging camps were starting to fall down by the time the railroads came.

It must have been quite a shock to the Chippewa when white people came flooding into the area to take advantage of the growing economy when the sawmills arrived. When I look at the history of my home county, I am amazed at how fast communities were built. The first railroad that passed through Forest County came in 1887. The Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault St. Marie Railroad was built to connect the grain fields of Minnesota and the Dakotas with the St. Lawrence River at Sault St. Marie. Later called the Soo Line, the railroad didn't produce any large mills along the tracks in Forest County. From reading old records and newspaper accounts it did spur on heavy logging for sleigh haul distance to the line, where logs could be loaded and switchd to a north-south railroad for delivery to sawmills in the Green Bay area. But when the Chicago & Northwestern built a north-south line through the east side of the county, towns sprung up as big mills were built alongside the tracks as the line moved north. In Wabeno, two big companies eventually operated their mills.

The Jones Lumber Company, from Appleton, Wisconsin, bought the first mill from the Rusch Brothers after their mill went broke. Jones Lumber made it pay using the Phoenix Log Hauler instead of a logging railroad. With the Phoenix, ice roads were built like the ice roads that were used for horse drawn sleighs, and there is a picture of the Phoenix pulling 100,000 board feet of logs into the mill in Wabeno. Then again, this was just for the photo taken by the manufacturer of the Phoenix, which was Phoenix Steel from Eau Claire, Wisconsin. Most other photos show three to six sleighs being pulled down the ice road.

Around 1905, the Menominee Bay Shore purchased timber lands in the area. They moved their mill from Menominee, Michigan, where they had made a success of floating pine logs down the Menominee River, which forms the border between Wisconsin and Michigan. Bay Shore switched to hardwood lumber production, and they constructed their mill on the east edge of Wabeno, building their own town, called Soperton. Company houses, most of them identical, were built on streets named after company officials. A company store was also built.

Both Jones and Bay Shore built their mills on the North Branch of the Oconto, each having a millpond to wash logs. Wabeno and Soperton (the two towns make up Wabeno today) prospered. Schools were built, some very fine houses were constructed, a bank was established and plenty of stores and restaurants, and an opera house for plays, magic lantern slide shows, and later, moving pictures. These mills operated into the 1930's, when the supply of timber ran out as well as the economy.

And so it was up the rail line. Padus was a little sawmill town on the railroad a few miles north of Wabeno, and the sawmill provided for a hotel, store and post office, as well as a boarding house and several company houses for employees. Padus didn't last long. The timber supply was far less than owned by the two mills to the north, and the Hammes family, owners of the mill and the town, gave up timber operations probably in the 1920's. The Connor Lumber and Land Company came before the Northwestern and ran their own rail line north to the Soo Line tracks until the slowbuilding Chicago & Northwestern finally got to Laona. About 20 miles to the north, the Cleereman-Jacquet mill was built in 1911. Because the rail line went through their northern timber holdings, the mill was moved from Green Bay to a small town that came to be called Newald. Those familiar with sawmill machinery will recognize the Cleereman name from sawmill carriages. Frances Cleereman, the second generation in Newald, designed and built the first automated sawmill carriage in the 1950's, and the third generation is still building the famous carriage today near the site of the first Cleereman sawmill. The Cleereman sawmill closed down in 1969, but that little town contributed much to the sawmill business nationwide.

Where I live, in Crandon, the first big sawmill was the Page & Landeck mill on Clear Lake, which is coffee-colored today, probably from the bark and sawdust that got in the water when it served as the hot pond for the mill.

Page & Landeck were also dependent on the railroad. To be sure, there was at least one sawmill in town before the big mill was set up. A sawmiller named George Bailey was sawing lumber on the shores of Lake Metonga, and he provided the lumber for the frame houses that were already being constructed in the small village of 800 souls. Bailey's sawmill had to be drug on sledges or hauled in pieces on horse-drawn wagons to get to Crandon from the depot at Pelican Lake, about 20 miles away. The Chicago & Northwestern had a north-south line there as well, and anybody traveling to Crandon arrived at Pelican Lake and rode the stage to this new community that had its start just prior to 1885, the year Forest County was established. The Page & Landeck Lumber Company operated mills in New London, Wisconsin and Glasgow, Kentucky. They were hot to get started on the holdings they had purchased from the Uihlein family back in 1891, but no rails! The Uihleins owned the Schlitz Brewing Company, and undoubtedly made some more money selling beer to the lumberjacks and sawmill workers after the mill got to town.

Page & Landeck sat on their holdings until 1901, when the railroad finally built a spur line from Pelican Lake, to the west, east to Crandon. They had to be working in concert with the railroad, because when the first train pulled into town, the mill was already there and operating. The first train left with a load of hardwood lumber, and the mill operated until 1921, when under its third owner, was destroyed by fire.

Even though the mill on Clear Lake only operated about 21 years, it totally changed the community. Because of the huge amount of lumber available, other manufacturers moved to Crandon. Harrington fruit packaging set up a multi-story plant on the other side of town, with lumber to make their berry baskets a short trip by lumber wagon through town. A wagon hub factory was built, and the company put up a big department store that sold groceries, furniture, clothing, and other necessities. Page & Landeck had their corporate offices over the department store, and these offices are apartments today. They financed a drug store with a doctor's office on the second floor, and held the note until the operator had the mortgage paid off. The 800 population jumped to 2400 in five years. And, there was an opera house built in 1908. It was a popular place, but it burned down four years later in 1912 and wasn't rebuilt.

When the big mills here in Forest County ran through their timber supply they were gone, never to be seen again, with the exception of the Connor family that still operates a large mill in Laona. The Connors started selective logging and didn't strip all of their lands and are still operating, which is a pretty good example of how you can log and not ruin the resource.

Small sawmills, however, continued doing their job. While the big mill was running in Crandon, some small mills supplied the local needs for building material. My house was built in 1902 by a Massachusetts lumberman named Abner Carpenter. He owned a sawmill and planning mill behind his house and sawed logs from local suppliers and planed lumber for whoever needed it. His sturdy old house raised his three kids and three of mine, and when I'm gone, it will likely help raise some more. His sawmill business had lasting effects on the community even if it wasn't a huge enterprise.

So what happened to the big mills. Without huge tracts of large timber, there was no need for them to exist. It was sad when they closed their doors and the equipment was moved away or scrapped, but they left communities that existed after their demise. And, small sawmill operators followed. The big mills and their logging camps often didn't cut every scrap of timber they owned. There was still plenty of good sawlogs left because they had a cumbersome method of getting logs to the mill. A logging railroad was often moved to the next timber tract because there wasn't enough timber left to warrant leaving the tracks in for a partial cut the next winter. The operation was moved to the next untouched timber stand, and whatever was left behind just kept growing. After all, the timber lands were bought from the taxpayers for next to nothing, and if the timber didn't all get cut, what the hell, they were making good profits anyway.

In Crandon, the big Clear Lake Mill burned in 1921, but by 1923, a timberman named Forrest Himes bought the wreckage. He had worked for the company prior to World War I, and he realized that times had changed. Perhaps he had seen men and material moved efficiently to the battlefields of France by truck, and he applied that transportation mode to his new scaled down sawmill. The days of the logging camps was not quite over, but many of Himes lumberjacks lived at home and drove to work. He cut a lot of hemlock lumber when he started, and many of the houses in this area are

built of hemlock cut at the Himes mill. And Himes wasn't unique. There is always a number of normally sane men who get bit by the "sawmill bug," and if their mill isn't successful the first time, you can bet they will try again. I worked for a fellow named Bill Marshall in about 1966 who had the sawmill disease, and he never could get rid of it. Somewhere along the line he had learned to be a master electrician, but his heart was with sawmills. When I worked for him, he received a letter from a plant in Racine, Wisconsin which he passed over to me to read. If my memory serves me correctly, he was offered \$20 an hour and double time after 40 hours. They said he could work all the hours he wanted. This was an exceptionally wellpaying job back then, and it wouldn't be that bad now considering the economic times. But Bill said that if he went to the city he would drink too much and the mill was too important to shut down. After all, he said, it was just about to turn that economic corner where success was eminent. I, of course, thought he was crazy, and maybe he was. He just liked seeing boards come off that Army surplus. World War I era sawmill carriage. I liked watching the mill work, and I hoped for its success, but I hated working there. I remember carrying eight-foot 8x8 inch red oak timbers to the pile, and it felt like my feet were sinking in the ground. The mill didn't make it, and Marshall started a very successful electrical business locally, but he liked the mill better, and still liked to talk about sawmills.

Bill Marshall wasn't the only one to be bit by the bug. It happens to a number of people every generation. Some of them are successful, and the jobs they create and the material they supply to society are important not only to the local economy, but to the cities where the lumber is turned into usable products, with job creation all along the manufacturing line and in the retail end as well. No, I haven't forgotten the local loggers. A logging industry needs a market for logs that is within a profitable trucking distance. Logging, like any other business, provides jobs and those employees spend money in the local grocery store and gas station, buy hardware and the other necessities of life.

My home county still has sawmills, but some have closed and others are just hanging on. These mills aren't like the Page & Landeck mill that sawed about 80,000 board feet in two ten hour shifts. This was in a promotional booklet published in 1906, and they may have added a little shine to the apple when they wrote it. Modern sawmills are designed to handle the small logs, sometimes make pallets or dimension lumber, and they are part of a healthy economy in rural towns that exist in the managed forests that have grown up since the big mills stripped the countryside of merchantable timber.

Forest County has approximately 80% of its land base in public lands, and about 60% of that is national forest. You can probably guess the rest. The amount of timber sales on that huge chunk of national forest has shrunk considerably in recent years. A sawmill operator that can literally see merchantable federal timber from his office window will run out of logs or have to pay so much to truck in logs that the profit vanishes.

While this problem is being worked on, sawmill people make do, and they are persistent lot. I have enjoyed living in an area where you can hear the sound of a mill operating, I have enjoyed most of the sawmill people I have done business with when I logged. I know that somehow there will always be sawmills, not just because we need the products they produce, but because they are afflicted with this disease that drives them to make square boards out of round logs.



Senator Johnson Asks FBI for Info on Clinton Emails

The Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs is continuing to examine former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton's use of a private email account and server during her time at the U.S. State Department.

On July 5, 2016, you announced the findings and recommendation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) examination of Secretary Clinton's use of a personal email system. In your statement, you reported that a total of 110 emails in 52 email chains were classified at the time they were sent or received, including emails sent or received by Secretary Clinton that were classified at the Top Secret/Special Access Program level at the time. You acknowledged that "there is evidence that [Secretary Clinton or her colleagues] were extremely careless in their handling of very sensitive, highly classified information." However, the FBI did not recommend charges against Secretary Clinton.

In light of your recent statement regarding the FBI's investigation, I write to better understand the resources that the FBI employed during this investigation. Accordingly, I request that you please provide the following information and materials:

The total number of FBI employees assigned to the investigation of former Secretary Clinton's use of a private email account and server.

--A list of all FBI components and resources that have worked or been consulted on the FBI's investigation. --An estimate of the total cost associated with the FBI's investigation of Secretary Clinton's use of a private email account and server. To your knowledge, what other federal departments or agencies incurred costs associated with the FBI's investigation?

--According to your statement, you determined that Secretary Clinton's "handling of very sensitive, highly classified information" was "extremely careless." However, you found that the actions of Secretary Clinton did not lead to a recommendation to pursue criminal charges, including charges under the "gross negligence" standard.

a. What is the difference, in the FBI's view, between extreme carelessness and gross negligence?

b. If the evidence that the FBI collected about Secretary Clinton's use of a private email account and server did not constitute gross negligence, what set of facts would cause the FBI to recommend criminal charges under the gross negligence standard?

Please provide this information as soon as possible, but no later than 5:00 p.m. on July 19, 2016.

More than 230,000 new cases of prostate cancer are diagnosed each year in the U.S. Scientists have yet to learn how to prevent prostate cancer - other than to protect your health in general.

· Eat a wide variety of fruit and vegetables each day. Get at least 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups of vegetables and 2 cups of fruit per day. Tip: Eating cruciferous vegetables, such as cabbage, broccoli and radishes, has been show in studies to reduce prostate cancer risk.

·Adopt a low-fat diet. Select leaner cuts and small servings of meat (1 serving equals 3 ounces, about the size of a card deck), avoid fatty snacks and choose low-fat dairy foods.

· Limit alcohol. Long-term, heavy drinking has been linked to increase risk.

· Lose excess weight. Being obese increases

The American Cancer Society advises normalrisk men to consult their health care provider about prostate cancer screening by age 50. If you are African American or you have a first-degree relative with prostate cancer, see your provider at age 45. The ACS recommends age 40 for men at highest risk - those who have more than 1 first-degree relative who had prostate cancer at an early age.

Discuss the uncertainties, risks and potential benefits of screening with your provider before you decide to get screened for prostate cancer. And ask about other steps you can take to reduce your risk in addition to the ones listed above.

Summer marks a hiatus from the daily responsibilities and scheduled demands children face during the rest of the year. "In addition to community support, there are many other things parents can do to promote healthy behavior." She offers some tips.

Enforce regular bedtimes. Kids need their sleep to avoid excess weight gain and to allow for healthy growth.

Take kids to the grocery store or farmer's market and let them pick ingredients for healthy snacks they can make for themselves. Think things like fruit and yogurt parfaits, or veggies and hummus.

Be creative with your activities! Hit the beach, explore a new hiking trail, go for a bike ride, play hide-andgo-seek outside, make post-dinner walks a "family thing," or have kids get involved in making dinner or snacks.

Limit TV time to one hour towards the end of the day as a way to relax after an active, productive day.

Give your children a patch of garden all their own. Kids love to eat what they grow!

Give kids choices at dinner. Chop up a big selection of ingredients mushrooms, onions, peppers, eggplant, pineapple, shrimp, and chickenand let them choose what they want on a grilled kabob. Let them choose toppings for tacos and pasta too.





Nicolet College to launch Drafting Design Technician program

With strong demand locally for individuals with drafting design skills, Nicolet College is launching a one-year technical diploma that teaches the entry-level job skills needed by area construction companies, manufacturers, and other businesses. Classes will start September 1.

Over the past year Nicolet staff met with numerous area employers to gauge job demand and determine the exact skill sets companies need, said Nicolet Dean of Trade, Industry, and Apprenticeships Jeff Labs

"Through these discussions we found that there were a number of factors that businesses were dealing with," Labs said. "One was how quickly the design software technology was changing. And the second was how the training was taking place to get individuals up to speed. Much of it was being done in-house, often in a piecemeal fashion. Everyone agreed there was a better way, and the decision was made for Nicolet to offer a formal Drafting Design Technician technical diploma."

Along with demand at traditional residential and commercial construction companies, Nicolet discovered significant new demand for drafting designers in the manufacturing sector, specifically with metal fabrication companies, Labs said.

"Every piece of product they produce and sell starts with a visual plan or blueprint," Labs explained. "That's where drafting designers come in. They create the plans and layout the exact specifications for every piece."

Software taught includes AutoCAD, AutoDesk Inventor, and an introduction to Solidworks. Other classes include architectural and engineering principles, blueprint reading for construction and manufacturing, along with math and communication classes.

The curriculum for the one-year Drafting Design Technician diploma was built so it ladders directly into the two-year Architectural Technology associate's degree.

"This gives students the option of entering the job market after one year or applying the credits they earned to the more advanced two-year associate degree," Labs explained.

Starting pay for graduates with the one-year technical diploma is around \$15 an hour. This jumps to a starting range between \$16.50 to more than \$20 an hour for graduates with the two-year associate's degree, he said.
