

Making Maple Syrup-Then and Now

The Brewer family saphouse and family memories

The following remembrance was written by Tricia Brewer as a college student in Advanced Composition back in 1990. Her work earned an A+!

A stranger passing by the saphouse at my grandma's house might wonder exactly what purpose this building had served. It is a plain building, not one built to be beautiful, but one built to make maple syrup. It had only two rooms, one for boiling the sap and storing it, and one for bottling the syrup. Our family made syrup there until I was about eleven years old. Then my family became too busy with their jobs, and eventually the contents of the building were sold. Although the rooms stand empty, they are still occupied in my mind and as vivid to me as the words on this paper. The saphouse is much more to me than just a building to make maple syrup. It is much more.

The saphouse is our family together. I can remember countless afternoons when my sister and I, happy to be free from school, would run down the drive to the saphouse. We were two blonde chatterboxes: arms loaded with books, starred spelling tests, and hats and mittens forgotten in the heat of the afternoon. My parents would be sitting on wooden stools, their hair damp and droopy from the steam that filled the room from the boiling sap. My mom would put down her Stephen King and Dad would turn off Paul Harvey droning from the dusty radio on the shelf, ready to hear the "real" rest of the story: those earth-shattering news flashes of who had forgotten their gym shoes that day, who had puked in the lunchroom, or how somebody had been sent to the office--again. These endless afternoons of writing our names and drawing pictures on the steamy windows and family talks that lasted long into the evenings were soon replaced with afternoons of two blonde chatterboxes racing off to basketball or cheerleading practice, where the news of our days was shared with our friends. The names I saw on windows were no longer at the saphouse, but rather, on the steamy, wet bus windows on the way to games.

The saphouse is simple fun. Told to stay out of the way of our parents when things got busy, we were faced with the problem of inventing things to do. The streams of melting snow that trickled over the gravel outside became rivers, and sticks, our canoes. Or with Grandma as our judge, we would play "Find the Best Rock," searching hour upon hour for the rock with gold in it or the rock that looked like a frog. It was funny, we would never dream of doing this at home; we had better things to do (the T.V. was our entertainer). But the saphouse forced us to use our imaginations. Wandering around in the field in back, we were Indians searching for treasures to trade to the pilgrims, keeping our collections of things we found hidden behind the woodpile, safe from the greedy hands of our neighboring tribes. But just as our family afternoons had been replaced, so had our simple fun. Simple fun became easier with video games or talking on the phone with friends. Our thinking of things to do was replaced with thinking of ways to get dates for dances and of ways to get our homework done faster so we could watch T.V.

The saphouse is tradition. Too young to understand why all of this hard work should be so important to my father, I told him that maple syrup that came from the store tasted just as good and was a lot less trouble. He would tell me to go in and look at the picture hanging on the wall in Grandma's kitchen. I must have looked at that picture of my grandfather emptying a pail of sap into a huge tup pulled on a sled drawn by horses at least a hundred times, yet I never quite understood why he told me to look at it. I used to stand and listen to my grandfather (who was too ill at the time to keep making

Lumberjack Maple Syrup Armstrong Creek

Making maple syrup today is far different than the syrup making depicted in Tricia's story on the Brewer operation when she was a kid in school.

Just west of Armstrong Creek, on Wall Road, Dave Kowalkowski; his wife Patty; and son, Kevin, are running a maple syrup operation on the family farm. A son, Craig, is a college student who helps on weekends.

This operation, sitting on the edge of the woods, is high-tech and high volume. The product is a high-grade Wisconsin maple syrup that can appear under many different labels. Making syrup in volume means that the syrup isn't poured into small glass or plastic bottles. It is piped into sterile 55-gallon steel barrels. There is storage for huge amounts of sap, and according to Dave, 12,400 gallons of sap, an amount they have storage for, will cook down to about 350 gallons of maple syrup.

An operation like the Lumberjack Maple Syrup Company is inspected by the state every year, and cleanliness is extremely important. All of the taps are sterile, and the plastic taps have a check valve to prevent bacteria from getting into the system.

Dave and his family tap maple trees in four different spots, and none are on their farm. The sap is hauled in tanks to the cookhouse. In addition, they buy sap from eight different tappers, including Pat Brewer, who is tapping their old sugar bush. His late father, George, would be happy about this.

How do they get this volume of production? This is where high-tech comes in. The sap is run through a reverse osmosis machine that removes 90% of the water that would ordinarily have to be boiled off. This enables them to cook the sap for four to five hours, and that volume, using traditional methods, would take 36 hours. The water removed isn't run on the ground. It is used for cleaning the cooker after a run. This also means that they use less firewood in their cooker. That cooker, by the way, is fired up with fresh wood every eight minutes. There is a timer on the wall to remind them. This keeps the heat

About 90% of their production is put in the 55-gallon barrels, and Dave says that the other 10% is sold to stores and restaurants. In addition, some will be sold to private labels.

Dave said they had a nice deal for their product from Alabama. The maple syrup is sold for a fundraiser that will help homeless kids.

When you visit their installation, you will see the tree tappers drive up with a tank on their truck or trailer. A connection is piped the length of the driveway, and they hook up to the flexible hose and have their sap pulled up the hill into the 12,000 gallon capacity collection of tanks on a raised platform. It is raised so that they can gravity feed the reverse osmosis machine from which the reduced sap is then pumped to the cooker. Volume and sugar content is checked and suppliers are paid accordingly.

On the Kowalkowski tapping area, all of the sap is run to a central spot with hoses. There are 3,600 taps on their sugar bush, and the sap is collected in a tank next to a small cabin holding a pump. When they haul the sap to

Burning Permits Required!

Spring has sprung! With the piles of snow rapidly melting, many of us are excited to do some spring cleaning of brush and leaves on our properties. The warmer weather that melts the snow and brings back the robins also creates the risk of wildfires to spread. Early springs, like the one we are experiencing, often result in higher wildfire risk.

Year after year, the #1 cause of wildfires started in Wisconsin is from debris burning that got out of control. The DNR urges everyone to be safe and take some precautions that may prevent small brush fires from becoming damaging wildfires and remember to get your annual burning permit before doing any burning.

Unless the ground is completely snow covered, and with the exception of campfires and cooking fires, burning permits are required for all open burning including ground burning, burn barrels, and incinerators. No burning permits are required within the city of Crandon.

Burning permits are FREE and required by law. Having the DNR come to put your escaped fire out can be extremely costly and may result in a citation, so don't get caught burning without a permit!

There are a variety of ways to obtain a burning permit:

Before burning you must verify current fire danger and burning restrictions for the day by visiting dnr.wi.gov/wisburn or calling 1-888-WIS-BURN (947-2876). Days and times that burning is allowed changes daily based on current weather conditions so it is important to check before every burn.

When burning, it is important to keep fire-fighting tools such as a water hose and shovel close at hand in case the fire gets out of control. The fire should be monitored at all times until it is completely out and cold to the touch. All it takes is one ember to start a wildfire.

If the fire starts to expand beyond the planned area, producing large flames and lots of smoke, call 911 immediately!

Be safe out there, folks! Hopefully the next time you see our fire engines will be in the parade and not to put out your escaped fire!

syrup) and my father argue back and forth about the right ways to do things. And just as they did, I would stand and argue with my father that our syrup would sell much better if we would put it in bottles shaped like a lady. I never understood why things were done the way they

The saphouse is many more things: dollars earned from labeling bottles; bright blue bags hanging from trees; and sticky sap dripping into the snow, melting puddles of sweetness. Today, I can taste that sweetness as I think of the springs of my childhood and the endless hours spent at the sap house. Pushed back into the field at my grandma's, the saphouse still stands. I've never gone back, nor do I wish to. To me, the saphouse is my childhood, the spring of my life: I'd rather remember it as

their cooker, they pull up on the end of a muddy driveway and connect to a pipe that runs from the collection point. This spot, when the sap is running good, will produce 250 to 300 gallons an hour. According to Dave, they could accept sap from other tappers up to 70,000 taps, at which time they would add another cooker. He said it is an opportunity for landowners with maple stands to realize some profit from their land without logging prematurely. He added that it can still be logged after it is tapped.

The cookhouse is a gathering spot for the neighborhood. A big wooden table on one side of the room accommodates visitors.

The family started with 700 buckets hanging on trees six years ago. They switched to tubing, and the operation took off. He credits his sons with pushing to expand.

Dave said this is a maple area, and it should be noted for its capacity to produce great maple syrup. This family is doing their part!



Health departments and hospital systems both have requirements to complete local health assessments and because there are many agencies, including health care systems that serve all three counties it made sense to collaborate on one health improvement plan. During the recently completed Community Health Assessment, the top three priority health issues were identified as Chronic Disease, Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse, and Mental Health.

The Community Health Improvement Plan includes goals, objectives and target outcomes, along with suggested strategies to improve those health issues.

The intent of the plan is to provide an outline for our many coalitions that are already working to improve the health of our residents and also foster new partnerships and encourage others to work together. Health is not something we get at a doctor's office; it starts in our homes, schools and work places, and playgrounds and parks. The strategies in the plan include suggested programs that have been shown to be effective but it also stresses that we need to improve our physical and social environment and implement policies to make healthy behaviors the easy choice.

The plan is closely linked to Wisconsin's Health Plan: Healthiest Wisconsin 2020, Everyone Living Better Longer. There are several overarching priority areas within the plan; health across the lifespan, health equity, and access to health care. By assessing health at all stages of life, providing equal opportunities regardless of race, ethnicity, gender or socioeconomic status, and addressing barriers to everyone receiving quality care, we will contribute to a better quality of life for all of our residents.

The next steps are to share this plan with the community and work with existing coalitions to implement the strategies and measure success toward the goals. It is our hope that community members will read through the plan and find some way to incorporate these strategies into your work, home and your lifestyle. 

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

I have been a life-long resident of the town of Armstrong Creek. In 1981 I graduated from of the Goodman-Armstrong Creek School District. In 1985, I graduated from the University of Wisconsin Stevens Point. I have three children and one grandson. My sons, Zack and Taylor are proud graduates of GACHS have moved on to successful careers. My daughter Rachel is currently a proud GACHS student in ninth grade. I have been employed by Forest County Government for the past thirty years as the County Forest Administrator managing our county forest and park system. I am also employed as the County Snowmobile and ATV Coordinator and have previously been employed as the County Personnel Administrator. I also raise beef cattle on our family farm that has been in operation for 99 years and I intend to continue to be life-long resident of our community.

I am not seeking office in the traditional sense, as a new career, but asking for your vote once again to allow me the honor of representing the students, staff and residents of the Goodman Armstrong Creek School District. I have been a member of the Board of Education for the past 27 consecutive years. I know exactly what I am getting myself into. I have been with the district through good times and when necessary during the tough times, I have battled at board meetings to change, adapt and plan for our future. Twenty-seven years ago I was told we were nearly out of money, our taxes were too high, that we could not improve our education and would be forced to consolidate our district. I disagreed! I had hoped that somehow our small school could endure, adapt and overcome these issues. Twenty-seven years later, I believe WE have been successful! If you have been following our District in this newspaper, you have read about the multiple educational awards the Goodman Armstrong Creek School District has received from the State in past years. If you have been attending board meetings, you have learned that we have built a sound fund balance in our budget to assist in taking us through these tough economic times. If you visit the school, you will find a friendly, small town atmosphere in a clean, well-maintained facility full of technology including computers, laptops, smartboards and an interactive distance-learning lab. All of this was accomplished over the years while reducing our taxes (mill rate) from one of the highest in the State of Wisconsin (over 29 mills), down to one that is average in the Northern Lakes Conference (10-11 mills). This was all completed by multiple board members willing to work hard, change and plan as well as teachers and staff willing to make concessions and do more with less, and all the parents and taxpayers who sacrificed to support our school. It does take a community to obtain success.

My three top concerns include; increasing costs/declining State aids, declining enrollment and the need to continue to improve the education of our students.

Our district will need leadership and experienced board members now more than ever as we face unknown changes in the State Budget Bill. For some, the Budget is hope for lower cost and lower taxes. For others, the Budget strikes fear and uncertainty as to how it may impact their wages and livelihood or how it may negatively affect the education of their children. Again, our district will have to plan, adapt and overcome rising costs for operating our district while receiving substantial reductions in State aid. The board and I have previously met with neighboring districts to discuss sharing staff, services and reducing costs. We will also need to streamline and reduce our own programs to balance our future budget.

Declining enrollment will reduce State aids and State funding even further. Thankfully our enrollment hit its low last year and has begun to climb. With the poor economy and lack of jobs, our district could face the risk of future reduction in enrollment resulting in a reduction of State funding on a per student basis. Meanwhile, the fixed costs of heat, electricity, bussing etc. will continue to increase whether we have 8 students per class room or 20 students. Our fund balance will not be able to sustain this reduction in State Aid, and will decrease yearly.

With declining enrollment, reduced State aid and increased fixed operation costs, how can we expect to deliver a quality education without substantially increasing taxes? The school districts that are able to answer that question will be the districts that survive these tough economic times. I suggest continuing discussions with neighboring districts to share services and reduce costs. improve our distance-learning lab to both receive classes that our district does not offer, and to provide our classes to other districts. We will continue to seek bids to reduce our fixed costs on items such as bussing, health insurance and property insurance. We have asked our taxpavers to complete a survey to provide directions to our Board of Education to assist in planning our future. We will also begin a Strategic Planning Process to ensure we have a solid plan of action for our District's future at the most cost effective manner possible.

Once again, our district will be facing challenging times and will need to endure, adapt and overcome. We will need experienced board members and leaders to plan for our future.

I hope that you allow me the honor, once again to represent the Goodman-Armstrong Creek School District by electing me to your Board of Education.

Your vote is very important and appreciated! Let's make a difference!

This letter is in response to another letter to the Editor.

Employee benefits: The benefit package increases have a lot to do with the high cost of health care and insurance and increases of pay and base benefits to district employees. The increases, as many folks have felt over the last few years, are a national issue/crisis. District employees have taken on more than ever with regards to sharing the cost of benefits since ACT10. This district shops insurance every opportunity we can. It is the only way to be fiscally responsible. The benefit package is part of the compensation for teachers. Are you suggesting that we cut the employees pay? We are in an age where teachers are now "free agents." Yes, this means it costs us more today to keep those good employees. As healthcare costs spiral out of control, we are, just like many of you, trying to find ways to deal with it. But chasing our good teachers away with wholesale benefit cuts is NOT the way to do it. It would only weaken our district.

Hot and free lunch: The taxpayers at the annual meeting decide if we offer free hot lunch. Everyone has an opportunity to vote and make suggestions at that annual meeting. Let's say we go to a payer type system: roughly 50% of the students in the Wabeno School District will still qualify for the free lunch program. So we would have to have the infrastructure in place to attend to those students needs. You want it to change? Then come to the annual meeting! We would love to have more than three people

Per Student cost: Yes, rural schools' costs are higher than urban schools'. One reason is the population density and resource density. If you compare us to the surrounding districts, we are very close in cost per student. We also have 80+ special ed. students in our district. This dictates an increase in resources because we must work with every student to try and achieve success in their education. We are required to try as hard as we can and provide the resources to educate EVERYONE. If you are going to use averages, then use those that apply, like the ones associated with similarly sized school districts. Take the time to look at rural small schools in our surrounding area. We are right in line with those averages.

Do we have a successful academic program? YES. Many students from our school have went on to a wide variety of successful professional careers. There are even some doctors and lawyers. The list is far too great to go over here. We have many students that have been accepted into some tough academic programs at some prestigious universities; including UW Madison and several other private and UW System Universities. In fact, since 2012, we have had students accepted to 30 different universities. 72 in total applied and were accepted. Yes, ACT scores need to improve, you are absolutely correct. This is a focus for our board and our administration as well as our staff. The ACT used to only be taken by those who were college bound, but now it is taken by everyone, even those who have zero interest in education beyond high school. The reality is, this impacts our overall average. It's not an excuse, just reality.

Even our choice for board members is important. The board member has to be objective and should not have a preconceived agenda. There is no room for "drama" on the school board, just common sense and an open mind. Lori Mattern is the best candidate. She has great education from Wabeno and UWSP, works in accounting, and is a professional.

Is the \$1.6 million justified? YES. The school would not ask for it if we did not need it. Will we continue to look at operations to streamline and save money where we can? YES. Are we open to suggestions and input? YES. Our choice is clear in my mind. As a taxpayer, I can pay for this referendum or this district will be gone, and the increase in taxes in that case is much higher than what the school is asking for. We need to set high standards for success. We are asking folks to be objective and look at the real facts and the impact this school can have. We are looking forward and asking for money to improve the curriculum to include training in the trades and technology. Technology, like it or not, is where we are today in manufacturing and life. Our school must compete in those areas and continue to improve in our offerings and methods of instruction. We have a choice on April 4th. I hope you choose YES on both questions.

Payment in Lieu of Taxes cut

It is widely known that the U.S. government owns a considerable amount of land in Forest County. What you may not know is that there is a yearly Federal appropriation that helps compensate counties with a high percentage of non-taxable federal land for lost property taxes. This is the Payment In lieu of Taxes (PILT) program. The Department of the Interior (DOI) website https://www.nbc.gov/pilt/counties.cfm shows the government made a payment of \$755,924.00 in 2016 for 303,562 acres of land in Forest county. This payment amounts to only around \$2.49/ acre for last year.

A news report in the March 17, 2017 issue of "The Outdoor Wire" (the Outdoor Industry's Newsletter) looked at the 12% cut in the DOI funding found in the President's proposed 2018 budget and the impact this cut would have on that industry (fishing, hunting, tourism, etc.,). One item mentioned in that article points out the proposed budget cuts would alter the PILT payments and thus affect rural communities that depend on PILT money. Apparently \$2.49/acre is much too generous for our county and future PILT payments will be at a "reduced level."

Your representatives in congress would certainly appreciate you sharing your thoughts with them on the local consequences of this "redirection" of these funds to other programs.



Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. 








Senior Stretch program at Strong Fitness Studio-Crandon
