

### Citizen participation at county board meetings-an explanation

In light of recent happenings at Forest County Board meetings and the right of the public to speak, plus the letter in last week's paper from Lee Joyner, County Board Member Steve Bunda asked the Wisconsin Counties Association for the correct procedure. What follows in italics is a the verbatim reply by email from the association.

My colleague Dan Bahr asked me to respond to your question.

Members of the public are not allowed to address the board unless there is a public hearing or the county has adopted rules that allow for public comment.

There are a couple of options If there is no public hearing or public comment period.

1. If so inclined, the Chair of the board could schedule a speaker to address the board by placing the name and topic on the agenda.

2. Another option is to suspend the rules. A member of the board could ask the chair, during the meeting, to allow a member of the public to address the board. The chair would say, "If there is no objection we will allow the public member to speak." If there is no objection then the public member may speak. In essence, since no one objected (by unanimous consent) the rules have been suspended. If someone objects then a member of the board could move to suspend the rules to allow the public member to speak. The motion requires a second, is not debatable and requires a two thirds vote.

Hope that is helpful, call with questions.



Swimmer's itch is a skin rash caused by an allergic reaction to microbes that may infect aquatic birds, such as ducks. Symptoms of swimmer's itch include, tinalina or itching of the skin, small reddish pimples, and small blisters. Most cases of swimmer's itch do not require medical attention. If you have a rash, relief may be provided by applying creams or a cool compress to the affected area. Swimming in a lake with swimmer's itch does not mean you will develop it. To prevent swimmer's itch:

Towel off immediately after swimming. \*\*

Swim in water away from the shore.

\*\* Avoid swimming in areas where snails have

Application forms may be sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals or free milk, households must fill out the application and return it to the school (unless notified at the start of the school year that children are eligible through direct certification). Additional copies are available at the office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by agency or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals or free milk for children in a household where one or more household members receive FoodShare, FDPIR, or Wisconsin Works (W-2) cash benefits, list the household member and the FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 case number, list the names of all school children, sign the application, and return it to the school office.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals or free milk of households not receiving FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 cash benefits, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, total number of household members and the adult signing the application form must also list the last four digits of his or her Social Security Number or mark the box to the right of "Check if no SSN." Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.).

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal and free milk policy, the high school secretary will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Jerry LaFleur was named after his father, who was also Jerry LaFleur. The LaFleur family was one of a number of families who came with Bay Shore with French heritage. The family originally came from Quebec, Canada, and a number of these people jumped the border to work for Bay Shore in Menominee. They brought the skills needed to drive pine logs down the Menominee River to the mill and other woodsman's skills. There are other families in Wabeno, both past and present, with French surnames, and most can trace their roots to the movement of the Bay Shore inland when the pine ran out.

Jerry LaFleur is a very quick-minded 96-year-old man who has many memories of growing up in Soperton/Wabeno. He graduated in 1939 from Wabeno High School. He was actually born in 1921, in Green Bay, when his father took a job on a farm at Oconto Falls. The family then moved back to Soperton.

Jerry recounted some of his memories of life in Soperton and Wabeno during the 20's and 30's. He recounted how he played football in high school. His father was working at the Bay Shore company store in Soperton. He said everything came in on the train, and his father would take the horse and wagon from the store and pick up the stock for the store. At noon hour he walked home to eat, and he would try to catch his father driving the wagon to get a ride home. He laughed when he told about his father spurring the horse on so he couldn't catch the wagon. He told his son he was trying to make him a better



tower work in Texas, and spent most of his time directing airplanes on and off the field.

After the war, in 1945, he went back to Point and had the honor of playing in a championship game in 1945. He earned a Masters Degree at Marquette University in education, and spent time teaching back at Stevens Point.

From there, he went into school administration and worked in a number of school systems. He was superintendent at Westboro for three years and did the same job in Wild Rose until 1968. He then moved to Pittsville and retired from Cambellsport as a principal in 1991, where he still lives.

His father, the first Jerry LaFleur, died in Wabeno in the fall of 1966. Older folks will remember him as the Schlafke bread truck driver who serviced the northern routes. I realized that I had likely talked to him as a kid when he delivered the bread to Jock's store in Argonne.

His son, Joe, who helped with the interview, also had an interesting career. Like Dad, he attended college at Stevens Point and played football there. His life story is far too complicated to tell in this article, but it should be noted that he was Student Body President when Lee Sherman Dreyfus was Chancellor. This led him to a job with Dreyfus in Madison when he became the governor of our state. This led to numerous interesting jobs at FEMA, and he is still employed handling crisis situations for companies in the private sector. He has been a world traveler for his

As a school kid, he would take a summer job with Bay Shore piling lumber in the yard. The piling crews worked with a lumber scaler, and put the boards in the correct pile after grading. He remembers working on a crew behind Jimmy Clavette and Rudy Glasl's crew as well. He recalls starting the summer with soft muscles, and building up those muscles as the summer progressed. Another memory of his lumber piling days was that most of the men chewed tobacco. The mill would send someone around with a water bucket and a dipper to quench the thirsts of these hard working men, most of whom chewed tobacco. He soon learned to be the first to the water bucket, as many of the tobacco plugs from his coworkers ended up in the water bucket.

After graduation, in 1939, he attended college in Stevens Point. He played football there in 1939 and 1940. While at Point, he was appointed to the Military Academy at West Point by Congressman Joshua Johns. To the best of our knowledge, he is the only Forest County resident to gain an appointment to West Point. But, his career at West Point was short-lived. Pearl Harbor put the country at war, and his services were needed in the military right now, and not four years later. This led to a stint in the Army Air Corps, and he spent a "fun-filled" tour in the Aleutian Islands. He occasionally was in an airplane, but had trained for control



**Don't Mess with These Food** Safety Myths Submitted by Kathy O'Melia

MYTH: "If it tastes ok, it's safe to eat."

FACT: You can't always rely on your sense of taste, smell or sight to determine if a food is safe. The bacteria that make a food smell bad or grow mold are not the same bacteria that make people sick. Taking even a tiny bite to test the safety of a questionable food can be extremely dangerous.

MYTH: "I've always thawed my meat on the kitchen counter and nothing has ever happened."

FACT: IF you use past experiences to predict whether a food is safe, your future may include a food-

saying "I'll buy insurance after my house burns down." You only need an extra minute or two to wash hands, clean a cutting board, or cook food to recommended temperatures. This is a small price to pay to avoid foodborne illness!

> CLEAN: Wash hands and surfaces often SEPARATE: Don't cross-contaminate **COOK**: Cook to proper temperatures **CHILL:** Refrigerate promptly

borne illness. In an earlier time, the chicken served tonight might have been walking around the backyard this afternoon. Today, your food may travel halfway around the world before it arrives at your table. Allowing meat or poultry to sit out at room temperature creates opportunities for bacteria to multiply.

MYTH: "I sampled it a couple of hours ago and never got sick, so it should be safe to eat."

FACT: Your timing may be way off if you believe this myth. The bacteria that cause food-borne illness multiply rapidly, so perishable food left out at room temperature for more than an hour can quickly become unsafe. What wasn't contaminated two hours ago could be tainted now.

MYTH: "I'm feeling sick. But it's been two days since I ate that week-old chicken salad, so I don't think that could be causing the problem."

FACT: You may feel all right a few hours after eating a food, but don't rule out a food-borne illness. Such illnesses may develop within 1/2 hour to a few days; some may occur as long as two or more weeks after eating a contaminated food. If sickness occurs 24 hours or more after eating a food, it's frequently blamed on something else, such as "a touch of the flu."

Many people won't change their food safety practices until they become sick. This is somewhat like
