Discovering family heritage in Newald

It is likely that the majority of residents in our corner of the Northwoods don't know that the leading manufacturer of sawmill carriages and the necessary accessories is located in a cluster of factory buildings in the Village of Newald. Cleereman Industries has led the field in innovations to sawmill machinery that make cutting hardwood lumber feasible and profitable, especially in the small sawmills that dot the countryside in the U.S. and Canada.

The Cleereman sawmill carriage is known worldwide, and in fact, many of them are in daily use worldwide! This innovation in the sawmill industry was the idea of Francis Cleereman, Sr. After returning from the fighting in Europe during WWII, Francis returned to the family sawmill business in Newald. The mill was older, the markets had changed, and the profits were way down. His father, Bill Cleereman, told Francis that they might just as well shut the mill down, but Francis had other ideas. It was 1949, and he modified the old mill, and then he invented the sawmill carriage that was to make a huge change in the sawmill business.

Francis Sr. is gone now, but his sons, Fran and John, who grew up in the business stepped in. Changes were made to the original carriage, and until his passing, Francis Sr. had a hand in things.

These days, John has retired, but Fran and son, Paul, are working the business, along with Jeff Krueger. The innovations and efficiencies are still being added to the original concept, and the business is in another round of expansions.

It could be said that the Cleereman carriage started with Francis Sr., and it was certainly his ideas that went from his head to the finished product, but it could also be argued that the famous Cleereman sawmill carriage had its beginnings in Newald decades before.

Two families, the Jauquets and the Cleeremans, a generation from a move from Belgium, started in the logging business. They were from the Green Bay area, but logged in the U.P. In 1910, John Jauquet and Julia Cleereman were married in Green Bay and honeymooned in Sagola, Michigan, where the Jauquets had been logging.

In 1913, the two brother-in-laws, John Jauguet and Bill Cleereman, purchased 1,400 acres of timberlands from the C&NW Railroad near the new village of Newald. The Cleereman & Jauquet Lumber Company had a project. They needed to build a sawmill, barns, a place to live and an endless list of things to be able to log and turn out boards for the marketplace. They built a house to share, and it is still standing adjacent to the factory complex, and still being used by a family member. It is the only original building left from the beginning of the sawmill business. The two brothers raised families, and life went on in the business. Francis Cleereman was raised in and around sawmills, and must have received a large dose of sawdust in his blood, as the old saying goes. It might be safe to say that the seeds of this sawmill industry innovation sprouted when the Cleereman & Jauquet sawmill was built in Newald. Whatever the viewpoint on this, the Jauquet family and their Cleereman "cousins" have a shared heritage in Newald. Bill Jauquet lives in Baltimore, Maryland. As the eldest, he thought it was his duty to teach younger family members about the heritage the Jauquet family had in Newald and in the early timber industry. The best way to get them altogether was to rent a bus, get them all aboard, and take them to Newald.

Prevent yourself from being a victim of fraud. The best way to protect yourself from insurance fraud is to research the agent and company you are considering.

Traffic fatalities on Wisconsin roads take turn for the worse

July was the deadliest month on Wisconsin roads this year, prompting transportation safety officials to issue a "call to action" urging all motorists to be safe/responsible.


The 66 people who died in Wisconsin traffic crashes in July make it the deadliest month on state roadways so far this year, prompting officials with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) to issue a special call to all motorists: buckle-up, slow down, be sober and alert behind the wheel every day – every trip.

"Through law enforcement and public education, we're doing everything we can to urge motorists to travel safely and responsibly," said David Pabst, Director of WisDOT's Bureau of Transportation Safety. "But in the end, it's the responsibility of every driver and passenger to do their part to prevent needless tragedies along our roadways."

Traffic fatalities last month were three more compared to July of last year, and 11 more than the five-year average for July. Wisconsin's safest July was in 2015 with 39 fatalities and the deadliest occurred in 1966 and 1971 with 140 fatalities. Through the first seven months of the year, a preliminary total of 338 people died along Wisconsin roadways, surpassing the 335 people killed over the same period last year. Wisconsin traffic fatalities through July include 192 car and truck drivers, 59 passengers, 45 motorcyclists and 38 pedestrians.

The annual Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign from August 18 through Labor Day will put more officers on the roads for longer hours looking for impaired drivers and other traffic law violators. "While impaired driving remains a serious concern across Wisconsin, other common traffic law violations like speeding and distracted driving are equally dangerous and deadly," Pabst said.

2018 Pheasant Stamp and Wild Turkey Stamp design contest

Robert Leum of Holmen, an avid hunter, submitted the winning design for both the 2018 Pheasant and Wild Turkey stamp design contests. Robert is a previous stamp design winner. He received first place for his paintings in the 2009 Waterfowl Stamp, the 2002 Pheasant Stamp and the 2001 Wild Turkey Stamp design contests.

First place in the 2018 Pheasant Stamp design contest went to Robert Leum of Holmen for his depiction of a rooster and hen pheasant at an old farmstead.

Second place was awarded to Todd Haefner of Janesville for his painting of a rooster pheasant in a farmland setting and third place was given to Robert Andrea of Spooner for his painting of a pair of pheasants on a winter landscape.

A \$10 Pheasant Stamp is required to hunt pheasants in the state of Wisconsin, and proceeds bring in several hundred thousand dollars annually for the forested landscape.

All turkey hunters are required to purchase the \$5.25 Wild Turkey Stamp to legally hunt turkeys in Wisconsin. Proceeds from stamp sales provide vital support for turkey management and hunting in Wisconsin, and bring in over \$775,000 annually for habitat management and restoration projects, education, research, equipment purchases and management of the wild turkey program.

Please note that an electronic "stamp approval" is printed on the licenses of wild turkey, pheasant and waterfowl hunters at the time of purchase. Hunters will not receive an actual stamp unless they request it. To obtain a physical copy of a stamp, visit the Wildlife and Fish Collector Stamp webpage, or go to any DNR Service Center.

ANNUAL NOTICE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION REFERRAL AND **EVALUATION PROCEDURES**

Upon request, the School District of Wabeno Area is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for an evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. NOTICE OF SPECIAL NEEDS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

This notice serves to inform parents and guardians of students with disabilities that the State of Wisconsin has established the Special Needs Scholarship Program. Under this scholarship program and as further specified in state law, a child with a disability who has been denied the opportunity to attend a nonresident school district under the full-time open enrollment program may be eligible to receive a scholarship from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that allows the child to attend an eligible private school that is participating in the Special Needs Scholarship Program. This is a state-administered program. ACCESS TO PUBLIC RECORDS

Student records are maintained to assist students, parents, guardians, and the school in achieving the student's educational goals. Such records are accumulated, maintained, released, transferred, and eventually destroyed by the building principal or his/her designee in accordance with state and federal law. Only those individuals or agencies specifically authorized by state and federal law shall be granted access to a student's records.

The school district does forward records to other schools that have requested the records and in which the student seeks or intends to enroll, or is already enrolled, as long as the disclosure is for purposes related to the student's enrollment or transfer.

An adult student or the parent/guardian of a minor student may inspect the student's records in accordance with administrative policy and established procedures and may challenge the content if he/she believes the records are inaccurate or misleading. Such a complaint would be filed with the building principal. If not satisfied with the decision, an appeal avenue is available through the Family Policy and Regulations Office of the U.S. Department of Education.



The Jauquet family engaged in the logging business way back. They purchased timber lands near Sagola, Michigan back in 1903, and started logging there. In fact, there are still members of the Jauquet family in that area. One of the Jauquet loggers either fell in love with the U.P. or a girl from the area, or maybe both.

In Newald, the Cleereman & Jauguet partnership split in 1945. It was a friendly separation from all accounts. John Jauquet bought out Bill Cleereman, forming the Jauquet Lumber Company. Bill Cleereman went up the C&NW track a bit to the north and established Cleereman Lumber and Manufacturing.

By 1954, the Jauquet Lumber Company decided to stop operations. By 1955, William Jauquet had bought out the Diamond Coal and Supply in Green Bay and eventually changed it to Jauquet Lumber.

Bill Cleereman ran his mill until 1969, when he suddenly passed away, with the mill never operating again. By this time, Francis Cleereman, Bill's son, was up to his ears producing the famous Cleereman sawmill carriage. There are over 1.100 of them that were made in Newald, by the way.



Baldwin introduces legislation to give the choice to buy into Medicare

at age 55

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI), Debbie Stabenow (D-MI), Sherrod Brown (D-OH), and five other Senators introduced the Medicare at 55 Act, which provides an option for people between the ages of 55 and 64 to buy into Medicare. There are 41 million Americans between the ages of 55 and 64, and millions of them are burdened by high insurance premiums, unaffordable deductibles and limited options.

"Wisconsinites have sent a clear message to Washington that they want us to work across party lines to make health care more affordable, not more costly," said Senator Baldwin. "Our legislation offers a choice for millions of older Americans to buy more affordable, quality health care coverage. For people between the ages of 55 and 64, this is a high quality option that can help reduce health insurance costs and increase competition."

"People between the ages of 55 and 64 often have more health problems and face higher health care costs but aren't yet eligible for Medicare," said Senator Stabenow. "If you live in Michigan, are 58 years old, and are having a hard time finding coverage that works for you, this bill will let you buy into Medicare before you turn 65. Our legislation is one way we can work together on a bipartisan basis to lower health care and prescription drug costs."

"Giving people more quality choices at reasonable prices is something we can all agree on – that's what letting Ohioans buy into Medicare is all about," said Senator Brown. "This is a simple solution for folks who are 55 and can't get healthcare through work, or those who are

People in the 55-64 age group face unique health challenges and especially high health care costs. The average person in this age group pays more than \$1,200 in annual out-of-pocket costs and is at a greater risk of suffering from chronic conditions such as diabetes or arthritis and medical emergencies such as heart attack and stroke.

Under the Medicare at 55 Act, an individual between the ages of 55 and 64 who buys into Medicare would receive the same benefits and protections as an individual enrolled under Medicare parts A, B, and D.

U.S. Senators Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI), Patrick Leahy (D-VT), Jeff Merkley (D-OR), Jack Reed (D-RI), and Al Franken (D-MN) co-sponsored the legislation.


County Deer Advisory Council meetings provide public with opportunity to get involved in deer management

MADISON - Beginning Aug. 21, County Deer Advisory Councils will review deer population data and other key information in order to develop preliminary three-year population objectives within their counties.

Council meetings will also discuss potential changes to Deer Management Unit (DMU) boundaries. Each CDAC meeting is open to the public - meetings are currently being scheduled and will be available at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "CDAC."

"Setting population objectives and reviewing DMU boundaries are discussions that occur only every three years," said Kevin Wallenfang, DNR CDAC coordinator. "These meetings and the resulting recommendations set the stage for the number of antlerless permits and the season structures that are used in each county for the next three year period. As a result, it is important that the hunters from each county will attend and provide their input as they will be impacted for the next several years based on the results of these meetings." August CDAC meetings will develop preliminary recommendations, and a public feedback period in mid-September will include an online survey. Councils will reconvene in October to determine final deer season recommendations in each county. Final population objectives and DMU boundaries will be determined at the December 2017 Natural Resources Board meeting based on the information received through this public involvement process. Councils will accept public comments prior to forming both preliminary and final recommendations. The public is encouraged to attend and provide feedback at any CDAC meeting or send comments to CDAC members - a contact list for each council and other helpful information is available at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "CDAC." way beyond just hitting a bulls-eye," Warnke said. "First, you learn to be safe. That carries with it an ability to concentrate, be responsible to how and where you shoot. August is inaugural National Shooting Sports Month

MADISON -- The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is joining a national foundation in marking August as National Shooting Sports Month to promote the activity and its dedication to safety and skill-building as fun and appropriate for youth to adult and open to persons with varying physical abilities.

DNR Hunting and Shooting Sports Coordinator Keith Warnke says the National Shooting Sports Foundation's inaugural month-long celebration is an opportunity to introduce and to promote the state's growing number of private shooting ranges with public access hours, youth trap-shoot activities and firearm safety for hunters of all ages.

"Shooting sports are all about skills - skills that you carry into real life. This is why this sport is challenging and fun, and worthwhile for kids. This goes way beyond just hitting a bullseye," Warnke said. "First, you learn to be safe. That carries with it an ability to concentrate, be responsible to how and where you shoot. In order to hit that target at the range, or at a shooting competition, you have to be able to control your breathing, your muscles, concentrate and be confident in your abilities. 

Some classes meet only once for a couple of hours while others meet once a week over the course of months.

"There's a great deal of flexibility," Peltier added. "Members are welcome to take as many or as few offerings as they wish."

Fall session activities will take place September through December and include a number of tours, educational and cultural experiences and social activities. Classes begin September 8.

All offerings are developed by LIR members. Some members are well-versed or even experts on a given topic and lead presentations themselves. Other classes are led by outside professionals.



This photo from the early 1900's is of the Hiles Town Hall. Like town halls in every little town, it was the center of all activity, and often school events as well. It was the place for funerals, at times, funeral dinners, voting, and the best times of all, wedding dances!

The old building served the community well for many decades, and then served as a sawmill office and storeroom until its eventual demise in recent years.

A story from the old days came from Oliver Campbell, who as a teenager was working on a loading crew at Adkins Siding. One of the men was killed, and the bloody body was wrapped in canvas and brought to the town hall. Oliver, as the youngest and least experienced of the crew, was left to sit with the corpse through the night until the family could get there to pick up the body. He said he was spooked! He spent the night watching the level of the kerosene in the only lamp, hoping it wouldn't run out before daylight. The only thing worse than sitting with a dead guy, was to do it in the dark.





