More than half of Wisconsin's municipalities are communities of fewer than 2,500 residents. Despite their large number, these small communities represent a wide variety of geographic and economic areas within the state. Because of their small size, these municipalities have unique issues and needs that are often very different from those of larger communities.

Now in their seventh year, the Small Community Forums, to be held in Wabeno on August 24 and three other locations in August and September, allow representatives of these communities to come together, network, share best practices and identify strategies to address shared concerns. Additionally, representatives from many state and regional resource partners will be on hand to connect with attendees and provide guidance on specific concerns introduced during the sessions.

The Wabeno forum will be held on Thursday, August 24, at the Wabeno Elementary School, 4346 Mill Lane, from noon to 4:30 p.m. Registration opens at 11:30 a.m. The registration fee is \$20 and includes lunch, starting at 12 noon. Register at www.wisconsindowntown.org/small-town-forum.

In addition, an optional and special tour of Wabeno's new downtown barrier-free boardwalk and nature trail has been added to the schedule. The pre-forum tour will start at 11a.m., leaving from the entrance to the elementary school, and another tour will happen after the forum ends at 4:30. All participants are welcome.

The Wabeno Forum will feature a presentation on the community resources that are working together to move Wabeno forward, including the Friends of Wabeno, the Wabeno Arts Consortium, and Wabeno Area Players.

The Wabeno Forum is open to everyone interested in small towns, including those involved in quality of life issues, business, government, education, civic and community development civic leaders, elected officials, volunteers, business leaders, educators, and local and regional economic development, civic, and planning are encouraged to participate. This convening is all about sharing ideas, learning and networking for people who care about the future of rural Wisconsin.

Anne Katz, a member of the Forum planning committee, had this to say about the forums: "Small business owners and civic leaders can find ways to help our community thrive and grow is important from a personal and professional standpoint. Being able to network and gather creative ideas and best practices from others in similar situations is a really valuable experience. She recently retired after a 30-year career with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection where she worked as a marine biologist and ultimately a deputy secretary at the agency.

"My goal is to make the science of climate change understandable for people," said McVety, who has spent at least a portion of every summer in the Northwoods for the past 40 years.

"Climate change is the most serious issue facing humanity. We are in a very difficult, life threatening situation and the window of opportunity to change the direction our climate is heading is shrinking rapidly."

The rub comes from all of the carbon already in our atmosphere. It's enough to keep the pendulum swinging towards a warmer and warmer planet for the foreseeable future.

The kicker is humans continue to dump tons upon tons of more carbon into the atmosphere every year, largely in the form of carbon dioxide from the burning of fossil fuels.






It travels through Forest County, Langlade County, Onieda County and Vilas County. The bulk of the byway is in Forest County.



MADISON -- Each year, a tree-killing fungal disease strikes and kills thousands of oak trees in Wisconsin's forests, woodlots and urban areas. Oak wilt is common in southern and central Wisconsin and is becoming increasingly abundant in northern counties. It is difficult to control once the disease takes hold and prevention steps need to be taken to slow the spread.

"We are observing oak wilt in more places this year, probably due to the storms we had in the spring," said Todd Lanigan, a forest health specialist with the Department of Natural Resources Division of Forestry. "The first symptoms of oak wilt are branches with wilted leaves dropping in summer. These are not the brown, dry leaves you see in autumn. These are partially green to bronze-green and are not completely dry."

Oak wilt is confirmed in all Wisconsin counties except Ashland, Bayfield, Calumet, Door, Douglas, Forest, Iron, Kewaunee, Manitowoc, Sheboygan and Taylor counties.

Oaks in the red oak group, including northern red, northern pin, and black oaks, are particularly vulnerable to oak wilt.

"Oak wilt is fatal for the infected tree. Landowners need to know what to watch for to take immediate steps to

ct nearby oaks," said Don Kissinger, DNR urban forester. "Trees that die of oak wilt can still spread the approximately a year after they die. It is important to know the signs and have a certified arborist or local forest health specialist help manage and contain the spread of oak wilt."

Wisconsin communities may be eligible to participate in a cost-sharing program to help combat oak wilt. The Urban Forestry Grant Program is not available to individual property owners; however, they can work with their municipalities to take steps to protect their oaks. Grant applications are due October 1. If a community is interested in applying for a grant, contact the local DNR urban forestry coordinator for more information.

"It is important to know the signs and have a certified arborist or local forest health specialist help outline management options, such as applying a fungicide," said Don Kissinger, DNR urban forester. What to watch for:

• Wilted leaves that drop from the top of the tree first.

- Dull green or bronze leaves that look water-soaked.
- · Partially green leaves on the ground which have dropped from the tree.

• Leaves infected with oak wilt drop rapidly and appear bronze-green.

Helpful tips:

Do not prune oak trees from April through July and seal any wounds with water-based paint to prevent insectcaused infection.

Check with your municipality to see if there are local oak wilt ordinances.

Control below-ground spread by severing the root system between an infected tree and healthy trees. Do not move diseased wood for firewood.

If storing diseased wood for personal firewood use nearby, seal the entire pile with 4 mil plastic.

The University of Wisconsin's Plant Disease Diagnostic Clinic can help verify the presence of oak wilt. Instructions for collecting and mailing samples to the clinic are available at www.plantpath.wisc.edu/pddc/ (exit DNR), or by calling 608-262-2863.

Other diseases and insect infestations can mimic oak wilt. Additional information about oak wilt and other forest health issues can be found at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "forest health."

This is a sober reminder of the months ahead. even if it is a "little" early for a snow photo.


This picture is from the Lynn Paul collection, but we don't know who the people in the picture are. We know it is probably in the 1920's, as you can see the dozer tracks in the snow.





"Humans have the ability to change the entire climate of the earth and the real question is how long will this planet be conducive to hosting human life," she said.

The subsequent sea level rise caused by warming temperatures and ice melt is already having dramatic, lifechanging impact in many areas.

Streets in affluent Miami Beach now flood during spring high tides. An elaborate and expensive pumping system does what it can to remove the water.

Nearby coastal Louisiana is also experiencing significant flooding, "but many of the people who are affected in this area do not have the options people in Miami Beach have."

Other areas around the world are experiencing deadly heat and back-to-back droughts.

"There are millions of people, primarily the poor and impoverished, who can't adapt to this new reality. They don't have the means to move from areas of repeated flooding, severe drought, or extreme heat."

So far the impact in the Northwoods hasn't been

nearly as dramatic. The decline of white birch trees in the region can be attributed to warming temperatures, she said.

Lake temperatures are also warming, creating conditions more beneficial to bass than walleye and other species in the pike family that prefer cooler temperatures. During her presentation, McVety will also talk about actions people can take as individuals.

"Once people understand how harmful and irreversible climate change is my hope is that they will act," she said.

Sponsored by the Oneida and Vilas County Chapter of the Citizen's Climate Lobby and the Nicolet College Sustainability Professional Learning Community, the presentation is part of the Our Changing World Series at the college.

Other upcoming presentations include Adapting Forest Management to a Changing Climate October 11 and a screening and discussion November 7 of the film Chasing Coral, winner of best documentary at the Sundance Film Festival.

All presentations in the Our Changing World series are free and open to the public.

Tips for Dealing with Flooding

Some areas of Wisconsin flood every year. These floods are usually created by rivers and lakes overflowing or too much surface water run-off in low-laying flat areas. Here are some steps you can take to protect yourself and your home if you live in an area likely to flood:

First, talk to your insurance agent about whether you need flood insurance. Second, you may want to think about moving your furnace or water heater so that they are above flood level. You also might want to think about installing a sump pump with a backup generator so that it can remove water even if the power goes out. Finally, you might want to put together an emergency kit with a supply of water and nonperishable food and a flashlight, and make sure that you can easily find your medications as well as your cell phone and charger.



2017 Fall Turkey Hunting leftover permits go on sale August 26

MADISON -Hunters who were successful in the fall turkey permit drawing will begin receiving notification in the mail early next week. Please note, it is possible that the notifications may arrive after the leftover permit sales begin. Leftover fall turkey permits go on sale August 26 for the season that opens Sept. 16.



Hunters can check to see if they were successful in drawing a fall turkey permit by logging into their accounts at GoWild.WI.Gov. A fall turkey license needs to be purchased, along with the turkey stamp [PDF], unless the stamp was purchased for the spring turkey hunt. Conservation Patron license holders already have their fall turkey license and stamp privileges and they will receive their fall turkey permits in the mail, if they were successful in the drawing.

Those not successful in the drawing will have the chance to purchase a leftover permit. All remaining fall turkey permits will go on sale Saturday, Aug. 26 at 10 a.m. Leftover permits can be purchased at a rate of one per day until the zone sells out or the season ends. The fall turkey hunting season for zones 1-5 runs Sept. 16 to Dec. 31 (season may be extended to Jan. 7, 2018, consult

When a flood happens, the most important thing to do is avoid flooded areas. Flood water may have sewage or large pieces of debris that you can't see under the water. Only two feet of rushing water is enough to carry away most vehicles.

If your home floods, make sure you have safe drinking water. If your town issues a "boil water" notice, make sure you follow all directions. If you have a private well, it may need to be disinfected before you drink or bathe in water from the well. Disinfecting a well is something that should be done by a licensed well driller or pump installer.

In addition, don't turn your power on or off while standing in water. You may need to have your electrical system inspected, and your electrical appliances must be completely dry before you use them. If they have been sitting in water, your appliances may not work.

Flooded buildings should also be inspected for structural damage. In addition, any hard surfaces that touched flood waters should be disinfected with a beach solution. Any damaged flooring or furniture may need to be removed to prevent mold.


