

### Ziolkowski honored at WCFA Annual Meeting on September 9





On Friday, September 29, 2017 the Wisconsin County Forest Association (WCFA) held their 2017 Annual Meeting at the Mountain Bay Conference Center in Weston, Wisconsin. The conference included over 100 people in attendance including county foresters from the 29 member counties, DNR foresters, DNR supervisors, county board supervisors, vendors and various speakers.

After a break for lunch, all 28 County Forest Administrators took center stage to recognize an old friend and coworker. David Ziolkowski, former Forest County Forest Administrator, was invited to center stage for a retirement plaque. As Ziolkowski walked up he was greeted by a loud, long round of applause as the participants rose to their feet for a standing ovation.

Ziolkowski received many kind words for his efforts to improve forestry in the State of Wisconsin as well as a plaque in the shape of the State of Wisconsin stating: "In Recognition of and Appreciation for 31 Years of Dedicated Service to Wisconsin's County Forests Serving as Forest County Forest Administrator November 6, 1986 -June 5, 2017. Many Thanks for Your Efforts in Promoting Sustainable Forest Management and Providing Public Recreation Opportunities in Wisconsin."

Ziolkowski served as past President of the Wisconsin County Forest Administrators and won the Milt Reinke Forest Productivity Award three times in his career.



Crandon International sees historic records reset at Off-Road World Championships

# Red Bull Rod Bull

While last Friday may have marked the official start of autumn, for off-road racing fans the biggest race of the year -- the 48th annual "fall" World Championships at Crandon International Raceway is already in the record books. Held August 31st through September 3rd, the legendary facility today announced that many of its existing records "fell" in 2017 -- pun intended.

Dubbed "The Big House" by legions of loyal fans, this year Crandon reset its own attendance record, with the oldest and most prestigious short course off-road races in the world attracting an official crowd of 54,408 over the final two days of competition. That number eclipses 2016's record of 49,600 by almost 5,000 guests, an impressive increase of nearly ten percent.

That milestone was also reflected in the first prerace sellout of Crandon's legendary grass campgrounds in 2017. Even with an increase of more than 100 sites from 2016 all 2,100 sites that make up Camp Crandon were sold before a field of nearly 200 racers hit the track for the first of 29 weekend races on Friday afternoon.



With great racing guaranteed in a variety of The Off Road Championship (TORC) PRO and Sportsman classes on Friday and Saturday promising an entertaining time for all, a great deal of excitement for 2017's Crandon World Championship Off-Road Race(R) weekend was generated by the second annual Crandon World Cup, part of the Red Bull Signature Series. An independent, nondenominational short-course race open to all PRO-class racers from around the country, the Crandon World Cup attracted the sport's top names from both the TORC and Lucas Oil Off-Road Racing Series in a dynamic East versus West showdown. 

The Forest County Recreation Department had a representative on hand to discuss the laws and and regulations on the lake. Greg Matske, a DNR biologist was available to talk about the various types of fish in Lake Metonga. Lindsey Peterson of the Wild Rivers Organization identified and discussed invasives on the land in Forest County. R.T. Krueger, from Northern Lakes Service, identified and explained the importance of aquatic macro inverabrates in the soil around Lake Metonga. Dr Cindy Edlund, the environmental teacher at Crandon High School demonstrated water chemistry using the water from Lake Metonga and Shari Alloway, a student teacher at Crandon demonstrated the use of the geographic Information system in lake management.

The students were divided so there were students from all three schools in each group consisting of eight groups. The groups rotated so each group was able to participate at each of the eight stations.

The students brought their own bag lunches from each school and were able to eat together for lunch. The knowledge absorbed by the students and the companionship made that day will be remembered by all who participated.



### Wisconsin Breeding Bird Atlas Releases Third-Season Findings

MADISON -- After the third year of the Wisconsin Breeding Bird Atlas survey, volunteers have documented 220 bird species breeding in the state, most recently including a family of rare and secretive marsh birds called king rails. With this addition, 12 new species have been observed nesting in Wisconsin that weren't found during the first Breeding Bird Atlas survey two decades ago.

"A few of these king rails were reported in the first atlas but none were confirmed as nesting here," says Ryan Brady, Department of Natural Resources conservation biologist and science coordinator for the Atlas. "So it's exciting to see wetland management efforts having positive benefits for a species that requires highquality marshes to successfully raise its young."

Good wetland management by state and federal wildlife management staff have also contributed to another Atlas finding -- that trumpeter swans are undergoing an impressive expansion in range and numbers since the last survey from 1995-2000, Brady says.

Trumpeter swans were decimated by over hunting by the late 1800s, and the species was mostly absent from Wisconsin until DNR's Natural Heritage Conservation Program and partners began reintroducing the species in 1987.

"Even a decade ago, most breeding pairs kept to the more remote northern lakes," Brady says. "Good wetland management and protection have allowed trumpeters to use unoccupied marshes and increase their numbers to over 5,000 birds.

organizations leading the project: The Wisconsin Society for Ornithology, the Western Great Lakes Bird and Bat Observatory, the Wisconsin Bird Conservation Initiative, and DNR.

"It's easy to participate and you don't have to be an expert birder to help," says Bill Mueller, director of the Western Great Lakes Bird and Bat Observatory, "We're constantly hearing from people how rewarding atlasing is, and we welcome participants of all ability levels."

When the project is completed, the data will be published in a hardcopy book and online for use by researchers, land managers, conservationists, and citizens interested in birds and their habitats.

Volunteers have documented them breeding across the north, northwest, and central regions and birds have even colonized the Lower Wisconsin River.

Volunteers Still Needed to Accurately Reveal **Trends in Birds** 

The purpose of the five-year atlas effort is to document all bird species that breed in Wisconsin, from common year-round residents like northern cardinal to species of high conservation interest like Connecticut warbler. Some of these species may be vanishing, while others are holding their own, or even increasing, but only a statewide effort will reveal these trends, says Nicholas Anich, Breeding Bird Atlas coordinator for DNR.

'The project has already amassed records of 4.9 million birds but we still have a ways to go," Anich says. "We need more volunteers to survey priority areas so we get a complete picture of what's going on with our bird populations and how we can help them moving forward." More than 1,400 volunteers have contributed to the survey so far, but more are needed to survey remaining priority areas, particularly in northern, central, and western regions of the state.

#### **Getting Involved**

Volunteers collect data by observing birds, and enter their sightings online, where the information is reviewed by Anich, Brady, and other ornithologists from

### U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin Cosponsors Bipartisan Legislation to Reauthorize Critical Funding for Community Health Centers

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin joined U.S. Senators Debbie Stabenow (D-MI) and Roy Blunt (R-MO) as a cosponsor of the Community Health Investment, Modernization, and Excellence (CHIME) Act, which would reauthorize the Community Health Center Fund (CHCF) and the National Health Service Corps (NHSC) for five years. In addition, the bipartisan bill provides four percent increases for the

CHCF and NHSC every year beginning in FY2019. "Families across the state of Wisconsin rely on the 17 community health centers across our state for critical, quality and affordable health care services, including preventative care, vision services and low-cost dental care," said Senator Baldwin. "Without immediate action to continue funding for these critical providers, more than 30 thousand Wisconsinites could lose access to care. We must act now on this bipartisan legislation to help keep these vital community health centers open and serving their communities."

Community health centers are a critical component of the nation's primary care network, serving approximately 26 million patients at over 10,000 sites throughout the United States. Community health centers operate in both rural and urban areas, in every state in the nation. Last year, health centers were the medical home for one in twelve Americans, one in ten children, one in six Americans living in rural areas, and more than 330,000 of our nation's veterans.

Without extension of the CHCF, community health centers will lose seventy percent of their funding. This will result in an estimated 2,800 site closures, the loss of 50,000 jobs, and result in 9 million Americans losing their access to care.

Earlier this month, Senator Baldwin joined a bipartisan group of Senators in calling for immediate action to extend critical funding for community health centers before funding runs out.

The CHIME Act is also cosponsored by U.S. Senators Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV), Ben Cardin (D-MD), Tom Carper (D-DE), Susan Collins (R-ME), Cory Gardner (R-CO), Joe Manchin (D-WV), Claire McCaskill (D-MO) and Roger Wicker (R-MS). An online version of this release is available.

### Help DNR staff monitor Wisconsin's wolf population become a volunteer carnivore tracker today

MADISON - Wisconsin's wolf monitoring program relies upon volunteers from around the state who help track animals each winter, and people interested in playing a key role in wildlife management are encouraged to sign up for one of a number of classes offered statewide.

Carnivore tracking classes focus on learning to identify the tracks of medium- to large-size carnivores that inhabit Wisconsin, as well as a few other common mammals. Wolf ecology and management classes cover the history of wolves in Wisconsin, their biology and ecology, how DNR monitors the population, and state management and research. Completion of both classes is required to participate in the wolf monitoring program as a volunteer carnivore tracker.

Wisconsin's wolf monitoring program relies upon volunteers from around the state who help track animals each winter, and people interested in playing a key role in wildlife management are encouraged to sign up for one of a number of classes offered statewide.

"DNR staff and volunteers tracked over 14,000 miles last winter searching for wolf, coyote, bobcat, and other medium to large size carnivore tracks in Wisconsin," said DNR assistant carnivore biologist Jane Wiedenhoeft. "It's a great way to get out and enjoy Wisconsin in the winter while helping the department monitor some of the state's most interesting wildlife."

Department of Natural Resources biologists and volunteers have partnered to provide informative classes focused on aspects of wolf ecology, population biology and field study techniques. Tracking is a great way to experience the outdoors in winter and make a contribution to natural resource management. 

### Water - The Beverage of Life

Submitted by Kathy O'Melia Water is the nutrient your body needs in the

greatest amount. To function normally and to avoid dehydration, you need an ongoing supply because unlike some other nutrients, your body doesn't store any extra for those times when you need more. Thirst normally signals the need for more fluids, but it isn't always reliable. For a number of reasons, getting enough water is especially important for older people.

Water: A Job Description

What does water do in your body? It does far more than satisfy your thirst! Every cell, tissue and organ needs water to function. Did you know that water...

- Transports nutrients
- Carries away waste
- Moistens eyes, mouth and nose
- Hydrates skin
- Ensures adequate blood volume
- Is the main component of body fluids
- Protects against heat exhaustion
- Acts as insulation in the cold
- Is a diluent for many medications
- How Much is Enough?

The average adult loses about 2 ½ quarts (about 10 cups) daily through normal body functions. Most people need 8 to 12 cups of water each day, although some of this comes from other beverages and from the water in solid foods, like fruits and vegetables. To add water to your daily routine:

- Take water breaks throughout the day
- Have water, tea or juice with meals

Never pass a water fountain without taking a drink

• Drink water before, during and after physical activity

Other factors may cause a need for more water, such as very hot or cold temperatures, sickness, eating a high-fiber diet or air travel.

Dehydration: Look for Body Signals!

The effects of dehydration, or loss of body water, are progressive. Although you need to pay attention to the



### A reminder to Hunters regarding changes to the tagging of deer and turkey

MADISON - As the archery and turkey seasons continue and the youth deer hunters will take to the field this weekend, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources reminds hunters about recently implemented changes involving the use of deer and turkey carcass tags.


Deer - Deer tags are still issued with license purchases. However, validation and attachment of tags is no longer required, nor is the requirement to keep the tag with the deer meat.

Turkey - Turkey carcass tags have been replaced with Turkey Harvest Authorizations. Turkey hunters are no longer required to validate or attach the tag, or to keep the tag with the turkey meat.

Newly issued deer tags will now look like these. Already purchased paper carcass tags are still valid. While not needed in the field, keep the tags you received with your prior license purchase as the tag number is needed for registration. Hunters must still carry proof of a hunting voluntary action to all areas of the state. license and deer tags. To date, nearly one million deer and turkey carcass tags have been issued for the current fall hunting seasons. All previously issued deer and turkey carcass tags are still valid as an authorization to hunt deer or turkey within the assigned or designated location. Customers making additional purchases throughout the remainder of this than those listed, from these states and provinces are not year's hunting seasons will be issued products that will not include the usual validation and attachment language. While hunting, customers will still be required to carry proof they are authorized to hunt within the designated location. Hunters will be able to use their paper tag/authorization, DNR issued Conservation Card, a GoWild validated Wisconsin driver's license, a GoWild digital file as proof of compliance. Harvested turkey and deer must still be registered under current law. Harvest registration is a critical part of deer and turkey population management. Customers will be asked to enter either their deer tag number or their turkey harvest authorization number into the Game Registration system to begin the harvest registration process. Please note, tag or authorization numbers are different than a customer identification number. Hunters will need to know their tag or authorization number to register.

### How hunters can help reduce spread of chronic wasting disease

MADISON - Hunters participating in any of the deer hunts this fall are reminded to observe Wisconsin regulations and to consider supplemental, voluntary recommendations when transporting carcasses across county or state lines. The movement of deer carcasses infected with chronic wasting disease is a key pathway in the spread of this disease.

"The infectious nature of the CWD prion contributes to an increased risk of introduction and spread of CWD if carcasses are brought to areas where CWD is not known to exist if not disposed of properly," said Tami Ryan, wildlife health section chief for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Carcass movement restrictions are currently in place to limit the spread of disease. Both whole wild-deer carcasses and certain parts of carcasses from CWDaffected counties can only be moved within CWD-affected counties and an adjacent county.
