Press Release from the Wisconsin Attorney General

Madison, WI - The Wisconsin Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation, at the request of the Crandon Police Department, has been investigating an officer involved death that took place on the evening of October 22, 2017 in Crandon, WI.

A traffic stop conducted by a Crandon police officer led to a physical altercation between the officer and the passenger of the vehicle, which resulted in the officer firing his duty weapon. The officer on the scene rendered first-aid to the suspect until EMS arrived, but the suspect, 30-year-old Dexter David Anthony Baxter, succumbed to his injuries and was pronounced dead before arriving at a local hospital.

An autopsy was conducted at the University of Wisconsin on Monday, October 23, 2017.

VA and Walgreens team up to provide flu vaccinations to Veterans

The cold and flu season is upon us and the Department of Veteran's Affairs has once again teamed up with Walgreens Pharmacies nationwide to allow all veterans who are currently enrolled in the VA healthcare system to be able to walk into any of the over 8,000 Walgreens nationally to receive a vaccination at no cost. Vaccinations will be available through March 31, 2018.

Veterans wishing to receive the no cost vaccination simply need to present a Veterans Identification Card and a photo identification at any participating Walgreens to receive the vaccination. The group ID is, VAFLU.

In addition, after the Walgreens pharmacist administrators the vaccine, Walgreens will transmit that information securely to VA, where it becomes part of the patients electronic medical record.

The once exceedingly vast, vibrant and fertile fields of ocean coral and their rapid demise will take center stage in the Nicolet College Theatre with the screening and audience discussion of the award-winning film Chasing Coral at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 7.

A winner at the 2017 Sundance Film Festival and the recipient of a box full of other awards, the film documents the rapidly-shrinking marine ecosystems from around the world as they devolve from lush and diverse environments to barren wastelands consisting of little more than muck.

The culprit: warming ocean waters where as little as a two-degree temperature change can have devastating impacts.

Taking more than three years to shoot, director Jeff Orlowski sifted through more than 500 hours of underwater video from around the world to make the hour-

and-a-half-long film.

"The secret weapon for Chasing Coral is that it's extremely funny, involving the viewers into its "Silicon Valley"-level nerd-ery about coral reefs. Orlowski's direct involvement with the story makes the documentary its own adventure," writes Nick Allen for the Ebert Club newsletter.

Nicolet Herrington, film critic for The New York Times, says "the film is particularly compelling when following Zack Rago, a self-proclaimed coral nerd whose love is palpable and infectious. The work takes a toll on his spirits, never more so than when after weeks of dives, he encounters what has essentially become a gravesite, barely resembling what was once a fertile haven."

Dr. David Barnhill will lead a discussion at the conclusion of the film.

The presentation is part of the Our Changing World series at Nicolet, sponsored by the Oneida and Vilas County Chapter of the Citizen's Climate Lobby and the Nicolet College Sustainability Professional Learning Community.

Truttman, 86, Laona, passed away Monday October 16 in Green Bay, WI. Wilbert (Bill as most people know him), was born November 7, 1930 in New Glaris, WI. He was the youngest son of Jacob and Emma (Kubly) Truttman. He lived on a farm with his family in New Glaris until the age of 9 when the family



moved to Green Bay. Bill spent a lot of time in his younger years caring for his sister Rosemary who suffered from illness and passed away at a young age.

Bill married Shirley Selsmeyer on September 30, 1950. Together they lived and raised their daughters in Green Bay until retirement when they moved to "the cottage" in Laona. Bill worked at the papermill in the printing department for many years, then as a building materials salesman, and as an expediter for a home building company. He was a member of the Naval Reserve. He also worked odd jobs like bartending where he was the smiling face people would remember. Everywhere he went he joked around with people and was smiling. Both he and Shirley were very active members of the First Presbyterian Church in Green Bay and then in Wabeno. They served as both Deacons and Elders for the church. They hosted many coffee hours in Wabeno at church and would help with the pie booth at Steam-up days. They also took care of the altar and set-up communion for many years. Bill was always the lastminute user, if someone didn't show-up he would fill in. They were both auxiliary members for Laona Rescue Unit and Bill did serve as a driver.

He coached many softball teams that his daughter played on, and even if he wasn't coaching, he would be in the stands, he didn't miss a game. As coach, he was the dad to everyone on the team. Bill was an avid sports fan and loved watching the Packers, he even had season tickets. But the Chicago Cubs stole his heart. He attended many Cubs games in Chicago and never missed them on TV. He never lost sight of his Cubbies winning the world series and he got to see that happen. In his later years, he loved TV and would get right into the shows. He never missed Molly B polka, music was his second favorite after sports.

Bill (or Papa) as the kids knew him, was the ultimate dad and grandpa. He would spend hours on end just "playing" with the kids. It didn't matter where he was, the kids naturally migrated to him. He would get right down to the kid's level and use imagination just like them. He would spend all day taking care of and playing with the kids. He also had a love for animals and any animal around would find him and jump on his lap. It didn't matter, dog, cat, they knew they would be petted and also receive treats. Many of the treats were from the sugary snacks that he loved. Sweets were also very important and became the main course for many of his meals.

Much of his later years were spent caring for Shirley. When her memory gave out, he was the memory. He helped her with the cleaning, he would measure the ingredients and put them in the right order so that she could still bake, and then as the disease progressed he would dress her and feed her each day. She became very anxious and he would just drive her around in the car for hours on end to keep her calm and content. Then when she needed to be placed in the nursing home, he went and sat with her every day. Senators Baldwin and Nelson Call on Department of Education to Act on Student Loan Debt Relief Scams

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Following the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) announcement of the first federal-state law enforcement initiative to crack down on student loan debt relief scams, U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Bill Nelson (D-FL) continue to call for the Department of Education to also take action in addressing this growing problem.

In a letter last month, Baldwin and Nelson led a group of 12 senators in calling on Department of Education Secretary Betsy DeVos to take swift action in addressing the growing problem of student loan debt relief scams, citing the Department's responsibility to ensure effective and streamlined student loan services.

"We write to request that your agency take swift action to address the growing problem of student loan debt relief scams," wrote the senators. "These schemes are luring student loan borrowers into paying thousands of dollars in exorbitant and unnecessary fees for services that are available for free with false promises to reduce or forgive their debt. Most victims of these deceptive practices are quickly defrauded by the companies that promised to help them, and unknowingly become delinguent on their payments and default on their loans, miss communications with their servicers, and fall even deeper into debt. Given the terrible impact on student loan borrowers and their families, and the clear federal role in improving federal student loan servicing we strongly believe the US. Department of Education ("Department") and its contracted loan servicers should take new and more aggressive action to reduce the prevalence of these debt relief scams."

Senators Patty Murray (D-WA), Dianne Feinstein (D-CA), Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY), Chris Murphy (D-CT), Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV), Ben Cardin (D-MD), Kamala Harris (D-CA), Dick Durbin (D-IL), Amy Klobuchar (D-MN), AI Franken (D-MN), Jack Reed (D-RI) and Elizabeth Warren (D-MA) also signed the letter.

WASHINGTON – During an appearance on MSNBC's "Meet The Press Daily" Thursday, U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) explained why he is seeking reforms to increase access to affordable health care in exchange for funding insurance cost-sharing reductions (CSRs).

Excerpts from Senator Johnson's appearance are below, and video can be found here.

"The bottom line is the insurance companies will get paid either way. The fix is already in. They either get the cost-sharing reductions, or they will get increased premiums and the American taxpayer will be out ... another \$194 billion. So I think it's a legitimate point of view on the part of Republicans to really resist trying to fund these unsustainable markets. That's a legitimate point of view, but the reality is, if we don't fund these cost-sharing reductions, premiums would increase and people that are working hard, those individuals that don't get subsidies (will face unaffordable premium increases)."

On if he supports the Alexander-Murray agreement

"No. What I'm for is in exchange for cost-sharing reductions getting some real reforms."

"It's a pretty easy lift to convince all Democrats to fund this faulty architecture. It's more difficult in the House." Background

Sen. Johnson is working to build support in Congress for several reforms, including the following:

1. Improved price transparency—Require the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to publicize pricing and cost information that it receives from providers in a format that is appropriate and useful to consumers;

2. Expanded insurance options—Allow all Americans (not just those under 30) to purchase catastrophic care plans, roll back the 90-day limit on short-term, limited duration plans (restoring the 364 day limit), deem that these plans satisfy the individual mandate under Obamacare, and allow greater state flexibility through 1332 waivers;

3. Strengthened consumer-directed plans—Expand the use of consumer-directed accounts to purchase expanded insurance options, and expand tax free contributions;

4. Reduced mandates—Delay the enforcement of the employer mandate to prevent 90,000 businesses from being assessed \$5 billion in fines due to Obamacare's mandates on employers; waive enforcement of the individual mandate for plan year 2017;

5. Lower premiums—Require insurers to roll back premium increases announced and justified by the anticipated ending of unlawful CSR payments.







Protecting Yourself from Medicare Enrollment Fraud Submitted by Kathy O'Melia

Medicare has rules about how Medicare Advantage and Part D prescription drug plans can contact you and market their services, at all times, including during Medicare's Open Enrollment Period, which runs from October 15 through December 7 each year.

Point 1: Know the rules about how plans can contact and market to you.

Plans can begin marketing as early as October 1 each year. Knowing some of these rules can help you protect yourself from dishonest plan agents or people posing as agents.

Plans are allowed to send you mail. However, unless you are currently enrolled in the company's plan, they are not allowed to call, email, visit your home, or approach you in public to market their plan without your permission. Agents and brokers can have educational exhibits at public events, but they cannot try to enroll you in their plan at these events. They can only give out their contact information only upon request, and then you must be the one to call them.

Point 2: Know how to avoid potential enrollment fraud.

There is a higher risk for fraudulent activities during Medicare's Open Enrollment Period. Enrollment fraud occurs when a plan agent or representative purposefully tricks you into enrolling in their plan, regardless of whether it is the right plan for you. They may do this by telling you misleading or false information to get you to enroll. Some may even enroll you without your knowledge. Watch out for people who pressure you with time limits to enroll in their plan. You can use the entire Open Enrollment Period to make your decisions. You will not receive extra benefits for signing up early for a plan. Contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) for trustworthy and unbiased counseling if you have questions about any of your plan options. Watch out for people who ask for your Medicare number, Social Security number, and/or bank information just to provide you with information. Someone can use this personal information to enroll you in a plan without your permission. Know that plans cannot request this personal information at an educational event and cannot call you to ask for a payment over the phonethey must send a bill. Watch out for people who threaten you with the loss of your Medicare benefits unless you sign up for their plan. Watch out for people who offer you gifts to enroll in their plan. Gifts must be given to everyone regardless of their enrollment, and cannot be worth more than \$15. Watch out for people who say they represent Medicare. Plans are never allowed to suggest they represent or are preferred by Medicare or any other



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
