

Meeting number two will be on Wednesday, January 17th at Crandon High School at 7:00 p.m.

The last meeting will be held in Laona at the High School on January 24th at 7:00 p.m.

On the brochure you will be receiving in the mail, the meetings are listed as informational, and it is assumed that questions from the audience will be answered.

On the brochure you will be receiving, there are two options listed. Option number 1 keeps the 1909 courthouse and costs \$25.8 million. Option number 2 removes the courthouse and costs \$22.8 million. Less expensive options aren't listed.







Adeline Nancy Volk, 71, of Wabeno, WI went to the Lord on Tuesday, December 19, 2017 at her home with her family by her side. Nancy was born January 28, 1946 in Laona, the daughter of Harter and Marcella (Champeau) Enders. She was united in marriage to Jan Volk on August 2, 1969 at St. Ambrose Catholic Church. Nancy attended St. Norbert College in De Pere where she received her Bachelors



Degree in English. After college, Nancy went on to become a teacher for the Wabeno School District until her retirement in 2003.

Nancy had a tremendous professional impact on the community of Wabeno and its students during her 35 years as an educator. As an English teacher, students learned to "fear the red pen" and her firm but fair critiques of their efforts in writing. Always a stickler for proper grammar, Nancy could leave a student feeling frustrated by her demands for excellence while, at the same time, knowing they had a compassionate, unwavering advocate in their corner. Nancy knew that all of those red marks would result in students prepared to meet the demands that college would bring. Nancy also opened the eyes of several generations of WHS students to the classics of American literature such as "Of Mice and Men", "To Kill a Mockingbird", and "Grapes of Wrath". The third aspect of Nancy's passion for teaching English was speech and communication. She spent numerous summers and long nights after school making the 100 mile trek to Stevens Point to earn her Masters Degree in Communication. She mentored hundreds of students as the Wabeno High School forensics coach, many who remember the trips to the state competition in Madison where they were able to get to know Mrs. Volk in a more relaxed, laid back setting.

Nancy's most lasting professional impact, and her greatest passion, is likely the development and nurturing of the Wabeno drama program. As director of the annual Wabeno High School musical, Mrs. Volk treated the community to classics like "Bye, Bye Birdie", "Guys and Dolls", "Finian's Rainbow", and "Damn Yankees". Nancy brought the arts and drama to the wider community by helping found her "baby," the Wabeno Area Players. During her last years, the Players brought Nancy so much joy, even though her illness prevented her from participating at the level she desired. Her impact will continue to be felt as the Wabeno Area Players will be sponsoring an annual scholarship in Nancy's memory.

Nancy's impact in the community could also be felt in her participation at St. Ambrose Church and with the Wabeno Lions Club. Nancy was a fixture for many years as a lector at St. Ambrose, and spent many years developing and organizing the church's lay minister schedule. She became close to many of the priests at St. Ambrose, including Father Philip, Father Dave, and Father Jason, all of whom provided amazing spiritual guidance in her final days. Father Jerry was a regular guest at Nancy and Jan's for Christmas Eve dinner for many years. As a member of the Lions Club, Nancy volunteered her time to many causes and served the club in a variety of capacities.

Nancy's greatest love of her life was always her family. She dearly loved her brothers and sisters and would do anything to spend time with them, including the trips to Las Vegas and Florida that she loved so much. Her nephews and nieces were like sons and daughters to her, and she would never miss a birthday or graduation party that involved them or their children. Her ultimate love, of course, were her grandsons, Max and Mitch. She loved nothing more than hugging her babies, taking them to the Tundra Lodge for a weekend of fun, and spending time taking boat rides at the lake. Nancy loved listening to her boys play music, and she never missed a concert, even when it required her to drive two hours in great pain.

Twila Marjorie Whiteman Will of Wausau, WI passed Dec. 31, 2017 at Eastview Nursing Home in Antigo, WI. She was born October 27, 1920 in Broken Bow, NE, the daughter of Harvey and Nellie Whiteman.

After graduation from Broken Bow High School she continued her schooling in Kearney, NE earning her teaching

certificate. During a summer baseball game, she met Arnold Will of Ringle, WI while he was stationed at Fort Kearney. They were married November 25, 1943 in Seward, NE. Arnold passed October 31, 1978. They had four children: Alan (Carolyn) Will, Randolf Lee Will, Deborah (Jerome) Warpehoski and Althea Schaepe.

After high school graduation at age 17, she moved to Elkhart, IN to work in a munitions factory during WWII. After the war ended, she married the love of her life,





#### What about America's Dairyland?







### **Medicare Provides Annual Doctor** Visits, but Not Regular Physicals

Did you know that Medicare pays for a "Welcome to Medicare Visit" and an "Annual Wellness Visit?" It is important to recognize that neither of these visits are physical exams.

The Welcome to Medicare Visit is a one-time preventative visit. The visit must happen within one year of Medicare Part B enrollment. The goals of the visit are health promotion, disease prevention, and detection. This Welcome to Medicare Visit includes a review of your medical and social history related to your health, as well as education and counseling about preventive services. Your doctor will obtain your height, weight, body mass index, blood pressure, and conduct a vision test. The Welcome to Medicare Visit allows you to talk to your doctor about important screenings and vaccines you may need.

In addition to the Welcome to Medicare Visit, Medicare covers an Annual Wellness Visit. The Annual Wellness Visit is similar to the one-time Welcome to Medicare Visit. The Annual Wellness Visit focuses on your plan for preventive care in the upcoming year. The first Annual Wellness Visit provides a Health Risk Assessment, which will be updated in future years. If you didn't receive a Welcome to Medicare Visit, you can still have an Annual Wellness Visit.

Medicare will only cover the Annual Wellness Visit once every 12 months. Your Annual Wellness Visit should also not be scheduled within 12 months of your Welcome to Medicare Visit.

When you schedule these appointments, you must state that you are scheduling the Welcome to Medicare Visit or Annual Wellness Visit. If you do not specify this, you will likely receive a regular physical exam. Medicare will never cover a routine physical exam.

What do these services cost?

You do not pay anything for the Welcome to Medicare Visit or the Annual Wellness Visit, if your doctor accepts Medicare assignment.

If your doctor performs additional tests or services during either visit, for example blood tests or lab work, the standard the Medicare Part B coinsurance (80/20%) and deductible will apply.

Note: People who are enrolled in Medicare Savings Account (MSA) plans pay 100% of the Medicare re-approved amount for their health costs (including preventive services) until their deductible is met.


