

Museum tea party honors women's suffrage



Annual DNR Spring Hearings/ Conversation Congress Annual County Meeting April 9

The Annual DNR Spring Hearings/Conservation Congress Annual County meetings are being held on Monday, April 9th. The Forest County meeting will be in the Crandon High School auditorium beginning at 7:00 p.m., according to Dick Krawze, Chair of the Forest County delegation.

This is a chance to give your opinions and register support or non-support for Conservation Congress proposals that regulate fishing, hunting, trapping and other outdoor recreation activities in Wisconsin. Resolutions can also be submitted at the meeting. It is a gathering of ideas that concern our outdoor activities.

The results of these proposals will then be presented to the Natural Resources Board in May, 2018.

There will be 36 advisory questions put in front of those attending the hearings. A sample of these proposals are:

--A proposal to return to a three-zone mink and muskrat season framework

--A proposal to allow the unrestricted harvest of white perch on Lake Superior

--A proposal to change the requirements for obtaining a Wisconsin Guide License

--A proposal to designate all karstic Wisconsin as sensitive areas

--A proposal to allow the transfer of bear tags to Wisconsin

senior hunters (over 70 years old) --A proposal on crossbow use

--A proposal on a fee for users of public land

Larry Bonde, Chairman of the Conservation Congress, said "If resolutions presented at the county level meetings are supported, the resolution is advanced to one of the Congress' advisory committees and the District Leadership Council for consideration."

"Each year, there are over 200 resolutions submitted locally. Not all pass, but the ones that do have the potential to become a rule, policy or legislative shange in the subsequent years. It is a true grassroots process that empowers the citizens of this state to shape natural resources policy."

Forest County ranked 62 out of 72 counties for health outcomes

Forest County ranked 62 out of 72 counties for health outcomes and 69 for health factors, according to the ninth annual County Health Rankings, released by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute. The rankings are available at www.countyhealthrankings.org.

Health Outcomes looks at premature death rates and quality of life, both of which Forest County improved on in 2018. Premature death rates is 50% of the ranking and is measured by the years of potential life lost before age 75. The top two causes of death for this age are malignant neoplasms and heart disease. Quality of life is 50% of the ranking and takes into consideration percentages of people who report poor or fair health, poor physical and mental health and also the percentage of low birth weight babies. There have been no significant improvements in quality of life.

Outdoor wood furnaces & pellet burners h a v e b e c o m e increasingly popular. Some companies charge a premium of \$15 to \$50. Others do not. Contact your agent to do an inspection or if you have questions before you install or have it installed.

If you are burning wood, follow all manufacturer's guidelines for installation or hire a professional to do the installation for you. Here are some more safety tips:

1. Burn seasoned wood. Wood two years old or more.

 Place ashes in a covered metal container to keep wind from blowing coals and sparks around.

3. Clean your chimney at least twice a year, using an approved cleaning method.

4. Install smoke alarms on same level as stove and have a fire extinguisher close by.

 Every year, make sure your smoke pipe is firmly in place where it enters the chimney and screw sections together.

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Jeff Seefeldt recognized by Federal Sustainable Forest Committee



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At its March 22 meeting in Rhinelander, Federal Sustainable Forest Committee (FSFC) Chair Tom Tallier presented US Forest Service Lakewood/Laona District Ranger, Jeff Seefeldt, with a plaque recognizing him for his leadership and advocacy of promoting sustainable management of our National Forests.

The National Forests of northern Wisconsin saw reduced timber harvests in the late 1990's and early 2000's. Ranger Seefeldt was actively involved as a participant at many FSFC meetings over the course of the past six years. His presence was most beneficial, as he was a voice of advocacy from within the ranks of the US Forest Service locally, and shared back to Forest Service leadership member's concerns regarding these low harvest levels. Today, there is a rebound in harvest levels of our national forests, which positively impacts the forest products industry and our local economies in many ways. Our schools and local municipalities receive federal revenues based upon timber sales from our national forests. Additionally, sustainable forestry practices provide necessary wildlife habitat to help sustain and grow our local wildlife populations.

The Federal Sustainable Forest Committee was formed in 2012 by various stakeholders in forest management, harvest and production in Forest County. Membership grew to include stakeholders in neighboring Florence County, and today, the FSFC membership is reaching out to include representatives from all 11 counties in northern Wisconsin that include national forest lands. Its membership now includes representatives from county government, county forests, conservation organizations, local schools and the forest industry. Members have visited Washington D.C. on an annual basis, and work hand in hand with the offices of our federal representatives here in Wisconsin. Many of the recent accomplishments in federal forest management, including Good Neighbor Authority, are attributable to the Federal Sustainable Forest Committee and its diverse membership.

Northwoods Friends for Civic Participation to Host "Voters Engaged" Listening Session

Elected officials unite across party lines to listen to our community

In conjunction with the Wisconsin Voters Engaged project, Northwoods Friends for Civic Participation is hosting a multi-partisan listening session to allow citizens to speak directly to their elected representatives. Elected officials from state and federal levels are all invited.

The listening session will be held Saturday April 14, 1:00-3:00 at the Oneida County Senior Center, 100 Keenan Street in Rhinelander. The event is open to the public.

The Voters Engaged listening session format is designed to nurture respectful interaction. It is not a town hall meeting. The goals are to increase voter communication with elected officials and to increase voter engagement in the process of orderly self-governance. Accordingly, Northwoods Friends for Civic Participation (NWFCP) commits to maintaining an orderly and respectful environment for all involved.

The session format includes a written set of rules for audience participation, time allowances to ensure all voices are heard and moderated public comment. There are four categories included in the Health Factors rankings; Health Behaviors, Clinical Care, Social and Economic Factors, and Physical Environment.

Health Behaviors is 30% of this ranking and include smoking, drinking, exercise, alcohol impaired driving deaths, sexually transmitted infections and teen births. There were no significant improvements in these areas, in fact, there were decreases noted in these areas. Clinical Care is 20% of the ranking and includes the percentage uninsured under age 65. We improved from 14% to 11%. It also looks at the ratio of population to physicians, dentists and mental health providers in our community, the number of preventable hospital stays, diabetes and mammography screenings. We did not improve in these areas.

Social and Economic Factors is the most heavily weighted category of the Health Factors. It accounts for 40% of the ranking. This category looks at high school graduation rates, college, unemployment, children in poverty, income, children in single-parent households, violent crime and injury deaths. Unfortunately there were no graduation rates reported for Forest County schools. The percentage of our residents is 56% which is up from 54%. Unemployment rates decreased from 7.5% to 6.4% but we have 23% of our children in poverty and 36% children in single-parent homes which increased slightly. Violent crime rate stayed the same and injury death rate increased.

Physical Environment is 10% of the ranking and includes air and water quality, housing and commuting to work. Forest County has consistently ranked in the top 3 for this category, even hitting number 1 for a few years.

I encourage you to go to the website and explore the rankings, look at some of the healthiest counties and see what differences exist between them and us. Look at the social and economic factors that influence health and see that education, income, jobs, and access to health really do impact the health of our communities.

As the Director of the Forest County Health Department and someone who looks at rankings and health statistics on a regular basis, it would make sense that we put our efforts into preventable causes of illness and death and also look at what factors have the most impact on health. We have learned that we cannot seek health at the doctor's office. We need to seek it at home, at work, at school, and where we play by making healthier choices easier for all. We work with our partners, coalitions and community groups to offer solutions and programs while working with shrinking budgets. We tell people to quit smoking, drink in moderation, don't use drugs, eat healthy and exercise every day. Yet we can visit businesses in our community who still allow smoking, visit areas of our community that do not have a grocery store or a park or sidewalks. We know that education is a leading indicator of good health, giving people access to better jobs and income. Yet we can see many of our young people struggling with school, finding or keeping a job, or supporting themselves. We know that our community is faced with drug issues that are impacting everyone. It is taking a toll on law enforcement, jails, families, schools, service agencies, businesses and more. Yet it seems to only get bigger and more widespread and we cannot get ahead of it. While I firmly believe in and value strong partnerships that are working hard to try to make an impact, I also believe all individuals have a role to play in improving the health of our communities. We cannot sit back and wait for someone else to fix our problems. I am proposing that we all look at our lifestyle and make one change to improve our health. Whether it is improving our education, physical health or mental health, it will impact the overall health of our community.

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

To the Editor:

Is it fair to the public schools to allow non-public schools to enter the WIAA tournaments based on their enrollments at the same level of enrollment as the public schools? The schools in divisions 5 and 4 are affected the most by this.

When the non-public schools were allowed to enter the WIAA tournament series, several years ago, an administrator I knew, who was also on the Board of Control for the WIAA, stated that if the non-public schools are allowed to enter at the same enrollment level as public schools it will never work, because they will dominate the tournaments.

This is exactly what happened! If anyone looks back over the tournament series since the non-public schools were allowed in the tournament, they can see how many more nonpublic schools have been at the state tournament compared proportionately to the public schools, especially at divisions 4 and 5.

I would like to give an example of a school that just competed and won the Division 4 state title at the recently completed girls state tournament in basketball. La Crosse Aquinas, listed with an enrollment of 281 students, is allowed into the tournament at the division 4 level even though most of the schools they compete against all season are from divisions 1,2, and 3. Aquinas beat La Crosse Logan and La Crosse Central, both division 2 schools, very badly, which would mean to me they have all the better athletes in the La Crosse area. They also played division 2 schools Onalaska, Hayward, Tomah and Edgewood. They played division 1 teams Chippewa Falls and Divine Savior Holy Angels. They beat them all, and many very badly, yet they are allowed to compete in division 4 for the WIAA tournaments. Is this really fair?

Several people I talked to at the tourneys thought Aquinas could have beaten most of the Division 1,2 and 3 teams at the tournament.

When will the public schools, especially in divisions 4 and 5, step up and tell the WIAA tournament people they will no longer accept this?

The enrollment numbers at non-public schools should at least be doubled, or at least the non-public schools should be advanced one level above their enrollment numbers to be fair to the public schools.

Public schools must take all student not using a selection process. Public schools do not recruit students as non-public schools can.





New Medicare IDs on the Way!

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) announced that it will start mailing the new Medicare cards with the new Medicare Beneficiary Identifier (MBI) in April 2018. The cards will be mailed out in phases by geographic region. Wisconsin Medicare beneficiaries can expect to receive their new cards after June 2018.

The new Medicare cards are still red, white, and blue, but they no longer have your Social Security number, gender, signature, or other personal information that could compromise your identity. Each person who is enrolled in Medicare will receive a new card with his or her new MBI. The MBIs are 11 characters long, and they are randomly assigned so that there is no connection to your other personal data.

Medicare has your correct address. The Social Security Administration (SSA) will be preparing and mailing the cards. If you need to update your address, you can contact SSA at ssa.gov/my account or by calling 800-772-1213.

Make sure to check your mailbox regularly until your new card arrives. At the latest, you will receive your new card by December 2019. You should continue to use the Medicare card you have now until you receive your new one in the mail. Once your new card arrives, you should destroy your old Medicare card and start using your new card right away. Remember: you should only give your new MBI to doctors, pharmacists, other health care providers, your insurance company, or people you trust to work with Medicare on your behalf.

CMS will not call or email you about your new card you will only receive information by postal mail. Beware of





I was told that the Forest County Highway Department facility was refinanced several times to help balance the budget. How much additional interest was added to the cost at the taxpayer's expense?






