Crandon School Board receives resignation after organization meeting

The Crandon School Board held their organizational meeting on Monday, April 23 in the Crandon High School Auditorium. Glen Pfieffer was sworn in. Jeff Ackley was elected Board President. Pfieffer was elected Vice President, Laura Bauknecht was elected Board Clerk and Nadine Westimayer and Brian Tupper were elected Board Directors. The usual business was conducted. After the meeting, a letter of resignation was turned in by Board Director Brian Tupper, effective at 12:01 a.m. on Tuesday, April 24, 2018.

The school district will now advertise for anyone who is interested in filling the void. The applicant will also have to give a written statement requesting their consideration. The board will then interview the candidates and will appoint someone at the next regular school board meeting.

Citizens United for Education start to get signatures for Crandon School Board recall By Boyd Monte

The group Citizens United for Education met on Tuesday, April 24 at the Crandon Public Library. The group announced the resignation of Board Director Brian Tupper. Recall papers were distributed to anyone who wanted them. The group will need to get 563 signatures from registered legal voters in the school district. They need 25 percent of the total votes cast for the office of governor in the last general election. There was 2251 votes cast for the office in the last general election.

The group needs to have the signatures turned into the district office 60 days after the day the petition of recall was formally filed. If that day falls on a weekend or holiday, the group has until the next business day, but the signatures cannot be dated before or after the specified 60 day period.

The signatures then need to verified. If there is enough valid signatures, the recall election will take place within 6 weeks.

Glen Pfieffer and Laura Bauknecht were present to listen to concerns and also answer anything that they could to help the citizens group move forward in the changes they want to achieve. **Continued on page 08**

Hospital Observation Status --What Medicare beneficiaries

need to know Submitted by Kathy O'Melia

People often think that if they if they are in the hospital and stay overnight in a hospital room they are an "inpatient." But that is not always the case. Hospitals provide observation care for patients who are not well enough to go home but not sick enough to be admitted. This care is considered an outpatient service. The hospitalization can include short-term treatment and tests to help doctors decide whether the patient meets the medical criteria for admission. So even if you stay in a hospital overnight you could be considered an outpatient.

Why does it matter? Your hospital status ("inpatient" or "outpatient") affects how much you pay for hospital services (like x-rays, drugs, and lab tests) and may also affect whether Medicare will cover care you get in a skilled nursing facility (SNF) following your hospital stay.

Medicare Part A provides coverage for a hospitalization only when you are an inpatient. If you are in the hospital under observation status you are considered an outpatient and Medicare Part A pays nothing. Medicare Part B covers outpatient hospital services after you pay your deductible, co-insurance and copayments. Generally, this means you pay a copayment for each individual outpatient service you receive.

In addition, be aware that the prescription drugs you get in an outpatient setting, sometimes called "selfadministered drugs," aren't covered by Part B. And for safety reasons, many hospitals have policies that don't allow patients to bring prescription drugs from home. If you have Medicare Prescription drug coverage, Part D, these drugs may be covered in certain circumstances. You'll likely need to pay out-of-pocket for these drugs and submit a claim to your drug plan for reimbursement. For further information and to request an "out-of-network pharmacy claim form," be sure to call your Part D plan.

Sometimes observation care extends over two or more days, but remember that does not mean you are an inpatient. If you receive observation services for more than 24 hours, the hospital is required to give you a written notification, known as Medicare Outpatient Observation Notice (MOON), that tells you that you are an outpatient, as well as an oral explanation of the notice and the financial implications.

It is also important to note that your hospital status will determine whether you will be able to obtain Medicare coverage in a nursing home after your hospital stay. Original Medicare only covers skilled nursing home care for patients who have had a three-day "inpatient" hospital stay"observation status" does not count toward the 3-day stay.

CWD shows up again in Oneida Co.

MADISON - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has confirmed that a wild deer has tested positive for chronic wasting disease in Oneida County, in the Crescent Township.

As required by law, this finding will renew Oneida County's existing baiting and feeding ban for another three years. Additionally, this positive will renew the two-year

baiting and feeding ban in Langlade County.

The CWD-positive one-year-old doe was harvested on a disease surveillance permit issued within a 10-mile radius of the recent Lincoln County positive

detection. This is Oneida County's first CWD-positive wild deer.

"This Oneida County detection is a direct result of our surveillance efforts put in place in response to the Lincoln CWD positive," said Eric Lobner, DNR Bureau Director for the Wildlife Management program. "We will continue to work with local communities to promote CWD surveillance and awareness in the area."

In response to the detection of this new CWD positive deer, the department will take the following steps:

--Continue to work with the local County Deer Advisory Council members in disease surveillance around this positive location.

--Conduct surveillance activities to assess disease distribution and prevalence including:

--Encourage reporting of sick deer

--Sample vehicle-killed adult deer

--Sample adult deer harvested under agricultural damage permits

--Sample adult deer harvested under urban deer hunts in the area

--Establish additional CWD sampling locations prior to the 2018 deer seasons.

These actions are very important for assessing the potential geographic distribution of the disease and if other animals in proximity to the new positive test are infected.

Spring fish and wildlife hearing results available

MADISON - More than 6,800 people came out to participate in the 2018 Spring Fish and Wildlife Hearings and Wisconsin Conservation Congress county meetings that were held in every county statewide on Monday, April 9.

The public hearings provide citizens with an opportunity to comment and indicate preference on a wide range of proposed fish and wildlife management issues, Conservation Congress advisory questions, and to submit resolutions for rule changes they would like to see in the future.

Statewide hearing results and the questions are available by searching the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for keywords "Spring Hearings."

People voting on the department's wildlife management advisory questions supported restricting the transportation of deer harvested in CWD-affected counties as well as moving the close of the pheasant season daily shooting hours from 2 p.m. to 12 p.m. on stocked public properties.

The majority of voters also favored the idea of reviewing panfish and gamefish regulations on the Mississippi River and reducing the walleye bag limit on the Lake Winnebago system. Participants supported the Wisconsin Conservation Congress' advisory proposals relating to increasing guide license fees and requirements, however, attendees were not in favor of requiring the registration of all non-motorized watercraft. Meeting results, along with written comments on the evening's questions and DNR recommendations are used to advise the state Natural Resources Board. This year's results will be reviewed at the board's May 23 meeting in Madison. Votes are non-binding and are presented to the Natural Resources Board as a gauge of the public's support or non-support for proposed changes. The hearings are held annually on the second Monday in April in conjunction with the Wisconsin Conservation Congress county meetings. DNR related proposals are presented to attendees by DNR staff. Following DNR business, the meeting is reconvened as a Conservation Congress meeting and Congress advisory questions are presented. The Spring Hearings also provide an opportunity for citizens of each county to elect Wisconsin Conservation Congress delegates to represent them on natural resource issues. The Conservation Congress is the only statutorily recognized citizen advisory body to the Natural Resources Board. During the Congress' portion of the hearing, citizens may introduce resolutions for consideration and vote by those attending the hearings.

Dear Editor,

The Forest County zoning committee has worked sporadically over the past year or two in an attempt to meet a state mandated requirement to revise the county shoreland zoning ordinance.

Unfortunately, the final product isn't pretty. What has for over forty years been an uncomplicated shoreland component of an overall zoning ordinance has now become an unnecessarily complicated, discombobulated, stand-alone document that arbitrarily assigns each property to one of eight various districts around and adjacent to Forest County waterways. It gives certain privileges to some landowners and disallows them for others, some could say arbitrarily, according to a master map kept in the county zoning office. The document has yet to meet DNR's approval, but was hurriedly passed as a late agenda add-on for the new county board's organizational meeting. Kudos to our new county board chairman and a few independent thinking board newcomers for their vote against this embarrassing document.

The required public hearing for this change, had been inconveniently scheduled and minimally noticed for a mid-March weekday evening. Landowners whose properties will be re-zoned under this ordinance (which is every landowner within 1000 feet of a lake and 300 feet of a stream) were not individually notified of the hearing. Few, if any, of the snowbird lake folks and the weekenders, who pay significant property taxes, knew their properties would be rezoned. Most hadn't a clue that a hearing had even been scheduled. It was an obvious success for those who wanted to sneak this through; a total of one member of the public reportedly showed up at that important hearing.

Oneida County, on the other hand, went through their drill and diligently worked on revisions for well over two years. Several drafts were revised as a result of testimony at six well publicized public hearings before their final product was submitted to DNR for review and approved in 2017. This is a property value issue. It's important. They understood that.

So now it behooves everyone in the previous single shoreland zone to visit the zoning office and determine which of the eight new categories has been selected on your behalf, then check the map and check your neighbors' classifications which might be different from yours. The eight new categories are listed on page 48 of the new document. (I paid \$5.80 for my copy at the zoning office.) And, page 49 will tell you how many chickens and ducks you may keep. Really.

Yes, Wisconsin! Even as we shovel our way out of April, the reality of global warming persists. In fact, it is the very reality of climate change which provoked the unseasonable resurgence of our mittens and muffs. How so? According to the Climate Analysis Section at the National Center for Atmospheric Research, our recent spring storm system stems from the Arctic's warm-up. The above average temperatures there weaken the jet stream and allow for more weather extremes.

Climatologists report that changes in the jet streams which usually flow from west to east, are closely tied to global warming. There is a great deal of evidence that the North and South poles are warming faster than the remainder of the planet. These changes particularly affect the polar currents. Their ups and downs become more extreme, bringing different types of weather to areas that are not accustomed to climate variations. If the jet stream dips south, for example, it takes the colder air masses with it. The result? Winter-like conditions occurring in the Midwest when we should be planning our gardens.





UW-Extension and WCA offer training for new county officials Following the spring elections in even numbered years, UW-Extension's Local Government Center and the Wisconsin Counties Association co-sponsor day-long County Officials Workshops to orient both new and continuing county officials, at seven locations around the state. In May 2018, topics will include the roles and responsibilities of county board supervisors, the county budgeting process, Wisconsin's open meetings law and public records law, ethics and conflicts of interest, running effective meetings, and state and county issues update. The workshops connect county governments with the expertise of educators from UW-Extension and the Wisconsin Counties Association, who make sure the topics and teaching methods stay current and meet participant needs.

Baldwin and Bill Cassidy introduce legislation to halt the flow of fentanyl to the U.S. The RESTRICT Illicit Drugs Act was included in the bipartisan Opioid Crisis Response Act that passed the Senate Health Committee today and moves to the full Senate

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Bill Cassidy (R-LA) of the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee, today introduced bipartisan legislation to stop the flow of illegal opioids, fentanyl, methamphetamine and other illicit drugs into the country through International Mail Facilities. The Restricting Entrance and Strengthening the Requirements on Import Controls for Trafficking (RESTRICT) Illicit Drugs Act would give the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) more tools to prevent illegal fentanyl, opioids and other illicit synthetic drugs from entering the country at the border through our International Mail Facilities. "The opioid epidemic is devastating families and communities throughout Wisconsin and a key way to help prevent this is to stop more illicit drugs like fentanyl, meth and illegal opioids from coming into this country. I'm introducing this commonsense bipartisan legislation with Senator Cassidy to strengthen our control over the flow of illicit drugs from other counties into America," said Senator Baldwin. "One of my top priorities for Wisconsin right now is increasing the federal investment to help fight the opioid crisis, and making sure we are doing everything we can to help local health and law enforcement officials in Wisconsin with prevention, treatment and recovery efforts."

2016. China is the primary source of fentanyl in the U.S. with many of these illicit drugs coming through our International Mail Facilities (IMFs). More than 340 million packages reach the U.S. every year through IMFs from more than 180 countries. However, estimates show that we are only intercepting a small percentage of the illicit drugs smuggled through IMFs.

The legislation was included as part of the bipartisan legislative package, the Opioid Crisis Response Act of 2018, to bolster the federal response to the opioid epidemic that successfully passed out of the Senate

The RESTRICT Illicit Drugs Act modernizes FDA's authority to help address importation of illegal drugs like opioids and other synthetic drugs by:

• Strengthening coordination and efficiency between FDA and CBP by clarifying CBP's role in managing the admission, refusal or destruction process of any counterfeit drug product or package containing a controlled substance.

 Allowing FDA to debar, or stop, individuals or companies convicted of an FDA-related felony from continued shipments to prevent companies who have been caught shipping illegal substances from gaming the system and operating under a new name.

• Enhancing FDA's authority to refuse admission of illegal drugs from entities that have been de-barred, as a result of an FDA-related felony.



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When the new courthouse was built back in 1909, there was an unintended gain. The local photographers had a great place to get aerial shots of the City of Crandon. This picture was taken by a photographer whose name is lost in time, but he obviously found a high perch in the dome and shot this picture to the northwest. 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Nicolet Players' "A Midsummer Night's Dream" spans the generations

Making the leap from high school productions to community theater with the Nicolet Players to perform A Midsummer Night's Dream was more than a little intimidating for Adam Bloom and Somerset Seymer, who are 16 and 15, respectively.

"Every other play I was in was with my friends I went to school with," said Bloom, a junior at Rhinelander High School. "There was a comfort level there. I pretty much knew what to expect."

Ditto for Seymer, a sophomore at Northland Pines High School in Eagle River.

"Nerve wracking," is how she described the transition. "I was used to being in plays with fairly close friends who I saw all the time. Now there's this group of complete strangers."

Nicolet College Theatre Director Jim Nuttall has been putting together plays at Nicolet for more than 20 years. He's seen this dynamic before.

"They go from being in plays with only kids their own age to now sharing the stage with just about every age group, including people old enough to be their grandparents," Nuttall said. "That's a pretty big leap. But over time, you see this common bond form. Everybody supports one another, they learn from one another, and that's when they really start to gel."

With more than a month of rehearsals for A Midsummer Night's Dream behind them, both Bloom and Seymer said they are finding their groove and appreciating the tips the veteran actors share with them as they work

through scenes.

"It's really nice to learn from people who have been doing this a long time," Seymer said. "Even something as simple as moving from one side of the stage to the other, there's an art to it."

And move a lot they do.

Bloom and Seymer play opposite each other as the young couple Lysander and Hermia in this classic Shakespeare comedy.

"There are a lot of different ways to put on this play," Nuttall said. "We're doing a very physical adaptation. It's very dynamic with lots of action. It's definitely not stand-and-deliver Shakespeare."

When close to 30 high school students auditioned for a dozen parts for younger individuals, Nuttall said he recognized an "energy" between the two.

"Somerset is a real fireball and Adam is really great playing off of that," he said. "It's hilarious to watch those two go at it, the back and forth and this little magical world they create."

Their parts in the play revolve around four young lovers who find themselves wrapped in the dream-like arms of an enchanted forest. Sprites and fairies rule the woods, casting spells and sprinkling magic dust to stir the pot of love.

Seymer said in many ways she can relate to her character, seeing herself in many of Hermia's traits.

"I try to be a fairly calm person," she said. "But it doesn't always work out that way. I like how Hermia is so headstrong, opinionated and can have a very quick temper. It's a lot of fun."

Bloom is also enjoying perfecting his character. "I like how my character can be serious, comedic, and clueless all at the same time," he said. "There's a lot of room for interpretation with the character and it's exciting to put on this face of someone who you are not."

The cast of 21 includes individuals from many parts of the Northwoods, including Tomahawk, Crandon, Minocqua, St. Germain and Cavour, along with Rhinelander and Eagle River.

Performances in the Nicolet College Theatre are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5, and Thursday through Saturday, May 10 through 12. Sunday performances May 6 and 13 will take place at 2 p.m.

Tickets are \$9 general admission and \$7 for students and seniors and can be ordered at nicoletlive.com or by calling (715) 365-4646.

Beer and wine and other refreshments will be available before the performance and during the intermission.
