The Lumberjack Steam Train begins the summer season



The Lumberjack Steam Train, in Laona, Wisconsin, has begun the 2018 summer season. The 1916 Vulcan steam locomotive has begun its 102nd year on the rails! Now, however, the Vulcan is hauling passengers to the Camp 5 Museum Complex. Its log hauling days are over.

Passengers on the Lumberjack Steam Train embark at the vintage depot on Hwy 8, on Laona's west side. They enjoy a ride in period passenger cars or cabooses, and disembark at the Camp 5 Museum Complex, where they enjoy a variety of fun and educational activities.

Kids and grown-ups alike enjoy the petting zoo, feeding and petting a variety of farm animals who enjoy the attention as much as the visitors. The early days of logging in the Northwoods are displayed in the Logging Museum. The days of the lumberjack wielding axe and crosscut are displayed with photos and tools that give the viewer a feel for the history of the time. A working blacksmith shop adds to the experience in the Logging Museum. Modern sustained yield logging is explained on the Green Treasure Forest Tour, with a trolley ride through a beautiful hardwood forest. The Cracker Barrel Gift Shop provides a shopping experience, and don't forget to sample the delicious ice cream! Lunch or a snack is available at the Choo Choo Hut Restaurant on the grounds. And, don't forget to visit the Nature Center and learn more about the ecology of the northern landscape.

A special event is when the Cowboys visit Camp 5. It is a sure thing they will rob every run of the Lumberjack Steam Train! You don't have to hide your money though. They never rob the passengers. But, you will enjoy the beautiful horses, vintage guns and period costumes that depict all walks of life from over a century ago. The Cowboys will visit on July 21st, so mark the calendar.

The train leaves the depot at 11:00 a.m. and every hour on the hour, with the last run leaving at 2:00 p.m. The Lumberjack Steam Train runs Wednesday through Monday. It is fun for all ages. If you can't make a visit this summer, come to Fall Festival on September 1, 22 and 29. The Cowboys will make another visit on September 29th, during Fall Festival.



Rowe's collection includes pieces that have rgone several layers of transformation; suc coloring on Unoyu paper, and then ironing it to make the color melt to the front. In addition, Rowe uses designs that are then stamped on hand colored papers such as news print that featured colorful melted images created by the method above. "The great love I feel toward art is there is no limit to what can be made with these hands of mine." Rowe's artwork goes beyond traditional ingredients and often incorporates wood, knives, paper printers ink, brayer and the main ingredient, an active imagination. Paper is often cut, wood blocks are often intricately carved with an art knife, and then the remnants are often colored or spray painted to give further dimension and perspective. Rowe earned the Gold Key Award from The Art Student League of New York, and attended The Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, as well as Nazarene Bible College. In addition, he studied in California and Colorado and was a member of the "Meadow Found Art Co-Operative." According to Rowe, he didn't seek any diplomas at the schools he attended, rather his goal was to gain knowledge and studio time.

New Medicare Cards Present Opportunity to Scam Seniors By the GWAAR Legal Services Team

Semior Chatter

Federal law required the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to create a new Medicare card design. Unlike the current Medicare cards, these new ones will not include the beneficiary's Social Security number. Social Security numbers are a vital piece of information that scammers use as part of broader identity theft operations. Removal of Social Security numbers from Medicare cards is a big step in fighting both Medicare-specific fraud and broader financial identity theft.

Instead of Social Security numbers, the new card will have a Medicare Beneficiary Identifier with 11 characters. This should limit any consequences of a senior losing her new Medicare card. Scammers may still use the Medicare Beneficiary Identifier for Medicarespecific fraud related to healthcare and benefit information, however, this is far better than when scammers could use the Medicare card for the potential theft of credit cards, banking services, and other wider-ranging financial identity theft.

The new cards will be sent to Medicare recipients automatically. New Medicare recipients will get the cards first, and some are already starting to receive them.

Even though the new Medicare card will prevent many future scams, scam artists have already tried the following:

a) Calling a senior to ask for a credit card number to pay a \$25 processing fee for the new card, along with requesting bank information and other personal details for the payment.

b) Selling a senior a "temporary" Medicare card for \$5 to \$50, in addition to requesting bank information and other personal details for the payment.

c) Urging a senior to provide bank account information so that the crook, posing as a federal employee, can "credit" the senior's account for a bogus balance on her old card.

d) Claiming that a senior must confirm her Social Security number to receive her new

Honorable Fred Albert Ackley Jr, Sokaogon Chief Judge and Community leader, age 70, of Mole Lake, passed away peacefully in his home with family and friends on the day of Summer Solstice. He was born in Globe, AZ on February 19, 1948, and is the son of Fred and Norma (Randall) Ackley.



He worked in Milwaukee for 14 years as a welder for Smith Engineering. His family then moved to his original place of origin, which is Mole Lake.

He is a member of the Sokaogon Chippewa Community. He was given the job as a Voight Task Member when the Great Lake Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission first started. Fred's passionate work is insurmountable because he was fearless in fighting Exxon from mining on sacred tribal land. He established the Sokaogon Tribal Court in 1983. He was among an original group of Judges appointed following the US Seventh Circuit Court of Appeals decision that reaffirmed offreservation Ojibwe treaty rights in the Wisconsin Ceded Territory. He conducted many weddings, funerals and naming ceremonies.

He married Karen Ann Miller, from Lac Courte Orielles in May of 1967. They had two children, Fred Albert Ackley III and Victoria Regina Ackley.

Later he had another wife, Frances Lee VanZile, and two step-daughters, Mary Randall Chapman VanZile and Kathy Christensen. He and Frances helped raise their grandson, Chad Christensen, during their 35 years together.

He is survived by his brother, Tom Smith and sister, Judith Smith Poler (both from Mole Lake); sister, Joanne Douyette from Watersmeet, MI; eighteen grandchildren; and seventeen great-grandchildren; nieces, Alice Ackley Jr, Amy (Ackley) Anderson, Valerie Smith, Jasmine (Poler) Pawlicki and Julanne Saylor; nephews, Arlyn D. Ackley Jr, Matt McPherson, Johnny Ackley and Laverne (Missabii) McGeshick; and lifelong friend, Earl (Butch) Thomas.

"For the safety of our guests and our natural resources, fireworks are prohibited on state properties," said Chris Madison, chief ranger with the Wisconsin State Park System. "Fourth of July favorites, the sparkler and the snake, are not defined as 'fireworks' per state law, but most park and forest rangers and managers discourage their use because they are a fire hazard."

A citation for illegal fireworks in a state park or forest can cost up to \$200 and parents could be liable for the full costs of putting out a fire started by their children playing with or setting off fireworks.

"Most wildfires caused by fireworks occur around the July 4th holiday or under extended drought conditions, but the reality is, wildfires can occur anytime the ground is not completely snow-covered." said Catherine Koele, DNR wildfire prevention specialist.

Exploding fireworks, such as firecrackers, m-70s, bottle rockets, and roman candles, cause the most fireworks-caused wildfires. Paired with hot and dry

weather, even sparklers and fountains pose a significant threat in dry grassy areas. Anyone responsible for starting a wildfire in Wisconsin is liable not only for the cost of putting the fire out, but also for any damages.

Fireworks are restricted in Wisconsin and permits may be required. It's best to check with local officials before purchasing and lighting them. A city, village, town or county may also enact an ordinance more strictly limiting fireworks sales or possessing them.

Anyone planning on camping in a Wisconsin state park or forest for the Fourth of July should enjoy fireworks displays in nearby communities -- not at picnic areas, campsites or other areas within state parks, forests and trails.

As of the last week of June, fire dangers levels throughout Wisconsin were low across the state, but even in low fire danger times, fireworks can start wildfires. So far in 2018. DNR records show nearly 700 wildfires have burned more over 1,800 acres in DNR fire protection areas of Wisconsin. Wildfires caused by fireworks only amount to 5 percent of the annual total: however, these fires typically occur in a condensed timeframe around the Fourth of July holiday.



MADISON - Wisconsin's \$5 first-time buyer resident fishing license or a one-day fishing license may be just the ticket for fun for family, friends and visitors gathered for the fourth of July holiday.

"Wisconsin fishing is a great value and these discounted licenses make it even easier to get your family, friends and visitors out on the water over the holiday," says Justine Hasz, Wisconsin's fisheries director.

The regular annual fishing license is \$20 for residents. Anglers who have never purchased a fishing license -- or who haven't purchased a fishing license in 10 years -- can get a discounted first-time buyer license. Lawmakers created the discounted license and both residents and non-residents can take advantage of this opportunity. Residents' discounted license is \$5 and nonresidents' is \$25.75 for the annual licenses.

If a person is eligible for the first-time buyer license, that license will be offered in their product catalog in place of the regularly-priced license.

For those family members and friends who have fished more recently but not yet bought a license for 2018, a one-day fishing license can be a good option. The oneday fishing license costs \$8 for residents and \$10 for nonresidents. The purchase price of that one-day license can be credited toward purchase of an annual license.



People can buy fishing licenses online through the Go Wild website, or purchase in person at any authorized license agent.

Wisconsin residents and nonresidents 16 years old or older need a fishing license to fish in any waters of the state. Residents born before Jan. 1, 1927, do not need a license. Resident members of the U.S. Armed Forces on active duty may obtain a free fishing license when on furlough or leave by presenting their military ID and leave papers at any license agent.



If people who are registered to vote get postcards, they should not worry, Wolfe said. Sometimes there are minor differences in the spelling of names or addresses that may result in a registered voter not matching DMV records. "Nobody will be removed from the voter registration list because of this postcard," Wolfe said.

Voters who need to register or change their address should go to MyVote.WI.gov, Wisconsin's secure voter services website, said Wolfe. Electors who need to register for the first time, or need to update their voter record, are strongly encouraged to do so as soon as possible and not wait until Election Day. If that is not

Wisconsin mails postcards to unregistered adults

MADISON, WI The Wisconsin Elections Commission is getting ready for midterm elections in 2018 with an initiative to inform voters about registration opportunities.

"Nearly one in 11 Wisconsin adults will soon be getting an official postcard in the mail urging them to register to vote before the election," said Meagan Wolfe, Wisconsin's chief elections official. "Getting people to register early helps reduce lines and make Election Day better for voters and election workers."

This is Wisconsin's second mass mailing to adults who appear to be eligible to vote but are unregistered. In the fall of 2016, the Commission mailed similar postcards to 1.28 million residents. "Contacting potentially unregistered but eligible voters is also vital to ensuring that Wisconsin has a high-quality, complete voter registration list," Wolfe said.

The informational postcards are being mailed this week, said Wolfe, interim administrator of the Commission. They can take up to nine days to arrive, and should start arriving in mailboxes soon.

Potential voters will be inundated with electionrelated mailings from candidates, political parties and independent groups in advance of the August 14 Partisan Primary and the November 6 General Election. Wolfe said this postcard from the Wisconsin Elections Commission is different because the mailing list comes from official state databases using a process to identify people who have a driver license or a state ID card but who are not registered to vote. People who were sent the first postcard in 2016 will not be included in this mailing.

The postcard encourages voters to register ahead of the election. To do that, they can contact their municipal clerk or visit MyVote.WI.gov. The postcard also has a toll-free number for people without internet access. possible, they can always register on Election Day.

Using MyVote.WI.gov, people who have Wisconsin driver license or state ID card can register online if their current address is on file with the DMV. Those who do not have a driver license or state ID can fill out the registration form online, print it out, sign it and send it to the correct clerk's address which the website will provide. Voters registering by mail must also send a copy of a proof-of-residence document, such as the registration postcard. A tax bill, utility bill or bank statement with the voter's current address will also work.

These postcard mailings are required by 2015 Wisconsin Act 261, which directed state election officials to join the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC). This multi-state group helps its members keep their voter registration lists current by identifying voters who may have changed their address, moved out of state or died. One of the requirements for membership in ERIC is to send a mailing to residents who may be eligible to vote but are not yet registered.
