

Forest County Historical Society offers Kentuck Heritage Day Camp



The Wisconsin Humanities Council has awarded a grant to the Forest County Historical and Genealogical Society, located in downtown Crandon, for a project titled "Forest County Kentuck Heritage Day Camp."

The week-long day camp will offer hands-on opportunities for youth to learn about the unique history of the Kentucky migration to Forest County that occurred during the early part of the 1900's. Youth will have the opportunity to study about Crandon's Kentuck families, what brought them to Forest County, how their hard work went into building our county's lumber towns and what type of activities kept youth entertained and busy that didn't involve electronics. Campers will also participate in field trips to both the Camp 5 Museum in Laona and the Wabeno Logging Museum. The last day of camp will feature our

Conservation Corner

Request for Farmer Information

Conservation Corner is a weekly article produced by the Forest County Land & Water Conservation Department. For more information contact Al Murray, Land & Water Resources Technician, at 715-478-1387 or by email at lcc@co.forest.wi.us.

The Land Conservation Department is charged with making direct contacts with farmers and those practicing agriculture within Forest County. We can all agree that farming is less feasible in Forest County because of weather, a short growing season, and often difficult soils. However, we have more than 420 property owners who are listed as agricultural properties. The department has cost share funding opportunities from State and Federal Agencies which are designed to assist farmers with many things including watering stations, soil erosion, animal shelters, fencing, high tunnel shelters (greenhouses) and manure storage just to name a few. A priority of the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is assisting farmers with Chapter NR 151, which is runoff management. DATCP is the main funding source for the Land Conservation Department. The department also has grant opportunities to assist farm producers with increasing production and improving marketing.

Through the years the attention to agriculture in Forest County has greatly reduced. Currently the department has very little information on what crops or livestock our county is producing. Without this information the department is limited in its ability to identify needs of the farmers or to find resources to assist. The department is currently drafting a basic inventory questionnaire to try to establish data regarding agriculture in the county. The department hopes to get data on crop types and production rates, including traditional crops, hay and forage crops, non-traditional products, vegetables and maple syrup. The department also hopes to get data on livestock types and production rates. This data will be utilized by the department to find resources and cost share programs which work for Forest County.

If you are a farmer or landowner who produces crops, livestock, vegetables, mushrooms, Christmas trees, maple sap/maple syrup, or any other items that are consumed by the public, the Department would like to get information from you to establish a Forest County agricultural inventory. 

DNR: Heavy rains fuel floods, faster currents statewide

MADISON -- June storms packing heavy downpours have pushed lake and river levels into flood levels, tossed debris into waterways and accelerated currents statewide, signaling Wis. Department of Natural Resources officials to remind all water users to think safety by checking local water conditions and always wear a life jacket when on the water.

Capt. April Dombrowski, head of the DNR Bureau of Law Enforcement's Recreation Safety and Outdoor Skills Section, says the heavy rain and rapid onset of flash floods in many areas of Wisconsin resulted in road washout, closures and sinkholes. In addition to the roadway issues, it can have a major impact on your water-based recreational activities.

Dombrowski says this severe weather is a reminder for all to check your local water conditions before boating or paddling, swimming or any water activity. Good places to check are local tourism offices, DNR offices, local bait shops, sporting goods stores or the U.S. Geological Survey, too.

"One quick safety tip is to always wear a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket," Dombrowski said. "Today's models are comfortable versions. Wearing one just might save your life." Learn more about life jackets for every water sport.

Some of these storms and heavy rains have pushed trees and other debris in the water which creates another danger to keep watch. High water levels also increases the shoreline and erosion impacts of your boat wake. Some areas have implemented lake-wide slow-nowake requirements. Remember to always be aware of

Baldwin introduces legislation to improve the drinking water safety in small and disadvantaged communities

CLEARR Drinking Water Act would authorize more than \$1 billion to improve water infrastructure for the 21st century

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin and 11 other Senators, led by Senator Edward J. Markey (D-MA), reintroduced the Contaminant and Lead Electronic Accounting and Reporting Requirements (CLEARR) for Drinking Water Act to authorize more than \$1 billion in federal funding to help small and disadvantaged communities replace contaminated water infrastructure to comply with Safe Drinking Water Act requirements. This competitive grant program was created by the bipartisan Water Resources Development Act of 2016, which Senator Baldwin supported.

The CLEARR Drinking Water Act also directs the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to establish requirements for electronic reporting of water quality testing results, update the requirements for repeat- or seriousoffender water systems, and create a system so that residents can request in-home water quality tests from the EPA and receive the test results in an expedited manner.

"Safe drinking water is a priority for every community and is essential to the economic health of Wisconsin's communities," said Senator Baldwin. "Too often though, small and underserved communities lack the resources to solve our most pressing water challenges, including lead and other contaminants. That's why I'm working to make sure that every community across Wisconsin has access to clean drinking water, and safe and reliable water infrastructure."

The CLEARR Drinking Water Act would:

--Increase the authorized funding levels for the Assistance for Small and Disadvantaged Communities program from \$60 million per year through FY2021 to \$230 million for FY2019 and \$300 million each year for FY2020 – FY2023;

--Develop a system for expedited water quality testing, create an electronic database of public health test results that could help monitors identify health threats sooner, and educate the public about the potential effects of drinking water contaminants and the assistance that the EPA can provide to ensure safe drinking water;

-- Provide advice and technical assistance to a state and public water system to help bring those systems into compliance with drinking water regulation;

--Establish requirements for the electronic reporting of water system compliance data; and

--Require the head of the state agency that has primary enforcement responsibility for drinking water to notify the EPA, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and appropriate state and county health agencies when a drinking water violation has the potential to have serious adverse effects on human health.

your boat wake and impact on others and check the signage prior to launching, Dombrowski says. Here are some other safety tips from Dombrowski:

Make a float plan, follow that plan - and let someone know where you are going.

Always wear a life jacket. All people in either canoe or kayak are required by law to have a wearable U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket on board.

Match your skill level to water and weather conditions

Take a boating safety class and hone your skills. Everyone born on or after January 1, 1989 must have completed a boating safety course to operate a motorboat (unless ages 10-15 and accompanied by a parent or guardian). You can take an online boat safety course.

Do not overload your vessel.

Place belongings and dry clothing in a wet sack or other waterproof container.

Another top tip is to remain sober while operating your boat or paddling. Hold off on consuming alcohol until after your recreational boating outing. Remember this weekend is the national Operation Dry Water event, when law enforcement agencies partner to keep the waters safe for all by removing impaired operators. DNR wardens will be out, joining local boat patrols for this June 29 - July 1 weekend.





I am honored to work with the men and women of the Forest County Sheriff's Office that have raised their right hands and swore an oath to do everything they can to serve and protect you. They are good people who daily amaze me with their acts of devotion and commitment.

In a recent ad Jason Novak has once again given you misleading information and "his" perception of the ongoings at the Sheriffs Office.

Yes, all members of the Forest County Sheriff's Office, including myself, at times have to work long hours and give dedication to the oath they took. We all have different roles on the "team" and it should be recognized that all of us are expected to do what it takes to protect you. Scheduling for a 24/7 emergency service provider is tough and tasking at times. Mandating employees to cover shifts does occur, but mainly when someone calls in sick and no one will cover the shift. It is not something that we prefer to do, but we owe it to you to cover the shifts. This is done under an agreement between the Deputies Union and the County and has been the practice for over 20 years. I have a very good relationship with the Deputies Union and have worked with them on this issue, but it boils down to fellow staff not calling in sick unnecessarily.

Yes, we do use email to communicate information to the staff. Email is a efficient and effective tool for communicating to the several employees, the same information, in a timely manner. I am confused as to Mr. Novak's concern over the use of email when it is the only form of communication he chosen to give to you in his political ad.

I have worked side by side with my Deputies day and night and have given them leadership in many situations over the years. You all know that, you've seen me out there, in your homes and life's. You also know that being an effective Sheriff requires hours of administrative duties as well.

I do find it interesting that for the last 7 1/2 years as Sheriff, I have encouraged all of my staff with a teamwork approach and to bring suggestions forward. I also immediately enacted monthly supervisor meetings to better communicate and share ideas and information. WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy prescription drugs.

In continuing to demand real action from the Trump Administration to hold the pharmaceutical industry accountable, Senator Baldwin asked Secretary Azar again to commit to transparency for prescription drug companies that jack up their prices and make it harder for families to afford life-saving medications.

"The evidence is clear: brand-name drug corporations continue to jack up prescription drug prices. It's unfortunate that when it comes to skyrocketing drug costs, this Administration is still all talk and no action," said Senator Baldwin following today's hearing. "I've heard from countless Wisconsinites who continue to see dramatic price increases. They are struggling to afford their prescriptions that they have relied on for years and they want Washington to act. My bipartisan FAIR Drug Pricing Act would require transparency and accountability for drug corporations who are jacking up prices for families in need of affordable lifesaving treatments and I am disappointed that the Administration has not yet joined me by supporting this bipartisan effort with Senator McCain."

Secretary Azar failed to give a straight answer or commit to any policy that would hold prescription drug companies accountable for their recent price hikes, including supporting Senator Baldwin's bipartisan FAIR Drug Pricing Act. HHS's own Inspector General recently found that even though seniors used fewer brand-name drugs over five years, Medicare spending on branded drugs increased by more than 62% because of increasing manufacturer prices.

Reports show that last year, the pharmaceutical industry spent over \$170 million on lobbying, deploying over 880 lobbyists to influence Washington. This investment has paid off for their CEOs and shareholders, as first quarter earnings showed seven of the largest drug companies together saw \$12.1 billion in profits since the beginning of 2018. Meanwhile, large drug corporations received a tax cut from the Republican tax bill and have spent a combined \$50 billion on new stock buybacks that enriched shareholders and corporate executives while drastically increasing prices on existing drugs. Furthermore, the 18 pharmaceutical companies in the S&P 500 spent an average of ninety-nine percent of their profits on buybacks and dividends over the last ten years.

In February, Senators Baldwin and McCain sent a letter to President Trump urging him to hold the pharmaceutical industry accountable and make good on his promise to lower the skyrocketing prescription drug prices that American families are struggling to afford. Baldwin and McCain co-authored the FAIR Drug Pricing Act, which would begin to address skyrocketing prescription drug prices and hold pharmaceutical companies accountable by requiring transparency for pharmaceutical corporations that plan to increase drug prices. The bill would not prohibit manufacturers from increasing prices, but it would, for the first time, give taxpayers notice of price increases and bring basic transparency to the market for prescription drugs.

If your name has changed, you will need to notify both Social Security and the DMV before you can change your voter registration name. The deadline for registering online is July 25.

If you do not have a driver license or state ID, you can complete a registration form online, print it, sign it, and send it to your Municipal Clerk, along with suitable proof of residence (such as a copy of a tax bill, utility bill, or bank statement). The deadline for registering by mail is July 25. You can register in person with your Clerk until August 10.

You can always register at your polling place on Election Day, if you bring your photo ID and proof of residence.

MyVote.WI.gov provides other important information such as your polling place, what's on your ballot, and your Municipal Clerk's name and contact info. You can also use this website to update your name and address if necessary, or request an absentee ballot.

Save yourself problems at the polls by visiting MyVote.WI.gov now. If you run into an issue, you can always contact your Municipal Clerk for help. If you don't have internet access, you can call this toll-free number: 866-VOTE-WIS (866-868-3947). 

own mini Kentuck Day festival with campers learning to make bean soup and corn bread, and learning the art of needlework, wood carving and how to make their own bamboo fishing pole.

Kentuck Heritage Day camp will be held on the grounds of the Crandon Aream Museum and at the Crandon Public Library daily from 10 a.m. 4 p.m. Monday, July 23rd Friday, July 27th.

The camp will be run by Michelle Gobert, UW-Extension and volunteer members of the historical Society. On Wednesday, July 25th, Amanda Flannery, a Crandon High School graduate who obtained her a Master's of Science with a focus on historical archaeology from University of Wisconsin Milwaukee in 2013, will offer campers hands-on archeology experience with an on-site dig on the historical society grounds. The group will also study various lumber towns that once existed in Forest county, including the town of Keith Siding, which Amanda wrote about in her thesis titled the "Oral History and Archeology of the Keith's Siding Site Location."

"In three short years, in the year 2021, the Crandon Area will celebrate fifty years of the "Kentuck Days celebration," said Michelle Gobert, project director. Semior Chatt Photo ID for Voting

The 2018 partisan primary is coming up on August 14, 2018. Offices on the ballot include Governor, U.S. Senator, U.S. Representatives, odd-numbered Wisconsin State Senate seats, and all Wisconsin Assembly seats. Now is the time to make sure you have a valid form of identification for voting.

Most people already have the right kind of photo ID for voting, such as a driver's license, Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT)-issued ID card, a U.S. military ID card, a U.S. passport, a tribal ID card, or a student ID card issued by a Wisconsin accredited university or college. These types of identification are valid for voting if they are unexpired or if they expired after the date of the most recent general election on November 8, 2016.

The following types of ID cards can be used for voting if they are unexpired: a veteran's photo ID card issued by the Veterans Health Administration of the federal Department of Veterans Affairs, a certificate of naturalization that was issued no more than two years before the date of the election, a driving receipt issued by the Wisconsin DOT, an identification card receipt issued by the Wisconsin DOT, a temporary identification card receipt issued by the Wisconsin DOT through the Identification Petition Process, and a citation or notice of intent to revoke or suspend a Wisconsin DOT-issued driver's license that the DOT issued within 60 days of the date of the election.

Some absentee voters do not need a photo ID. Members of the military and people who live permanently overseas do not need a photo ID. In addition, absentee voters do not need a photo ID if they are considered "indefinitely confined" and cannot travel due to their age, an illness, or a disability. These voters must indicate that they are indefinitely confined when they apply for an absentee ballot.

If you do not have a valid form of identification, and the documents you need to apply for an ID card are not easily available or would cost too much money for you to obtain them, you can use the voter ID petition process. This petition process is available for applicants unable to provide proof of name and date of birth, United States citizenship, identity, or other required documentation. The process is free and will allow you to obtain a receipt that you can use to vote while you obtain the remaining documents.

You should go to your local DMV office to apply for your photo ID receipt. If they are available, you should bring:

Proof of your name and date of birth (such as your birth certificate);

Proof of your identity (such as your Social Security card, Medicaid card, Medicare card, etc.);

Proof of Wisconsin residency (such as a utility bill, government mail, lease, etc.);

Proof of U.S. Citizenship (such as your U.S. birth certificate or citizenship paperwork); and

Social Security Number.

If you don't have all of these documents, bring what you have to the DMV. At the DMV, you will fill out two forms. Then, you will receive a receipt in the mail that you can use for voting. Learn what the receipt will look like by going to the following link:

http://wisconsindot.gov/Documents/dmv/shared/idpptakeaway.pdf. This receipt will be valid for 180 days, and it will be renewed automatically unless the DOT cancels it. You will receive additional receipts as long as you are making reasonable efforts to obtain the documents you need to apply

Remember that if you already have an unexpired Wisconsin driver's license or identification card, or if you have a Wisconsin driver's license or identification card that has expired since November 8, 2016, you already have valid identification for voting.

Please note that there is no separate "voter ID" card If you are unsure whether your identification meets the requirements, you should visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website at http://elections.wi.gov/ to check.

The Wisconsin Elections Commission also has information on its website about voter eligibility, poll locations, voter registration information or other election information. If you have questions about how to obtain identification for voting, you can call the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Voter ID hotline at 844-588-1069.







Mursau congratulates 3 school districts on School Safety Grants

Madison ... Representative Jeff Mursau (R–Crivitz) was happy to attend the School Safety Grant Announcement in Green Bay today, where three local school districts were awarded School Safety grants from the Department of Justice (DOJ). It was announced by the DOJ this Tuesday that Niagara School District received \$42,177, Goodman-Armstrong Creek School District received \$40,073, and the Menominee Indian School District received \$55,817 in grant funds.

"It was great to be there and see three more great school districts from the area receive these grants," said Mursau. "The money from these awards will certainly help provide the needed resources to improve safety in our schools for students and teachers alike."

The School Safety Grant Program was a product of last session's bill, 2017 Act 143. The program, which is administered by the Office of School Safety at the DOJ, is set to award a total of \$100 million in grant funds to schools state-wide to enhance school safety and preparedness. Already, more than \$9 million has been awarded to school districts throughout Wisconsin, with more being awarded in the near future.

"I am glad to have voted in favor of this bill when it was on the Assembly floor this past session," expressed Mursau. "It's reassuring to think about the impact these enhancements will have on making our schools safer, and I hope to see even more of these grants awarded in the 36th Assembly District soon."
