On July 21, "Cate and Her Jacks" will make its Holt and Balcom Logging Camp Museum debut at 1:00 p.m. Kathleen and Jon Marsh, Townsend, will reprise their roles as Cathouse Cate and Whiskey Jack, popular characters from the Red Light Saloon series. This time around, Cate and Jack will share entertaining anecdotes of the lumberjacks who patronized their fictitious establishment in the late 1890s. The couple will share humorous stories inspired by tall tales surrounding the former Wheeler Hotel. Built in 1898, the Wheeler is still standing on Highway 32 in Townsend (Sawbucks). It was a wildly popular place for lumberjacks looking for hard liquid refreshment and soft female companionship. Note: this show is for mature audiences only.

As always, the Museum will be open for tours beginning at 10 a.m. Holt & Balcom Logging Camp Museum is located off Highway F in Lakewood. Take Highway 32 to County Trunk F; go east 1.5 miles. Turn right into the McCauslin Golf Course and follow the signs. Park in the Golf Course Parking lot. The Museum is directly behind the Clubhouse. The rich history of families from Kentucky will be featured in the historical booth on the grounds of the courthouse square. With artist and crafter booths, great sidewalk sales, specialty food booths, and live entertainment on the grounds, and a classic car and bike show just down the street, there will be something for everyone to enjoy!

The day kicks off with the 7th Annual 5K Moonshine Run/Walk. The Moonshine Run starts at 9:00 a.m. (registration begins at 8:00 a.m.) and will wind its way through downtown Crandon and end near the Kentuck Day Festival grounds on the courthouse square. Registration is available the morning of the event or by contacting joshjaeger84@gmail.com. All proceeds will benefit local youth sports.

The 16th annual Kentuck Klassic Car & Bike Show will take place on the beautiful grounds of the Weber-Hill Funeral Home from 9:00 a.m. till 2:00 p.m. An entry fee of \$10.00 can be paid upon registration, taking place from 8:00 till 11:00 a.m., at the show grounds. Chair Susan Hill is excited about her second year as chairperson and invites everyone to come and enjoy the show. Open Letter to the School District of Crandon, citizens and taxpayers

Citizens United for Education is an open group to all citizens and taxpayers interested in educating themselves on how responsibly our school is using our tax dollars in running the school, the children's education, safety, staff and student moral. These meetings generally take place once a week in the basement of the Crandon Public Library. We encourage any and all Crandon School District citizens and taxpayers to participate in and attend school board meetings, school board workshop meetings and Citizens United for Education meetings.

Your school board is a policy making entity for the school district. The board is an administrative agency that must provide oversight for the operation of the local school system and is ultimately accountable for the system's operation and the board is a democratically elected body that provides school system leadership and represents the interests of the community on public education issues. Boards may also be authorized by the state legislature to levy taxes without going to referendum. ITEMS THAY MAY BE OF CONCERN TO YOU:

**Current projected deficit of approximately \$700,000.00 for the 2018-19 school year;

**Currently considering a tax levy (\$900,000.00 Contract signed with McKinstry) which DOES NOT have to go to referendum. Under consideration is an increase in the mill rate of \$.63/\$1000 for each of the next two years to pay for the energy upgrades. The most interesting part about what the board is considering here is that after these energy upgrades are completed, the levy is not proposed to disappear, thereby garnering more revenue for the district. This is effectively a referendum without going to a public vote. Who is to say that the money collected by this levy will be handled appropriately and there is still future consideration of a referendum;

**Recent approval of two new administrative staff (associate principals); Crandon School District now has approximately 8 Administrative personnel for every 100 students:

**One year early renewal of Administrative Contract with salary and benefit increase:

Current Superintendent under investigation;

**Inconsistent and questionable staff salaries; Safety of the students and staff

**The alarming number of students leaving the district and enrolling in nearby schools;

**Poor staff and student morale.

While this list is not exhaustive, it is extensive. The public needs to be aware of the current trend the board has







10 tips to help adults include physical activity into their lifestyles

Being physically active is important for your health. Adults who are physically active are less likely to develop some chronic diseases than adults who are inactive. Physical activity is any form of exercise or movement of the body that uses energy. People of all ages, shapes, sizes and abilities can benefit from a physically active lifestyle.

1. Start activities slowly and build up over time. If you are just starting physical activity, build up slowly. This will help to prevent injury. After a few weeks, increase how often and how long you are active.

2. Get your heart pumping. For health benefits, do at least 2 ½ hours each week of physical activity that requires moderate effort. A few examples include brisk walking, biking, swimming and skating. Spread activities over the week, but do them at least 10 minutes at a time.

3. Strength-train for healthy muscles and bones. Do strengthening activities twice a week. Activities that build strength include lifting weights, doing push-ups and sit-ups, working with resistance bands or heavy gardening.

4. Make active choices throughout the day. Every little bit of activity can add up and doing something is better than nothing. Take the stairs instead of the elevator, go for a 10-minute walk on your lunch break, or park further away from work and walk.

5. Be active your way. Mix it up - there are endless ways to be active. They include walking, biking, dancing, martial arts, gardening and playing ball. Try out different activities to see what you like best and to add variety.

6. Use the buddy system. Activities with friends or family are more enjoyable than doing them alone. Join a walking group, attend fitness classes at a gym, or play with the kids outside. Build a support network - your buddies will encourage you to keep being active.

7. Set goals and track your progress. Plan your physical activity ahead of time and keep records. It's a great way to meet your goals. Track you activities with the Physical Activity Tracker on SuperTracker - Use the My Journal feature to record what you enjoyed so you can build a plan that is right for you.

8. Add on your active time. Once you get used to regular physical activity, try to increase your weekly active time. The more time you spend being physically active, the more health benefits you will receive.

9. Increase your effort. Add more intense activities once you have been moderately active for a while. You can do this by turning a brisk walk into a jog, swimming or biking faster, playing soccer, and participating in aerobic dance.

10. Have fun. Physical activity shouldn't be a chore. It can help you feel better about yourself and the way you live your life. Choose activities that you enjoy and that fit your lifestyle.



To ride the Lumberjack Steam Train, stop at the depot on Hwy 8, on Laona's west side. You can ride to the Camp 5 Museum Complex in a vintage passenger coach or caboose. When you arrive, enjoy the petting zoo, feeding and petting a variety of farm animals who enjoy the attention as much as the visitors. The early days of logging in the Northwoods are displayed in the Logging Museum. The days of the lumberjack wielding axe and crosscut are displayed with photos and tools that give the viewer a feel for the history of the time. A working blacksmith shop adds to the experience in the Logging Museum. Modern sustained yield logging is explained on the Green Treasure Forest Tour, with a trolley ride through a beautiful hardwood forest.
