Large landslide in election for Forest County Sheriff John Dennee wins big

It was a hotly contested election for the position of Forest County Sheriff between incumbent John Dennee and Deputy Jason Novak. Dennee carried the election in a big way, getting around 80% of the vote.

The vote by precinct is as follows with Dennee's count listed first: Alvin-18 to 3; Argonne-132 to 44; 67 to 13; Blackwell-28 to 3; Caswell-18 to 9; Town of Crandon-144 to 23; Freedom-109 to 14; Hiles-96 to 38; Laona-260 to 88; Lincoln-281 to 48; Nashville Ward 1-96 to 20; Nashville Ward 2-34 to 14; Nashville Ward 3-51 to 12; Popple River-6 to 7; Ross-12 to 24; Wabeno-169 to 30; City of Crandon-411 to 78.

The totals for the race for Forest County Sheriff came to Dennee at 1932 and Novak at 468.

On the Republican ballot, Governor Scott Walker appears to be popular in Forest County, tallying up 1,617 votes against his Republican opponent Robert Meyer.

Lieutenant Governor Kleefisch was given a total of 1,550 votes. Attorney General Brad Schimmel was given 1,519 votes. In the race for Secretary of State, Jay Schroeder totaled 977 votes against his nearest competitor, Spencer Zimmerman, with 408 votes in Forest County. Travis Hartwig was the leader on the Republican ballot with 935 votes with his rival, Jill Millies, following with 400 votes.

In the Republican race to see who will run against Democrat Tammy Baldwin, Kevin Nicholson led the field in Forest County with the nearest opponent Leah Vukmir at 575 votes against Nicholson's 701 votes.

Tammy Baldwin only totaled 438 votes, but it should be added that the Republican race for sheriff undoubtedly drew many voters to the Republican ticket, and the voters can only vote on one ballot.

Sean Duffy, incumbent in District for U.S. Contress, received 1,718 votes running unopposed.

Ron Swearingen, Wisconsin Assembly District 34 received 480 votes running unopposed, and Jeff Mursau, incumbent if the 36th Assembly District received 1,185 votes running unopposed.

The Democrat ballots didn't get much use in the Forest County election because of the rule that you can only vote on one ballot. Certainly, the contested race for Forest County Sheriff put more voters on the Republican ballot.

In the race for Forest County Sheriff, there are no candidates on the Democratic ticket, so logically, this means Dennee will be re-elected to the sheriff's position next November.

Have Your Poultry Tested!

Thursday, September 6th is Entry Day. It is important to all who are entering their poultry in the Fair, to have their poultry tested by a Wisconsin Certified Pullorum Tester. This is to avoid the spreading of avian bird flu outbreaks. If not tested, the birds won't be allowed on the fairgrounds.

The Forest County Agricultural Society will be holding a testing program for one time only, on Saturday, August 18th (This Saturday!) from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. on the Sipple Farm that is located midway between Argonne and Hiles, fire no. 9705. This is a white farmhouse, red outbuildings and two concrete silos at the junction of County N and Hwy 32. Bring your premise ID number, and all birds will be identified with leg band tags and numbers. The only cost will be to pay for the antigen serum at about \$1 to \$2 per bird.

What Will Be At The Fair?

A more complete schedule will be published as the date draws near, but there will be carnival rides, and adult talent contest, trick rider shows, a youth talent contest, Heritage Day, an apple pie bake-off, and a special Horse Pulling Contest on Sunday at 1:00 p.m.

The kids will have Wristband Specials on Saturday afternoon, and it should be a great time for all attending!



Baldwin to Pfizer CEO: Make drug price reductions permanent

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin today sent a letter to the CEO of Pfizer calling on the pharmaceutical company to make recently announced price reductions permanent. Baldwin's letter follows an announcement by Pfizer that it would delay announced price hikes after a tweet from President Trump, calling into question why the company needs to increase prices in the first place.

Major drug companies have drastically raised prices for top-selling drugs over the past five years, in some cases more than doubling prices. This is despite increased sales and company profits. Last year, President Trump signed partisan tax legislation passed by Congressional Republicans that gave permanent tax breaks to corporations such as Pfizer. Since then, drug corporations, including Pfizer, have announced more than \$50 billion combined in stock buybacks—largely benefiting top executives and wealthy shareholders as prescription drug prices continue to rise for American families. In fact, Pfizer and many other companies instituted price hikes on prescription drugs in January after the corporate tax cut became law. Recently, Pfizer increased prices again and it's costing consumers.

On July 1, Pfizer increased prices for the second time this year on many prescription drugs by nearly 10 percent. Days later, Pfizer issued a puzzling statement that they would return the prices of over 40 prescription drugs "to their pre-July 1 levels as soon as technically possible" but only until the end of the year or until the President's prescription drug "Blueprint" is implemented.

"Instead of playing games with the costs of prescription drugs that millions of Americans depend on, you should make a firm and clear commitment to permanently roll back prices," wrote Senator Baldwin in her letter.

Senator Baldwin has been working to hold prescription drug companies accountable for skyrocketing drug prices. Earlier this year, Senators Baldwin and McCain sent a letter to President Trump urging him to hold the pharmaceutical industry accountable and make good on his promise to lower the skyrocketing prescription drug prices that American families are struggling to afford.

Baldwin and McCain also co-authored the bipartisan FAIR Drug Pricing Act, which would begin to address high prescription drug prices and hold pharmaceutical companies accountable by requiring transparency for drug companies that plan to increase drug prices. The bill would not prohibit manufacturers from increasing prices, but it would, for the first time, give taxpayers notice of price increases and bring basic transparency to the market for prescription drugs.

"I have heard from countless Wisconsinites who are struggling to afford medications that they have relied on for years. They want Washington to take real action. That is why I have offered a bipartisan solution, the FAIR Drug Pricing Act, to institute basic transparency and accountability for drug companies that raise prices." said Senator Baldwin.

The McKinney-Vento Act defines children and youth who are homeless (twenty-one years of age and younger) as:

- Living in emergency or transitional shelters;
- Abandoned in hospitals;
- Awaiting foster care placement;

*Children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designated for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.

*Children and youth who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar

*Migratory children who qualify as homeless because they are living in circumstances described above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children who may qualify according to the above criteria, the School District of Laona provides the following assurances to parents and homeless children:

*Local school district staff member (liaison) to assist homeless children/families:

*There shall be immediate enrollment and school participation, even if educational and medical records and proof of residency are not available.

*All educational opportunities and related opportunities for homeless students (preschool to age 21), including unaccompanied youth, shall be the same as for the general student population.

*Enrollment and transportation rights, including transportation to the school of origin. "School of origin" is defined as the school the child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled.

*Written explanation of a child or youth's school placement, other than school or origin or the school requested by the parent, with the right to appeal within the local dispute resolution process.

*Meaningful opportunities for parents to participate in the education of their children. These shall include: special notices of events, parentteacher conferences, newsletters, and access to student records.

Any person aware of a child between the ages of birth and 21 who may be experiencing physical, mental, emotional or learning problems may contact the Special Education teachers at the School District of Laona, 5216 Forest Avenue, Suite A, Laona, WI 54541, phone (715) 674-2143 to initiate screening services that will determine if a referral for special education is appropriate.

Referral Procedure

The school district shall solicit and receive referrals of students with suspected educational needs from all persons who have responsible cause to believe that such needs exist. Specific state criteria shall be adhered to in determining eligibility for specific handicapping conditions. Referrals of suspected children with disability shall be referred to either of the people listed above.

IEP - Team Evaluation

Whenever a child is referred who is suspected of having an exceptional educational need, the school district shall establish an IEP Team. An appointment of this team shall be the responsibility of the Program Support Teacher. The Program Support Teacher shall approve the evaluation process and may request additional information.

Procedural safeguards for evaluation including the following:

The notice of intent to evaluate shall be sent to the parents that will include:

•A full explanation of the due process/ procedural safeguards;

 A description of the evaluation proposed, an explanation of why the evaluation is proposed, any options that were considered, and the reasons why those options were rejected;

•A description of each evaluation procedure used as a basis for the evaluation;

•The type of professionals conducting the evaluation;

• A description of any other relevant factors. Written parental consent shall be obtained when a child is being evaluated for the first time within the district. This consent form shall include:

·A statement documenting that the parent understands the content of the notice;

•Information on the general areas to be

ANNUAL NOTICE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION REFERRAL AND EVALUATION PROCEDURES

Upon request, the School District of Wabeno Area is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for an evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. A referral may be made by contacting Robert Tucker, Director of Special Education, School District of Wabeno Area, at 715-473-2592, or by writing him at P.O. Box 460, Wabeno, WI 54566.

Under this scholarship program and as further specified in state law, a child with a disability who has been denied the opportunity to attend a nonresident school district under the full-time open enrollment program may be eligible to receive a scholarship from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that allows the child to attend an eligible private school that is participating in the Special Needs Scholarship Program.

This is a state-administered program. A parent or guardian who is interested in the Special Needs Scholarship Program should independently verify the participating private schools and the specific terms, eligibility criteria, and application procedures of the scholarship program with the DPI.

The Special Needs Scholarship Program is further defined under section 115.7915 of the state statutes. However, special eligibility requirements not found in that statute exist for program scholarships that are awarded for private school attendance that initially begins in the 2017-2018 school year. 

The McKinney-Vento Act defines children and youth who are homeless (twenty-one years of age and younger) as:

housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason (sometimes referred to as double-up);

- living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to lack of alternative adequate accommodations;
- living emergency or transitional shelters;
 - abandoned in hospitals;
- awaiting foster care placement;
- Children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designated for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.
- Children and youth who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings.
- Migratory children who qualify as homeless because they are living in circumstances described above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children who may qualify according to the above criteria, the School District of Wabeno Area provides the following assurances to parents of homeless children:



SCHOOL DISTRICT OF WABENO AREA

ACCESS TO PUBLIC RECORDS

The Board of the School District of Wabeno Area shall allow persons to have access to school district records in accordance with this policy and implementing procedures and in accordance with the law. The district administrator is designated as the legal custodian of records. The legal custodian shall safely keep and preserve records of the authority and shall have full legal power to render decisions and carry out duties related to those records maintained by any school district authority. The legal custodian may deny access to records only in accordance with the law.

Public records may be inspected, copied and/or abstracted at any time during the established district office hours, which are from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M., Monday through Friday. The legal custodian may establish fees for services in accordance with the law. A list of fees is available at the district office.

STUDENT RECORDS

Student records are maintained to assist students, parents, quardians, and the school in achieving the student's educational Such records are accumulated, maintained, released, transferred, and eventually destroyed by the building principal or his/her designee in accordance with state and federal law. Only those individuals or agencies specifically authorized by state and federal law shall be granted access to a student's records.

The school district does forward records to other schools that have requested the records and in which the student seeks or intends to enroll, or is already enrolled, as long as the disclosure is for purposes related to the student's enrollment or transfer.

An adult student or the parent/guardian of a minor student may inspect the student's records in accordance with administrative policy and established procedures and may challenge the content if he/she believes the records are inaccurate or misleading. Such a complaint would be filed with the building principal. If not satisfied with the decision, an appeal avenue is available through the Family Policy and Regulations Office of the U.S. Department of Education.

TEACHER LICENCE

Federal law requires that we share with you the qualifications of the teachers in the School District of Wabeno Area.





Bonus Fall Turkey Harvest sale begins Aug 18 at 10 a.m.

MADISON -- New for 2018, one fall turkey harvest authorization is issued to each person purchasing a fall turkey license or conservation patron license, instead of being issued through a drawing.

Hunters can choose the zone for which their harvest authorization will be valid at the time of purchase.

Bonus fall turkey harvest authorizations can be purchased in addition to the fall turkey harvest authorization included with a license purchase. The bonus harvest authorization sale begins at 10 a.m. on Saturday, August 18, availability is as follows:

Zone 1: 5,000 Zone 2: 1,000

Zone 3: 5,000 Zone 4: 2,000

Zone 5:0 Zone 6:0

Zone 7:0

Bonus harvest authorizations are sold on a firstcome, first-served basis. They can be purchased at a rate of one per day until the zone sells out or the season ends. The cost is \$10 for residents, \$15 for nonresidents, and \$5 for hunters under 12 years old. An annual turkey stamp authorization is required to hunt turkeys.

Hunters can purchase their bonus harvest authorization in person at any license agent or online at GoWild.wi.gov. Hunters can purchase their fall turkey license and claim their fall harvest authorization anytime throughout the fall turkey season. Please note that customers who wish to purchase a bonus authorization will need to first purchase a fall turkey license and claim their harvest authorization.

The fall 2018 wild turkey season for Zones 1-5 is Sept. 15 to Jan. 6, 2019. For zones 6 and 7, the season will run from Sept. 15 to Nov. 16.

Availability for bonus harvest authorizations is determined by a variety of factors, including hunting pressure, customer demand, habitat availability, turkey population densities and turkey distribution in each zone.








Wisconsin manufacturers hit by trade policies discuss plight with Ron Johnson

Ralph Hardt of Manitowoc-based Jagemann Stamping Co. came to the Federal Courthouse in Milwaukee Monday to tell Republican U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson exactly how tariffs are hitting his bottom line.

Hardt, the firm's president, said a Canadian customer was going to give Jagemann a \$3 million project to produce parts for automotive but because of an increase in steel prices in the U.S., the job went to a Korean business.

"The longer this goes on, the increased possibility we'll lose more new projects," Hardt said

Johnson convened a group of 15 Wisconsin business leaders from the farming, food processing and manufacturing sectors to discuss President Donald Trump's trade policies and the nascent trade war.

The Trump administration imposed tariffs on foreign-made aluminum and steel, igniting retaliatory measures by America's trading partners.

"We're being hit inbound and outbound on our products," said Doug Reigle, vice president for supply chain management at Kewaskum-based Regal Ware Inc. Brad Kremer, a farmer from Pittsfield, said he lost \$60,000 in the past 30 days because of a drop in soybean prices after China announced tariffs against U.S. soybeans.

Even though Kremer said he supports Trump trying to level the playing field on trade with China, the tariffs are hurting.

"Farmers aren't going to buy this year," he said. "Our checkbooks are closed."

Austin Ramirez, chief executive of Waukeshabased Husco International, an engineering and manufacturing firm, said tariffs are costing "us a fortune .. about \$1 million a month in impact."

"Husco is far from the largest company in Wisconsin, however, last year we were the largest contributor to Wisconsin charities in the state," he added. Ramirez said tariffs will not only impact business but also

Ramirez said he had around "100 jobs worth of manufacturing in the U.S." to support exports and those jobs are now at risk.

Cindy Brown, president of Chippewa Valley Bean Co., said her family began farming in the state in 1858, and she said "of all government interactions, this is absolutely the worst. It totally takes us out of the European market."


Brown said 60% of the firm's export business goes into the European Union, accounting for \$25 million in sales. But now that business is being hurt by tariffs, she

Johnson said there are people who are concerned that a trade war will "get out of control."

"You've heard already of the damage being done," he said.

Johnson said he held the discussion to deliver the stories to Trump and Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross and trade negotiators "so they understand that there is some real damage being done now. They say there's going to be short-term pain for long-term gain, fine, but they need to understand some of this damage is going to

Johnson said he was hopeful that the Trump administration would conclude trade deals.

Johnson said the businesses provided details of what they're facing and he added, "Houston, we've got a problem."

Enrollment up in online classes at Nicolet College

The popularity of online classes continues to grow at Nicolet College, accounting for nearly a third of all credits earned in the 2017-18 academic year. The reason: flexibility.

"The flexibility is very important," said the working mother of three. "I would not be able to earn a college degree right now if I did not have the online option."

To date, Wilberding has taken eight online classes on her way to finishing her Administrative Professional associate's degree. She plans to graduate this December.

Starting her first online class was a bit intimidating, she readily admitted. But that feeling didn't

"Everybody at Nicolet is so helpful," she said. "I was wondering if I was going to be out there in this online world all by myself, but that wasn't the case at all. You really develop this sense of community, even family, with the other students in the class. Everybody, especially the instructors, want to see you succeed."

Nicolet first offered online classes in 2004 with just a few classes. This coming Fall Semester students will have their choice of 68 different online classes from 21 different academic disciplines.

The Accounting and Business Management associate's degrees can now be earned entirely by taking online classes. Several of the required classes for these degrees are also offered in the face-to-face classroom format, giving students the option of mixing traditional and online classes if they desire.

Nicolet College Interim Dean of Business Joel DeNamur noted that Nicolet structures each online class to provide a high level of support to students. "It all focuses on creating a quality learning experience for every student," he said. "Along with instructors being readily available to interact one-on-one with students either online or in person, Nicolet also offers extensive tutoring resources and technical support. The depth of support is there for every student who is willing to put in the effort."

Students taking online classes can also get faceto-face or online help with coursework at any of the college's eight Academic Success Centers located within the six-county Nicolet College District. "Breastfeeding Welcome Here" window clings can be obtained free of charge at the Forest County Health Department.

They can also provide a private space, other than a bathroom, for breastfeeding moms to pump milk. This has been shown to increase employee retention and reduce medical costs.
