A plaque that was furnished by the Lake Metonga Association was formally presented by Crandon Mayor Dennis Rosa to Les Schramm and his late wife, Donna. The plaque reads:

"In grateful recognition for their many years of exceptional volunteerism and dedicated service to keeping Lake Metonga a pristine natural resource for generations to come."

The plaque will be displayed in the new beach kitchen. Les addressed the crowd in the pavilion and said the Lake Metonga Association was privileged to support and fund a part of this restoration, along with the Crandon Lions. He pointed out that the kitchen will serve at the many Lions events that "...reach out to the community, to tourists and all who come to enjoy this pristine lake."

Les shared his memories of coming to Lake Metonga with wife Donna with their kids, Kathy and Rick. He said it started when they would visit Donna's brother, Chuck Roland, who had a cabin on Strawberry Bluff.

According to Les, it was about 1974 when Chuck called to tell them a cottage was for sale just down the hill from his place. A Dr. Kendall, from Merrill, owned the cabin. He was married to a Phillipino girl who disliked cold winters, so they decided to spend winters in Arizona.

Les remembered the hand pump in the kitchen sink, the outhouse and battling bats.

Les and Donna became permanent residents in 1996, and they joined the Lake Metonga Association in 1998. Through the years, he served two terms as president of the association, and served on the board until 2018.

He pointed out that he held the positions, but Donna was actually part of his positions. He said Donna served and worked as hard as he did on projects. She was his advisor, editor, secretary and partner.

In those years, Metonga did have problems. There was the rusty crayfish invasion, and then there was the invasive species that could have ruined the lake if it wasn't for the intervention of the association and the hard work of the Schramms. Eurasian milfoil is a tough plant to fight, but RT Krueger identified it in the lake and the fight began.

One of the battles he remembered was with the IRS, when he tried to get 501C3 status for the association. Eventually, after six months, the government cooperated, and the association was granted the non-profit status. In the meantime, the milfoil had to be fought. Today, Les estimates that there is probably about 50 to 60 acres of milfoil in the lake, but without the efforts to control this invasive, there would be immense beds of the plant.

Les estimates that about a quarter million dollars has been spent controlling the milfoil. Due to Les and Donna writing grants available because of the non-profit status, about 75% of the cost of abatement was paid by grants. The Lake Metonga Association paid the balance with their fundraising activities.

In addition to grant writing, the busy couple compiled a newsletter for the association and a power point presentation for educating the public on the milfoil problem affecting Metonga and other area lakes.

With Donna's passing some three years ago, Les has slowed down. He was very happy to see her name on the plaque. He said he truly loved her and misses her a great deal. These days he is visiting his kids and doing some traveling. He is confident that passing his work on to Gary Mueller and other members of the association, the good work of the Lake Metonga Association will carry on.



The new kitchen at the Crandon beach will work for events for many years to come. The Crandon Lions efforts on the project have been helped with the donation from the Donna Schramm Memorial Fund. The plaque will serve as a reminder to all who follow that others made a big effort to keep Lake Metonga healthy and provide a nice public facility.



Wisconsin manufacturers hit by trade policies discuss plight with Ron Johnson

Ralph Hardt of Manitowoc-based Jagemann Stamping Co. came to the Federal Courthouse in Milwaukee Monday to tell Republican U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson exactly how tariffs are hitting his bottom line.

Hardt, the firm's president, said a Canadian customer was going to give Jagemann a \$3 million project to produce parts for automotive but because of an increase in steel prices in the U.S., the job went to a Korean business.

"The longer this goes on, the increased possibility we'll lose more new projects," Hardt said

Johnson convened a group of 15 Wisconsin business leaders from the farming, food processing and manufacturing sectors to discuss President Donald Trump's trade policies and the nascent trade war.

The Trump administration imposed tariffs on foreign-made aluminum and steel, igniting retaliatory measures by America's trading partners.

"We're being hit inbound and outbound on our products," said Doug Reigle, vice president for supply chain management at Kewaskum-based Regal Ware Inc. Brad Kremer, a farmer from Pittsfield, said he lost \$60,000 in the past 30 days because of a drop in soybean prices after China announced tariffs against U.S. soybeans.

Even though Kremer said he supports Trump trying to level the playing field on trade with China, the tariffs are hurting.

"Farmers aren't going to buy this year," he said. "Our checkbooks are closed."

Austin Ramirez, chief executive of Waukeshabased Husco International, an engineering and manufacturing firm, said tariffs are costing "us a fortune .. about \$1 million a month in impact."

"Husco is far from the largest company in Wisconsin, however, last year we were the largest contributor to Wisconsin charities in the state," he added. Ramirez said tariffs will not only impact business but also communities.

Ramirez said he had around "100 jobs worth of manufacturing in the U.S." to support exports and those jobs are now at risk.

Cindy Brown, president of Chippewa Valley Bean Co., said her family began farming in the state in 1858, and she said "of all government interactions, this is absolutely the worst. It totally takes us out of the European market."

Brown said 60% of the firm's export business goes into the European Union, accounting for \$25 million in sales. But now that business is being hurt by tariffs, she said

Johnson said there are people who are concerned that a trade war will "get out of control."

"You've heard already of the damage being done," he said.

Johnson said he held the discussion to deliver the stories to Trump and Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross and trade negotiators "so they understand that there is some real damage being done now. They say there's going to be short-term pain for long-term gain, fine, but they need to understand some of this damage is going to be permanent."

Johnson said he was hopeful that the Trump administration would conclude trade deals.

Johnson said the businesses provided details of what they're facing and he added, "Houston, we've got a





Jennifer Vogler, District Administrator, reported the following: I am proud of the success we have had this school year! We have had students increase academic knowledge and success due to the work being done each day by our faculty members! They did a great job reviewing our 2017-2018 goals during our data retreat. The discussions had while developing our new goals for the 2018-2019 school year were outstanding!

The board met on Wednesday, May 30. As a group we are developing goals and learning about our roles and responsibilities. As part of the growing process the board has asked that I develop a district wide team with the purpose to help improve the district culture. The team members will help create improvement goals as an effort to build a positive, district wide culture. This will help address the great things we are accomplishing as a district and the areas we need to improve. Our first meeting took place on Monday, June 4. We had a great discussion during our meeting. We discussed community involvement, moving forward and communication. We also had a conversation regarding our district mission, vision, and philosophy. Eric Becker, Elementary Principal, reported on the following: Updated AGR (Academic Gap Reduction; Formally SAGE) Report

We utilized class size reduction as our strategy for all grade levels

Performance Objectives: Reading - Kindergarten- 81% of students are reading at level C or above. Goal of 80% met.

First Grade- 60% of students are reading at level I or above. Goal of 80% not met.

Second Grade-55% of students are reading at Level M or above. Goal of 80% not met. Third Grade-71% of students are reading at Level P or above. Goal of 80% not met.

Math - Kindergarten- of students are at or above level 2 in the math assessment. Goal of 80% not met. First Grade- 83% of students are at or above level 4 in the math assessment. Goal of 80% met. Second Grade- 39% of the students are above the 40% tile in STAR math. Goal of 80% not met.

Change in assessment to STAR

Third Grade- 79% of students are above the 40% tile in STAR math. Goal of 80% not met. Data goals for AGR for next year:

Standardize measurements for goals. Use all STAR and/or F&P

Transition to a growth goal that looks at current level of performance and moves students at an appropriate rate. These goals are more meaningful and show how much a student has gone from the start to the finish. STAR uses a Student Growth Percentile to calculate this figure.

4-6 Grade At or above the 40% tile; this is the district benchmark.





All public housing goes smoke-free on July 30, 2018

Starting Monday July 30 all public housing authorities became smoke-free due to a rule passed by the U.S Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The rule instructs all public housing authorities to implement a smoke-free policy that includes all living units and indoor common areas in public housing and public housing administrative buildings. Local Health advocates from Northwood's Tobacco-Free Coalition and The Forest County Health Department are celebrating the change.

The Forest County Health Department is very excited for the new Policy to take effect and for the positive health outcomes that will come out of it. Housing and public health go hand-in-hand. Part of HUD's mission is to promote housing and create healthy communities. Second hand smoke is one of the leading causes of asthma and other respiratory diseases for children-diseases that disproportionately affect families living in public housing. Asthma not only robs children of their breath but it's one of the top reasons for why children miss school, robbing them of precious learning time. Asthma can also lead to expensive emergency room visits-a financial burden on parents already coping with the emotional toll of caring for their sick child.

Exposure to second hand smoke can also cause sudden infant death syndrome and respiratory symptoms such as cough and wheeze, middle ear infections, slowed lung growth, reduced lung function in children, and increased risk of stroke in adults. The Forest County Health Department supports this change because over 50% of nonsmokers are exposed to second hand smoke. Second hand smoke contains more than 70 substances known to cause cancer and over 7000 chemicals. 30%-60% of air leaving an apartment may leak into adjacent apartments resulting in recycled air flow. Eliminating smoking in indoor spaces is the only way to protect nonsmokers from exposure to secondhand smoke.

While the HUD rule doesn't require people who smoke to quit, it does present them with a great opportunity to give up tobacco for good. Tobacco users who are ready to quit can call the Wisconsin Tobacco Quit Line at 1-800-QUIT NOW (784-8669) to receive free help. Medicaid covers the cost of many quit smoking medications and we encourage you to talk to your doctor for coverage information.

The Forest County Health Department in conjunction with the Northwood's Tobacco-Free Coalition are here to help property managers with the transition to smoke-free housing by providing signage, tips and other resources. Please call the Forest County Health Department at 715-478-3371 for more information.

Baldwin Joins legislation honoring the military service of "Hello Girls"

Congressional Gold Medal Act Would be Awarded to Women Telephone Operators of WWI

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin today cosponsored bipartisan legislation honoring the groundbreaking service of the women who connected American and French forces on the front lines during World War I. The Hello Girls Congressional Gold Medal Act will award the women of the U.S. Army Signal Corps, dubbed the 'Hello Girls,' with the Congressional Gold Medal for their service and subsequent 60 year fight to be recognized as veterans.

"The 223 women who served in the U.S. Army Signal Corps during the first world war, including two Wisconsinites, connected more than 26 million calls between military officers on the frontlines, and played an integral role in the war effort," said Senator Baldwin. "I'm so proud to join this bipartisan effort to honor the brave, trailblazing women who stepped up to serve their country, and to acknowledge their decades-long fight to be given the recognition they deserve."

Women were recruited after male infantrymen struggled to connect calls quickly or communicate with their French counterparts. The bilingual female telephone operators served at military headquarters and command outposts in the field alongside the American Expeditionary Forces in France. Despite their outstanding service and the military oath they took, they were denied veteran status and benefits when they returned home. In 1977, 60 years after the first Hello Girls took the Army oath, Congress passed legislation to retroactively acknowledge the military service of the women of the U.S. Army Signal Corps.

A recent documentary by Wisconsin filmmaker Jim Theres told the story of the "Hello Girls," which included two Wisconsinites - Martina Heynen (Green Bay) and Hildegarde Van Brunt Abbott (Milwaukee) who both sailed to France in the second group of phone operators in April 1918.

The legislation was first introduced by Senators Jon Tester (D-MT) and Dean Heller (R-NV).

Make it a healthy school year

It won't be long before kids head back to the classroom for the start of another school year. While you need to make sure your child has all the school supplies they need to succeed, it's just as important to make sure they have a healthy school year.

- 3. Visit the doctor. A check-up is a wonderful way to make sure your child's school year gets off to a healthy start. It's also an opportunity to get a physical for your child, which is usually required for kids who will be playing a sport.
- 4. Getting sleep schedules back on track. Before they head back to classroom, get your kids back on their school year sleep schedule. Start readjusting bedtimes several days out so children are hitting the pillow earlier. And encourage them to cut back on playing games and watching their favorite programs in the evening.
- 5. Healthy food = good health. A healthy diet is the fuel children need to succeed in the classroom. Make sure you child is eating whole grains, fruits, vegetables, lean meats and foods low that are low in fat and rich in protein, such as fish, eggs and beans.

The start of a new school year is exciting, but it can also be a little scary for some children. It's a big shift from summer's freedom to the measured routines of school and sometimes that can build up in to big, emotional outbursts and other classic signs of anxiety.

Here are some additional tips to ease back to school anxiety for children:

- 1. Listen to your child Be available and give your child your undivided attention to express his/her feelings or fears. Tell them it's normal to experience these things.
- 2. Focus on the positive aspects of going to school such as being with friends, learning a favorite subject and playing at recess. Talk through previous triumphs and remind them of their own successes with previous situations.
- 3. Pay attention to your behavior Kids often feed off the anxiety and energy they sense in the adults around them. That's why it's important that you remain calm and positive. The more confidence and comfort you can model, the more your child will understand there is no need to worry.
- 4. Get back into a routine A week or two before school, start preparing your child for the upcoming transition by getting back into school year routines like realistic bedtimes and selecting tomorrow's clothes.
- 5. Be patient Erasing anxiety can take time and each day can bring new challenges. Be patient with your child and


