7th Annual Festi-fall in Lakewood





children need to succeed in the classroom. Make sure you child is eating whole grains, fruits, vegetables, lean meats and foods low that are low in fat and rich in protein, such as fish, eggs and beans.

The start of a new school year is exciting, but it can also be a little scary for some children. It's a big shift from summer's freedom to the measured routines of school and sometimes that can build up in to big, emotional outbursts and other classic signs of anxiety.

Here are some additional tips to ease back to school anxiety for children:

1. Listen to your child Be available and give your child your undivided attention to express his/her feelings or fears. Tell them it's normal to experience these things.

2. Focus on the positive aspects of going to school such as being with friends, learning a favorite subject and playing at recess. Talk through previous triumphs and remind them of their own successes with previous situations.

3. Pay attention to your behavior Kids often feed off the anxiety and energy they sense in the adults around them. That's why it's important that you remain calm and positive. The more confidence and comfort you can model, the more your child will understand there is no

4. Get back into a routine A week or two before school, start preparing your child for the upcoming transition by getting back into school year routines like realistic bedtimes and selecting tomorrow's clothes.

5. Be patient Erasing anxiety can take time and each day can bring new challenges. Be patient with your child and with yourself, there isn't a one-size-fits-all solution to childhood anxiety.



MADISON - Where should state environmental officials focus efforts to protect surface water quality in

State officials are seeking public comment on a draft list of five water quality standards topics proposed as priorities for protecting Wisconsin's lakes and rivers. Specifically, these priorities relate to the protection of public health, recreation, fish and other aquatic communities within the state's waterbodies.

This prioritization process, which occurs every three years, is called the triennial standards review. The topics under consideration address things such as levels of toxic pollutants and algal toxins as well as guidance for implementing water quality standards.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is proposing to revise some existing standards because of new information about levels of exposure to certain contaminants and to reflect changes in federal regulations or recommendations. Also under consideration is the development of standards for certain emerging contaminants that may need to be monitored and

Any actual changes to standards must be approved by the Natural Resources Board, the Wisconsin Legislature and the U.S. Environmental Protection

There are many potential standards-related topics that may benefit from a review under this process. However, due to limited resources, not all of the changes can be addressed at the same time. The DNR has developed a draft list of water quality standards priorities to work on for the next three years and is seeking public

Stakeholders are invited to comment on DNR's draft priority list from August 28 to October 5, 2018. The draft report of the 2018 - 2020 TSR priorities, which includes the list and topic descriptions, is available by searching the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for "triennial

Conservation Wardens reminder to ATV and UTV riders: "Wear it, Wisconsin!"



MADISON - With more crashes involving all-terrain and utility-terrain vehicles this late summer state conservation wardens are urging all operators and riders to remember safety steps. Wisconsin has seen 16 fatal crashes involving all-terrain and utility-terrain vehicles this year.

Gary Eddy, off-highway administrative warden with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, says wardens statewide are encouraging all operators and riders to "Wear it Wisconsin!"

"That means wearing helmets for ATVs and UTVs, and your seat belts on an UTV," Eddy said.

Anyone under the age of 18 must wear a helmet, and that helmet must meet U.S. Department of Transportation standards.

Eddy says a common factor in fatalities is the lack of wearing helmets and not wearing the UTV seatbelt.

Versatile vehicles best used with safety in mind

"These machines are popular for work and for play, and their use continues to grow in Wisconsin," Eddy said. "Since you can't predict when an incident will occur, it is best to protect yourself and your passengers for that possibility. Simply put on the helmet, fasten the safety straps and click the seatbelt."

"It is always important to remember safety while operating these vehicles for work or recreational purposes," Eddy said. "These machines are often operated on paved surfaces and across rough terrain. These conditions bring their own set of hazards. That's why the use of safety equipment is so important. Many of these tragedies may have been prevented had seat belts and helmets been used."

Eddy urges all ATV and UTV owners to spread the "Wear it Wisconsin" message by setting a personal rule that helmets and seat belts are always used on their machines. Also, educate others you know on the importance of using helmets and seat belts. "A little positive peer pressure on your family and friends can help," Eddy said. "We want everyone to stay safe and have fun while using these versatile vehicles. Here are more of

Warden Eddy's safety tips for all ATV-UTV riders:

Never drink and ride. ATVs and UTVs are challenging enough to operate sober; adding alcohol endangers everyone around you. Practice "Zero Alcohol" and wait until you're done operating all vehicles before consuming alcohol.

-- "Seize the keys:" Control who and when your machine is being operated.

--Complete an ATV safety course. All ATV riders at least age 12 (and UTV operators at least age 16) and born after January 1, 1988 must complete a course prior to operating an ATV or UTV. This course may be completed either in a classroom or over the internet. Search the Wisconsin DNR website for ATV Safety" to learn more.

--Use extreme caution while operating on paved surfaces. ATVs and UTVs highly unstable on paved surfaces and cannot be operated in the same manner as a car. All maneuvers must be made in a slow, controlled manner. Corners cannot be taken at the same speed as other motor vehicles.

--Never ride alone. If a mishap happens, you may need immediate help.

--Slow down, be responsible and expect to meet other people while on trails.

--Stay on the right side of the trail. Rough terrain and puddles are part of the experience; don't endanger others by riding on the wrong side of the trail. Cross obstacles in a controlled and safe manner.

--Don't operate your machine outside the limits or capabilities of you, the machine or the environment (trail condition, terrain, hours of darkness, etc.)

--Headlights and tail lights are required at all times while on public roads. All turns must be indicated by use of turn signals or hand signals.

ATV/UTV is among our state's favorite recreational activities in the summer months. Stay safe and stay responsible.





The Town of Nashville has once again extended the use of our town hall for this clinic, and Dr Sarah Lautzenhiser of Antigo Veterinary Clinic has graciously volunteered her services to administer these vaccinations at our clinic. Hopefully, Dr Lauren Tshida, also of Dr Sarah's clinic, will be able to assist which will expedite the waiting lines. Members of Dr Sarah's staff have also agreed to volunteer their services.



CoVantage Credit Union offers unique commercial rehabilitation financing

CoVantage Credit Union was recently awarded a \$750,000 grant from the U.S. Treasury's Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) Fund. CoVantage will offer the program until the grant is exhausted, and will continue to expand commercial lending services in the communities served.
