Conservation Corner

- Land and Water Conservation Board

Conservation Corner is a regular article produced by the Forest County Land &Water Conservation Department. For more information contact Al Murray, Land&Water Resources Technician at 715-478-1387 or by e-mail at Icc@co.forest.wi.us.

As I write the article this week, I am preparing updates from Forest County on accomplishments that have been made this year on work toward meeting the goals of the Forest County Land and Water Plan. These updates will be presented at a meeting with the Land and Water Conservation Board (LWCB) at the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) in Madison.

The LWCB connects local and state governments on conservation and farmland preservation issues. The board:

- ** Reviews county land and water plans and makes recommendations
- ** Recommends how the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection should allocate conservation funds to counties
- ** Approves releases from farmland preservation agreements (if signed before July 1, 2009)
- ** Provides a forum to discuss emerging soil and water conservation issues

The LWCB has 11 members: 3 each from county land conservation committees and state agency leaders, one Governor-appointed member serving a two-year term, and 4 Governor-appointed members representing urban, rural, river management and natural resource preservation interests.

The LWCB review of plans, determines the amount of cost share funding that comes to Forest County. The board also reviews and approves DATCP staffing grant funding which fully funds the County Conservationist position as well as 70% of an additional position and 10% of a third position.

The LWCB reviewed and approve the Forest County Land & Water Plan in October of 2017, however at the board meeting in December 2017 the board requested that Forest County present updates on its work toward the plan goals in the 1st and 3rd year of the plan in addition to the regular 5 year review of the 10 year plan.

The presentation to LWCB will include updates on department splitting which addresses some of the board's initial concerns with staffing working too much on zoning. The update will also include accomplishments of the department including assisting Pine Lake with potential dredging projects, research on the effects of historic wildfires on Forest County lakes and streams, maintaining activity with the Forest County Association of Lakes, improvements in the use of GIS and compilation of GIS data, reviews and drafting updates on the County Comprehensive Plan to promote well planned development, completion of over 120 site visits of shore land properties, and proposals for 7 cost share potential projects.

I hope all is well with the readers and I encourage all to get out and enjoy our fall colors. Scenic drive maps from many towns are available on the county website under the Visit the Forest of Wisconsin tab.

School District of Crandon to host a community forum Monday, October 15

The School District of Crandon is hosting a community forum regarding the Energy Efficiency Exemption Project that was approved in December of 2017. The forum will be held on Monday, October 15 in the school auditorium at 5:30 p.m. The board and administration recently met, reviewed the budget and felt a community forum prior to the annual meeting would be an informative opportunity for citizens living within the district's boundaries. There is also new, relevant information from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that will be shared with the community pertaining to the project. This will be an opportunity for community members to listen to a presentation involving building and grounds updates, the energy efficiency exemption project and DPI emergency rule, finance, tax levy and mill rate.

There will be an opportunity to ask questions. The goal of the forum is to help inform the electorate prior to the October 29 annual meeting. On the evening of the annual meeting, the project will have to voted on with a yes or no. Please consider attending this informational meeting to better understand how the district is trying to support student learning and community engagement. It is not likely to be a meeting of the full board, and no actions will be taken that evening, but several board members will likely be in attendance.

100th Anniversary of the end of WWI Remembering the local men who served

2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War. It was the conflict that put the U.S. on the world stage, and was the beginning of this country's dominance of world affairs. After this war, called the Great War before WWII, Europe would never be the same. The ruling families in Germany, Austria-Hungary, and Russia became part of history and would never again be in power.

Beginning in August of 1914, it was truly a world conflict with fighting between the European powers in places with colonial countries, like Africa. Europe was torn to shreds in many place by artillery and to a certain extent by the beginnings of aerial bombardment. The war also affected backwoods communities like those in Forest County and the Upper Peninsula, with young men joining the military so they wouldn't miss the "excitement." For some of these men, when the train left the depot carrying them to basic training, it would be the last time they saw their hometowns.

Why did the war occur? History books will tell you that it began with the assassination of Austrian Archduke Ferdinand and his wife in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia. This event did get the ball rolling, but the causes were deeper than that. Europe was controlled by non-elected monarchs whose only qualification for leadership was their birth right to the throne. Intelligence was not a requirement for running a country. In addition, the military leaders, who had the ears of the monarchs, usually were able to persuade them to start a war.

Over the last year, several well publicized accusations have been made against me, all of them untrue and without merit. I have long focused on the power of forgiveness and leave Crandon with no ill will and no regrets. With that, I offer everyone in the School District of Crandon my most sincere and heartfelt wishes for health and happiness in the future."

The Board of Education just took action regarding the acceptance of Dr. Kryder's resignation.

Board President, Jeff Ackley expresses his appreciation to Dr. Kryder on behalf of the of the District," The Board would like to thank Dr. Kryder for his service to the District and the students it serves. The Board is also grateful that Dr. Kryder has announced his intentions now, at the same time as the Board announces the hiring of Patrick Saunders as Interim District Administrator, providing the Board with an opportunity to conduct a thorough search for Dr. Kryder's replacement and make a seamless transition."

of the Crandon Public Library, a group that stills exists today. In 1995, I took the Director position at the Three Lakes Public Library and spent 13 years working with the community, school and taxpayers of that town. In April of 2008, the Three Lakes library was recognized as one of three top ranking libraries in the state. Later that year, the Director position at the Crandon Public Library became available and I became the Library Director in December of 2008. As the Director of the Public Library, I worked hard on the areas of youth programming and community engagement and engaged the youth in our school district every chance I got.

These community engagements included Frozen sing-alongs, weekly Story Hour programs, taking the High School Senior English class to the UW-Green Bay University Library, obtaining a grant to spotlight successful Crandon Alumni and providing an opportunity for the Crandon High School Art Club to tour the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum.

During the twenty-five years I have worked in a public library, I have served as an administrator with a full board supervising me. In this position, I was responsible for the day-to-day administration of the library, while the board was responsible for setting policy. I also was responsible for monthly board meetings, annual meetings, and developing budget documents. My role as Director also allowed me to serve as a board member on various community boards, including the Forest county library board, the Chamber board and the Community Coalition of Forest County. All of these opportunities have allowed me to gain an understanding of the Wisconsin Open Meetings laws, Robert's Rules of Order and most importantly, engagement with the community I served.

In February of 2018, I made the decision to switch careers and took a position as an UW Extension educator in Forest County. My role as a Positive Youth Development educator allows me to bring University of Wisconsin programming to Forest County youth. My current programming efforts include expanding access to 4H, maintaining and retaining young adults in our community and expanding youth leadership opportunities in the county.

As a candidate for school board, I am willing to put the time and effort into my position. I feel very strongly that our community cannot allow ourselves to define itself by one individual, the School District Superintendent. Our school district employs close to two-hundred educated, dedicated and hardworking employees, and each one of them should have the opportunity and motivation to help define the culture of our school.

Ultimately, what led to my decision to run as a candidate for the school board, was an idea that popped into my head as I sat at a recent school board meeting listening to our District Attorney discuss ethical violations related to the administration of the school. As I looked around at the frustrated, fed up, outraged and stressed community faces, the idea that popped into my head was this: "It doesn't have to be this way."

We do not need to be the School District that pays out thousands of dollars in attorney fees, while our teachers raise funds for their classrooms Facebook. We do not need to be the District that cringes each time Channel 12 arrives at our door. We cannot continue to let one man and his supporters define who we are as a District, who we are as a community. It's time to put educated, experienced people on our board who are willing to put the time and energy into making our district a reflection of our community.

There is no doubt in my mind that our community values its youth and their education. It's about time we let everyone else know that.







There is also new, relevant information from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that will be shared with the community pertaining to the project. This will be an opportunity for community members to listen to a presentation involving the following:

- Building & Grounds Update
- Energy Efficiency Exemption Project & DPI Emergency Rule (PI-15)
- Finance, Tax Levy & Mill Rate

There will be an opportunity to ask questions. The goal of having a forum is to help inform the electorate prior to the October 29th annual meeting. On the evening of the annual meeting, the project will have to be either voted yes or no. Please consider attending this informational event to better understand how the district is trying to support learning and community engagement. It is not likely to be a meeting of the full board and no actions will be taken that evening, but several board members will likely be in attendance.

Deer Hunting

No changes to deer carcass transportation rules in 2018

The proposed emergency rule regarding transportation of deer carcasses out of CWD-affected counties will not go into effect this year. Regulations regarding the transportation of deer carcasses in 2018 are the same as they were in 2017.

Registration of deer harvest is required

All harvested deer must be registered by 5:00 p.m. the day after recovery in the Deer Management Unit (DMU) of harvest or an adjoining DMU. Deer may be registered online through Game Reg, by phone at 1-844-GAME-REG (1-844-426-3734), or at a participating in-person registration station. Before you register, have the unique deer harvest authorization number ready.

Baiting and feeding regulations

In 2017, Wisconsin Act 41 amended Wisconsin Act 240 to limit the time during which the baiting and feeding of deer may be prohibited following a positive test for CWD or TB. Please check this page frequently for updates, as baiting and feeding bans will renew again with each new positive CWD/TB test result. Hunters should continue to follow local ordinances that may prohibit baiting and feeding of deer until they are notified of a

Baiting is not allowed in Forest, Langlade, Oconto or Oneida Counties

When dropping your deer off at a processor, please complete the log sheet indicating your desire to donate the deer. We'll do the rest. The donated deer will be processed and the venison will be distributed to charitable organizations to help feed Wisconsin's needy.

Drug company coupons and assistance programs

These days, a common way for people to pay for costly prescription drugs is to utilize drug manufacturer's coupons and assistance programs. For many individuals, this may be the only way to access expensive cancer, antirejection, and HIV drugs, among others. In addition, these benefits are valuable when the prescribing doctor believes the brand name drug will work better than the generic version, but the brand name drug is too expensive under the person's current health plan.

The first thing to consider is whether the drug manufacturer offers a discount for your particular prescription. For drug coupons, you need to contact the manufacturer directly. For assistance programs, you can use www.needymeds.org or Medicare's searchable list of drugs at https://www.medicare.gov/pharmaceuticalassistance-program/. Here you can click on the first letter of the drug's name to see if any programs are available for



the drugs you are taking. If your drug is on the list, you can then click on "details" for detailed information about the program. You may learn that you need to prove that you are at a certain stage in your disease, or that you have a financial need to be eligible for the assistance program.

As with any benefit, there are cautions. One thing to understand is that the drug coupons and assistance programs are just that - discounts that can be offered and taken away at any time. This means a person using a drug manufacturer's coupon or assistance program must have a back-up plan if the benefit expires or is discontinued. It is common for benefits to be available for one year only. Drug coupons and assistance programs do not count as creditable coverage for Medicare Part D. That means lateenrollment penalties will accumulate if a person is not enrolled in creditable drug coverage.

There is also the issue of using coupons while receiving Medicaid, TRICARE, or a Medicare Part D plan. Currently, CMS prohibits drug manufacturers from offering coupons for drugs paid for by a federal health plan - of which Medicaid, TRICARE, and Medicare apply. This does not mean that you can't ask for and use a manufacturer's discount, but it does mean that the manufacturer cannot try to persuade you to use the coupon or assistance program if it knows you receive health benefits from Medicaid, TRICARE, or Medicare Part

A final caution is that if you have Medicare Part D plan and are also using a manufacturer's discount, you will need to notify your pharmacy so it knows to apply the discount first, and bill Medicare second. If you do not notify your pharmacy, it is required to automatically bill your Medicare Part D plan.



WWI Anniversary Cont. from pg. 1



Teddy Roosevelt's son, Quentin, was shot down by the Germans and was buried by the Germans near the French village of Juvigny, with full military honors. He was, after all, the son of an ex-president of the U.S. The 32nd was proud to capture Juvigny and repatriate the grave of the fallen comrade.

To the various military staffs, it broke the boredom and gave them a chance for national recognition as daring and intelligent military leaders who would lead the country into glory and honor. These members of the various military staffs, however, did not do the bleeding and suffering. The average young man did most of that with the exception of some of the elite of the country who had graduated from a military school and wanted to adorn their chests with medals. For some of these elite, the honors never came, but they had fancy funerals and not common graves.

The 32nd Division was formed primarily from Wisconsin and Michigan National Guard units. Forest County sent a company of their young men to fight in the Great War, and many of them readily signed up at a recruiting party held on the courthouse square in July of 1917, after the U.S. had finally entered the war that had enveloped Europe, the Balkans and even the Middle East. Note Lawrence of Arabia, who became a household word doing battle in the sands of the Middle East. The European colonies around the world were anxious to join the fray like their friends and relatives back in Europe.

Forest County sent many of her sons off to this conflict. It is part of the landscape these days, but that granite obelisk with all of the names of the WWI veterans still deserves attention. Those names with a star are those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. None of them are still alive, of course, but they do represent patriotism, courage, and, it is safe to say, a youthful spirit of adventure.

Years back we did a story on a recruitment party on the Forest County courthouse grounds. There was live music, beer and patriotic speeches. The time was July of 1917, and the party was thrown by Captain Himes of the army reserve. Himes was from Merrill, and had come to Crandon to work for the Keith & Hiles Lumber Co. as a forester/woods boss. Himes was with Black Jack Pershing on his campaign to capture Pancho Villa after the Mexican rebel had attacked border towns in the U.S. Pershing and his men entered Mexico and tried to chase down the elusive Villa but were unsuccessful. It appears that Himes,

and Army reservist, had caught the "military bug" even if they hadn't caught Villa.

About 90 men signed up at the recruitment/beer party that day, and they came from all over Forest County. The new unit became part of the 32nd Division, 128th Infantry Regiment, Company H of the Fourth Wisconsin Infantry. A poster, that is framed at the Crandon Library, lists all of the names. They eventually went into battle in France, after leaving on the train for Camp Randall, in Madison, then to Waco, Texas for training and eventually shipping out of Hoboken, New Jersey for Brest, France. In Brest, they lived in tents and did some more training. While in Brest, Himes found himself torn from his unit and transferred to an engineer unit. It seems that the American Army needed barracks and warehouses to accommodate all of the men and supplies that were being shipped to France. He wasn't happy, but did as he was ordered, and he didn't get to lead his Forest County boys into battle.

It should be noted, that not all of the men who fought in WWI were in the 32nd Division. The list of the names on the honor roll at the courthouse has the names of men who served in a variety of units and did different functions for the various branches of the military. However, the men of Company H received a lot of notice, and there is that list of names at the library as a reference. Now, like back then, they are getting attention!

In a book published about the 32nd Division shortly after WWI, there is a list of the highlights of the 32nd in WWI. Here is a sampling:

- **Six months under fire, from May to November of 1918.
- **Fought on five fronts in three major offensives: The Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne, and Meuse-Argonne **Sustained 14,000 casualties from all causes
 - **Met and vanquished 23 German Divisions,
- capturing 2,153 prisoners

 **First American troops to set foot on German soil
- **First American troops to set foot on German soil, in Alsace, in May of 1918.

 **Over 800 officers and men decorated by
- American, French and Belgian governments

 **Composed of Wisconsin and Michigan National
- Guardsmen with the insignia of the Red Arrow, signifying that the 32nd shot through every line the enemy put before it.
- **They were called "Les Terribles" by the French because of their ferocity in battle.


