Historic Wildfires and Potential Effects on Current Lake Conditions

Could historic wildfires from the cut and run logging era have created unnatural algae blooms and weed concentrations in our lakes of today?

I have just received and reviewed this interesting article about findings of increased nitrogen, phosphorus, and mercury as related to wildfires. The article can be found at: https://e360.yale.edu/features/how-wildfires-arepolluting-rivers-and-threatening-water-supplies.

According to the article which was published by the Yale School of Forestry & Environmental studies, following a fire in the Jasper National Park in 2000, which also coincided with a study on mercury concentrations, the following statement was made:

"Following the fire, the doubling of the lake's nitrogen concentration and a quadrupling of the phosphorus concentration was not a big surprise. What was not expected was a five-fold increase of mercury in fish."

I believe there are high concentration of nitrogen, phosphorus, and mercury in the sediment in many lakes with Forest County. According to many studies in the past, most of these concentration have been blamed upon improper sewage disposal, improper farming practices, and air pollution to name a few. Has historic fire ever been

Report on Building Committee meeting on October 4th

At a Forest County Board Building Committee meeting on Thursday, October 4th, the Building Committee, including the citizen members, met with two architects from the Wendel group, David Cahiskey and Susan Lasecki, and discussed the upcoming iail/courthouse project. Like all of these meetings, they are slow and painful! But, it is a large and expensive project for the taxpayers, and decisions shouldn't be lightly made.

The dispatch center in the jail was the first order of business. Josh Bradley has done some work on this, and he was at the meeting with Jail Inspector Heidi Millenberg. The dispatch center is of the most importance, at this time, in improving the efficiency of the jail.

What was presented to the committee was a plan to separate the dispatch center project from the larger expansion in the works. According to Bradley, after meeting with Millenberg, the county can handle this project without guidance from Wendel. The plans can be made by the Sheriff's Department with guidance from Millenberg, and the project can be bid out separately from the larger project. Both Bradley and Millenberg have confidence that this will work and be affordable, plus meet state code.

The motion passed the committee to proceed with this work.

Another idea that came out of the Sheriff's Department was the addition of extra jail cells on the northeast corner of the jail. With the changing of the jailer's pod, the new cells would be visible from the new pod and help with any possible overcrowding of the jail.

This is where the meeting began to bog down. As reported in the last article on this subject, Rod Chitko, a citizen member of the committee, brought in a drawing showing an addition that could be added to the left side of the jail that could house the courtroom, the judge's office and other necessary offices, plus extra jail cells, built on a basement that would provide room for storage and other needs. This is an idea that has been had by numerous people following the project.

However, the architect's version, that was discussed at this meeting, not only placed the court room and attendant infrastructure there, but connected this proposed new structure with the existing north courthouse addition. Plus, extra offices were proposed for the north end of the north addition. The new plan also called for the removal of the old jail and sheriff's residence on the south end of the courthouse complex.

The issue of the old jail and residence, to say the least, has been confusing. The Samuels Group stated that this 1910 structure was sound, but that the 1966 addition that connects the 1909 courthouse with the old jail was not sound. At the next meeting, it was announced that the old jail wasn't sound. The recently discovered 2009 study finds the structure sound. But, at this meeting, the architects thought it should come down, because, as it was explained, it wasn't sound, and a parking lot should be built on the site after demolition.

The Crandon School District Recall Primary Election was held on Tuesday October 9, 2018. The election was for one seat on the board currently held by Laura Bauknecht. The reason this was a primary election in a recall was because state laws states that if more then two people run for one position, a primary election will be held and the top two candidates will move on to vote to be held four weeks later. Michelle Gobert and Bryan Schallock were the top two candidates and they will be on the ballot on the November 6, 2018 election. Michelle Gobert received 278 votes, Bryan Schallock received 147 votes, Jamie Thomaschefsky received 101 votes and Laura Bauknecht received 61 votes. Laura Bauknecht will hold the seat until after the November 6 election results have been canvassed. For a break down of how the towns voted a chart is on page 18 of this paper.

DNR needs wolf trackers

Wisconsin's wolf monitoring program relies upon volunteers from around the state to help track animals each winter - individuals who are interested in playing a key role in wildlife management are encouraged to sign up for one of several classes offered statewide.

Department of Natural Resources biologists and volunteers have partnered to provide informative classes focused on aspects of wolf ecology, population biology and field study techniques. Tracking is a great way to experience the outdoors and contribute to natural resource management.

Carnivore tracking classes focus on learning to identify the tracks of medium to large-sized carnivores in Wisconsin, as well as a few other common mammals. Completion of both classes is required to participate in the wolf monitoring program as a volunteer carnivore tracker.

"DNR staff and volunteers tracked over 16,000 miles last winter searching for wolf, coyote, bobcat, and other medium to large size carnivore tracks in Wisconsin," said DNR wolf biologist Nathan Kluge. "It's a great way to get out and enjoy Wisconsin in the winter while helping the department monitor some of the state's most interesting wildlife.'



PROCLAMATION of snow emergency PARKING REGULATIONS

Pursuant to Section 7.03(4) of the Municipal Code of the City of Crandon, I, Mayor of the City of Crandon, Dennis Rosa declare an emergency by proclamation, and by such proclamation, prohibit the parking of vehicles on all streets and avenues within the city closer than 15 feet to the center of such streets and avenues between 3:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. between November 1, 2016 and April 30, 2017 to enable the City of Crandon to effectively remove snow from such streets and avenues. Violation of these regulations shall be enforced as provided in the Municipal Code of the City of Crandon, and as otherwise provided for by law.

Further, in addition to the forfeiture specified, any vehicle parked in violation of these regulations may be impounded by the Chief of Police at a place designated by him; and the owner of such vehicle may be subject to the payment of the costs of such impoundment and in the event of the failure to pay such costs, such vehicle may be sold as provided by law and the proceeds of such sale applied toward payment of such costs and the costs of sale.

NOTICE City of Crandon 8.06 SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

(1) SIDEWALKS TO BE KEPT CLEAR. The owner or occupant of any lot or parcel shall promptly each day remove all snow and ice which may have fallen or accumulated upon the sidewalk in front of such lot or parcel, provided when ice has so formed that it cannot be removed, the owner or occupant shall keep the same sprinkled with a material which will prevent the sidewalk from being dangerous to pedestrians. If the owner or occupant fails to comply with this subsection, the Public Works Committee shall cause the snow or ice to be removed or sprinkled as required in this subsection, the cost of which to be assessed against the property as a special tax.

(2) DEPOSIT IN STREETS RESTRICTED. No person shall deposit snow from his premises onto any street in the City without permission therefore from the Public Works Committee, which may require payment of a fee sufficient to reimburse the City for the cost of removal.



The 1966 addition is, presumably, now sound, as the demolition of this portion of the building has not been called for at this point in time.

Confused yet? Most of us who have attended these meetings are.

While a vote hasn't been taken, it seems that most of those involved in this lengthy process would like to see this unique-looking structure saved and put to productive use. The argument put out by the architects is that building new is more cost-effective. No decision was made at this

Mr. Cihaskey, the Wendel architect made the point that we need 20,000 square feet, wherever it goes. He also stated that he is trying to keep the cost between \$11 and 13 million. Everyone agrees that this is a better number than the \$23-26 million the taxpayers looked at in the brochure that was initially mailed out.

One of the other topics talked about is that this project can be done in phases after establishing the priorities, which is deciding what is needed first and what can be done at a more leisurely pace, spacing out the debt and not putting the full amount on the taxpayer at one time.

As an observer at these meetings, I cannot always tell what the first priorities are, but these are details

that can be worked out as the committee work goes on.

Certainly, the committee has to decide what to do with the old jail/sheriff's residence. That it will require an expenditure to keep the old structure is for certain. As has been said before, the removal of lead paint and any asbestos in the building has to be done whether the building is razed or remodeled. If it is to be saved, it also has to be put to a good purpose. This will likely be based on the needs of county government at some point in time, and whether or not the structure will be saved or removed, the abatement of lead and asbestos can be started in the near future.

So, the process grinds on, and patience and practical thinking are the resources needed to make the project a success for the citizens of the county.

Editor's Note: The jail/sheriff's residence was started in 1910, but someone, probably the Samuel's Group said it was built in 1940. It has been referred to as the 1940 structure, but looking at the photo above, it is obvious that the WWI Memorial is not there, meaning that the structure was there before the end of WWI and before the building of the monument.







As told in last week's article on WWI, Forrest Himes held a recruiting party at the courthouse in July of 1917. The details of this get together were in a ledger in the Vet's office in the courthouse, but the ledger has disappeared these days. Regardless, the recruitment party did occur, and Company H of the 32nd Division was formed from the volunteers. This was a beer party, by the way, and while some of the young guys had no intention of joining up, the beer and the patriotic speeches brought many into the ranks. Many of these young inebriated men slept under the trees at the courthouse, and as one of them told me, he woke up when Himes kicked the bottom of his foot and said; "Get up soldier!" He knew then he had signed up.

The two photos below are likely from that event. They are taken from the Cronce collection. The photos were not marked, so this is a good guess that the top shot is of the party, and the one below of the new recruits drilling at the fairgrounds. Himes started drilling his new recruits the morning after the party, and I was told that it was no fun having a hangover with Himes bellering commands in their

The new recruits did their training in Waco, Texas,



This is likely the recruiting party from 1917. It would appear that the beer tent is about where LaFetta is today. None of those smiling people knew what their young men were going to face in France. It was a big adventure!





Another new technology that was used in WWI was the truck. This is from the Art Bock collection. Art served in the Motor Truck 318 unit. Getting supplies to the troops was a constant job. Besides ammo and artillery rounds, the troops had to eat and needed medical supplies on a daily basis. Horses and wagons were also used, and when the roads were muddy, they probably did a better job getting to the front than trucks. Driving a truck was a much cleaner job and safer than serving in the trenches, but it was hazardous to be on roads that were targets for German



Opioid abuse on the rise to the doctor in older adults

By the GWAAR Legal Services Team As the population of older adults in the United States grows, opioid misuse and abuse among older Americans is becoming an increasingly urgent public health concern. Opioids are a category of prescription drugs that are intended to manage pain from surgery, injury or illness. However, opioids are incredibly addictive, and many patients who are prescribed opioids for pain abuse these medications and become addicted. Although people believe that younger individuals are mor likely to become addicted to opioids, seniors are at greater risk of developing an addiction than younger adults because seniors are more likely to suffer from chronic

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration estimates that the population of older adults in the United States who misuse or abuse opioids will double from 2004 to 2020, from 1.2 percent to 2.4 percent. In Wisconsin, opioid dependence or prescription opioid poisoning hospitalized more than 4,000 individuals aged 55 or older in 2016. In 2017, there were almost 1,000 emergency ambulance runs on Wisconsin residents aged 55 or older for suspected, unintentional opioid overdoses. In addition, the number of opioid overdose deaths in Wisconsin adults over 55 has risen dramatically, from 10 deaths in 2002 to 148 deaths in

It can be hard to tell when older adults are misusing or abusing opioids because the symptoms can look like other medical conditions. Here are some signs that could mean a person over 55 is at risk:

- Appearing over-sedated, disoriented or
- Poor balance or unsteady walking Requesting early refills on prescriptions
- · Reporting that their medications have been lost or stolen (especially if this occurs more than once)
 - · Poor hygiene or messy appearance

- · Appetite changes
- Mood swings or major personality changes
- Increased isolation
- Demanding narcotic or opioid prescriptions at visit

Apparent doctor shopping

Unfortunately, many older adults in the U.S. are being prescribed opioids. In 2016, one out of every three Medicare beneficiaries received at least one prescription opioid through Medicare Part D, according to data from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Most of these opioids are classified as having the highest potential for abuse among legally available prescription drugs. In addition to the risk of addiction, opioid use can also pose health risks like breathing complications, confusion, drug interaction problems, and an increased risk of falls, which can be particularly dangerous for older adults.

Because of these concerns, Congress is taking steps to address opioid misuse in older adults. The U.S. House of Representatives recently passed a bill, H.R. 5685, that would require the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to develop educational materials for Medicare beneficiaries about opioid use, pain managment, and alternative pain management treatments. CMS will include this information in the "Medicare and You" handbook that it mails to Medicare beneficiaries each year. The Senate has not vet voted on this bill.

In Wisconsin, the Department of Justice, the Department of Health Services, and other agencies are working to educate Wisconsin residents about opioid misuse and abuse. For more information, please see https://doseofrealitywi.gov/.

The legislature's Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules voted to suspend portions of an emergency rule that would have restricted deer carcass transportation in CWD-affected counties at its Oct. 1 meeting.

As a result, carcass transport regulation changes included in the original emergency rule, approved by the Natural Resources Board at its Aug. 8 meeting, are not in effect as previously announced. The 2018 deer hunting

regulations and deer carcass movement restrictions webpage have been updated to reflect this change and revert back to 2017 carcass transportation rules.

It is important to note that it remains illegal to transport whole wild deer carcasses and certain parts of those carcasses from CWD-affected counties to areas outside of CWD-affected counties, unless these deer carcasses or parts are being transported to an adjacent county or to a licensed taxidermist or licensed meat processor within 72 hours of the deer being registered. This restriction applies to all CWD-affected counties, including those where a baiting and feeding ban is no longer in effect.

Proper disposal of deer carcass waste is an effective preventative measure to reduce risk of disease transmission. While the emergency rule has been suspended, Department of Natural Resources staff continue to encourage hunters who harvest a deer in a CWD-affected county to voluntarily keep that deer carcass in the county of harvest or limit movement to an adjacent CWD-affected county, unless the hunter transports the carcass to a licensed taxidermist, meat processor, or landfill through regular waste disposal systems such as curbside pick-up.

The following links provide additional information: deer waste disposal sites; and recommendations for stopping the spread of CWD.

Deer hunters play a key role in preventing the spread of CWD in Wisconsin, and DNR staff encourage hunters to have harvested deer tested for CWD and to adhere to baiting and feeding bans. For more regarding CWD in Wisconsin, visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "CWD."



considered for these sediment concentrations?

The Forest County area had many un-natural wildfires that were fueled by the cut and run era of logging. Fires across Forest County occurred frequently and lasted decades from about 1880 until the early 1940's. During this time the fuel for fires within Forest County comprised largely of conifers such as pine which would be similar to fuel composition of western fires today. I believe we could assume that results of current studies on the effects of wildfire could be utilized to infer results of water quality on historic wildfire.

Thinking in terms of the historic wildfires in Forest County and the amount of area contained within the watersheds that drain through Forest County Lakes I believe this unrelated study and other studies can show that historic fires may very well have caused the largest concentrations of nitrogen, phosphorus, and mercury in the sediment of our lakes. Other issues since then likely also contributed to the cause.

The reference article also makes reference to green algae growth in cold water streams that were the result of increased phosphorus and nitrogen in the


streams as a result of the fires. The phosphorus, nitrogen, and mercury contents in the sediment will remain in the sediment. I think we can assume any disturbance of the sediment from wave action, boats or water shifting will bring those increased "un-natural" concentrations back into the water column and result in algae blooms and also result in "un-natural" concentrations of weed growth.

Now I ask you as a reader of this column, what could solve this polluted sediment issue? Some of the lake associations have begun the process to propose dredging as a potential solution, however state and federal regulations are large roadblocks to these proposals. Future articles will provide updates on dredging as information becomes available.

I hope this has stirred your interest in our history as well as interest in the quality of our lakes. Remember, our actions today affect the environment and water quality for those in the future!
