Conservation Corner Non-Metallic Mines

In the last few weeks I have been completing reviews of permitted non-metallic mines (otherwise known as gravel pits) across the county. In all, Forest County has 20 mines with reclamation permits. Reclamation permits are required under county ordinance for every mine where material is sold or utilized commercially. Mines utilized by the owner for use on their own lands or utilized only for municipal purposes are not required to have a permit. There are 34 additional non-metallic mines in Forest County which do not require a permit, with the US Forest Service operating 15 of those and remaining 19 operated by towns, the county, companies and private landowners.

Energy Effeciency Exemption is approved with annual school budget in Crandon

The School District of Crandon held their annual meeting on Monday, October 29th, at 6:00 p.m. in the school auditorium. The goal at the meeting this year was to approve the budget for the 2018-2019 year with the Energy Efficiency Exemption and to approve tax levies for funds 10, 38, 41 and 80 totaling \$7,210,708. All were approved.

The Energy Efficiency Exemption allows the district to levy \$463,495 for two years and use that money to update and improve the building without taking money out of savings and operational costs. The district is facing a deficit of about \$750,000 right now and the deficit is projected to get worse over the coming years if the district stays idol. The district did feel that they would have to have some short term borrowing in November or December. The district also said that they would probably be looking at a recurring referendum by April of 2020. The referendum would go into effect in the fiscal year 2021. The referendum would be used for operational costs, meaning staff and education of the children.

The district also stated they were trying to save where they could. For instance, when someone retires, they will not rush out to hire somebody, but see what they could do to save. The board assured everyone that they are not cutting staff to save. Erica Neilitz suggested that the district have a master plan for 5 or 10 years. The board responded that they are open to that idea and that they were making strides to having one.



Preliminary 2018 Wisconsin black bear harvest numbers available

MADISON - Preliminary registration numbers show hunters harvested 3,685 black bears during the 2018 Wisconsin bear hunting seasons. This represents a decrease of 11 percent from the 4,136 black bears harvested in 2017.

"Wisconsin's bear population remains healthy, and the 2018 season again provided hunters excellent opportunities to share time in the woods with family and friends," said Scott Walter, large carnivore specialist with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. "The slight decline in harvest this year was to some extent expected, as we reduced the harvest quota in 3 of our 4 bear management zones to achieve population management goals.

While reports from hunters during the season were varied, hunter success was very similar to previous years across most of the state, with over half of hunters in most areas harvesting a bear. Zone C, which includes central and southern Wisconsin saw just over half the quota harvested, with 9 percent of hunters registering bears.

"Data provided by hunters through registration really serves as the backbone of our bear population management process, and we appreciate their commitment to sound, science-based management," said Walter.

Interest in black bear hunting continues to increase in Wisconsin, with over 124,000 hunters applying for either a harvest permit or preference point for the 2018 season.

"With participation in many forms of hunting on the decline, the passion Wisconsin bear hunters have for our bear resource, the hunting experience, and for introducing new hunters to the outdoors is wonderful to see," said Walter. "Now is definitely an exciting time for Wisconsin's bear program. We've got new population monitoring tools in development, an extremely engaged community of bear hunters, and a healthy and expanding bear population."

2018-19 ruffed grouse hunting season shortened in Zone A

MADISON - An emergency rule is now in effect to move the season closing date for ruffed grouse hunting in Zone A from Jan. 31, 2019 to Dec. 31, 2018.

The ruffed grouse season opened Sept.15 in Zone A. The change does not impact season dates for Zone B, which runs from Oct. 20 to Dec. 8, 2018. Bag limits remain at five birds in Zone A and three birds in Zone B.


Emergency rules are effective for 150 days, so the early closure only applies to the 2018-19 season. Department of Natural Resources staff have begun working with partners on a statewide ruffed grouse management plan that will outline the future of ruffed grouse management in Wisconsin. This plan is expected to be completed in early 2020.

The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board approved this emergency rule at its Sept. 26 meeting. For more information regarding ruffed grouse hunting in Wisconsin, search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for "ruffed grouse."



Each year permitted sites have the areas calculated utilizing GPS and the sites are reviewed for reclamation activities and potential issues that may affect reclamation. Area determinations are utilized to calculate the annual fees required for the mine to operate. These fees are based upon acreage with portions retained by the County and part of the fee paid to the State of Wisconsin.

The area is also required to calculate the amount of reclamation bond which the operator needs to maintain to insure that the mine area follows the reclamation plan. Bond amounts of \$3,000 per acre are required to be maintained for each acre which is not reclaimed. The bonds, in the form of letters of credit, cash, or actual bonds from bonding companies are held by Forest County to insure appropriate reclamation of mine sites.

Reclamation of sites include water resource protections such as retention berms and silt fence to retain storm water in wetlands established with a site. Reclamation also includes leveling of sites to no more than a 3:1 slope and seeding and planting of sites to native vegetation to prevent and eliminate future erosion. Some sites have active reclamation on part of the mine as they become inactive, others wait to complete reclamation when all activity is complete.

If you know of commercial activity on non-metallic mines or if you have concerns with the operation of a nonmetallic mine in your area, please contact our office. Actively monitoring non-metallic mines to insure proper reclamation is just another way that Forest County Land Conservation strives to maintain our water quality and our natural beauty for all to enjoy while providing for business opportunities and providing materials that we need everyday!





and seek native alternatives A 'bittersweet' message about colorful autumn arrangements

MADISON - Homeowners and decorators creating their autumn displays should avoid two invasive plants that have been used historically in Thanksgiving and other floral arrangements but are increasingly recognized as harmful to forests, wetlands, prairies, and other wild areas.

Oriental bittersweet and multiflora rose offer attractive red accents but their use in holiday decorations and their disposal in compost piles increases the risk that these invasive plants will spread to new sites, says Matt Wallrath, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources outreach coordinator working with the plant nursery, aquarium, pet, and bait industries to prevent the sale and distribution of invasive species. "Our wild lands and conservation areas are threatened by these non-native plant species, which can outcompete native plants and displace native wildlife," Wallrath says. "Vendors and consumers should seek native plant alternatives instead and avoid these invasive plants, which are illegal to sell or distribute in Wisconsin." Oriental bittersweet (Celastrus orbiculatus) is a vine that spreads in forest understories and is known to kill mature trees by strangling their trunks. Multiflora rose (Rosa multiflora) is a shrub that can form impenetrable bramble thickets that impede hunters and other recreationalists, while shading out native plant species. The colorful fruits of these species are often eaten by birds and dispersed to areas far from their origin. Once established, these species are difficult to control. Even when these plants are cut down close to the soil, they re-sprout from roots remaining belowground.

including American bittersweet (Celastrus scandens), winterberry (Ilex verticillata), and native roses like smooth rose (Rosa blanda). "Native alternatives can add vivid color without posing a threat to our Wisconsin plants and animals," Kearns says.

To control the spread of invasive species, Wisconsin regulates the importation and sale of more than 140 plants, as well as some animals, that have been identified as invasive in Wisconsin. Oriental bittersweet and multiflora rose are on the list of restricted species on the Wisconsin invasive species rule (Wis. Adm. Code ch. NR 40), making it illegal to transport, introduce, gift, buy, sell, or trade these plants unless you are trying to control or safely dispose of them. Search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for "invasive species rule" to find an interactive list of invasive species, with factsheets, photos, identification tips, and more.



Local school districts receive School Safety Grants Focused on Mental Health

Madison ... Representative Jeff Mursau (RCrivitz) was happy to learn that five area school districts were awarded funds from the Wisconsin Department of Justice's (DOJ) School Safety Grant Program this month. There were 595 schools and school districts that applied for this second round of grant funding, and so far 549 grants have been awarded, and the DOJ is reviewing the remaining applicants before awarding the final funds. Of the schools and school districts receiving a grant are five that serve families and communities in or connected to the 36th Assembly District:

- ** Bonduel School District - \$42,400
- ** Crivitz School District - \$43,671
- ** Gillett School District - \$28,923

** Goodman-Armstrong Creek School District -\$10,000

Oconto Falls Public School District - \$95,537

"I am glad so many schools in the district will be receiving this grant funding," said Mursau. "These funds are an important step in developing school-based mental health programs."

The School Safety Grant Program was created by last session's bill, 2017 Act 143. The program is administered by the Office of School Safety at the DOJ and is set to award a total of \$100 million in grant funds to Wisconsin schools to enhance school safety and preparedness. This second round of grants are focused on improving student mental health and creating local School Safety Intervention teams, along with additional structural and physical security updates.

Schools that receive a grant are required to train 10% of their staff in advanced adolescent mental health and create a School Safety Intervention Team (SSIT). These teams are based on a model from the U.S. Secret Service and will be made up of educators, counselors and law enforcement. They will be tasked with threat assessment and behavior monitoring in order to identify potential students in need of support or intervention. Information about these teams, the grant program and award process, or the full list of awarded schools can be viewed on the DOJ website: https://www.doj.state.wi.us/office-school-safety/officeschool-safety. "We all want to make sure our kids get the most out of their education experience, so they can have a great foundation for their futures," expressed Mursau. "By investing in these safety and mental health measures, we can hopefully create a positive learning environment for all students."

State health officials announced that the Forest County Health Department has successfully passed the state's health department review. As a result, the Forest County Health Department will maintain their Level II status.

"Local public health staff help make their community a healthier place in which to live, play, work, and learn," said Karen McKeown, State Health Officer. "The department has an actively engaged and supportive Board of Health, and does an excellent job of efficiently meeting the needs of the community and building strong partnerships across the county."

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services is required to formally review the operations of all 86 Wisconsin local health departments at the county or municipality level at least every five years. The review establishes the health department as a level I, II or III agency. All agencies must meet the minimum requirements of a level I health department and agencies must provide an additional 7 to 14 programs or services to meet the requirements of a level II or III health department.

smoking; **WIC, Prenatal Care Coordination and other services

Myth-busting mental health issues in older adults

Many people equate depression and other mental health issues with aging. However, positive mental health as one grows older is certainly possible. Perfect physical health is not necessary to have a positive mental health outlook. Some characteristics of positive mental health in older adults include:

• Embracing aging in a happy and healthy way

• Getting out and being physically and socially active and engaged, despite any physical or mental limitations

• Having a good support system in place, including doctors, family and friends

• A sense of purpose, hope, and the ability to contribute to society

Self-control, self-advocacy and being proactive
 Independence

Myth #1: Aging is a disease

Aging is often seen as a factor for physical problems, poverty institutional care and poor mental health. However, aging happens to all of us. It is not a disease.

Myth #2: Many elderly people have mental illnesses.

Most older people do not have a mental illness. However, among those who do, Generalized Anxiety Disorder (GAD) is the most prevalent anxiety disorder. GAD is a "global" anxiety, where it is difficult to verbalize the actual fear. GAD is the top anxiety disorder among adults. Depression can increase in nursing homes. Untreated mental illness can lead to Alzheimer's. Those who have mental health issues tend to visit the Emergency Room more often and be prescribed multiple medications.

Myth #3: Depression and anxiety are not medical conditions.

Medical professionals diagnose mental health issues using the DSM-5. People can be diagnosed with mental health disorders if their activities of daily living (ADLs) such as brushing teeth and showering are lacking. 20%-40% of people diagnosed with major depression are also diagnosed with chronic pain. 15%-20% also have heart disease, 11%-15% have diabetes, and 30%-50% have strokes.

Myth #4: Mental health issues are due to moral flaws or a social failing.

Depression, anxiety, and other mental disorders are typically the result of a loss of independence, chronic illness, a co-morbid substance use disorder, major losses (such as the death of a family member), and/or medication mismanagement.



The CDC's number one recommendation for those with mental health issues is behavioral activation. This is where a person slowly increases his or her physical activity and social engagements. 80% of people who use this strategy have a positive outcome.

It is important to stay connected to others when a mental health condition is being treated. Friends, family and doctors can and should help advocate for the person. It is important to be vigilant in making sure the person takes his or her medication.

If anyone you know is having a mental health crisis, please contact 911 or a 24-hour hotline such as 1-800-273-8255. If you are with the person during their crisis, you should remain with them until help arrives. **Bus Schedule**

As would be expected, there were a lot of concerned citizens who worry about having a sex offender in their midst and those especially concerned are the people with children on Sand Lake Road and in nearby Mole Lake.

Mr. Levasseur's past offenses include sexually assaulting a 7 year-old acquaintance in Minnesota. In addition, he sexually assaulted a 6 year-old male and an 11 year-old female in Forest County. According to the Sheriff's press release, he has a history of sexually assaulting children. The Forest County assaults happened in 1999, and he has been incarcerated since.


According to this press release, Levasseur will be placed on Intensive Supervision and will be subject to the Global Positioning System (GPS) from an ankle bracelet that is locked on.

From the meeting we learned that Levasseur will be checked on at unspecified times during the night and day to make sure that he is still in the domicile or within 150 feet of the house.

As would be expected, there was nobody in the meeting room that wanted Levasseur to move into the neighborhood. Dolly McGeshick pointed out that kids go to Sand Lake to swim and they pick berries on Sand Lake Road, and that the kids have "....lost their rights with his presence on the road." Dolly was applauded by those attending the meeting.

Regardless of public opinion, the people at the meeting from the Department of Corrections said he would be placed, and was within days living on Sand Lake Road. According to the Corrections people, it takes a decision by a judge to change Levasseur's place of residence, and he will likely be joined at this domicile by a second sexual offender.

It should be noted that the committee that picks the sight is called the Act 184 Committee, and it is composed of local citizens from various departments of the courthouse. There are 11 members. This committee was told by the judge that if they didn't pick a supervised residence somewhere in Forest County he would be released without supervision.



Myth #5: Mental health issues are easily recognized.

Because many older people believe depression is a normal part of aging, many of them go untreated as symptoms are often missed. Depression may present itself in an atypical way, leading others to believe it is the start of dementia. Atypical presentation may include irritation and agitation. Some with depression may not cry or say they're sad at all.

Pseudo-dementia is where a person has forgetfulness, a lack of concentration, a lack of ADLs, clouded thinking and/or a lack of motivation. These can actually be symptoms of depression, so this person may need to see a doctor for evaluation.

Myth #6: There are no effective treatments for mental health disorders.

There are many evidence-based treatments for depression and anxiety, such as SSRIs, SNRIs, NDRIs, psycho-social support and cognitive behavioral therapies. It may take six weeks to two months for the person to see results though. Creek



Trump Signs Senator Baldwin's Opioid Crisis response reforms into law

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, President Trump signed into law a number of Senator Baldwin's bipartisan reforms to combat the opioid crisis in Wisconsin.

As a member of the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee, Senator Baldwin authored key reforms included in bipartisan legislation which passed the Senate earlier this month.

Senator Baldwin worked to include provisions that will help prevent the flow of illegal fentanyl, opioids and methamphetamine from other countries; extend and expand investments in local prevention, treatment and recovery efforts; and provide more resources to combat the growing methamphetamine problem in Wisconsin.

"I've met with local health officials, law enforcement and those who have lost loved ones throughout Wisconsin, and it's clear Washington must do more to be a stronger partner in supporting local prevention, treatment and recovery efforts," said Senator Baldwin. "In Wisconsin, we have seen a spike in fentanyl overdose deaths and a growing problem of methamphetamine abuse in our state. That's why I have worked to provide more resources and flexibility to help Wisconsin fight this epidemic, and to stop the flow of illicit drugs, like fentanyl, meth and illegal opioids, coming from other countries into America. These bipartisan reforms are an important step forward and will help provide Wisconsin the tools we need to save lives."

Prevent the flow of illegal fentanyl, opioids, and meth from other countries

The Opioid Crisis Response Act of 2018 includes a bipartisan reform introduced by Senator Baldwin that would help stop the flow of illegal opioids, fentanyl, methamphetamine and other illicit drugs into the country through International Mail Facilities.

The Restricting Entrance and Strengthening the Requirements on Import Controls for Trafficking (RESTRICT) Illicit Drugs Act, introduced with Senator Bill Cassidy (R-LA), would give the FDA more tools to prevent illegal fentanyl, opioids and other illicit synthetic drugs from entering the country at the border through our International Mail Facilities.

Recently, communities across Wisconsin have seen dramatic increases in illicit fentanyl overdoses. According to the Milwaukee County Medical Examiner's Office, in 2018, there have been 193 confirmed opioidelated overdose deaths and 117 confirmed fentanyl-related overdose deaths in Milwaukee County. Stronger support for local prevention, treatment and recovery efforts Earlier this year, Senator Baldwin led the effort to include an additional \$1 billion in the FY2018 omnibus spending bill signed by President Trump for the Opioid State Targeted Response Grant program. The Opioid Crisis Response Act of 2018 includes provisions from Baldwin's Opioid Response Enhancement Act to expand and extend the Opioid State Targeted Response Grant program to provide states and tribal communities more resources for local prevention, treatment and recovery efforts. The grant program was established as part of the bipartisan 21st Century Cures Act that Senator Baldwin worked to pass in Congress.

The representatives will meet as often as needed, allowing the people in each township to take their concerns to their representatives and have their voices heard, because they cannot be heard unless they are on the agenda. This will help the School Board have greater insight on the thoughts and concerns of community members, especially when the current School Board discusses possible referendums.

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
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
