The Crandon Area Historical society is pleased to announce its Monday, December 3, "History on Tap" program will feature Wisconsin author and naturalist John Bates beginning at 7 p.m. at the historic Hotel Crandon restaurant and bar. The program will feature John's newest book titled "Our Living Ancestors: the History and Ecology of Old-growth Forests in Wisconsin and Where to Find Them."

Old-growth forests touch the soul of many people. Some hear the echoes of Native Americans or the first settlers. Some feel the great age of the trees and revere them, while others feel they are in the presence of an overwhelmingly rare beauty. Still others understand the profound scientific value of old-growth forests as reference systems for what forests can be.

Despite the remarkable emotional appeal and scientific value of old-growth forests, they are rare in Wisconsin. Only 0.3% of Wisconsin's old-growth forests remain, but these scattered, small parcels still retain their ability to amaze hikers with their size, beauty, and elegance.

Bates, the author of nine books and a contributor to seven others, has worked as a naturalist in Wisconsin's Northwoods for 29 years. Copies of his book will be on sale after the program and will make the perfect Christmas for many people on your list!



## Nicolet Quick Start Dec. 5; new flexible class format caters to working adults

Nicolet College will hold a Quick Start event Wednesday, Dec 5, for anyone looking to enroll at the college, which now features a growing number of highlyflexible academic programs.







It is the love story of Ethel and Norman Thayer, who are returning to their summer home on Golden Pond for the 48th year. He is a retired professor, nearing 80, with heart palpitations and a failing memory - but still as tart-tongued, observant and eager for life as ever. Ethel, 10 years younger and the perfect foil for Norman, delights in all the small things that have enriched and continue to enrich their long life together.

They are visited by their divorced, middle-aged daughter and her dentist fiancé, who then go off to Europe, leaving his teenage son behind for the summer. The boy quickly becomes the "grandchild" the elderly couple have longed for, and as Norman revels in taking his ward fishing and thrusting good books at him, he also learns some lessons about modern teenage awareness- and slang - in return.



Medicare-enrolled supplier. If a supplier is not enrolled in Medicare, Medicare will not pay for the equipment. You can find a supplier online by going to www.medicare.gov and clicking on "Where can I get covered medical items?" at the bottom of the page. Type in your zipcode and click "Go." Then, choose the type of equipment you need from the categories listed and click "Search."

If possible, you should use a supplier that accepts Medicare assignment. This means that the supplier will accept the Medicare-approved amount as payment in full for your equipment. You will pay 20% of the Medicareapproved amount, and the Part B deductible applies. If a supplier does not accept Medicare assignment, that supplier may bill you for costs beyond the Medicareapproved amount.

The supplier will be able to help you with any paperwork or documentation requirements. Moreover, the supplier will be able to tell you if Medicare will allow you to buy the equipment or whether Medicare will pay for you to rent it. In addition, if the supplier thinks that Medicare will not pay for your equipment, you will get a written notice called an "Advance Beneficiary Notice of Noncoverage" (ABN). The ABN will list the equipment that Medicare is not expected to cover, an estimate of the cost of the equipment, and the reasons the supplier thinks Medicare will not pay. Finally, if the suppliers are required to submit claims on behalf of people with Medicare, this may mean the supplier



## Nicolet College "perfectly positioned" to help students fill booming middle-skills job sector

Demand for workers with skills training beyond high school continues to surge as traditional blue-collar jobs decline and shift dramatically toward more technically skilled positions.

That's according to a new landmark Georgetown University study that looked at how labor trends have shifted across the country from 1991 to 2016.

"We're seeing that exact same trend across the Northwoods," said Jeff Labs, Nicolet College Dean of Trade, Industry and Apprenticeships. "Talking with employers, there's clearly been a shift and significantly stronger demand for workers with technical skills training after high school. Nicolet is perfectly positioned to train students for those jobs."

The Georgetown study found that good jobs in middle-skills sector of the workforce – those with at least some college training after high school – was one of the fastest growing areas.

"Since 1991, good job opportunities declined by 1.8 million jobs on the high school path (and) grew by 3.5 million on the middle-skills path," Georgetown reported. "The middle-skills pathway includes workers with more education than a high school diploma, but less than a BA (bachelor's degree), including certificates, certifications, licenses, associate's degrees, and some college coursework."

The national study defined good jobs as those paying at least \$35,000 a year and averaging \$56,000 for workers with less than a bachelor's degree.

Labs noted that Nicolet is perfectly positioned to provide the training for the booming middle-skills labor sector.

"Now about two out of three jobs demand at least some education or training beyond high school," he said. "That's exactly what Nicolet offers and has been doing so for more than 50 years."

The college currently offers 62 different college credentials. These include short-term certificates, oneyear technical diplomas, and two-year associate's degrees along with various apprenticeships.

Recently the college also launched the Nicolet My Way format to make college more accessible for students, many of whom are working parents.

Instead of a traditional semester-long, 16-week

course where everybody moves through the curriculum at the same pace, Nicolet My Way programs take that same curriculum and chunk it into competencies. Students progress through the course at their own pace, mastering one competency before moving on to the next.

Nicolet My Way courses also offer a great deal of flexibility by combining online instruction with open labs where students learn hands-on skills by working one-onone instructors.

"The whole concept is for students to fit college around their lives rather than fitting their lives around college," Labs said. "Most of our students work and many also have children. They need that level of flexibility to complete the coursework at times that are best for them. For many, this is the only way they can make a college education a reality."

The college's Welding, Information Technology, Business Management, and Accounting programs are currently offered in the Nicolet My Way format. Several other academic programs are expected to adopt the structure in 2019.

The single best seed to provide is black oil sunflower, which has high fat content and attracts the most species.

Also offer nyjer (thistle) for finches, white millet for sparrows, doves, and other ground-feeding species. Offer both suet and peanut chunks for woodpeckers, chickadees, and nuthatches.

Avoid generic seed mixes as these tend to have more waste and attract less desired bird and mammal species.

Deter squirrels with cone- or dome-shaped baffles above hanging feeders or below pole-mounted feeders.

Place feeders closer than 3 feet or farther than 30 feet from your home to avoid the deadliest window collision zone.

Minimize disease by cleaning your feeders at least once every two weeks using soapy water and a 10% bleach solution.

Provide cover such as brush piles or dense shrubs for roosting and escape from predators.

Offer water to attract a wider variety of species, using a heating element when temperatures dip below freezing.

MADISON - Another Wisconsin nine-day gun deer season has come and gone, and preliminary registration numbers show an increase in statewide harvest.

Wisconsin's nine-day gun deer season continues to show hunting as a safe recreational activity, as the season ended with three hunting incidents and no hunting-related

Zone counties open through January 2019.

Hunters may use any unfilled antlerless harvest authorization during each of these hunts, but they must be used in the zone, county, and land type designated on the harvest authorization. For more information regarding which hunts may be offered in each county, check out the interactive deer map at keyword "DMU."

For the nine-day gun deer hunt, the 2018 regional harvest breakdown by Deer Management Zone (with percent change from 2017) included. Note - it should be taken into consideration that these are not exact comparisons, due to zone boundary changes

Northern Forest Zone: 26,357 (0.6 percent decrease) antlered and 16,160 (5 percent increase) antlerless;

Any hunter who failed to follow mandatory registration rules should do so now, despite having missed the deadline. The 2018 nine-day gun deer season will go into the books as one of the safest on record in Wisconsin with the DNR Bureau of Law Enforcement reporting three relatively minor firearm related incidents (Columbia, Dunn and Sauk counties) and no fatalities.

Plenty of hunting opportunities remain, and hunters are asked to keep safety their priority by knowing and following the 4 rules of firearm safety (TABK):

treat every firearm as if it is loaded;

always point the muzzle in a safe direction;

The GameReg internet registration system and call-in phone option worked well, while hunters continue to visit walk-in stations that offer these services. Positive feedback was received throughout the season as hunters enjoyed the convenience and flexibility of GameReg. On Saturday, Nov. 18 an average of 61.1 registrations were processed per minute. To date, 67 percent of harvest registrations were completed online and 33 percent were completed via telephone for the 2018 deer hunting seasons.

The accuracy of deer harvest numbers is directly related to the level of hunter compliance. If a hunter forgot to register their deer, they still have time to use GameReg and help ensure each deer harvest is counted. For more information, search keywords "GameReg."

Hunters encouraged to submit deer for chronic wasting disease sampling

Hunters are reminded that CWD sampling opportunities are available throughout remaining deer hunting seasons. To find a sampling location near you, search keywords "CWD sampling."

Because of generous contributions from numerous partners, the Adopt-a-Kiosk and Adopt-a-Dumpster programs gave hunters additional options to submit their harvested deer for CWD sampling and safely dispose of carcasses.

#### fatalities. Preliminary Registration Totals

Overall, preliminary figures show that 211,430 deer were registered during the nine-day gun deer hunt, compared to 197,733 in 2017. Of this year's total, 104,388 nine-day gun season hunters were successful in their pursuit of an antlered deer.

The largest increase in buck harvest occurred in the Central and Southern Farmland Zones (both up about 5 percent from 2017). Considering the very poor opening weekend hunting conditions in 2017, this increase is not surprising.

"We had just about ideal hunting conditions through most of the season, and many hunters reported significant rutting activity," said DNR Secretary Dan Meyer. "Considering those factors, it isn't surprising that we are hearing good reports from hunters from all corners of the state."

The nine-day hunt also provided successful hunters with 107,042 antlerless deer, an overall increase of 8.4 percent from 2017. Those numbers will climb as hunters enjoy additional hunting opportunities:

Nov. 26 to Dec. 5 - statewide muzzleloader hunt, Dec. 6-9 - statewide four-day antlerless only hunt,

Dec. 24 to Jan. 1, 2019 - nine-day antlerless only Holiday Hunt in select Farmland Zone counties; and

Hunting is a safe recreational activity, as seen in the downward trend in the number of firearm-related hunting incidents during the popular nine-day gun-deer season.

"In Wisconsin, seven of the past 10 nine-day gun deer hunts finished without a firearm hunting fatality and three non-fatal firearm incidents in 2018 is the lowest in history for this hunt," said Todd Schaller, DNR Chief Conservation Warden. "Even so, one incident is one too many - always remember safety first when you are in the field."

#### Preliminary license sales totals

In 2018, 576,277 gun deer licenses were sold through the end of the nine-day gun deer season, a 2 percent drop from 2017 gun deer license totals.

In total, 803,772 gun, archery and crossbow licenses (not including upgrades) have been sold through the end of the nine-day gun deer season, just over a 2 percent drop compared to 2017. DNR license agents sold 59 percent of licenses, while 41 percent were purchased online. Deer hunting license and harvest authorization sales will continue throughout remaining deer hunting seasons.

Hunters continue to embrace GameReg

active until all deer seasons have ended, and wildlife managers ask that hunters submit a report of what they observe during their time in the field. This information provides valuable data to improve population estimates for Wisconsin's deer herd and other species. For additional information, search keywords "deer hunter wildlife."
