

# Report on the courthouse/jail project-The new 911 Center



Report by Steve Bunda-Chair of Building Committee

At the last meeting of the Forest County Building Committee, a vote was made to hire Jeff Musson, architect, to assist the Building & Public Property Committee for development of the new 911/dispatch center in the Law Enforcement Center. Musson will help in design and in the proposals to contractors. All will be approved by the state.

Musson will also bring in an engineer to assess the structural integrity of the old jail and sheriff's residence. Should the buildings be found to be sound, the committee will then discuss who and what department will occupy the space after a remodeling process. This will also determine what the future plans will be for the HVAC and fire protection for the rest of the courthouse complex.

Two roofing contractors discussed their proposals for re-roofing the south annex of the courthouse. No decisions were made at this time by the committee.

The next meeting of the building committee will be with the citizen members of the committee. Hopefully, there will be answers on the building report as well as the 911/dispatch center, along with time lines for the projects. This meeting will be held February 5 at 5 p.m., and of course, the public is invited.

# Crandon School Board meets for regular monthly meeting

The Crandon School Board met on Monday, January 14 at 6 p.m. in the auditorium. The board welcomed the newest member, Skye Alloway. Ms. Alloway was appointed to the board at a special meeting held on January 9.

John Doane gave an update on the energy efficiency project. He stated that the main goals of the project are to update the main doors to the building, the windows and the HVAC. Local contractors are encouraged to bid. John stated that he will be the person to contact with any concerns on the project.

An update on the possible new score boards in the gymnasium was given by Mr. Josh Jaeger. Mr. Jaeger explained that the score boards in both gyms are in need of replacement. There are donations of \$60,000. The total cost of the score boards is \$109,000. The remaining bill needed to be picked up by the school or the youth basketball was going to borrow the money. This would mean that the youth basketball would benefit from the advertising rather then the school district. These new score boards have the capability of advertising and they come with a curriculum. This means that the school will be able to hold classes with students using the boards and also, the board will help pay for itself. The boards were already approved by the previous administration. The board voted that if all of the donations were in place that they would pay the remainder. The public commented that the school should take this gift, as they are receiving better score boards at a reduced price.

Mr. Valentine, the band director, made a presentation to the board about 5th grade band. Mr. Valentine would like to revitalize the program and needs funds for instruments. The board approved the funding for the 5th grade band.

The high school math teacher resignation was accepted. The district has a replacement teacher in place for the remainder of the year. There were second reads for policies on weighted grades and safety and cardiac response plans. The weighted grades policy would take affect for the 2019-2020 school year. The cardiac response plan meets qualifications with the American Heart Association. New courses to challenge the student body for the middle school and high school were approved by the board. and the U.S. Department of Education Impact Aid IPPs were approved by the board.



Dear Parent/Guardian and Community Members:

Recently, we have had situations arise during morning and afternoon student drop-off and student pick-up times. These situations give us great concern since they compromise the intended safety margins we seek for drivers, buses, walkers, visitors, etc. The greatest incidence of unsafe situations occur in the morning.

Several years ago, Crandon Schools implemented a drop-off plan involving unloading of buses, vehicles parking and vehicles dropping off students, and walking of students, employees and visitors. This plan does promote a smooth and safe traffic flow, with reasonable margins of safety for walkers.

The bus lane is for buses only, please do not use this lane at any time; instead utilize the community drop off lane. The community drop off lane is the one closest to the curb between the bus lane and the parking lot. Please refrain from letting students out in the passing/exit lane, or the driver's side, it is more dangerous and hinders traffic flow. Always have students exit curb side of your vehicle when being dropped off. Please be respectful of others and do not cut drivers off to gain curb access.

We have designated several parking spots for temporary parking to allow for parents to walk students in or for any reason you may need a short time in the school or waiting. Please do not park in the drop off lane, even if you feel you are out of the way, you will not be, and it creates congestion for traffic flow.

The most important caution we request is for vehicle drivers to DRIVE SLOWLY!

Forest County law enforcement have been very supportive of our efforts to maintain the safety of our students and adults. Forest County law enforcement have been requested to issue warning citations to drivers who exhibit unsafe driving behaviors in our parking lots. Drivers who repeatedly display unsafe driving behaviors in our lots shall be subject to a written citation and fine.

On behalf of everyone at the School District of Crandon, we truly appreciate your cooperation with our cooperative efforts to maximize the safety of our students and adults. Thank you for your support of Crandon Schools.



### U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin joins Legislation to protect Federal workers, families from losing homes, falling behind on bills during shutdown

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin joined a group of lawmakers, led by Senator Brian Schatz (D-HI) and U.S. Representative Derek Kilmer (D-WA), in introducing the Federal Employee Civil Relief Act to protect federal workers and their families from foreclosures, evictions and loan defaults during a government shutdown.

"The Trump shutdown is punishing federal workers, and contractors who are serving without pay. This legislation will protect these workers as their families face economic uncertainty and insecurity," said Senator Baldwin. "We should be respecting their hard work and it is simply wrong that they are victims of President Trump's shutdown. Both Democrats and Republicans agree we should end his shutdown and have a vote in the Senate to pass bipartisan legislation to reopen the government."

"While the President and Senate Republicans struggle to get their act together, real people are suffering," said Senator Schatz. "Right now, thousands of federal workers and their families are struggling to pay rent and make ends meet. It's absolutely unacceptable. Our bill will protect federal workers and make sure they aren't harmed because of a political stunt."

"Across 800,000 kitchen tables today, hardworking people are trying to figure out how to pay bills and provide for their families without an income," said Representative Kilmer. "Federal workers are public servants, they deserve better than being treated like pawns in a negotiation. This shutdown is wrong, and it's time to reopen the government – but until that happens, it's Congress' responsibility to help out the families most affected. This bill gives them some much needed relief."

"People who took an oath to serve their country as federal employees should not have to worry about being evicted, having their car repossessed or going further into debt because of a government shutdown," said Tony Reardon, President of the National Treasury Employees Union. "I want to commend Sen. Schatz and Rep. Kilmer for having the foresight to introduce legislation that would protect the nation's federal workforce, many of whom are suffering after nearly three weeks without pay. The Federal Employee Civil Relief Act would give frontline federal workers a reasonable amount of time to catch up on their bills once the shutdown ends and their income is restored. Federal employees around the country are grateful that there are members of Congress who are looking out for them in their time of need."

"The International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers (IFPTE) applauds Senator Schatz and Congressman Kilmer for authoring this critically important bill. This legislation will provide much needed relief to federal employees who may be facing civil actions against them due to a lapse in pay that has resulted because of the government shutdown. It is truly unfortunate that President Trump is using these civilian workers and their families as political pawns to achieve a political goal. The real life ramifications on these working Americans are hard choices between feeding their families, and meeting other financial obligations. The Federal Employee Civil Relief Act will provide impacted workers additional time after a shutdown to meet their financial obligations that would otherwise result in actions against them such as eviction, foreclosure and other civil claims. IFPTE endorses this bill, and urges all Senators to support it," said Paul Shearon, International President of the International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers.

The bill addresses the real threat of federal workers losing their homes, falling behind on student loans and other bills, having their car repossessed or losing their health insurance because they have been furloughed during a shutdown or required to work without pay. Modeled after the Servicemembers Relief Act, the legislation will prohibit landlords and creditors from taking action against federal workers or contractors who are hurt by the government

shutdown and unable to pay rent or repay loans. The bill would also empower federal workers to sue creditors or landlords that violate this protection. The Federal Employee Civil Relief Act would safeguard workers impacted by a shutdown from the following:

- · Being evicted or foreclosed;
- $\cdot \ \, \text{Having their car or other property repossessed;}$
- · Falling behind in student loan payments;
- · Falling behind in paying bills; or
- · Losing their insurance because of missed premiums.

The protection would last during and 30 days following a shutdown to give workers a chance to keep up with their bills. The partial government shutdown, now in its third week, hurts more than 800,000 federal workers in all 50 states

Cosponsors of the Federal Employee Civil Relief Act include U.S. Senators Ben Cardin (D-MD), Chris Van Hollen (D-MD), Maggie Hassan (D-NH), Martin Heinrich (D-NM), Cory Booker (D-NJ), Chris Murphy (D-CT), Sherrod Brown (D-OH), Mazie K. Hirono (D-HI), Mark Warner (D-VA) and Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV). Kilmer will introduce companion legislation in the House of Representatives with the following cosponsors: U.S. Representatives Sean Patrick Maloney (D-NY), Gerald E. Connolly (D-VA), Susie Lee (D-NV), Cheri Bustos (D-IL), Dan Kildee (D-MI), Rep. Ann McLane Kuster (D-NH), Debbie Dingell (D-MI), Brendan Boyle (D-PA) and Katherine Clark (D-MA).

### Depression: a True and Treatable Medical Condition

Depression is a true and treatable medical condition, not a normal part of aging. Older adults are at an increased risk of experiencing depression, yet depression in the elderly is often underdiagnosed and undertreated. Symptoms of depression overlap with symptoms of various medical illnesses, such as reduced energy, weight loss, and sleep disturbance. This overlap makes the diagnosis of depression challenging.

Depression is not just having "the blues" or the emotions we feel when grieving the loss of a loved one. The effects of depression extend far beyond changes in mood. Patients become less energetic, experience changes in sleep patterns, changes in their appetites, and decline in physical health. It is a true medical condition that is treatable, like diabetes or hypertension.

In the later years of a person's life, changes occur that can cause depression. These include medical illnesses, death of spouses or other loved ones, and retirement. Individuals who never experienced depression before may experience it for the first time as an older adult.

Depression and the health conditions older adults experience can create a cruel cycle. Older adults experience a health condition that makes them feel depressed. Then the depression makes them feel lethargic. Then feeling lethargic makes it more difficult to treat the health condition or their depression, and this is only likely to make both the depression and health condition worse.

In older adults, untreated depression can last for years. It can lead to or make worse other problems in physical or mental health and in relationships with others. Depression also makes suicide more likely. Older Americans have the highest suicide rate of any age group, with older men having the highest rate of suicide of any group.

Treatment can help depression and help older Americans enjoy their lives more. Treatment may help older adults better deal with other long-term health problems. Someone experiencing symptoms of depression can take the following steps:

- · Get a normal amount of sleep. Depression can affect sleep patterns by causing a depressed individual to want to sleep all the time or to not sleep much at all.
- · Exercise. Studies consistently show that physical activity improves one's mood and is often as effective as antidepressants, but without the dreaded side effects.
- · Eat healthy. Eating a lot of sugar and junk food can cause the body to experience crashes. In contrast, healthy food provides energy and nourishment.
- · Increase healthy social connections. Healthy relationships with others can greatly improve a depressed person's mood. This eliminates feelings of loneliness and isolation. If the depressed individual is physically unable to get around, inviting others over or keeping in touch via email or phone can be effective as well.

Of course, these are actions that would benefit anyone, whether they are depressed or not.

Some individuals with depression will need to be treated with medicine, counseling, therapy, or a combination of these. It is really important to follow a health care provider's instructions. Treatment for depression usually works, and may also help older adults with other medical problems. Older adults may benefit from early, continuing, and long-term treatment. As always, it is important for health care providers to review the list of drugs that their patients are taking for other health conditions, especially if older adults start to take medication to treat depression.

Most older adults' conditions improve when treated with antidepressant drugs, psychotherapy, or a combination of both. If you become aware that anyone, including an older adult, is in crisis and may hurt themselves or others, you should seek help immediately. You may need to take the following actions:

- Call 911
- · Visit a nearby emergency department or your health care provider's office
- · Call the toll-free, 24-hour hotline of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-TALK (1-800-273-8255) TTY: 1-800-799-4TTY (4889) to talk to a trained counselor.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, each year, about 42,700 new cases of cancer are found in parts of the body where human papillomavirus (HPV) is often found. HPV causes about 33,700 of these cancers.

"Early detection greatly improves the chances of successful treatment," said Corujo-Incha. "Today, a test to detect HPV is often used as a follow-up when abnormalities are detected on a Pap smear."

Each program will last approximately 20 minutes with a question and answer session of follow. Light refreshments will be provided. All attendees at each presentation will have a chance to win a Fitbit donated by Ties that Bind Us.

"Anti-cancer vaccines have been found effective in preventing the two strains of HPV most frequently found in cervical cancer," said Meyer. "Your primary doctor or Women's Health Specialist often can do the tests needed to diagnose pre-cancers and cancers and may also be able to treat precancer."
