It is the end of January and winter temperatures have finally arrived! Slight chances of snow and light snow pack has had negative effects to our local businesses, but we will survive through yet another winter in Forest County.

The Land Conservation/Land Information Department is working on many different projects with many different county departments and partner groups. One of many projects includes working with the UW Extension and other partners to increase involvement with the younger generations in natural resource issues.

The Department recently completed a soil conservation poster contest through the Land Conservation Committee. The 4 top places in the contest will receive county level prizes and will be forwarded to regional competitions at Florence on February 1. If successful at this regional competition the winners may be presented at the State and National levels.

The Forest County Association of Lakes (FCAL) will soon be starting their annual essay contest at the Crandon, Laona, and Wabeno School districts with prizes to each school. If you or your children are interested the quality of our lakes and streams, please keep yourself informed on this contest. FCAL has established this contest as well as a youth education day that happen every year.

The Department recently received information regarding the Sand Lake Conservation Camp. This camp is located at the Camp Bird Youth Camp at N8395 Caldron Falls Rd., Crivitz, WI. It is sponsored by the Marinette County Land & Water Conservation Division and the Wisconsin Land & Water Conservation Association, of which Forest County is a member. The camp will be held from June 19-21, 2019 and is open to students that will enter 6th-8th grades in the fall and have an interest in the outdoors. Registration for the camp is \$100 if postmarked on or before May 22 or \$150 if postmarked after May 22. The Forest County Land Conservation/Land Information Department and the UW-Extension are working on creating a scholarship contest for attendance at this camp. We are currently trying to locate funding to provide six Forest County students with funding to attend the camp based upon an essay. If we locate the funding, we will duplicate the current Marinette County program, in Forest County, to include a contest of a 200-300 word essay titled "Why I Want to Participate in Conservation Camp." Stopping for school buses

A note from Sheriff Dennee

I have recently received several calls and inquiries about school bus lights and the proper and safe procedures when the buses activate their lights. After receiving a lot of calls, I thought it would be important to put an informational reminder out to everyone about School Bus lights and safety.

When approaching a school bus from the front or rear and the bus is displaying its yellow flashing lights, this is a warning that the bus will be stopping soon. Drivers should reduce their speed and prepare to stop. Drivers should never see this at a time to speed up and pass the bus. The bus will next be activating its red lights and putting out the flashing stop sign. This is when all vehicles, both following and oncoming traffic, need to stop at least 20 feet from the bus.

Please know that it is not only very unsafe to pass a bus when it has activated either its yellow or red lights, it is also illegal and could result in a traffic citation. Please keep our children's safety an utmost concern at all times, but also when you are traveling and encounter a school bus.

January is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month

January is Cervical Cancer Awareness month. Nearly 13,000 women in the United States are diagnosed with cervical cancer each year. Cervical cancer is most often caused by the human papillomavirus (HPV). This disease is preventable with vaccination against HPV and proper screening. It can be cured when found early and treated.

HPV is very common in the United States and is passed from one person to another during sex. It is also common that nearly all sexually active men and women get it at some point in their lives, but few women will get cervical cancer.

Talk to your health care provider about getting the HPV test.

There are two tests that help prevent cervical cancer or find it early

-- The Pap test (or Pap smear) looks for precancers, which are cell changes on the cervix that might become cervical cancer if they are not treated appropriately.

-- The HPV test looks for the virus that can cause these cell changes.

The Pap test is recommended for women between the ages of 21-65, and can be done in a doctor's office or clinic. Women should start getting Pap tests regularly at age 21. If your Pap test results are normal, your doctor may say you can wait three years until your next Pap test. If you are 30 years old or older, you may choose to have an HPV test with the Pap test. Your doctor can perform both the Pap and HPV tests at the same time. If your test results are normal, your chance of getting cervical cancer in the next few years is very low. Your doctor may then say you can wait as long as five years for your next screening.

There is a vaccine available that can protect against the types of HPV that most often cause cervical cancer. HPV can also cause cancers of the penis in men, as well as other areas of the body in both men and women. The vaccine is the HPV vaccine. It is recommended for preteens (both boys and girls) aged 11-12 years but can be given as early as age 9 up until age 26.

HPV vaccine is available at the Forest County Health Department free of cost to eligible clients, or you can talk to your health care provider about getting the HPV vaccine. Most insurance plans cover the HPV vaccine.

New diabetes program comes to the Northwoods

(Rhinelander, WI)- Just a few weeks into 2019, it's not too late to start on the path to a happier, healthier you. But knowing and understanding how to really put that health goal into practice can be hard, particularly for people with type 2 diabetes.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) "Prevent Type 2" diabetes program is a new offering through Ascension St Mary's Hospital. The program is designed to offer a supportive group learning atmosphere for people who are at risk for developing type 2 diabetes.

An informational session on this new free program will be held at Ascension St. Mary's on Monday, January 28th, at 5 p.m. in the 2nd Floor Conference Room located at 2251 North Shore Drive, Rhinelander.

Type 2 diabetes is the most common form of diabetes and is a chronic condition in which your blood sugar level is higher than normal. If not properly treated, it can lead to heart disease, blindness and kidney failure. Type 2 diabetes affects more than 28 million Americans, according to the CDC.

Here in Wisconsin, the Department of Health Services estimates that 8 percent of Wisconsin adults have diabetes while another 28 percent have diabetes, but they don't know it. Another 37 percent of Wisconsin adults have prediabetes.

"Changes in diet and exercise can lead to significant weight loss and improved diabetes control, but the benefits of starting healthy habits don't stop there," said Carley Reynolds, RN, Certified Diabetes Educator at Ascension St. Mary's. "In some cases, type 2 diabetes patients may be able to lower their risk and even stop medications for diabetes, blood pressure and cholesterol after implementation of a healthier lifestyle."

The free Prevent Type 2 Information session at Ascension St. Mary's is open to anyone in the community and will feature a pre-diabetes risk assessment, help from Certified Diabetes Educators to interpret risk levels and provide additional details about the program.

"This program is especially targeted for people who have a family history of diabetes, have been diagnosed with pre-diabetes, borderline diabetes, impaired fasting glucose or gestational diabetes, said Hope Williams, MPH, RD, Certified Diabetes Educator at Ascension St. Mary's. "It also is a good fit for people over the age of 45 with other risk factors such as being overweight or having an inactive lifestyle."

Dear Editor:

On January 17, 2019 the Forest County Land and Water Use (Zoning) Committee held a public hearing to consider a conditional use permit request from Northeast Asphalt Plant, Inc. to operate an asphalt plant into the existing non-metallic mine owned by Alton (Bud) Ison Jr. in the Town of Argonne. The committee voted unanimously in favor of the permit.

Argonne citizens attending the hearing voiced strong opposition to the asphalt plant for various reasons and concerns, including its negative impact on health and safety, property values, air and water pollution and other public nuisance and health concerns such as; fugitive dust, diesel-fueled truck traffic, noise and proposed hours of operation. It should also be noted that the Argonne Town Board also submitted a letter to Forest County Zoning Committee in opposition to the conditional use permit.

As a former member of the City of Franklin Environmental Commission, with experience and knowledge in metallic and non-metallic mining, I was shocked at the Forest County Zoning Committee members' ignorance, lack of technical knowledge and disrespectful behavior of its Chair - Karl Tauer. It was apparent these elected officials made their minds up to approve the permit long before the meeting started.

At the hearing, the Forest County Board Member representing the Town of Argonne (Cindy Gretzinger) pleaded with the Zoning Committee, publicly stating that she lives 2 miles from the mine site and has a 7-year old family member suffering from Leukemia. Health concerns related to asphalt plants are legitimate being that all asphalt plants emit toxic pollution in various levels including; carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxide, sulfur dioxide, hydrogen sulfide, benzene, chromium, formaldehyde, polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, cadmium and arsenic. The ambiguity of the written request from Northeastern Asphalt, Inc. and their inability to answer questions about the duration and details of the project was ridiculous. Our concerns were not taken seriously - in fact the Zoning Committee closed the hearing and passed the conditional use permit without giving citizens the opportunity to ask further questions following a second round of information from Northeastern Asphalt, Inc.

This battle is not over. Tax-paying citizens of Argonne will start a wave to remove Forest County Board members from their derelict of duty and take back our rights to clean air and water, public safety and good health.



I ran the pipe from the basement to the roof alongside the chimney. I added antifreeze to water to carry heat from the roof top panels to the basement water tank. Thirty-eight years later, I'm still getting free hot water.

Yes, there have been a couple of problems along the way. After 25 years, the hot water tank had to be replaced. Sometime along the way, the expansion tank had to be replaced, but the original panels are still there working on the roof.

If it matters, long ago, probably twenty-five years ago, the system paid for itself with reduced heating costs. Think about it!


Both scholarship winners responded to the award of their scholarships:

there was substantial evidence presented by Northeast Asphalt that they can operate the plant safely, and that health hazzards associated with these types of plants have been reduced over the years. They stated that many employees that work with this material without any major health concerns caused by it. The letters opposing the plant were also reviewed. They felt that there was not substantial evidence that would be required by Wisconsin State Statue 59.69(5e). The committee approved the conditional use

Northeast Asphalt has two storm water permits One permit for the plant and the other is for the non-metallic mine. Northeast Asphalt also has the required air permits for operating an asphalt plant.

Jeannie Fannin explained that the property is zoned General Rural. She explained that a "conditional use" means a use allowed under a conditional permit, special exception or special zoning permission issued by a county, but does not include a variance. Jeannie also explained that the conditional use permit is required for a non metallic mine in the General Rural District. A temporary asphalt plant is an ancillary use in a nonmetallic mine, therefore it requires a conditional use permit.

About 30 people were in the audience. They were able to address their concerns before the board. Those concerns were air emissions, health concerns, the water table being contaminated, noise all day long and concern that the temporary status of the plant would running the plant. They shall route all trucks to the west to highway 32. The hours of the plant are 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday. Dust shall be controlled on all interior roads. Northeast Asphalt shall use ground liners under the containment units. Northeast Asphalt must maintain and give copies of all the DNR permits for this plant to the zoning office. The committee also required periodic inspections of the site by the zoning office and the committee will tour the site after it is up and running. A motion to approve the conditional use permit with the conditions mentioned was made by Ron Karl, seconded by Scott Goode and all were in favor. The motion was approved.
