Northern Health Centers merges with NorthLakes Community Clinic



As of February 1, 2019 Northern Health Centers (NHC) is now part of NorthLakes Community Clinic. NorthLakes Community Clinic is a sister of a Federally Qualified Health Center headquartered in Iron River, Wisconsin. The NHC Board of Directors made the decision in 2018 as a way to respond to better serve patients now and into the future.

"As a smaller community health center, we determined it was time to find a partner that could provide us more depth in some of the foundational back-end aspects of running a community health center," says Shelly White, CEO of Northern Health Centers. "Merging with NorthLakes Community Clinic allows us to continue serving the people of northeast Wisconsin, while having additional resources available to improve overall patient experience and stabilize our future."

White, along with the rest of the Northern Health Centers staff, will remain on the team; and additional dental, medical and mental health providers and staff are being hired. The White Lake, Oconto and Lakewood locations will remain open and provide the same services as before. Patients will notice few changes, other than communication and billing now coming from NorthLakes Community Clinic. There will also be an additional resource available for patients via a change in the Sliding Fee Scale. As part of this merger, under- or un-insured patients who qualify for the first level (Slide A) of the Sliding Fee Scale will now pay no (\$0) co-pay. Prior to the merge, their co-pay was \$20.

"As a regional community health center, we are also exploring ways to actively remove barriers to care," says NorthLakes Community Clinic CEO Reba Rice. "This merger provides an opportunity to ensure patients in northeast Wisconsin have access to high quality, affordable care. We strongly believe everyone deserves access to care and are always looking for ways to achieve that mission."

About NorthLakes Community Clinic:

NorthLakes Community Clinic is a regional Community Health Center, with clinic locations in Ashland, Balsam Lake, Birchwood, Hayward, Iron River, Lakewood, Minong, Oconto, Park Falls, Turtle Lake, Washburn and White Lake. We are a 501(c)3 non-profit organization managed by a patient majority board of directors. Services we offer include: medical, chiropractic, dental, behavioral health counseling including substance use disorder and recovery services, psychiatric services, pediatric speech and occupational therapy, physical therapy, and prescriptions for patients. We also have resource coordinators and health insurance navigators who can assist both patients and non-patients.

Crandon International Raceway opens event reservations for Golden Anniversary Season



Last week's incredible polar vortex has hit the Wisconsin Northwoods with a vengeance, but for Crandon International Raceway and generations of fans the promise of warmer days and a historic 50th anniversary season is just around the corner.

Despite dealing with another day of freezing temperatures, today Crandon International Raceway is opening up individual event camping and grandstand reservations at precisely noon Central Standard Time (CST) for two traditional off-road racing weekends -- the 26th Forest County Potawatomi Brush Run on June 15th -16th and the 50th Crandon World Championship Off-Road Races® held over Labor Day weekend August 29th -September 1st.

Fans can stake their claim to either or both anniversary weekends by logging on to Crandon's stateof-the-art reservation system found at www.crandonoffroad.com. As is Crandon tradition, camping and grandstand season passes for both weekends kicked-off at noon on January 1st, 2019 with stronger than expected sales. For the past several years all 2,500-plus camping sites and seats in the Vison Wheel Hospitality Complex were reserved before the recordbreaking Labor Day Crandon World Championship Off-Road Race weekends even began.

Unlike nearly every other location in off-road racing, for 50 years Crandon International Raceway has served as a permanent facility found on 400-plus acres of woodlands in Northern Wisconsin. The former farm includes rich green grass that frames the track's challenging 1.75-mile undulating dirt circuit, with more than 50,000 fans from all over the America and Canada filling every corner of Crandon International. Many of the Crandon faithful have made this annual pilgrimage an annual family tradition with camping, fireworks and tons of bratwurst creating an unforgettable weekend better known as "the Crandon Experience."

With roots that stretch back to its inaugural running in 1970, Crandon's Forest County Potawatomi "Brush Run" is the first of two visits by Lucas Oil Midwest Short Course League in 2019. The "Big House" will once again welcome summer to the American heartland with the sounds of high-horsepower unlimited PRO 2 and PRO 4 trucks, and with the highly competitive PRO LITE trucks and PRO UTVs, as well as a jam-packed race schedule filled with all of the MORR Sportsman categories. For the fourth consecutive year, the Labor Day weekend will feature the sport's most important race day the annual Crandon World Cup held Off-Road World Championship weekend. Hosted by Crandon International Raceway on Sunday, September 1st, the special day has been created to attract the world's best off-road racers and teams to compete for Crandon World Championships® in a variety of PRO-level classes and the Crandon PRO 2 versus PRO 4 Cup finale. MORR Sportsman World Championship rings will also be awarded that weekend, while Crandon International also plays host to myriad of special concerts, events and races to commemorate its 50th anniversary. "For years we have been working toward this historic 2019 season and our golden anniversary," explained Crandon International Raceway President Cliff Flannery. "We are nicknamed the 'Big House' for a reason, and nothing will be bigger than celebrating 50 years of racing, entertainment and family tradition. All of us are excited about offering fans their chance to make plans for the most significant season in our history. But, they better hurry, because we have been selling out this place in the past few years."

Nearly 350,000 of Forest County's total 649,000 acres lie within the Nicolet National Forest. The State and County own tens of thousands of additional acres. These areas present enormous recreational and economic opportunity but as staff and budgets are stretched, it becomes more difficult to maintain and promote these areas.

Assistance from outside groups may be the solution. While motorized recreational activities are supported by well-funded, dedicated organizations, the silent sports and more primitive sites haven't had the same level of attention.

On Tuesday, February 12th at 6:30 p.m., in the basement of the Crandon Public Library, there will be a general meeting to discuss the possibility of establishing a group to stand ready to assist local, state and federal agencies in maintaining and promoting our beautiful public lands and the recreational opportunities they offer.

Agencies will often express their willingness to accept help from volunteers, however it is too often very difficult to actually find those opportunities and even

harder to accomplish substantial long-term positive impacts through them. A standing group, one that has developed a process to minimize red-tape, ensure satisfaction of safety/liability considerations, and has some capital available to put to work immediately at any time, would make it much easier to respond to those opportunities that do arise.

It would likely also help encourage the creation of additional opportunities. The group would constantly remind our partner agencies to bring projects our way and a proven track record would further encourage utilization of the group.

This group could help coordinate promotion amongst entities.It's very costly/challenging for each (State, County, Feds) to promote their features seperately, but bundled it is much more efficient for the agencies and attractive to potential users. A hiker doesn't care if she is on a state trail one day and a county trail the next; she simply wants beautiful trails to make a trip north worthwhile. Same for the canoeist It doesn't matter if he puts in at a federal landing and takes out at a state park the overall experience is what counts. We can cluster bird-watching sites, troutfishing hot-spots, grouse-hunting trails, horse-back riding, fat-tire biking the opportunities are innumerable. It may not be cost-effective for the Forest Service to promote just a couple sites specific to a certain activity, but bundling those sites along with similar but unique state and county sites, creates a legitimate "destination" for vacationers.

In 2016 the Nicolet Wolf River Scenic Byway was approved (OVERWHELMINGLY) by a panel of professionals, representing the Departments of Natural Resources, Transportation, Tourism and several other state agencies. One of the few criticisms they had was that of signage. A group that could easily and quickly build and place signs to the very specific federal and state specifications would provide a service that, though likely not much noticed by us locals, would definitely be appreciated by visitors to our area.

Painting picnic tables, brushing trails, raking parking areas, a couple hours on the part of a few volunteers could save valuable staff time and agency dollars, while providing real improvement to the experience of the public.

Kayaking doubled in popularity in last decade to almost 16 million participants. We have water!

Forest County, while touting itself as a tourism/recreation county, falls well below its neighbors in venue. Forest County usually falls around 67th out of 72 in "direct visitor spending". Oneida and Vilas have landing around 15th and pull in approximately 15 times more tourist dollars. It is doubtful that we can really expect to push the needle much, but there is no reason not to make the best effort to promote what we have. We may need to look at different ways to promote and maybe different things to promote. The assumption is very often that Millennials have no appreciation of nature but that is not accurate. However, they may have very different expectations than those of only a couple decades ago. We need to explore those needs and work to adapt and implement those that don't threaten the natural experience as it is. Preservation of our special sites relies on creating interest and a buy-in of young people. Interest and buy-in are essential to ensuring that there is a next generation of stewards for the places we love. Efforts to make these areas more inviting not only help bring new people into our area, but possibly also bring some of OUR young people back to the area.

Open Letter to Governor Tony Evers

This letter is a request for your consideration for the disbursement of the Wisconsin Tribal Gaming funds that you have the authority and responsibility to direct to projects as described in the Gaming Compact.

Forest County is the home of the Potawatomi and Sokaogon Chippewa tribes that are 2 of the 11 tribes represented in the gaming compact. The compact states the intended use of the additional state revenues derived from the tribes and per the MOU are as follows. The most important element is the provision that at the governor must undertake his or her authority to assure that monies paid to the state are expended for a specific purpose. These purposes are:

**Economic development initiatives to benefit tribes / and or natives in Wisconsin.

**Economic development initiatives in regions around casinos.

**Promote tourism within the state.

**Support programs and services of the county in which the tribe is located.

The Forest County Potawatomi MOU specifies these four purposes , but also limits the expenditure of these disbursements to Milwaukee and Forest counties.

The project identified as the number one priority by Forest County Law Enforcement , Sheriff Dennee, and Forest County Supervisors is the construction and staffing of a new 911 / dispatch center. Currently the county jailers are also doing double and triple duty by working as jailers, dispatch, and 911 operators. This overlapping of jobs and duties is recipe for disaster. The dispatcher has the responsibility to the pubic, deputy, and first responder to give them their full undivided attention during a emergency. This is oftentimes interrupted by a disturbance in the jail that requires the intervention of the d i s p a t c h e r t h u s t a k i n g h i s o r h e r s attention from the emergency at hand.

Forest County supervisors have sketched out plans to remodel the current law enforcement center at a cost of 130 thousand dollars to create a separate 911/dispatch center independent of the jailers pod that maintains internal security for the inmates. Committees have determined that an additional 6 employees at a cost of 450 thousand dollars per year are needed to staff the new 911/dispatch center for the 24/7 service that is required. Additional duties for the staff of the 911/dispatch center will be reception of visitors to the LEC. Other duties will be to monitor security cameras for the courtroom and courthouse that currently is the responsibility of the county clerk.

Forest Counties budgeted monies are limited and already being stretched and barely meeting the needs and services to the residences and visitors to the county. We are limited by the amount of fully taxable lands in the county to 18 % as all others are not eligible to be levied.

The non taxable or limited by MFL and other rules include National Forest, State Forest, BCPL lands, Municipal lands, Tribal Lands, and others. Forest County levies approximately 5 million dollars and receives the rest of its revenue from state aids and grants. A major contributor is the Potawatomi of Forest County that gifts near 500 thousand dollars a year to the Sheriff's department for additional officers and squads. The business climate and growth in Forest county is slow and growing at an anemic pace and would be nonexistent with out our great neighboring tribes the Mole Lake Sokaogon Chippewa, and the Forest County Potawatomi. Their casinos, businesses, and service industries such as the Health and Wellness Center not only create great jobs, but serve all the people of this great county. But our immediate need due to the drug problem that is devastating these communities and the children of Forest County is reliable 911 and first responders . If you would please dedicate 500 thousand dollars for the 911 center per year to staff it with 6 additional employees we could solve many problems and stave of a possible disaster. These monies will be fully accounted for and satisfy the requirements of the MOU with the tribes. Provide services to the county that the tribes are located, create 6 new jobs thus helping economic development, will benefit the tribes, county and state while providing a much needed service.


