Forest County is a partner and supporter of the Wild Rivers Invasive Species Coalition (WRISC). WRISC is a coalition which seeks and obtains grant funding from many sources to provide services to Forest, Florence, and Marinette Counties in Wisconsin and Dickinson and Menominee Counties in Michigan. Since 2009 WRISC has completed invasive species education, management and control in many areas across the 5 county region. The mission of WRISC is dedicated to the management of our lands and waters through cooperation, education, prevention and control.

WRISC provides services to private landowners, organizations, and municipal partners. I recently received a letter from WRIS asking the Town of Laona to become a partner with WRISC. There is no cost to become a partner, it only takes agreement with a memorandum of understanding between your group and WRISC. Larger numbers of partners will improve the chances for WRISC to obtain grants.

A primary goal of WRISC in 2019 will be inventory and management of invasive species populations on road right-of-ways. There is a particular concern with wild parsnip which has greatly expanded its populations within right-of-ways and also provides health dangers to the public

I would encourage every group with an interest to sign on to become a partner with WRISC. Let's work together to fight against invasive species on our lands and in our waters.

Forest County Board meeting

The full county board met on Tuesday, February 19. There were a number of items on the agenda that were handled quickly.

The fire wardens were approved with a voice vote as was the 2017 audit. There was discussion on the changes to the Forest County Rules and Regulations.

The rule changes will provide a significant change to the way the board will vote on some issues, like the election of a board chairman. Ballots will no longer be signed, but will be secret ballots. The executive committee has been replaced with decisions being made by the 1st Chair and 2nd Vice-Chair. There was also a change made to give the public a chance for input at board meetings with discretion by the board chairman.

Other items quickly passed was amending the 15-year comprehensive plan for boundaries on county lands, the commitment of veterans donated funds so they stay targeted for vets, approval of the emergency preparedness plan, ATV trail maintenance grants, and snowmobile grants.

There was a discussion on whether or not to have an IT Committee in place to handle problems with digital record-keeping and communication, but the resolution did pass to form an IT Committee.

There was approval by the board to pursue the



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Rep. Mursau announces tax relief for Wisconsin's middle class families

Madison - Rep. Jeff Mursau (R-Crivitz) is joining his fellow legislative colleagues today in announcing an effort to provide a significant tax cut for Wisconsin's middle class families. After eight years of financially responsible budgeting, Wisconsin has a strong budget surplus. The GOP plan would direct \$340 million of that surplus to middle class families throughout Wisconsin to provide tax relief.

'Whenever I work on developing the state budget, I always try to balance smart financial planning decisions with reducing the financial burden of our working families," said Rep. Mursau. "I am glad the smart budgeting decisions we made over the years has paid off and that we're in a position to give back and provide this tax cut without having to raise taxes on our local businesses to do it."

Rep. Mursau and his Assembly colleagues reached out to Governor Evers last week and detailed a number of issues where the two branches could work together in a bipartisan way to accomplish shared goals. This effort continued when Governor Evers joined Rep. Mursau and his fellow GOP representatives in joint caucus earlier this week. The proposal unveiled today delivers on a shared promise and is a testament to the word of both parties to put politics aside and move the state forward. The tax reductions announced today are for individuals making less than \$100,000 and families earning \$150,000 or less. According to the nonpartisan Legislative Fiscal Bureau, a median income family filing jointly should see a \$310 reduction in their net taxes.

"Though I expect this session will likely find the legislature and Governor disagreeing on various issues, I am glad we can find common ground on providing tax relief to our hard-working constituents," said Mursau. "I look forward to working with Governor Evers in the coming months on the state's two year budget and finding additional areas where we can work together."

Right now, Assembly Republicans are working with colleagues in the Senate to finalize this tax relief legislation, and it could be introduced as early as next week. Once approved by the legislature and signed into law, the tax cut would take effect next year.

New Data: Teen e-cigarette use explodes in popularity as smoking wanes

Forest County, WI: The Wisconsin Department of Health Services recently released data showing a sharp increase in e-cigarette use among both middle and high students even as fewer teens than ever are smoking conventional cigarettes (1.4% of middle schoolers, 4.7% of high schoolers). The news comes shortly after U.S. Surgeon General Jerome Adams declared teen ecigarette use a public health epidemic.

Data from the Wisconsin Youth Tobacco Survey showed current e-cigarette use jumped 154% among high school students from 2014-2018, and 272% among middle school students in that same time period. According to the survey, one in five Wisconsin high school students currently use e-cigarettes, and one in nine Wisconsin middle students have tried e-cigarettes. Additionally, one in four high school students say they first tried an ecigarette before 16, and 96% of middle school ever-ecigarette users tried their first one before the age of 13.

The Forest County Health Department is concerned about the rise in e cigarette use among middle and high school students because of the harmful effects of E-cigarette aerosol. Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine which is the addictive drug in regular cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco products. Nicotine exposure is harmful to the developing brain of an adolescent and can impact learning, memory and attention. Using nicotine in adolescence can also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs. In addition to nicotine, the aerosol that users inhale and exhale can potentially expose both themselves and people close by to other harmful substances, including heavy metals, volatile organic compounds, and ultrafine particles that can be inhaled deeply into the lungs.

Flavors drive e-cigarettes' popularity with this young age group. 89% of high schoolers and 95% of middle schoolers say they would not use an unflavored product. Flavors like magnificent menthol, cherry crush, vivid vanilla. Pina colada, blueberry, strawberry mint. berry cobbler, mint chocolate, caramel café, blue raz cotton candy, peach green tea, pink spot, black mamba and frozen lime drop are just some of the examples of the 15,500 flavors available online that kids are finding appealing according to a 2018 study.

Members of the Northwood's Tobacco Free Coalition and the Forest County Health Department ask parents, educators, health professionals, and community leaders to help address this important issue. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services Public Health Advisory details recommended actions for each of these groups and can be found at https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/tobacco/advisory.htm.



financing needed to purchase two parcels of land called the Peshtigo Block 1 and Peshtigo Block 2. The financing sought would be through the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Fund.

The most discussion occurred over the last item on the agenda. The discussion was over what to ask for from the Wisconsin Gaming Compact money. According to the compact, the money that is put up every two years is parceled out between Milwaukee and Forest County. Governor Evers decides where the money will go.

In a resolution offered by the Intergovernmental Relations Committee, the county put in a request for funds to help cover the building and staffing of the 911-Dispatch Center in the Forest County Jail. The request is for \$450,000 per year for two years.

The second part of the resolution put in a request for \$80,000 per year for economic development projects in the county.

At the meeting, a resolution was made to remove the request for the economic development money to prioritize what is considered the more important funding for the dispatch center. However, the \$80,000 requested for economic development was placed in another resolution that will also be put in front of the governor.

Governor Evers could decide to grant both requests or one or the other. Time will

tell.



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

Myth: Canned foods aren't nutritious.

Fact: Canned fruits, vegetables, beans, lean meats and seafood are just as nutritious. All forms of fruits, vegetables, beans, lean meats and seafoods can help achieve a healthy diet and provide needed nutrients Americans are lacking.

Myth: All canned foods are high in sodium.

Fact: There are hundreds of canned foods available in no-salt-added, low and no-sodium options. Nearly half (48%) of consumers surveyed are unaware canned foods can be low in sodium. There are more low sodium options in the canned food aisle than ever before. And draining and rising the food can reduce sodium levels by up to 41%; draining alone results in a 36% sodium reduction.

Myth: Canned foods are filled with preservatives.

Fact: Although canned foods do not require preservatives, in a recent survey, more than 65% of respondents incorrectly believe they do. Just like foods canned at home, foods packaged in steel cans are already cooked - the process of "canning" preserves the food, so there is no need for preservatives to prevent spoilage. In fact, most canned foods are preservativefree.

Many Americans are falling short on key nutrients. Having "all forms" of fruits, vegetables, beans, lean meats and seafood on hand provides more options to increase your nutrient intake. After all, food is not nutritious unless it is consumed, and canned food is there when you need it. People should feel good about being able to enjoy cost-efficient, convenient, nutritious canned food all year long.

Snack Pantries set up at Nicolet College

The recent partial government shutdown has many Nicolet College students on edge.

"Many of our students are parents who struggle financially to put food on the table," said Sara Tienhaara, Nicolet College Student Engagement and Career Development coach. "Many also rely on government assistance programs in order to feed their families. And even though the government has reopened for a few weeks, they're still pretty nervous about what the future holds.'

To help with the situation, Tienhaara has recently led an effort to place Snack Pantries in six buildings on campus. Filled with mixed nuts, dried fruits, beef jerky, ready-to-eat tuna and the like, the high-protein snacks are designed to provide sustenance to students while they are on campus.

"Being hungry and learning college-level material doesn't mix well," Tienhaara said. "Even with federal food assistance, many of our students - especially those who are parents - still go hungry. I see them put the needs of their kids first and then just deal with whatever the situation is then in front of them."

Tienhaara said she first noticed a change at a recent annual student picnic that starts each semester. It was held, by coincidence, during the partial government shutdown. The fare was a free taco bar.

"In the past, students would come up to me and joke around that we should do this every week. But this last time the tone was different. It's like they weren't joking. There was this increased sense of urgency in their voices."

She noted that the comments came from students who tended to be more naturally outgoing and leaned toward feeling a connection to the college community.

"What about that segment of the student population that isn't like that?" she asked. "They are out there, in our labs and classrooms, and it's a good bet that they have an equal need and we're just not hearing about it."

Along with healthy snacks to get them through the day, each Snack Pantry also has resource information about the many community organizations that exist to assist those

Tienhaara stressed that this new service at Nicolet, paid for with student activity fees, is not intended to function as a food pantry.

"Food Pantries serve an entirely different and valuable role in our Northwoods communities," she said. "The Snack Pantries are intended to help students get through their day on campus without being hungry. You can't learn when you're hungry."

What does she hope the future holds for the Snack Pantries on campus?

"My goal is for all of them to go away. That means we wouldn't have any hungry students on campus. But from everything I'm seeing, we're a long way from that being

Johnson continues push to delist gray wolf with new amendment

WASHINGTON — U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) introduced a bipartisan amendment to the Natural Resources Management Act Wednesday that would delist the gray wolf in western Great Lakes states, including Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota, as well as Wyoming under the Endangered Species Act of 1973. The amendment would restore the gray wolf to the status determined to be appropriate by Department of Interior wildlife experts in 2011, and allow the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to develop a wolf population management program.

"Four years ago, an activist federal judge ignored recommendations from wildlife experts and President Obama's Department of the Interior to delist the gray wolf as an endangered species in the western Great Lakes. It is past time for Congress to act on what we have heard from state DNR experts, Wisconsin farmers, ranchers, loggers and sportsmen for years: Gray wolf listing decisions should come from wildlife experts, not from courtrooms," Sen. Johnson said. "This amendment allows wolf management plans that are based on federal and state wildlife expertise to move forward without legal ambiguity."

Sen. Johnson's amendment is cosponsored by Sens. Tammy Baldwin (D-Wis.), John Barrasso (R-Wyo.) and Mike Enzi (R-Wyo.). Sen. Johnson has worked to remove the gray wolf from the endangered species list in the western Great Lakes region since 2015 when he introduced legislation with former Rep. Reid Ribble (WI-8) to address the issue.
