Conservation Corner

Sugar Maple Trees- Facts, Importance, and Pests

A few weeks ago we discussed the importance of the maple sap and maple syrup industry to Forest County. Following that article I had a conversation with a reader pertaining to emerging threats to the sugar maple. In response to this question, today we will discuss the importance of sugar (hard) maple trees to our forest and our economy, along with some emerging threats to this important tree species.

Sugar maple (Acer Saccharum) is one of the most shade tolerant of all hardwood tree species. Shade tolerance makes the sugar maple the dominant tree species within hardwood forests as the forest matures, allowing less light to reach the ground and reducing the regeneration of other tree species. This simplification of the forest reduces the number of tree species present over time and sugar maple becomes dominant with nearly 60-70% of all trees within northern hardwood types being sugar maple. Timber harvesting and harvest history has altered this process in some stands, making the forest more diverse in the number of tree species present. Many of us know the relation of sugar maple trees to maple syrup but what about the importance to the timber industry? Sugar maple growth and quality is dependent upon soil types and climate. Sugar maple require high quality silt loam soils with moderate moisture for optimum growth. The climate of a region and the length of the growing season determines the growth rates and the optimum age for any tree species for production of forest products. Soil and climate also determine the color of the wood or lumber produced as well as potential for defects which create specialty products. Within the forests of Forest County, sugar maple veneer grade with bird's eye or curly defects are the top value products produced. These products are highly sought out in the world market and the upper Midwest and Forest County happen to be a major supplier in that market. Soils and growth rates in the upper Midwest provides growing conditions for sugar maple which creates a rich white color in the wood of healthy trees. This is the only place in the world that maple produces the rich white color, making sugar maple lumber and products from our forest a highly prized product. The specialized markets for sugar maple veneer, lumber and flooring put Forest County on the map in the worldwide market. Sugar maple is that important. **Continued on page 11**

BURNING PERMITS REQUIRED!

Spring has sprung! With the piles of snow rapidly melting, many of us are excited to do some spring cleaning of brush and leaves on our properties. The warmer weather that melts the snow and brings back the robins also creates the risk of wildfires to spread. Early springs, like the one we are experiencing, often result in higher wildfire risk.

Year after year, the #1 cause of wildfires started in Wisconsin is from debris burning that got out of control. The DNR urges everyone to be safe and take some precautions that may prevent small brush fires from becoming damaging wildfires and remember to get your annual burning permit before doing any burning.

Unless the ground is completely snow covered, and with the exception of campfires and cooking fires, burning permits are required for all open burning including ground burning, burn barrels, and incinerators. No burning permits are required within the city of Crandon.

Burning permits are FREE and required by law. Having the DNR come to put your escaped fire out can be extremely costly and may result in a citation, so don't get caught burning without a permit!

Before burning you must verify current fire danger and burning restrictions for the day by visiting dnr.wi.gov/wisburn or calling 1-888-WIS-BURN (947-2876). Days and times that burning is allowed changes daily based on current weather conditions so it is important to check before every burn.

When burning, it is important to keep fire-fighting tools such as a water hose and shovel close at hand in case the fire gets out of control. The fire should be monitored at all times until it is completely out and cold to the touch. All it takes is one ember to start a wildfire.

If the fire starts to expand beyond the planned area, producing large flames and lots of smoke, call 911 immediately!

Be safe out there, folks! Hopefully the next time you see our fire engines will be in the parade and not to put out your escaped fire!

Representatives from the Wisconsin Historical Society will be asking teens about what they would like to see in a new, modern state history museum. Teens from all area Northwoods communities are invited to attend and share their voice.

"The fact that the Wisconsin Historical Society is engaging the teen voice in this decision is a powerful reminder that today's youth will shape Wisconsin's future" said Michelle Gobert, Positive Youth Development Extension Educator in Forest County, whose office is hosting the event. "Combining local history and youth is a win-win for both groups. Research confirms the idea that children develop a stronger sense of control over their lives and build resiliency when they hear stories describing uphill battles and obstacles relatives and community members may have faced. There's an app for that: new app tells you what Medicare covers Submitted by Kathy O'Melia

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) recently launched a new app for mobile devices. The new "What's Covered" app provides general cost, coverage, and eligibility information for items and services covered by Medicare Part A and Part B. The app also includes a list of covered preventive services.

The app is available for free in both Google Play and the Apple App Store. The app is available in Google Play at: https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id= gov.medicare.coverage and is available in the Apple App Store at: https://itunes.apple.com/us/app/whatscovered/id1444143600?mt=8.

The "What's Covered" app is part of CMS' eMedicare initiative. CMS launched the eMedicare initiative in 2018 to provide new ways for beneficiaries to get information about Medicare.

According to CMS data from 2016, about two-thirds of Medicare beneficiaries say they use the internet daily or almost daily. Some of the most common questions CMS receives are about what Medicare covers. There are approximately 15 million page views each year for coverage-related content on Medicare.gov, and 1-800 MEDICARE receives over 3 million coverage-related calls each year. Beneficiaries can use the app to guickly see whether Medicare covers a specific medical item or service.

Other tools developed as part of the eMedicare initiative include:

• A simplified log-in for the Medicare Plan Finder tool. which helps beneficiaries choose a Medicare Part D plan or Advantage plan;

Sugar maple has been relatively fortunate in the realm of invasive pest that affect it, until 1996 when the Asian Longhorned Beetle was discovered in Brooklyn, New York. The Asian Longhorned Beetle (Anoplophora glabripennis, or ALB) is a threat to America's hardwood trees. With no current cure, early identification and eradication are critical to its control. It currently infests areas in Massachusetts, New York and Ohio. It threatens recreation and forest resources valued at billions of dollars. The ALB has the potential to cause more damage than Dutch elm disease, chestnut blight and gypsy moths combined, destroying millions of acres of America's treasured hardwoods, including national forests and backyard trees. Infestation have been located and eradicated as close as the Chicago area. People in general and the people of Forest County need to recognize the impacts that the Asian Longhorned Beetle can have on our forest and our economy as a whole. Imagine our forest without sugar maple!

Start now, for those who travel to be here, please do on move firewood from your home to Forest County! Our forests are too important and I believe we do have an adequate source of firewood here.

Look forward to future articles for more information regarding the Asian Longhorned Beetle. Until then, happy spring again as we look forward to the fishing opener!

Alcohol Awareness Month

Drinking too much alcohol increases people's risk of injuries, violence, drowning, liver disease, mental illnesses, and some types of cancer. This April, during Alcohol Awareness Month, Forest County Health Department encourages you to educate yourself and your loved ones about the dangers of drinking too much.

Drinking responsibly does not mean avoiding alcohol all together. It takes conscious steps to stay safe, like planning ahead, knowing your limit, and having a safe ride home. Knowing the health content in your beverage is also important. Pay attention to alcohol content, along with calories present. On average, a Bloody Mary is 400 calories excluding garnishes and any beer chaser. The average beer is between 90 to 150 calories per 12 oz. A 5oz glass of wine tallies up towards 120 calories. A night of drinking can easily pack on an additional 500 to 1,000 calories to your daily intake with little to no nutritional value.

According the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention, every day 29 people in the United States die in motor vehicle crashes that involve an alcohol impaired driver. The legal blood alcohol level for driving is below .08%, which is estimated to be about 4 drinks. Binge drinking is characterized as 5 or more drinks on an occasion for men, and 4 drinks on an occasion for women reports the CDC. Alcohol abuse in Wisconsin continues to be a major concern and it knows no boundaries based on wealth or education. If you are drinking too much, you can improve your health by cutting back or quitting. Some strategies to doing so would be to limit your drinking to no more than 1 drink a day for women or 2 drinks a day for men, and to choose which days of the week when you will not drink. You can also limit the amount of alcohol you keep at home, and avoid drinking when upset. If you are concerned you may be addicted to alcohol, talk with your primary care provider to discuss a safe treatment plan.
