"Clean Waters: Our Mission, Our Legacy" is the theme for the meeting, from 9 a.m. to noon. Attendees will explore ways to encourage lake residents and lake users to take actions to protect lakes and streams and the scenic values of the Northwoods. Attendees are expected from Oneida, Vilas, Forest, Langlade, Lincoln, and Iron counties.

"The single best and simplest measure people can take to protect their lakes is to keep the shoreline habitat natural or restore it to a more natural condition," says Bob Martini, president of the Oneida County Lakes and Rivers Association, which is organizing the event with the Vilas County Lakes and Rivers Association.

The main speaker, Patrick Goggin, lakes specialist with the UW-Extension Lakes team, will discuss shoreland buffers and other forms of shoreline protection as a way to help prevent runoff of nutrients and sediment into lakes.

Other speakers include Michael Engleson, executive director of Wisconsin Lakes, giving an update on state government policies affecting lakes; Dave Noel, presenting summaries of studies linking lake quality to regional economies and property values; and Bob Martini, reporting on the Wisconsin's Green Fire organization promoting sound science as a basis for public policies.

Dane Whittaker, a graduate assistant at Arizona State University, will report on a Northwoods Fishery Study now underway. A discussion and feedback session will follow the program. The event will include exhibits from water-related organizations. Annual meetings of countywide lake associations will follow. Public comment sought on DNR's surface water grant program

MADISON-The public comment period to provide feedback on a proposed consolidated administrative rule governing the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources' surface water grant program opened on June 17 and will continue through July 24.

The proposed language can be found under Board Order WY-18-15 on the department's proposed permanent rules site. The department's web page on NR193 has more information.

The surface water grant program helps local groups protect and restore lakes, rivers and wetlands, and control aquatic invasive species by providing around \$6.5 million each year in the form of cost-sharing funds. Local organizations and units of government use the funds to improve the lakes they manage and live on, protect their property values, and ensure resources are protected and restored for the benefit of nature and society.

The consolidated code will clarify policies, improve customer service and satisfaction, improve administrative consistency and efficiency and is designed to support better and more cost-effective environmental outcomes that serve local needs and advance department management objectives for state surface waters. Goals of the rule creation include uniting current subprograms under one consistent set of procedures and policies, updating management standards with reference to new statutory programs, supporting management at the watershed scale, enhancing accountability and allowing for performance standards.

MADISON - Requests to consider proposed rules and framework for the 2019 Wisconsin migratory bird season, rule changes to agricultural and urban best management practices, and proposed rules for taking catfish by hand or with a bow and arrow or crossbow are among the items the Wisconsin Natural Resources Board will address when it meets June 26 in Barneveld. The board meeting will convene at 8:30 a.m. at Deer Valley Lodge, 401 W. Industrial Drive in Barneveld.

The Natural Resources Board will offer remote participation in an open forum with the board from the DNR Service Center, 1300 W. Clairemont Ave., Eau Claire. Agenda Item 5 - Open Forum is an opportunity for citizens to provide testimony remotely or at the Barneveld meeting location on matters that are not otherwise on the meeting agenda. Comments generally should address broad general policy rather than the day-to-day operations of the Department of Natural Resources. Opportunities for remote testimony will be specifically noticed on each meeting agenda. Pre-registration by posted deadline is required.

Future remote locations include: Milwaukee for the August 14 meeting when the board will be meeting in Wausau; Fitchburg for the September 25 meeting when the board will be meeting in Mishicot; Rhinelander for the October 23 meeting in in Madison; and Green Bay for the December 11 meeting in Madison.


Other topics on the June 26 meeting agenda include a request to approve proposed rules related to aquaculture and fish farms; approval of a scope statement incorporating the 2015 national ambient air quality standards for ozone; request for approval of a scope statement related to eliminating night hunting restrictions for raccoons; along with other topics.

On Tuesday, June 25 the board will participate in area tours and presentations on southwest Wisconsin ground water, a trout shocking demonstration, streambank easement and habitat improvements, statewide trout management plan overview, update from DMAP landowner and cooperator on the SW WI CWD and Deer Predator Study, spring update on the SW WI CWD and Deer Predator Study, and a partner update on the adopt-a-dumpster and adopt-a-kiosk programs regarding CWD management. No action will be taken. NOTE: The public must pre-register with Board Liaison to attend scheduled tours and provide their own transportation.

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New stamp series recognizes America's Wild and Scenic Rivers

These new forever stamps released by the U.S. Postal Service feature several of the Wild and Scenic Rivers managed by the Forest Service.

The National Wild and Scenic River System spans more than 13,000 miles of the United States through landscapes as diverse as the rivers themselves.

Just last year, the system celebrated its 50th anniversary. President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act into law with overwhelming bipartisan support in Congress. On signing the law, President Johnson said "an unspoiled river is a very rare thing in this Nation today," adding that unless there were steps taken to protect them, healthy, free flowing rivers would become a thing of the past.

Since then, the system has grown to include rivers in 41 states and Puerto Rico. The USDA Forest Service manages more miles of these rivers than any other federal agency, including the National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Now, the United States Postal Service has released a new series of forever stamps commemorating the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System. At the release event along the banks of the Deschutes River in Bend, Oregon, U.S. Postal Service chief financial officer and executive vice president Joe Corbett said, "When Americans use the stamps, either to mail letters and packages or to add them to collections, they will be reminded of our cherished Wild and Scenic Rivers."

The stamps feature photographs of 12 designated Wild and Scenic Rivers. Many of these rivers are managed in whole, or in part, by the Forest Service. Those rivers include the Flathead, the Merced and the Deschutes.

These designated rivers and others like them throughout the country provide a wide range of economic, ecological and other social values.

"Wild and Scenic Rivers are the backbones of many communities that rely on the visitors to fill hotels, visit shops and outfitters, and to hire guides," Pacific Northwest Regional Forester Glenn Casamassa said at the release event. "We need to take responsibility for stewardship of these rivers in collaboration with partners, local communities and other stakeholders."

June 1 through 9 is also National Fishing and Boating Week, a time to connect with the great outdoors by getting on the water to fish, boat and even scuba dive. Learn more about National Fishing and Boating Week and the many events being held to celebrate at TakeMeFishing.org.

It is about managing this \$20,000,000 resource as a profit center for the County while providing jobs and recreation opportunity for the public.

As a Board Member you need to look at what steps it will take to accomplish this task. You need to hire Dave Z for as long as he needs to train his successor, five or ten years should be sufficient. Do the math on what it will cost to make it happen and compare it to the monies squandered for the last few years an into the uncertain future.

Congressman Duffy Urges Speaker Pelosi to Fund the President's Request for More Beds for Unaccompanied Alien Children

Washington DC - Wisconsin Congressman Sean Duffy, Ranking Member of the Financial Services Subcommittee on Housing & Insurance, sent a letter to Speaker Nancy Pelosi to address the humanitarian crisis at our southern border by supporting President Trump's request for more beds to be used by Unaccompanied Alien Children (UAC). Read the entire letter below.

"Dear Madame Speaker:

"Knowing that you may soon bring supplemental appropriations legislation to the floor of the House, I urge you to ensure that this legislation fully funds the President's request for beds to be used by Unaccompanied Alien Children (UAC).

"As you know, the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR), which provides essential services and beds to UAC, is experiencing a substantial increase in referrals to their facilities. As of April 30, 2019, ORR had received referrals of approximately 40,800 UAC, which represents a 57 percent increase over Fiscal Year 2018 and puts ORR on a path to care for the largest number of UAC in the program's history.

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Funding available to assist in promoting safe ATV operation

MADISON - Organizations interested in assisting the Department of Natural Resources in the recruitment and training of all-terrain vehicle (ATV) safety instructors and volunteer trail ambassadors may apply for funding through a 2 year program to promote the safe operation of ATVs and UTVs in the state. The program funding is for up to \$297,000 for each year

Eligible organizations must provide documentation that they are registered with the Wisconsin Secretary of State's office as non-stock organizations and have an established board of directors. Funding applicants must create and provide a business plan detailing the methods and approaches the organization will use to accomplish a number of requirements that will promote the operation of ATVs and UTVs that is safe and responsible, does not harm the environment and does not conflict with laws, rules and department policies.

Among these requirements are:

--assisting the DNR in recruiting, assisting and providing support to volunteer safety instructors ATV/UTV clubs and

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organizations and promoting the ATV safety education program;

--assist the DNR and Tourism in creating an outreach program to inform local communities about appropriate ATV/UTV use in their communities; the economic benefits that may be gained from promoting tourism to attract ATV/UTV enthusiasts:

--techniques the organization will use to recruit, train and manage volunteer trail patrol ambassadors to monitor the recreational operation of ATVs/UTVs on public trails; and improve and maintain its relationship with the DNR, Tourism, ATV/UTV dealers, manufactures, recreation partners and off-highway motorcycle clubs

Additional requirements apply and the organization that receives the funding must be able to provide supporting documents showing objectives have been met through the use of reports, receipts and audits.

Organizations interested in applying for the funds should search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for ATV UTV Enhancement Funding.

The deadline for submitting funding applications is 5 p.m., June 28, 2019. DNR expects to issue the fund agreement to the successful applicant no later than July 19, 2019. The fund agreement will be effective as of July 1,

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

"On May 1, 2019, the Administration sent a letter to Congress requesting an emergency appropriation to address the needs of those UAC in federal custody. This would provide ORR the funding necessary to offer adequate lodging and care while it works to find sponsors for these children. Without emergency funding, the UAC program could exhaust its funding as soon as the end of June and will be forced to scale back services to these children. Additionally, should funding not be appropriated, thousands of children could be forced to remain in Department of Homeland Security facilities that were not designed to serve as long-term shelters.

"There is a major humanitarian and security crisis at our southern border. Regardless of your political leanings, we should all agree that the critical needs of UAC should be met. As the father of eight, I cannot stand idly by while these children suffer. Inaction amounts to nothing less than a dereliction of our Constitutional duty.

"Therefore, I respectfully request that you fulfill the President's request for humanitarian assistance via supplemental appropriations.

"Thank you for your consideration of this important matter and I look forward to your response."

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#### Dental insurance vs. dental savings plans Submitted by Kathy O'Melia

If you or someone you love is looking to save money on the high cost of dental care, two available options include dental insurance and dental savings plans. These may sound similar, but they offer different types of benefits and have different limitations. There are pros and cons of each. It is important to know the difference between the two and choose a plan that is right for your individual dental care needs.

#### **Dental Insurance**

Dental insurance is like health insurance. You pay premiums to the company, and then, the dental insurance company pays the dental provider on your behalf. These insurance plans will typically require copays and deductibles. They will oftentimes have a provider network that works much like an HMO or PPO health insurance plan.

It is important to note that some dental insurance plans have an annual maximum amount that they will pay on your behalf (sometimes referred to as a "benefit cap.") Sometimes, this maximum amount will be around \$1,000 or \$1,500. If you need a lot of dental work in a one-year period, this could mean your insurance benefits are used up rather quickly. It may also mean that more expensive items or services may not be fully covered. However, some plans do have negotiated discounted prices that you pay the provider after you reach your annual benefit cap.

Another drawback to dental insurance is that they sometimes require a waiting period before a particular service is covered. One benefit to dental insurance is that sometimes they will cover preventative care with no co-pays. Most importantly, keep in mind that each plan is different, and you should compare multiple plans to choose the right one for your needs.

#### **Dental Savings Plans**

Dental savings plans are not insurance (although sometimes they may be administered by insurance companies such as Aetna.) With a dental savings plan, you pay the provider directly, but those charges are discounted in accordance with your plan. Also, you must choose a dentist who participates in the plan.

With a dental savings plan, there are generally no deductibles, no waiting periods, and no annual maximums. However, most often, the discounted price you pay for these services is higher than the copay amount you would pay with dental insurance. Notably, some services that are not typically covered by dental

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insurance, such as cosmetic services, may be discounted through a dental savings plan.

It is often possible to have both a dental insurance plan and a dental savings plan. For example, if you reach your annual benefit cap with your dental insurance plan, you can then start paying discounted rates through the dental savings plan, or you can pay discounted rates for items or services that dental insurance does not cover. If you chose this option, you will want to make sure your dentist is in-network for the insurance plan and participates in the savings plan.

Finally, and most importantly, when choosing a dental insurance plan, dental savings plan, or both, you should weigh the pros, cons, and total costs of each option. To do this, it is helpful if you have an idea of your expected dental needs. Then, you can estimate what your total dental care cost will be under each plan considering copays, deductibles, benefit caps, covered services, and discounts.




Forest research studies; contribute toward satisfying demand for wood products; provide a safe and effectives road system; increase public safety related to wildfire potential; and maintain or enhance recreation experiences.

Alternative 2, the Proposed Action, meets the purpose and need with actions on around 12,100 acres of timber harvest, 562 acres of fuel reduction pertaining to wildfire probability and reforestation, 6.5 miles of hunting hiking trails maintenance, 1.2 miles of new road construction, 0.2 mile temporary road construction, road reconstruction, road closure and removal from Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM), 50.7 miles of unauthorized roads added as closed to public motor vehicle use, and road decommissioning.

The National Forest System has many needs and priorities on the National Level and has much input from groups and individuals Nationwide. Many local residents and users of the forest have had past concerns with reduced access to the forest, especially in regards to forest products and motorized vehicle use. To the advantage of Forest County, this proposed project includes 12,100 acres of timber harvesting which will benefit our timber industry. The project will include 46.4 miles of road reconstruction which will improve the current forest roads. The project will include 6.5 miles hiking trails maintenance which will improve our hunting resources. The project proposes reducing forest access by closing of 50.7 miles of roads currently used by motorized vehicles, it proposes converting 48.9 miles of road to trail and it proposes eliminating 147.2 miles of road by obliteration. Net loss of motorized forest access will be a little over 247 miles of roads, if this concerns you, now is your time to voice your opinion. prisoners for various services, a support of broadband expansion, approval of the purchase of a mid-size SUV 4x4 in the \$25,000 range for the Health Department, a change in fire number fees, an abolishment of the nuisance ordinance, and a movement of money from the Gang Task Force (where it is not needed now) to the Youth Task Force. A street signing ordinance was also passed.

It was also a unanimous vote to oppose the closing the Blackwell Job Corps, with a discussion of the loss of 54 jobs and the fact that this facility has been given awards for their work in training young people trades that are needed in our society.

In addition, the rules for usage of the Courthouse Square for activities was changed and approved, without making the facility not available to non-profits holding an event.

There were two pieces of correspondence read that pushed for the rehiring of former Forest Administrator Dave Ziolkowski. Ron Krueger sent a letter to the board as did Gary Mueller. Both letters were read aloud to the assemblage. Mueller's letter is printed in this issue of the Pioneer.

There were two award given at the board meeting. Shannon Boney, the Child Support Director, was given an award for 20 years of service. In addition, the Child Support Department, which consists of Shannon Boney, Nancy Donek and Stephanie Statezny, was given an Outstanding Achievement Award.
