There were numerous trees down in Pelican Lake, and the town hall was damaged by a large white pine that blew over along the lake shore. The blow-downs continued on into Elcho.

Elcho also had plenty of trees that caused roof damage, as did the winds. A section of the roof of the Elcho Fire Department was missing and laying across the street from the station. As we traveled east on County K, the damage increased, as can be seen in the photo of the house below plus a pickup seen under the debris.



Some recreation areas closed

Strong winds and rain caused significant damage to portions of the Lakewood-Laona Ranger District on the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest.

Forest Service personnel began surveying the damage this morning and will be continuing to assess recreation sites, roads, trails and the Forest in the coming days.

Currently, Bagley Rapids, Boot Lake, and Boulder Lake campgrounds are closed until further notice as well as all trails in that area. There are numerous trees down in this area causing roads to be impassable.

The Forest has issued a Road and Area Closure for National Forest System lands in Oconto County including all roads, trails, dispersed and developed recreation sites.

"As crews begin clearing areas from the storm damage they will be reopened," said Mike Brown, District Ranger on the Lakewood-Laona Ranger District of the Cheguamegon-Nicolet National Forest. "Safety is our number one priority - we want to ensure our roads, trails and recreation sites are safe for the public before reopening them."

The additional storms and rain today may cause further damage to Forest Service roads, bridges, trails and recreation areas. Please use caution if visiting the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest and traveling on Forest Service roads, bridges and trails.

Drivers are advised to practice defensive driving techniques, reduce your speed, drive with your lights on and watch out for flooded roadways, washed-out culverts and bridges, trees on roadways and other storm debris. 5 Essential Tips for Aging Well and Happily

There's no shortage of advice on how to age without feeling like we're getting old. Some see age as a state of mind, some cite social engagement, and still others emphasize diet and physical health as essential to keeping us young.

Essential Tips for Aging Well

After searching through dozens of aging articles and studies, we've found the top five essential tips for aging happily and staying healthy.

1. Be Socially Engaged

Maintaining active connections with our community, family and friends is critical to staying healthy, both mentally and physically. As we ourselves get older, our family relationships change and we have opportunities to mend fences - particularly with our own aging parents. In addition, aging adults are in the unique position of being able to learn a lot from older and younger friends — the former providing a sense of perspective, and the latter a sense of youth. Meanwhile, social isolation is a major predictor of depression, as well as having negative health effects: the Louisiana Healthy Aging Study reported earlier this year that more social engagement has a significant effect on physical health later in life.

2. Have a Plan for Your Later Years

On Psychology Today's website, aging expert Helen Kivnick, Ph.D., a psychologist at the University of Minnesota, points out that our ever-increasing life expectancy presents an amazing opportunity for personal growth: "Because people live longer and with greater independence, they can plan their futures more actively," she says. Of course, that means we can't just sit around waiting to get old and watching our bodies and minds deteriorate. We have to think about what we might want to do, whether it's spending more time in the garden or learning a new creative skill. "[T]he most important thing we can do to ensure a comfortable and interesting old age is to plan for one."

3. Rethink the Idea of Older Age

Several aging experts are starting to lay some of the blame for our ambivalence about getting older on the pervasive effects of ageism in our society. Learning to accept the natural changes to our bodies and minds that occur as we age is a big part of combating the problem. Whether it's the media or pharmaceutical companies, we are bombarded with messages about how we're going to start falling apart, our bodies losing vitality and our minds losing acuity, and this makes the prospect of getting older somewhat depressing; but with aging as with anything else, there is such a thing as a self-fulfilling prophecy. If we look at getting older as an opportunity — a chance to really focus on what is important to us - we can look forward to actually becoming healthier and happier with age.

4. Stay Physically Active

We've all heard the saying: use it or lose it. If you want to remain healthy and vital well into your later years, exercise is a must. Regular physical exercise will help you maintain flexibility and muscle mass, sure, but it can also keep you feeling young. It's mentally empowering to be able to continue doing many of the physical activities you did when you were younger - some people, in fact, are more fit as older adults than they were as young adults. But perhaps the most compelling evidence of all for staying active comes from a study in the Archives of Internal Medicine: those who were more physically fit in midlife were less likely to develop chronic health conditions in old age, such as Alzheimer's disease or congestive heart failure.

5. Watch Your Stress Levels

Relax! Slow down! It's advice we're all used to in our increasingly hectic daily lives, but stress is a bit more complex than that. On the one hand, debilitating stress can have negative effects on our health later in life: a study in the Journal of Gerontology found that adults who reported greater work stress in midlife were more likely to show disabilities and physical difficulties in older age. Oddly enough, though, a little stress can be good for us. "If you never have to react to anything demanding, the mechanisms in your brain that help you deal with taxing situations will atrophy," says Luigi Ferrucci, MD, PhD, scientific director of the National Institute on Aging, in an article on Oprah.com. Striking the right balance for each individual is the key.

DNR taking more steps to protect Wisconsin drinking water

MADISON, Wis. - In light of recent discoveries of contamination of drinking water and groundwater across the state, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is initiating a new voluntary PFAS testing program.

The DNR will ask 125 municipal wastewater treatment facilities to begin sampling and analyzing water flowing in and out of the facilities for PFAS compounds to gain a better understanding of how and where PFAS contaminants could be entering the air, land, and waters of the state before ultimately ending up in public and private drinking water.

PFAS (per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances) are a group of human-made chemicals used for decades in numerous products including non-stick cookware, fast food wrappers, stain-resistant sprays, and certain types of firefighting foam that have made their way into the environment.

"No one should ever be afraid to turn on their tap. Clean drinking water is a public health priority," said DNR Secretary-designee Preston Cole. "Water is life-giving. We have an opportunity with this initiative to take a large step forward in protecting our citizens and our natural resources from harmful contaminants."

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A letter is being sent Monday to the municipal wastewater treatment facilities requesting that they sample their discharges for PFAS. The included facilities were selected because they are more likely to receive wastewater from businesses that knowingly or unknowingly use PFAS.

Based on initiatives by other states such as Minnesota and Michigan, it was discovered that PFAS could enter the municipal wastewater system. These legacy contaminants can then be unintentionally transferred to farm fields through land spreading, to groundwater and our rivers and lakes through surface water discharges, and finally into our drinking water.

Data from the sampling results will be used to assist facilities to identify and implement a plan to reduce the amount of PFOA and PFOS entering their facility. The data will also be used to inform DNR on any rule making and associated economic impact analyses as part of the effort to adopt surface water standards and groundwater standards for these two PFAS compounds.

In addition to this wastewater sampling initiate, the DNR is also developing administrative rules in the fall to establish groundwater quality standards for two PFAS compounds, PFOA and PFOS. The public will be invited to provide input at several steps in the process.

Since EPA does not have a federal drinking water standard for these contaminants, like other states, Wisconsin is working to address this critical issue. The rule-making process started with the state department of health services recommending a cumulative groundwater enforcement standard of 20 nanograms per liter (ng/L) or parts per trillion (ppt) for PFOA and PFOS. The recommended standards will be enforceable once the rules are finalized.

The DHS recommendation for groundwater enforcement standards for PFOA and PFOS are comparable to current guidelines or standards in New Hampshire, New Jersey, Vermont, and Minnesota. Michigan is also developing standards that once finalized will be close to 20 ppt.


According to the National Institute on Alcohol and Alcoholism the use of alcohol by people under the age of 21 is unsafe, unhealthy, and unacceptable. This is a problem that needs to be addressed by communities across Wisconsin, now, to assure that our youth reach their full potential in life.

Alcohol is unsafe because it is a factor in the deaths of more than 4,300 youth and young adults every year in the United States. This is broken down as: 1,580 deaths from motor vehicle crashes, 1,269 homicides, 492 suicides, and 245 from alcohol poisoning, falls, burns, and drownings.

Alcohol use by this age group is unhealthy because the brain is still developing and is not complete until a person is well into their 20's. Alcohol can alter brain development. Youth and young persons who drink are more likely to have behavioral issues in school that result in poor academic performance, suspensions, and expulsions. People who start drinking before the age of 15 are more likely to have an alcohol use disorder later in life.

Alcohol use by underage people is unacceptable. A person under the age of 21 caught drinking alcohol and or buying or trying to buy alcohol may be fined up to \$500.00. First time offenders also face a suspension of their driver's license. Adults may be fined up to \$500.00 for failing to stop underage drinking, and they also may be fined up to \$500.00 for illegally providing alcohol to people under the age of 21.

There are many ways a community can prevent underage drinking. One strategy is to address the acceptability, availability, attractiveness, and affordability of alcohol in the home and in the community. Don't make alcohol part of everyday living. Don't have alcohol available to underage people. Don't advertise alcohol products where youth and young adults can easily see it. To make it less affordable, encourage business owners to discontinue "buy one, get one free" offers and similar pricing promotions. Our youth are our future. As a community it is up to us to try to instill good values and provide positive role models for or youth to look up to. There has never been a more important time than now to try to make changes to ensure a bright future for our youth. 

"Once students earn that short-term diploma, they can use that to get a job in their field of study and continue taking classes towards their associate's degree," he said. "That way they're earning money, they're getting valuable professional work experience, and they're learning more advanced skills so they can get an even better job when they graduate. It really is the perfect pathway."

Administrative Professional programs this fall at Nicolet College

"What's beneficial to students is that they progress through the competencies at their own pace," DeNamur explained. "If they have previous experience with a specific skill, they can progress through that competency fairly quickly. If they come across one that is more challenging, they can work one-on-one with the instructor until they grasp the concept and master the given skill."

Because the structure is so flexible, students who prefer the more traditional classroom approach can set up their schedules to reflect that as well, DeNamur added.

"That's the beauty of it," he explained. "Some students like the social aspect of being in a class with others, of getting to know other students and meeting a challenge together. If that's what works best for them then that's what we'll put together."

Both the Accounting and Administrative Professional programs are structured in a way where students first earn a short-term technical diploma and then use that credential as a stepping stone to a two-year associate's degree.
