A Day of Remembrance

An overdose is a biological response that happens when the human body receives too much of a substance. It can be intentional or accidental, and can be caused by illicit drugs, alcohol, prescription medication, and other substances. In many cases, overdoses are fatal, although most individuals can be saved if medical treatment is provided quickly enough. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 70,237 drug overdose deaths occurred in the United States in 2017. Opioidsmainly synthetic opioids (other than methadone) are currently the main driver of drug overdose deaths. Opioids were involved in 47,600 overdose deaths in 2017 (67.8% of all drug overdose deaths).

Naloxone, or Narcan, is an opioid agonist that can block the effects that opioids have on the body. If someone experiences an overdose, depending on the severity, one to several doses of Narcan can actually stop it in progress, and save someone's life. Narcan is available without prescription across the country. Narcan is a quick fix in an overdose for opioids, such as heroin, but will have no effect on other substances such as benzodiazepines. Benzodiazepines are used commonly for anxiety, as a muscle relaxer, seizures, and panic disorders. Some of these prescriptions are abused or not taken as recommended, which can lead to an overdose.

In Forest County there has been a staggering 14 drug overdose deaths recorded in the last 5 years. To bring attention to this number and those we have lost the Community Coalition of Forest County is setting up an Empty Chair Campaign next to the Laona Rescue Squad in Wabeno over this holiday weekend. The Empty Chair Campaign is a symbol used to stand in for the missing persons from our families and highlight their absence. To help us decrease this number in 2020 here are some tips: keep your medications in a locked location, and dispose of unused medications. The Forest County Health Department has free lock boxes for those interested, and there is a 24/7 drug disposal located in the Forest County Sheriffs lobby. There is also an anonymous tip line at both the Forest County dispatch and the Forest County Potawatomi Health & Wellness. We encourage you to join us for a free Narcan training this fall to learn the skills that just may save a life.

We appreciate all of our Emergency Medical Services and Law Enforcement for all your hard work preventing and stopping overdoses, without you our chair count would be a lot higher than 14. For more information please call the Forest County Health Department at 715-478-3371



Rolly Yocum had an idea that an off-road race would be a big success here in the Northwoods. There were plenty of old logging roads complete with mud and rocks, and it could be a fun event and good for local businesses.

The local Jaycees were the first group to hold the Brush Run 101. The race was called "101" because it was 101 miles of brush, mud, rocks, and an occasional field or gravel fire lane. There were four laps of 25.25 miles, and the race started at the Forest County Fair grounds in the northeast corner of Crandon. It was through the woods to Carter's field and on to the Otter Creek country, then north to the mud holes on the Johnson Road near Argonne and back to the fairgrounds and then do it three more times.

There were 47 entries that included a field of motorcycles. The younger members of the group suggested that the motorcycles start first, as they would make the loops quicker than the cars. The older members scoffed at the idea and started the cars and trucks first. It was a time when the younger members were wiser than the older members of the group. Motorcycles flew past the cars, passing in tight places and making the four-wheel



racers very nervous! Most of the entries couldn't have made it through the mud without the help of fellow racers who helped push each other through mud holes. It wasn't as competitive as it would be in the years to come. One of the entries that first year hit a ruffed grouse and stopped the car to look for the bird!

There was an interesting selection of entries that included a one-ton panel truck that had been used to deliver milk for the Argonne Dairy, a 1955 DeSoto, a 1949 Chevy car, some home-made dune buggies, one made from a Buick with low ground clearance. The bottom of the buggy was heavy steel, so it slid quite nicely over the rocks. The surprise that first year was an entry from Chicago. Wally Schauer's VW dune buggy easily won the race, and in fact, most entries never finished. This led to future races where several entries were rear-engine Chevy Corvairs, but they didn't hold up well to the pounding on the front end.

Those first few races were a great time for the guys who put together a race car or truck on a shoe string budget, but it was drawing attention from more sophisticated racers. It was about this time in the race's history that somebody pointed out that there was no world's championship race, and Crandon registered the title. Another change was that spectators couldn't see most of the race, as it was out in the woods.

The race was moved to Pitt's field, in 1979, and a five-mile track that provided better viewing to spectators. After four years, the race was moved to the current site just










Wild rice harvest season outlook

In Wisconsin, wild rice harvesters are beginning to plan their 2019 season. The Department of Natural Resources is reminding people to acquire the necessary license before heading into the rice beds and is asking them to complete the harvester survey sent by mail at the close of the season.

"Overall, the wild rice crop across northern for abundance," said Jason Fleener, DNR wetland habitat specialist. "However, plenty of good harvest opportunities exist if ricers do their homework to locate the right body of water to harvest," he added.

Several waters in the Polk County and Northern Sustained high water tables have raised lake levels, especially in north-central Wisconsin, affecting wild rice production.

A helpful resource is GLIFWC's Off-Reservation page does not contain a comprehensive list of all Wisconsin wild rice waters, but it features reports on commonly harvested waters. The survey results posted on this page reflect a body of water's wild rice crop relative to total abundance or predict harvest success. For example, a large lake assessed with a "fair" crop of rice may result in greater harvest opportunity than a small lake with a "good" crop. This page also contains a list of date-regulated waters with opening dates and closures as they are determined.

As the season progresses, lake opening notices will be posted on the GLIFWC page regularly as dates are determined. Often, lakes do not open until Labor Day weekend or later. Year-to-year variation occurs, so check the website out frequently for the latest information. Dateregulated lakes will also be posted at least 24 hours before the lake opens for harvest at commonly used boat landings. "The openings for local date-regulated lakes provides a good barometer for when local non-date-regulated lakes are ready for harvest," noted Fleener.

Opening harvest dates for date-regulated waters are determined jointly by DNR and tribal officials. Many of these date-regulated waters are producing insufficient crops or no wild rice and will be posted as closed

for harvest this year.

Recreational boaters, anglers and early teal and goose hunters are encouraged to take precautionary measures using watercraft on waters with wild rice beds. Wave action has shown to cause damage to rice beds as they are maturing throughout the spring and summer. Watercraft usage directly in wild rice beds cuts and injures plants. Intentional cutting of wild rice plants is illegal over Wisconsin's public waters.

DNR officials stress the importance of waiting to harvest until rice falls with relatively little effort while flailing. If most of the rice appears to be milky or still growing inside the hull, it is best to come back and try harvesting later. Premature harvest attempts often inhibit the maturation of the rice kernels and can damage plants if harvesters use excessive force in the flailing process. This not only affects harvest opportunities for other rice harvesters but can also have long-term effects on the sustainability of rice beds. As a general rule-of-thumb, rice growing on river systems tends to mature sooner than lake rice. Lakes such as Pacwawong Lake in Sawyer County and Island Lake in Vilas County are notorious for ripening later and often do not peak until mid-

Wisconsin DNR produced a video on harvesting wild rice that offers an introductory look at the tools and proper techniques for wild rice harvesting, people can view the video on the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, by searching keywords "wild rice." Information regarding wild rice licensing and harvest regulations are also available on the wild rice web page.

People who purchase a wild rice harvesting license through DNR's Go Wild licensing system will be mailed a wild rice harvest survey following the harvesting season. The survey is coordinated jointly between the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission (GLIFWC) and Wisconsin DNR. The survey is a critical tool in gathering data that helps inform future management and research of wild rice. The survey tracks biological trends over time, such as estimates of annual harvest, estimates of average harvest (pounds) per trip, and trends in the presence of disease and pests. The survey also addresses social issues such as harvester experience and preferences. Those harvesters who receive a survey are encouraged to fill it out and mail it in as another way to support wild rice conservation.

To receive email updates regarding wild rice in Wisconsin, visit dnr.wi.gov and click on the email icon near the bottom of the page titled "subscribe for updates for DNR topics" and follow the prompts and select the appropriate distribution list.

Mental Health: How to be a Good Ally

Mental health includes our emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, and act. It also helps determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and make choices. Positive mental health allows people to realize their full potential, cope with the stresses of life, work productively, and make meaningful contributions to their communities.

When it comes to mental health and others, what we say and how we listen matters. Here is some advice on how to help someone open up about their mental health:

Listen attentively. Listening attentively involves your full focus and consideration. Listen for what the person is telling you, but also what their body language might be telling you. If you are able to refer back to something they said later on, it not only shows you were listening, but that you care about the person and what they've shared with you. Make sure to put away all distractions (phone, games, etc.) and face the person you're speaking with. Look at them as they talk to you. Nod your head in understanding when appropriate, and gently inquire about something they brought up.

Ask open-ended questions. Make sure the conversation is not full of questions the other person can answer with a simple yes or no. Instead, open up a space for understanding by asking open-ended questions like: "How have you been feeling lately? What have you been doing to cope? What do you want to do about that?" You can also express your concern and encourage the person to talk about what's going on by offering caring statements like: "You seem to be a bit quiet these days. What's been on your mind?" or "You don't seem like yourself lately. Is anything going on?"

Don't assume or make judgments. Opening up and reaching out for help can be difficult. If you make assumptions and judgments in response, it can make it even harder for people to express themselves. Don't assume how a person feels, what they need, or what's going on with them. Instead, ask gently for clarification when you need some. If your friend or loved one tells you things that make you uneasy, or that you might not agree with, do your best to set aside all judgment. Expressing warm-hearted concern and offering support should always be the goal.

Find a way to help or get help. Sometimes, you might be able to directly help the person you're concerned about. Maybe all they needed was to vent or have someone to talk to and help sort out their feelings. For some people, it might be helpful to send them positive text messages throughout the week or make a brief telephone call whenever you get the chance.

However, there are some cases in which the ways you can help are limited. If a person is suicidal, for example, then you need to get help from those more equipped to handle the situation. Ask your friend or loved one if they want to get help, and offer them the resources to do so. Assure them there's nothing wrong with getting the help they need and that by doing so, they've taken the first step to feeling better. Sometimes, just hearing this will help lift some weight off their shoulders. Offering to take your friend loved one to these helpful spaces, or to find the proper assistance, can go a long way.

Some tips for supporting positive mental health

include:

- · Connecting with others
- Staying positive
- · Getting physically active
- · Helping others
- Getting enough sleep
- Eating healthy foods
- Developing coping skills
- Getting professional help if you need it

SCHOOL DISTRICT OF WABENO AREA

ACCESS TO PUBLIC RECORDS

The Board of the School District of Wabeno Area shall allow persons to have access to school district records in accordance with this policy and implementing procedures and in accordance with the law. The district administrator is designated as the legal custodian of records. The legal custodian shall safely keep and preserve records of the authority and shall have full legal power to render decisions and carry out duties related to those records maintained by any school district authority. The legal custodian may deny access to records only in accordance with the law.

Public records may be inspected, copied and/or abstracted at any time during the established district office hours, which are from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M., Monday through Friday. The legal custodian may establish fees for services in accordance with the law. A list of fees is available at the district office.

STUDENT RECORDS

Student records are maintained to assist students, parents, guardians, and the school in achieving the student's educational goals. Such records are accumulated, maintained, released, transferred, and eventually destroyed by the building principal or his/her designee in accordance with state and federal law. Only those individuals or agencies specifically authorized by state and federal law shall be granted access to a student's records.

The school district does forward records to other schools that have requested the records and in which the student seeks or intends to enroll, or is already enrolled, as long as the disclosure is for purposes related to the student's enrollment or transfer.

An adult student or the parent/guardian of a minor student may inspect the student's records in accordance with administrative policy and established procedures and may challenge the content if he/she believes the records are inaccurate or misleading. Such a complaint would be filed with the building principal. If not satisfied with the decision, an appeal avenue is available through the Family Policy and Regulations Office of the U.S. Department of Education.

TEACHER LICENCE

Attention Sokaogon Chippewa Tribal Members:

According to the Sokaogon Chippewa Constitution, you possess the exclusive right to harvest the wild rice on the Sokaogon Chippewa reservation's wild rice bed, known as Rice Lake.

The exclusive right comes through the right of enrolled membership.

At the Tribal Council meeting of August 19, 2019, a resolution was presented to the Tribal Council regarding "exclusive right-tribal member's only" wild rice harvesting and enactment of harvesting regulations to ensure that the wild rice bed and tribal harvester's rights be respected.

At the above meeting, some individuals expressed that they wanted to abolish their "and other's" exclusive harvesting right.

Voiding of the exclusive harvesting right means that the wild rice bed would be open to harvest by ALL PERSONS POSSESSING A STATE OF WISCONSIN WILD RICE HARVESTING PERMIT.

Therefore, I am circulating a petition asking for a referendum vote to be taken on the matter. This way, all tribal member's rights and opinions will be respected.

Please call or text me at 715-784-0849, if you want to sign the petition asking for a referendum vote.

I, the undersigned, verify by signature that I am an enrolled member of the Sokaogon Chippewa tribe, and that I want a Referendum Vote on the following matter, in the following language.

"I, as a Sokaogon Chippewa tribal member possess the exclusive wild rice harvesting right to the wild rice bed located on Sokaogon Chippewa Reservation's Rice Lake. I do not want to have my exclusive right given to any other parties. And, I also agree that the attached harvesting regulations should be enacted."

____ I am in agreement with upholding the exclusive wild rice harvesting rights and harvesting regulations.

___ I am not in agreement with tribal members having exclusive wild rice harvesting rights."
Sokaogon Chippewa Manoomin (Wild Rice) Harvesting Regulations

APPLICATION AND PERMIT: An application for a permit must be completed to harvest wild rice on "Rice Lake" which is located on the Sokaogon Chippewa reservation. This permit allows for the harvesting of wild rice as per conditions set forth by the Tribal Council, and its designated authority: Wild Rice Chiefs.

PERMITS: A Sokaogon Chippewa tribal Identification card and permit is required to harvest wild rice on Rice Lake (Sokaogon Chippewa reservation). The permit and tribal identification card is to be with the tribal members at all times while on the lake. No tribal member shall transfer their permit or tribal identification card to another person, or allow the use thereof.

RICING STICKS: You must use smooth, rounded cedar rods or sticks no longer than 38 inches. (Note: Binding of rice is not permitted.)

BOATS: Boats can be no longer than 17 feet, or wider than 38 inches. The gunwales of the boat cannot be modified to capture rice outside the boat. Boats can only be propelled with push poles or paddles.

OUTBOARD AND TROLLING MOTORS: No battery-operated trolling motor or gasoline outboard motor can be utilized to access the lake via Swamp or any other creek, nor upon the lake.

RICING HOURS: 10:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. (Required to be off the lake by 6:30 p.m.)

OPENING DATE OF LAKE: All tribal members with permits shall adhere to the opening of the lake as set forth by the Wild Rice Chiefs, and refrain from harvesting until such time.

CLOSING OF THE LAKE: All tribal members who have obtained a wild rice permit shall adhere to the Wild Rice Chiefs decision to close the lake for day of recuperation for the plants, or for closing of the season.

ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES: Hook and line fishing is allowed on the lake during wild rice harvesting hours. The hunting of ducks and other water fowl is not allowed during wild rice harvesting hours.

VIOLATIONS: Violations of this permit or any conditions of harvesting stated herein shall be investigated by the Wild Rice Chiefs and/or Tribal Law Enforcement, and a determination will be made and could result in the revocation of such permit. Violations may also subject the violator to confiscation of wild rice, assessment of any actual damages caused, prosecution for trespass, theft, littering, etc.

ANNUAL NOTICE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION REFERRAL AND EVALUATION PROCEDURES

Upon request, the School District of Wabeno Area is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for an evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. A referral may be made by contacting Robert Tucker, Director of Special Education, School District of Wabeno Area, at 715-473-2592, or by writing him at P.O. Box 460, Wabeno, WI 54566.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL NEEDS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM This notice serves to inform parents and quardians of

This notice serves to inform parents and guardians of students with disabilities that the State of Wisconsin has established the Special Needs Scholarship Program. Under this scholarship program and as further specified in state law, a child with a disability who has been denied the opportunity to attend a nonresident school district under the full-time open enrollment program may be eligible to receive a scholarship from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that allows the child to attend an eligible private school that is participating in the Special Needs Scholarship Program.

This is a state-administered program. A parent or guardian who is interested in the Special Needs Scholarship Program should independently verify the participating private schools and the specific terms, eligibility criteria, and application procedures of the scholarship program with the DPI.

The Special Needs Scholarship Program is further defined under section 115.7915 of the state statutes. However, special eligibility requirements not found in that statute exist for program scholarships that are awarded for private school attendance that initially begins in the 2019-2020 school year. 

Choosing an elder law or estate planning attorney who is familiar with Medicaid laws

Elder law is a legal specialty area focused on the specific legal needs of older adults. Elder law attorneys have a wide variety of expertise with trust and estate planning, Medicare, Social Security, retirement, guardianships, health and long-term care planning, public benefits including Medicaid, and many other legal issues affecting older adults.

That said, not all elder law attorneys are familiar with every aspect and every detail of the law that may affect older adults. Some elder law attorneys may be well-versed in estate planning and guardianships but not know much about Medicaid law.

If you are in a Medicaid program or are likely to ever need Medicaid, especially for any type of long-term care, it is important to find an elder law attorney who is experienced in Medicaid law (sometimes called "Medicaid planning.") Even if this attorney focuses on drafting a will or a trust for you, it is important that the attorney is aware of and can spot potential issues with Medicaid in the future.

The issues related to Medicaid that could arise, could be prevented, or that could be minimized may include:

- Eligibility For example, an estate plan with careful attention to Medicaid planning could include setting up burial trusts or other types of exempt assets that may make someone eligible for Medicaid services.
- Divestment penalties Long-term care Medicaid programs have income and asset limits to qualify. If someone gives money away or sells something for less than fair market value in order to qualify for Medicaid, that could be seen as a divestment and the Medicaid recipient would be subject to related penalties. An attorney who is familiar with Medicaid laws may be able to find ways to prevent this from happening or lessen its impact.
- Estate Recovery Medicaid law allows the state to recover some costs that were paid on behalf of a Medicaid recipient. This includes placing a lien on the person's home and/or making a claim against their estate. An attorney who is familiar with Medicaid laws may be able to help with estate recovery as a potential issue.

The types of Medicaid services that may be affected by these issues include long-term care nursing home Medicaid, Medicaid recipients who are considered "institutionalized" in the hospital, and community-based waiver programs such as Family Care, IRIS, Community Options Program (COP), and others. Also, it does not matter whether you are currently a member of any of these programs, if there is even a possibility that you may need these services in the future, it is a good idea to find an attorney who is familiar with Medicaid laws.

Please note that ADRC staff and Elder Benefit Specialists do not provide estate or Medicaid planning services or advice. You will need to contact a private attorney for that. Below are some resources to help you find one, and again, if Medicaid is a concern for you, make sure to ask that attorney if they are familiar with Medicaid laws and Medicaid planning.

Tips for parents of children with disabilities who want them to succeed in school

As someone with a disability myself, and who also knows what it means to parent a child with multiple disabilities, I've become an advocate for my children on so many fronts, including their education. After all, when it comes to disability and inclusion, despite good intentions, many schools don't even know what they don't know. Also, only 61% of students with disabilities get a high school degree — so it is up to people with disabilities, and their loved ones, to educate and advocate for disability inclusion and success. This is especially true when enabling children with disabilities to have full access to education. While today on average only 1-in-3 working age adults with a disability have a job, studies show that 70% of young people with disabilities can get jobs and careers. But we have to do our part. Here are some tips I've used in the past that may be helpful to you: 1. Know you are not alone.

Fully 1-in-5 Americans has a disability. While parenting a child with differences feels lonely at times, seek out other families with similar experiences Peers can

friends. They reside in your local community and online.

2.Research which schools in your area have real experience and success working with children with disabilities

offer good advice, and may become your new best

While all public schools are required to accommodate students with disabilities, some schools may have magnet programs specifically for your child's educational needs. In other cases, you may want to resist when your school district wants to bus your child across town to a school for other kids with disabilities, when accommodations can be easily made at his or her neighborhood school.

Call your local disability groups to see what resources and leads they can offer. Ask other parents of children with disabilities about their experiences with different schools. Go online to look at the school's website. Does it say they welcome and serve people with disabilities?

3. Write an "all about how to succeed with my child" letter.

Yes, you should also prepare a file with your child's Individualize Education Plan (IEP), including suggestions for success from any speech, physical, occupational, mental health or other therapists that works with your child. But don't expect all teachers to be knowledgeable enough to understand some of the technical material. Your letter should be easy to read.

Provide a toolkit for working with your child. Put things into simple language with bullets of information that the school needs to know to make your child's experience safe and successful.

Remember, as a parent, you have unique insights about your child that can help your child's teacher understand his/her strengths and needs. Your candor, experience and advice will be much appreciated. Depending on the age of your child, you may want your child to help write the memo.

4. Request a meeting with your child's teacher and team.

Yes, everyone is busy. However, if you miss out on having a real substantive conversation, you may create a situation that turns your child off to school and learning.

Additionally, it is not enough to meet with the school principal. You need to sit face-to-face with teacher who will be in the classroom with your child, as well as the school leaders who support that teacher. If appropriate, bring your child's therapists. Depending on the age of your child, you may want to bring them to this meeting.

Before the meeting, you should send your memo about your child to all the meeting participants. Bring copies of it to the meeting as well, and have your "elevator pitch" about your child ready to go. You may want to practice it in front of someone who can offer constructive criticism. It is important to get your points across quickly so they can ask questions. Teachers will really appreciate your efforts, resources and transparency.

Once the teachers learn about your child, the school may want to put an extra aid in the classroom to support your child's needs. Alternatively, they may want to match your child with a different teacher who is more experienced. If so, do your "elevator pitch" and Q&A with that teacher as well. The school may benefit from having your child's occupational or physical therapist meet with them, or join the class for a day, to give the teacher some tips.

5. Ask the teacher and team about their preferred method of communication.

Mutual respect and trust are important to all relationships. This includes the relationship you want to cultivate with your child's teacher. That's why it's important to find out which method of communication suits them the best. Many prefer emails.

6. Be fully transparent with your child's team.

If your child has tantrums, be sure the staff understands what causes the tantrums, and how to prevent them. If your child needs notification before a transition, or has a tick or expression that they use to indicate he or she is anxious, the team needs to know, so they can best serve your child. This is not the time to worry about privacy - you need to focus on safety and success. 7.Be upbeat. Teachers want proactive parents.

A positive relationship with your child's teacher

will help your child feel good about school. Before you hit "send," look over emails, making sure they're respectful of the teacher's time and also of their efforts to help your child. It's great for you to ask questions and make suggestions as long as your message conveys your trust that the teacher is performing her job ethically, responsibly and to the best of their ability. You want to be their partner. Remember that a teacher is a person first. Send thank you notes, volunteer, let them know when your child really enjoyed a particular lesson, and try to be considerate of their schedule; teachers h a v e f a m i l i e s t o o.

Talk with your child about they will be learning during the year, and why it is important to you. Let your child know that you have confidence in their ability to master the content, and that you believe it will be a positive part of their life. Reinforce the natural progression of the learning process that occurs over the school year. Learning skills take time and repetition Encourage your child to be patient, attentive, and positive.

8. Share your enthusiasm for learning with your child.

9. Slow down and take the time to do it right.

Transitions are often difficult for children with disabilities. There will be a few bumps in the road. Your child will have a successful year at school in spite of difficulties. As we move into the first few weeks of school, stay calm and positive. Remember to take care of yourself. Know your limitations, and don't be afraid to ask for help. Make sure your child has enough sleep, plenty of time to get up, eat b r e a k f a s t , a n d g e t t o s c h o o l . 10. Familiarize yourself with the other professionals.

Make an effort to find out who it is in the school who can be a resource for you and your child. Learn their roles and how best to access their help if you need them. This can include the principal, cleaning and kitchen crew, front office personnel and others who may work with kids with disabilities on a daily basis.

11. Reinforce your child's ability to cope.

Give your child a few strategies to manage a difficult situation on his or her own, but encourage your child to tell you or the teacher if problems persist. Maintain open lines of communication with the school.

12. Help your child make at least one real friend there.

Arrange play dates. Try to arrange get-togethers with some of your child's classmates during the first weeks of school to help your child establish positive social relationships with peers. Go to holiday events with other children and help facilitate actual friendships for your child. Parents of other children both with and without disabilities who are friends with your child can become your new best friends as well.

13. Listen to Your Child's Feelings.

When your child shows any anxiety about going back to school, the worst thing you can do is brush it off with a "don't worry about it" response. Listen and be responsive to your own child and empower them to advocate for themselves as well. Show them your love. Sometimes you need to take a little step back in order to move forward.

14. Enjoy their childhood.

It goes way too fast!

Farm Service Agency expands payment options The U.S. Department of Assignificants (USDA)

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) is expanding its payment options to now accept debit cards and Automated Clearing House (ACH) debit. These paperless payment options enable FSA customers to pay farm loan payments, measurement service fees, farm program debt repayments and administrative service fees, as well as to purchase aerial maps.

"Our customers have spoken, and we've listened," said Bill Northey, USDA's Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation. "Finding ways to improve customer service and efficiency is important for our farmers, ranchers, producers, and forest landowners who work hard for our nation every day. Now, our customers can make electronic payments instantly by stopping in our offices or calling over the phone."

Previously, only cash, check, money orders and wires were accepted. By using debit cards and ACH debit, transactions are securely processed from the customer's financial institution through Pay.gov, the U.S. Treasury's online payment hub.

While traditional collection methods like cash and paper checks will continue, offering the new alternatives will improve effectiveness and convenience to customers while being more cost effective. In 2017, the average cost to manually process checks, a process that included navigating multiple systems, cost USDA more than \$4.6 million. The expanded payment options will cut the time employees take processing payments by 75 percent.

"At USDA, we're focused on modernization to improve customer service," said Northey. "If half of our customers use these new payment options, we'll see a \$1 million savings in one year. These new payment methods are one part of a much larger effort to expand options for our customers, as well as to make our services more effective and efficient."

Today's announcement marks the beginning of a multi-phased roll-out of new payment options for USDA customers. Ultimately, payment option flexibility will be extended to allow farmers and producers to use debit cards and ACH debit payments to make payments for all FSA programs, including farm storage facility loan repayments, farm loan facility fees, marketing assistance loan repayments, Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) administrative fees and premiums and Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) fees.

DNR asks for hunters to record their wildlife observations

With the start of the 2019 deer hunting season Sept. 14, the Department of Natural Resources is kicking off its 11th annual Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey. The easy-to-use survey is a way for hunters to record their observations of deer and other wildlife while out hunting. Survey results help track abundance trends for Wisconsin's deer herd and other wildlife.

The DNR asks archery and gun hunters to record all their hunting activity throughout the deer season, even if no wildlife were seen during a hunt. The observations provide the DNR with an index to abundance for many wildlife species.

Hunters can enter observations by desktop, mail or smartphone. For more information about entering Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey observations go to the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, and keyword search "Deer Hunter Wildlife."

At the end of the survey, participants can receive a personalized summary of all recorded wildlife from that season. The survey period ends January 2020.

Disaster recover microloans now available

The North Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (NCWRPC) has again partnered with the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) to provide Disaster Recovery Microloan (DRM) funds. This program will provide a source of funds for small businesses to cover expenses related to storm damage that occurred in Businesses within Langlade, Portage and Wood Counties are eligible to apply.

The loans, up to \$20,000 per business, may be used for procurement of cleanup and restoration services, operating expenses, temporary space, and repair and reconstruction work. These are no-interest loans have a two-year repayment period, with payments deferred for at least six months.

"Storms had a devastating economic effect on our areas small businesses", said Darryl Landeau, Senior Planner with the NCWRPC. "This new program provides an immediate source of funds to help those impacted businesses recover from this disaster."

The second year of racing was nice, wet and muddy, as can be seen by the ground. This is a view of a lineup of some of the vehicles entered. Some of them might have finished the race!




The crowds may not have been as big in the early days.




