The Green Treasure Forest Tour is an entertaining and educational trip through a sustained yield forest. The Cracker Barrel Gift Store will be open with unique gifts, books, great fudge and ice cream! A trip through the Nature Center is unique, and to get in the mood for Halloween, visit the Haunted Slaughterhouse. 

Ms. Michelle Boor, Athletic Director, had several gym floor companies work with her to create a new floor design. Our scoreboards in the gym were also in need of updating. With the kind financial assistance from the FCP, we were able to purchase new scoreboards that have controls that are compatible with the football field scoreboard. We now have the ability to use both scoreboards in our gym during tournament events. Like many small rural school districts, budgets are very tight. With the help of the Forest County Potawatomi community, we were able to put together funding for the gym floor and scoreboards, as well as to care for other maintenance areas of need.

There is a new energy-- a heightened excitement from our students and athletes as they are using the gym for physical education classes and our fall sporting events. We hope to see you at many athletic events throughout the fall and winter to share in this excitement. Without the generosity of the Forest County Potawatomi and the generous \$30,000.00 donation to our school district, this notable upgrade to both areas of the floor and scoreboards could have been years away.



Prostate Cancer: Early Detection Provides Treatment Options

(Rhinelander, WI)-Prostate cancer is the second leading cause of cancer among men, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. But prostate cancer is often slow to grow and spread. For this reason, and because of early detection, prostate cancer has one of the highest survival rates of any type of cancer.

According to the American Cancer Society (ACS), the most common screening tool for prostate cancer is the prostate-specific antigen (PSA) test. This blood test measures the presence of PSA circulating in the bloodstream and is usually the first step in any prostate cancer diagnosis.

For 77-year old Roger Marguardt of Rhinelander, early detection for his case of prostate cancer came as the result of his management of other health problems.

"Given my issues, I had been having a PSA test every six months," said Marquardt. "A significant jump in my numbers from one test to the next led to further testing to confirm that I had prostate cancer."

That result introduced him to Dr. Daryl Barton, a radiation oncologist with Radiation Oncology Specialists on staff at the James Beck Cancer Center located at Ascension St. Mary's Hospital.

"One of the benefits of early detection is it allows us to consider all of the options for effective treatment,"

The Wisconsin Groundwater Coordinating Council shared key recommendations for protecting and preserving groundwater resources with the Wisconsin legislature in its August 2019 annual report. Nearly threequarters of Wisconsin residents rely on groundwater as the primary source for their drinking water.

Recognizing the importance of Wisconsin's water resources to public health and the economy. Gov. Tony Evers declared 2019 the Year of Clean Drinking Water and State Assembly Speaker Robin Vos formed a task force to hold hearings focused on water quality throughout Wisconsin. This report helps to inform both efforts about steps that should be taken to protect these vital resources.

"Too many people in Wisconsin are concerned about the safety of their drinking water, our recommendations are intended to change that," said Bruce Rheineck, groundwater section chief for the Department of Natural Resources.

Three of the key recommendations found in the report address some of the most prevalent issues in Wisconsin water quality, including:

Protecting groundwater from nitrate and other agricultural contaminants;

Evaluating groundwater for viruses and other pathogens; and

Addressing emerging challenges such as perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS) chemicals, livestock and mining industries, and climate change impacts.

Areas of the state with a greater density of agriculture generally have a higher frequency of nitrate and pesticide detection, especially in areas of the state with vulnerable geology and soils. The report recommends developing and evaluating a strategy to promote practices that lead to efficient use of nitrogen and careful or reduced use of pesticides to protect drinking water sources.

Viruses and other microbial pathogens have been found in municipal and domestic wells, challenging previous assumptions about their persistence and transport. Identifying where and when pathogens pose threats to human health is fundamental to improving water quality. The council recommends working with partners to increase awareness of waste disposal choices, their risks and costs.

While many emerging challenges threaten the health of Wisconsin's groundwater resources, some rise to the top. The report also highlights the water quality challenges posed by PFAS, livestock industry expansion, metallic mining and climate change. Partner agencies are joining together to formulate strategies to address these challenges and acting on recommendations established in the report.

The 2019 report also notes in the steps taken by participating Council agencies to protect groundwater from contamination and helps the public better understand the sources and distribution of naturally occurring contaminants in groundwater. It also highlights the need for the continued support of applied groundwater research into the factors that affect groundwater supplies and identify the next steps to protect and preserve our valuable groundwater resources.

The Groundwater Coordinating Council was formed in 1984 to help state agencies coordinate activities and exchange information on groundwater. Today, the council and its subcommittees regularly bring together staff from more than ten different agencies, institutions and organizations to communicate and work together on a variety of research, monitoring, data management, education and planning issues. These activities increase coordination across agency lines to avoid duplication, create efficiencies and benefit Wisconsin's taxpayers.

Fall Color Season starts

As temperatures drop and the days get shorter, hints of fall color are becoming visible in the Northwoods.

"The intensity of the fall color season is dependent on the weather that Wisconsin receives during September and October," said Colleen Matula, Forest Silviculturist/Ecologist with the DNR-Division of Forestry. "To have the most brilliant and vibrant fall color display, a series of fall days filled with bright sunshine and cool, but frost-free, evenings are required."

Peak fall color usually occurs in far northern Wisconsin during the last week of September and first week of October. Central Wisconsin peak color generally occurs during mid-October and in southern Wisconsin during the latter half of October.

Leaf pigments determine the range of the color palette. Chlorophyll, which begins to fade in the fall, gives leaves the primary green color and is necessary for photosynthesis. Carotenoids, which produce yellow, orange and brown colors, are always present, so trees like aspen and birch have more predictable colors each year. Anthocyanin, which produces red and purple tints, varies with the conditions and makes each autumn unique for other species. "Forests support Wisconsin's economy through spending by forest recreation enthusiasts as well as jobs and forest products," Matula noted. "While the fall color show draws many visitors to our state, the 17.1 million forested acres in Wisconsin are also a year-round economic contributor, with forest products adding \$24.1 billion annually to state's economy."

As the showy fall colors move through the state from north to south, Wisconsin's state forests and parks offer a front-row seat for the fall color show, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources forestry experts say search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for keywords "explore outdoors" to find nearby public lands.

ABLE Accounts' Impact on HUD Housing

In December 2014, President Obama signed into law the Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) Act. The ABLE Act allows eligible individuals with disabilities and their families to establish ABLE savings accounts that will largely not affect their eligibility for various public benefits. The ABLE Act resulted from nearly a decade-long grassroots effort that originated with a group of parents of children with Down syndrome. These parents recognized the unfairness of not being able to save funds in their child's name for fear of losing needed government benefits. Multiple advocacy groups have heralded this law as the most significant disability law since the Americans with **Disabilities Act.**

An ABLE account is a tax-advantaged savings account that gualified individuals with disabilities may open. The designated beneficiary must be a person with disabilities, whose disability began before the individual's 26th birthday and who meets the other statutory eligibility requirements.

Any person (the account beneficiary, an employer, family and friends) may contribute to the account. Individuals contribute on an after-tax basis. Earnings from ABLE funds grow tax-deferred and are tax-free if used for qualified disability-related expenses.

The ABLE Act promotes the quality of life of individuals with disabilities. Language within the ABLE Act established that ABLE accounts would not impact eligibility for Social Security and Medicaid. In contrast, the ABLE Act did not explicitly address how other means-tested programs should treat the income in ABLE accounts. Rather the law simply has a general catch all language that provides that other mean-tested programs should not count income in ABLE accounts.

Many people with disabilities rely on assistance received from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This assistance from HUD can make a significant impact in preventing individuals with disabilities from being homeless. Generally, HUD rules base eligibility on an individual's annual gross income. Н U program rules do not have an asset test, but HUD's definition of income includes income derived from assets. Moreover, if an applicant's net assets are greater than \$5,000, a housing authority will impute income to the applicant even if the assets do not provide actual income to the applicant.



Drivers asked to watch for buses/students

As students across Wisconsin head back to school, motorists are being reminded to keep a sharp eye out for students, school buses and crossing guards. The State Patrol's September Law of the Month details state laws designed to protect students as they head to and from school activities.

Many Wisconsin school buses are now fitted with amber lights. When flashing, the amber lights tell drivers to slow down because the red flashing lights will soon be activated and the bus is about to stop. Drivers can carefully pass a school bus with amber lights activated, but should do so cautiously.

Wisconsin law (346.48) requires drivers to stop at least 20 feet from a stopped school bus that has its red warning lights flashing. The law applies when approaching a school bus from either direction. The only exception is if you are traveling on the other side of a divided roadway separated by a median or other physical barrier. When passed illegally, school bus drivers are authorized to report violations to law enforcement. A citation for failure to stop for a school bus costs \$326 and four demerit points. Last year in Wisconsin, there were 1,016 traffic convictions for failure to stop for a school bus. "Passing a stopped school bus that has its red lights flashing is illegal and very dangerous," said Wisconsin State Patrol Captain Travis Wanless, Commander of the North Central Region State Patrol Post in Wausau. "Children are easily distracted and don't always think about their own safety, so drivers need to be extra alert."

State law also requires drivers to yield when directed to stop by a school crossing guard (346.46 (2m). Like bus drivers, crossing guards have the authority to report violations to law enforcement.

School buses are among the safest vehicles on the roadways due to their design, construction and because of careful bus drivers. The Wisconsin State Patrol inspects every Wisconsin school bus annually, conducting about 12,000 inspections each year. Inspectors look at mechanical equipment like steering, brakes and lights along with emergency equipment such as first aid kits and fire extinguishers.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation and its Division of State Patrol have produced a podcast on this topic providing additional information about school bus laws and inspections (https://wisdot.libsyn.com/).

HUD has not updated its handbook since November of 2013, which was before the passage of the ABLE Act. So, some housing authorities have continued toinclude the assets in ABLE accounts to determine an applicant's income.

In the past two months, HUD released guidance for the treatment of ABLE accounts. The guidance clarified that housing authorities should disregard amounts held in ABLE accounts. This means housing authorities should not count actual or imputed interest from an ABLE account as income. Further, housing authorities should not treat distributions from the ABLE account as income. The guidance did place some limits on the favorable treatment of ABLE accounts. The guidance provides that housing authorities should continue to treat all wage income received as income, regardless of whether the income goes into an ABLE account.




