It was a successful first attempt at a pumpkin farm, with 1,000 seeds planted and 700 pumpkins produced alongside the driveway.



Crandon is accustomed to transitions from year to year, whether that be losing experienced seniors, facing new competition with new schedules, or learning new drills to enhance skills during practice. This fall will be no different in the fact that adjustments will be made program-wide.

One of the more obvious changes made this fall will be the middle school schedule. Middle school volleyball will now be in the fall, the same time as high school

The Varsity went 16-10 overall last season, placing 3rd in the conference. Key losses were Sydney Gretzinger, Alexa Neilitz, and Tia Poe. All three were offensive placeholders at the net. Returning this year is, Lindsay Littleton, 1st Team All-Conference, Lynzee McGeshick, 2nd Team All-Conference, Leah Littleton, Honorable Mention All-Conference, Grace Gunderson, Brandi Okrasinski, Maddie Stamper, Macie Palubicki, and Abbie Samz. Newcomers are Anjelina Lyons, Bella Toyebo and Abey VanZile.

During the Varsity's preseason, the team traveled to Bonduel and then to Marion to compete in two team tournaments. Crandon was able to face Regional rivals such as Bonduel and Conference competition like Elcho. 



Collared Deer are Legal to Harvest **During Fall Hunting Season**

MADISON, Wis. - During the 2019 hunting season, hunters may spot deer that are equipped with radio collars. Collared deer are part of a mortality study in the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and are legal to hunt with a standard Wisconsin hunting license and tags.

The DNR Office of Applied Science is conducting a five-year mortality study called the Southwest Wisconsin Chronic Wasting Disease, Deer, and Predator Project. Researchers are investigating factors like CWD, predation and hunter harvest, and specifically to what degree these affect survivorship in deer. So far, the project crew has put GPS-enabled collars on 548 deer in Grant, Iowa and Dane counties.

"One of our study objectives is to determine what proportion of our deer herd is harvested each year, and how exactly that differs according to how old the deer is, between bucks and does and between deer that are CWD-infected and those that are not," said DNR Deer Research Scientist Daniel Storm. "That objective depends on hunters essentially treating collared deer like any other deer when deciding whether or not to harvest."

Deer that are collared as part of the Southwest CWD, Deer, and Predator study are legal to harvest. Standard licensing and harvest regulations apply to collared deer just as they do to uncollared deer. Anyone who harvests a collared deer is asked to call the number on the collar so that a crew member can retrieve it. The number to call is 608-935-1940.

The DNR recommends testing for CWD for both collared and uncollared deer. CWD is a transmissible type of spongiform encephalopathy that causes fatal brain and nervous system degeneration in ungulate species like deer, elk, and moose. CWD testing is typically only done post-mortem. To better understand CWD in Wisconsin, the DNR needs to test as many deer as possible for the disease. Proposed SNAP Rule in the News

In July, 2019, the Trump administration proposed a rule change that would revise the eligibility requirements for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). FoodShare is Wisconsin's state implementation of the federal SNAP.

Currently, there are two ways to be financially eligible for FoodShare in Wisconsin:

- 1. Your gross income is less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and you meet one of the following criteria:
 - Receive cash assistance from SSI; or
- Receive cash assistance from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant; or
- Receive cash assistance from state-run General Assistance (GA) programs; or
- You are "Broad-Based Categorially Eligible." In Wisconsin, a person is broad-based categorically eligible if he or she receives Job Center of Wisconsin services, which is a partially TANF-funded service. Because all food unit members are authorized to receive these services, this means that only the 200% FPL threshold is required.

If your income is less than 200% FPL and you meet one of the above conditions, there is no asset test in Wisconsin.

OF

2. Your gross income is more than 200% of the FPL, but your net income (considering all types of household expenses) is less than 100% of the FPL, and you have no more than \$3,500 in assets.

The federal SNAP gross income limit is 130% FPL and the asset limit is \$2,250 (or \$3,500 if at least one person in the household is 60 years old or older or has a disability). However, the current rule allows states to set their own parameters regarding the broad-based categorically eligibility criteria. This means that if your gross income is between 131% and 200% FPL, then the proposed rule would limit categorical eligibility to those who receive substantial, ongoing assistance from TANF. This assistance means cash or non-cash benefits valued at a minimum of \$50 per month for at least six months. Non-cash benefits conveying automatic FoodShare eligibility would be restricted to subsidized employment, work supports, or childcare. The proposed rule would also apply the federal asset limit of \$2,250 (or \$3,500) to those individuals who no longer meet the broad-based categorically eligibility criteria.

It is important to remember that headlines are often misleading. A proposed rule must pass the 60-day comment period, then the rule is amended/changed based on the comments. After the rule has been changed based on the comments, then the final rule is published, and must then be implemented by the states. This process can take years, if the proposed rule makes it to a final rule at all. Proposed rules can also face lawsuits along the way, which further stalls the process. Most estimates show that the proposed rule, if implemented, will affect roughly 3 million SNAP recipients nationwide, 25,000 of those from Wisconsin

As it stands, there are no changes to SNAP or the Wisconsin FoodShare program. This is a proposed rule only. For anyone who would like to share their need for FoodShare or comments/concerns regarding this proposed rule change can submit them in the following ways:

Nicolet receives \$350,000 grant from Lumina Foundation

Nicolet College has been awarded a \$350,000 grant from Lumina Foundation to build clearer pathways to degrees and other credentials for adults, especially for people of color and Native learners. Lumina's All Learning Counts initiative will support Nicolet to ensure that knowledge, skills, and abilities gained outside of formal higher education—through work, military, and other experiences—can be recognized and applied toward programs leading to credentials of value.

Nicolet received one of nine grants awarded nationwide from a pool of 78 applicants.

Nicolet was awarded the grant to increase the post-secondary educational attainment of American Indians in Wisconsin. According to Lumina's Stronger Nation report for Wisconsin, in 2018 the post-secondary credential attainment for Wisconsin residents was 48.4%; and the rate for American Indians in Wisconsin was 25.5%. One of the significant barriers to increasing education attainment beyond high school is the lack of cultural relevance to indigenous people in the typical post-secondary curriculum.

"Through All Learning Counts, we are recognizing exemplars who want to ensure many more Americans will have skills they need to thrive by earning college degrees, certificates, and industry certifications," said Haley Glover, the Lumina strategy director who will oversee the grant program. "We need to think in new ways about the recognition of learning after high school. We must see that all college-level learning, regardless of how and where it is gained, can be applied toward meaningful post-high school credentials."

Nicolet partnered with the Wisconsin Indian Education Association to create the The Many Ways of Knowing: American Indian Culture Competencies for Community College Career Pathways project proposal.

"The project will design curriculum that reflects American Indian cultural competencies across liberal arts and general education courses," said Susie Crazy Thunder, Nicolet tribal outreach coordinator. "It will also create a methodology for recognizing indigenous community learning and knowledge toward increasing the number of tribal members qualified to teach American Indian Studies curriculum."

The project will also develop a framework and criteria for recognizing and awarding credit for prior learning and experience to students for competencies in American Indian language and culture.

To my husband-

A lifetime ago, I was so lost I was almost gone. And then you found me.
Our first date, jouncing through Kukla's fields in a 59 Chevy Impala at
night hunting deer out of season with me driving and you in the shotgun seat with
Louie's 22 hornet bolt action (I'm sure the statute of limitations has run on that
one). I was scared out of my wits, but it was the most fun imaginable for a totally
brainless 17-year-old kid.

When I moved over to Rhinelander to work, you drove over every single night, stayed until after midnight every night, drove back to Crandon and got up for work at 5 a.m. Then one night you said, "we better get married or something so I can get some sleep." So we did.

Soft summer nights on Beatons Lake in Michigan in the bottom of the boat on scratchy old wool army blankets watching the stars traverse the sky until almost morning. Pulling trophy brook trout out one after the other on Otter Creek up G in a little jon boat barely big enough for the two of us just ahead of an epic thunderstorm. The time we saw moose tracks up on Consolidated hunting deer.

When the babies came, every time we brought a baby home from the hospital you elbowed me out of the way, and held that baby constantly, day and night, and rocked him. You couldn't take your eyes off him. You jumped right in with dirty diapers, sitting up day and night with sick kids and the whole nine yards. Going

to every single football game. You sitting alone on the bleachers in a monsoon with a big jacket on; every now and then a little head would peek out of the jacket then go back in. That was our baby. Being hockey roadies for another nine years. You and me lying on top of the covers fully clothed watching the news day and night when our country sent our oldest into a desert war. You carrying our middle one when he had pneumonia, and again when he got bit by a dog and had to have rabies shots.

You followed my impossible dreams. Whatever goofy impossible thing I thought up, you packed up your stuff, all your guns, boat, hunting dogs and all, and went along. You never told me how to act, not even when I swore or danced funny in front of people. I never had to hide my light under a bushel basket or pretend I wasn't smart just to make you feel like a big man, because you didn't need that – you already were. The biggest man I ever knew.

You were always so neat and clean – up at 5 a.m. all combed and washed with a fresh ironed shirt, whistling, every day. You couldn't stand to see dirty dishes or unmade beds. When I was so busy, you just rolled up your sleeves and did them.

When I was in law school, you would give the kids breakfast every morning, get the older boys on the bus, pack up Ja's bottles and diaper bag, take him to Grandma Moreau's, then go out and work hard in the woods all day. At the end of the day, you would pick up Ja, kids would come home on the bus, you would make them from scratch suppers, make sure homework was done, and wash jeans. When your lumberjack buddies tried to give you flak, you just laughed at them and said, "I'm the boss at my house – I do the dishes the way I want." I suspect those lesser men would give anything to be as free as you. That's what I so loved about you – your fearlessness – sometimes to the extent of being foolhardy, but not afraid of one thing - not even me.

I'm no prize. We are two very imperfect people who just decided to hang on together through the ups and downs. We had many good times, many bad times, and a few hair-raising horrible times, because that's what life is. We just decided to ride it out together because that's what marriage is. We had some rip roaring good fights (remember the raw hamburger fight?) and 18,250 rip roaring good nights. But you hung in there with me through it all. And rode it out. No lesser man could have done it. It was the ordinariness and imperfection that brought joy, because it was so real.

You got a little crazy now and then, springtime was always weird, but I have to say there's never been a boring day with you. You have never put on or pretended to be someone you are not. What you see is what you get with you. There's not a sneaky bone in your body. When you tell a lie, it's a big fat bald faced one. If you have 2 dollars left and someone asks you, you give it to them. You have been broke and you have been very comfortable money wise, and you're still the same. Being broke or having money does not impress you in the least and it certainly doesn't define you.

You have never judged other people harshly or looked down on anyone. I don't think I've ever heard you put another person down. You don't have to put anyone else down to make yourself feel like a real man because you already are. You just are.

There are no words for what these fifty years have meant to me. You stayed. You call me your beautiful wife, even decades after the rest of the world has stopped thinking so, if they ever did. You still say you like to look at my pretty little face. And told me you loved me every single day, even when you were so mad at me you could just spit. And brought me coffee.

You stayed. Mighty glad you stayed.

Last month at about this time, we lost a good friend and loyal employee when Dick Jesse died unexpectedly on September 5. We are sad and heartbroken at Dick's passing.



Forest County Historical Society Annual Meeting



The annual meeting of the Forest County Historical Society, held at the Crandon Public Library last Monday, featured discussions on several exciting and challenging projects including continuation of our popular History on Tap event series and significant facility upgrades. The highlight of the evening though, was a presentation by Eagle Scout candidate Bradley Shepherd regarding his recent service project to map the graves of veterans buried at Crandon's Lakeside Cemetery.

An Eagle Service Project, the culmination of a Scout's commitment to an intensive advancement program, must demonstrate leadership of others while benefitting the scout's community, school or another non-profit organization. It is estimated that Eagle Projects contribute approximately 3 million hours of community service every year.

Local veteran's-service organizations have loyally marked the graves of servicemen at Lakeside for many years but the lists they use to locate the graves are incomplete, inaccurate and confusing. With the guidance of local UW-Extension Youth and Family Development Educator and Historical Society president, Michelle Gobert, Bradley reviewed those outdated materials and lead family members and his fellow Scouts from Crandon Troop 649 in confirming and correcting information onsite. He then developed an online database that includes the block and lot location of each veteran.

The main point of Bradley's presentation was that his project is not a finished product, rather it provides a base for more information and corrections to the existing list. "There are actually people that are on the list who don't belong there and a LOT who should be on the list but are not", he said. The Society is hoping to schedule some organized efforts to continue Bradley's work. In the meantime, we encourage the public to visit the site. Visitors can search for friends and family members and will find a form on which they can provide additions and corrections.

To access the site, go to www.crandonareahistory.org and look for the "Lakeside Cemetery Veteran Database". Veterans are listed by lot number but can be easily searched by last name. While the primary goal of the list is to provide a more accurate and complete tool for locating graves, the database has future potential to store biographies, obituaries and other documents pertaining these brave men and women. While you are at the site, check out more of the historical materials photos that the Society has assembled.
