I recently attended a Webinar put on by the Northern Institute of Applied Climate Science. They are stationed at Michigan Tech in Houghton, Michigan and study the climate of Northern Wisconsin and the Western

With our recent cold snap and snowfall, people tend to think climate change is a farce. What we just experienced is weather. Weather plus time equals climate. And yes, our climate is changing, even in the Northwoods. Average temperature has increased by about two degrees since 1950. Precipitation on the other hand has gone down in the Northern half of Wisconsin during the summer and gone up in the Southern half of the state. This is kind of a mystery and a good explanation hasn't been found yet. Large rain events (3 inches +) have become more frequent and more violent. Our growing seasons in the Northwoods are becoming longer. You may think that would be a good thing, but it's not necessarily the case. The combination of temperature, precipitation and growing season can cause a 'threat multiplier' and cause more stress on our forests, more insect pests, freezing/thawing of buds and more invasive species.

Here in the Northwoods, climate change can mean increased drought risks, extreme weather events (remember Mountain last summer), less frozen ground (which actually protects our trees), increased fire risk and

a shift in species ranges.

They were considered a bit of an odd couple. He was a big and burly Irishman, who was known to imbibe a bit much and would never back down from a fight. In spite of what some considered his shortcomings, he was also an intelligent man and not afraid to work.

She was a girl who came from German parentage, and the first of the family to be born in America. She was quite pretty with a slight trace of a German accent picked up from her parents, along with a tendency to be a bit too frugal. Her parents were not happy with her union to the Irishman, but eventually went along with her wishes.

The young couple, now with a small daughter, found themselves in a northern Wisconsin sawmill town. The move from Milwaukee was made because there appeared to be an opportunity working for the big mill in the company town. A man chaser had promised her husband that the company would teach him the sawmill business. The money wasn't great, but there was a decent company house furnished along with electric lights and wood for the cooking and heating stoves, both at a nominal cost. The small town life appealed to both of them, and her husband had learned lumber grading and moved up a bit in ranking and a little bit in the pay scale.

Christmas was coming. This was a bigger holiday for the wife due to her Germanic upbringing, although the Irishman enjoyed it as well. The small family had a Christmas tree and some decorations, but there were new electric lights available this year for Christmas trees, and the wife yearned for them. She was also a bit sad that they didn't have enough glass and porcelain ornaments for the tree. Germans invented the Christmas tree, and her parents had ornaments hanging in multiples from every limb of their Christmas trees. This was the Christmas season that caused her to lose her frugality.

All employees had credit at the company store. The bill was paid by taking the amount owed out of the next paycheck. While shopping for groceries at the store, she wandered by the area that held a prominent display of Christmas tree ornaments, along with strings of electric lights. These days we may say she lost control. When she left, the bill for the groceries was dwarfed by the ten dollar

Each week throughout the winter recreation season, the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest will be posting a weekly Cross-Country Ski Report with the latest conditions on the trails. This report can be found at http://go.usa.gov/FKvG.

The user fee at many of the trailheads is \$5.00 and may be obtained at the trailhead using a selfregistration envelope. addition to the bill for Christmas ornaments. She hurried home to add her new purchases to the family tree.

Her husband came home after a trying day at work. She was very proud of her completed Christmas tree. It lit up the corner of the living room and added cheer to the whole house. Unfortunately, her Irishman, while shocked at the sight of the beautiful tree, lost his Irish temper when she told him she had charged the ornaments and the lights at the company store. Swinging his arms while shouting about the expense, he knocked down her favorite ornament. The porcelain Christmas angel, with extended wings, hit the floor with sickening breaking sound. She now had a one-winged angel and a husband who felt more than a little contrite when he saw the sad look on her face. After apologies and some hugs and kisses, he tried to make up for his rash behavior by gluing the wing back on the hapless angel. The glue worked, but those hands that handled lumber so well didn't work that well on delicate work. The angel was to continue on its job bringing Christmas cheer from that time on with a slightly crooked wing.

Maybe things like breaking the angel happen for a reason. For all the Christmases that followed, there was always the story of how the poor angel had a crooked wing. The tense moment of the past now became a story that brought laughs to the small family and guests who inquired about the crooked-winged angel. Their daughter loved the story, and it became her favorite Christmas ornament.

Bad luck hit this happy family. The Irishman was way to check out the grading skills of some new people who were developing their eye for separating the better and more profitable grades of boards. While passing through the log yard an unexplained and unusual event occurred. A large hard maple log on top of one of the log decks decided that it was time to roll down the face of the log pile just as the Irishman was walking by. He had a large funeral, as he was well liked by all of the employees and the management of the sawmill.

The wife and daughter were now faced with a calamity besides the loss of the husband and the father. They were living in a company house, had no income, and certainly no more credit at the company store. A letter was written to her family in Milwaukee explaining that she may have to move back and would need the charity of family members until she could find work and be self-supporting. Then an event took place in the company office. One of the bookkeepers was found to have been helping himself to some of the cash that should have been placed in the company safe. He was quickly booted out and hurriedly left the company town, never to be seen again.

n office worker had a bright idea. He suggested that the newly widowed German lady be brought into the office. She was very literate and had watched her work with numbers at a social event he had been involved in. "Bring her in" was the reply.

The new job was a godsend to the widow. She not only took to the work with gusto, but being busy took her



mind off of her loss, and she didn't have the financial stress that would have come. In fact, she was so good at her job, that she soon found herself making more money than her husband did in the mill. The mill management wondered how they had ever run the office without her.

Each Christmas was a poignant time when the tree was decorated. The crooked-winged angel was always hung with ceremony, and a remembrance of the husband and father was had with joy and tears.

Being a frugal woman, she had saved enough money to send her daughter to Stevens Point Normal school when she graduated high school. The house was lonesome without the daughter, but there were friends who visited, community events, and life went on. The daughter came home for Christmas, of course, the crooked-winged angel was always the cause for laughter and tears.

One Christmas, the daughter brought home what was to be a new member of the family. Her boyfriend loved the story of the angel with the crooked wing and was impressed with the other ornaments that had been bought at the company store years ago.

The wedding was held in the bride's hometown, and the other good news was that both of the newlyweds had been given teaching jobs in a town just a few miles away from the bride's mother. All went well until the tuberculosis epidemic that swept the country in the late 1920's and early 1930's. The daughter was amazed at how frugal her mother had been when cleaning out the company house that she had finished her life in. Much of the late mother's belongings were given to neighbors, but the well-worn box of Christmas tree ornaments left with the mourning daughter.

When old enough, her son was told the story of the angel and the box of ornaments and how his overlyfrugal grandmother had been seized by the Christmas Spirit and charged their purchase at the company store. It was a continuation of the Christmas tradition.

The Great Depression brought much sorrow to the nation. A shortened budget caused the husband to lose his teaching job, and with money short, Christmas was to be celebrated with a meager budget. It wasn't the happy time that most families looked forward to, and the young couple and their son were a bit sad-faced, but the Christmas tree was up, and it was time for the decorations to be placed. Grandma's ornament box came out to finish decorating the tree, and the mood in the room changed. The bright bulbs were placed on the tree where a hole needed filling, and then the deformed angel was unwrapped. The mother looked at it and was filled with hope. She recounted again the story of the poorly glued wing, and told her husband and son that Grandma had

been through some tough times and did fine, and we can too. The angel was placed in the center of the tree, which was always the spot where he spent Christmas, and cheer returned to the new family.

Time, as it always does, passed, and the young family wasn't so young anymore. The son they had enjoyed so much was now in the Army, and he wouldn't be home for Christmas. He was in Korea, and while it was towards the end of the conflict, there were still casualties. They hoped and prayed he wouldn't be on the list of those who came home in a coffin. Then the telegraph came. The treasured son wasn't dead, but he was wounded, and he would be home for Christmas. He had lost a leg to a land mine. He was in transit, and would be given leave from the nearby veteran's hospital to spend Christmas at home, after which he would return to the hospital, and after a proper time healing, would be given a prosthetic leg.

It was a sad young man who was picked up at the vet's hospital and brought home. But, home did cheer him up a bit. He wasn't much help decorating the tree. On crutches, he couldn't reach up to place ornaments, and had to settle for putting the bulbs on at about shoulder level. Then his mother gave him the angel with the crooked wing, and explained that it was his turn to place this ornament. When he was placing the ornament, his mother repeated the story of the broken angel, and while he had heard the story numerous times growing up, the story did improve his spirit. The thought went through his mind that if previous generations of his family had faced adversity and were successful at living through it, so could he.

The college student who limped to class in the 1950's earned his degree and went on to have a successful career. In time, the box of ornaments bought by his frugal grandmother in spite of her tight-fisted personality came under his care. The electric lights Grandma had bought had long been replaced, and some of the glass bulbs had been accidentally dropped and shattered, but the big porcelain angel with the crooked wing was still wrapped in tissue and awaited its placement on the family Christmas tree, along with the story.

In time, the ornaments and the imperfect angel, along with the family story, was passed to the next generations. The angel and the story helped the family through the years of the Viet Nam War, the recession of the 1980's, the conflicts in the Middle East and the last deep recession in 2008, along with other family calamities.

The crooked-winged angel waits patiently in his box to thrill members of the family, especially those who have reached the age to appreciate story, and to help the family through rough times, always bringing forth the Christmas Spirit in them and reminding members of the family that tough times don't last forever, and family history is worth remembering.

An obvious sign of scams: payment in gift cards

Recently, a resident of Wisconsin received a threatening call from someone saying he was from the Social https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/paying-scammers-gift-Security Administration. The resident was told there was a warrant out for her arrest, and that she needed to cooperate or she would be arrested. He told her exactly how many fraud/info-2019/gift-card-fraud.html minutes away the local Dollar General store was from her house, which is where he told her to buy \$200 worth of eBay gift cards. The caller then instructed her to give him the redemption codes on the gift cards. The resident was obviously scared, and complied. After she met this first demand, the caller told her she needed to get another \$500 worth of gift cards to get out of trouble. Luckily, on her drive back to the store, she realized this may be a scam and went to the sheriff's office instead.


Gift cards have become a popular way for scammers to steal money because they are nearly as untraceable as cash and are much more transferable. In previous scams, imposters would ask you to wire money to them but, increasingly, they tell you to go put money on a gift card.

How the scams work

The caller will often tell you to go buy a popular gift card from iTunes, Google Play, Amazon, or in the case above, eBay. The caller will tell you to get the card at a particular store near you such as Walmart, Target, Walgreens, CVS, or a dollar store. They may even have you buy several cards at several stores. Sometimes, the caller will stay on the phone with you while you go to the store. Once you buy the card, the caller will demand the gift card number and PIN on the back of the card. Those numbers let the caller immediately get the money loaded onto the card. Once the caller has those numbers, the money is gone, and usually without a trace.

Examples of the types of callers

- · Someone may claim to be from the Social Security Administration, telling you that you owe money and if you fail to pay you risk losing your monthly benefit check.
- · A caller may pretend to be from law enforcement, a court, or an attorney's office, threatening arrest, court appearance, or bailing a family member out of jail.
- · Someone might call you and claim to be from the IRS, collecting back taxes or fines.
- · The callers might say they're from tech support, asking for money to fix your computer. They may try to tell you that they've detected a virus on your computer that they will help you remove.
- · Someone might even say he or she is a family member with an emergency and needs money right now.
- · Callers pretend to be from a utility company, telling you to pay your bill by gift card or they'll cut off your power or water.
- · Sellers on online auction sites who ask for gift cards will ask to "buy" big items like cars, motorcycles, boats, RVs, tractors and electronics.
- · Someone may pose as a servicemember to get your sympathy, saying he has to sell something quickly before deployment and needs you to pay by gift card.
- · Callers will say you've won a so-called prize for a sweepstakes you probably never entered but first you have to use a gift card to pay fees or other charges.
 - · A caller may buy something from you, probably



Price. The caller will then ask you to give them the difference on a gift card, and the check will bounce.

What all of these callers have in common is an urgent need for you to send money right away. The most important takeaway? Gift cards are not used and cannot be used to pay bail, taxes or court fines. Gift cards are just that gifts.

What if you paid a scammer with a gift card?

If you paid a scammer with a gift card, tell the company that issued the card right away. When you contact the company, tell them the gift card was used in a scam. Ask them if they can refund your money. If you act quickly enough, the company might be able to get your money back. Also, tell the store where you bought the gift card as soon as possible. In the case above, the EBS helped the client notify the Dollar General store, which agreed to educate employees about these scams. You can also do the following:

- Tell the Federal Trade Commission about any type of scam or fraud you detect at ftc.gov/complaint, or call tollfree: 1-877-FTC-HELP.
- Report it to your state Attorney General (for a list of state offices, visit naag.org).

"Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" holiday campaign begins Friday - runs through January 1

To discourage impaired driving and enhance public safety, law enforcement agencies across Wisconsin will patrol in greater numbers and for longer hours during the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" holiday campaign that begins Friday, December 13 and continues through New Year's Day. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) uses federal funds to support stepped-up law enforcement efforts along with public education and outreach to help deter impaired driving.

"This annual initiative combines federal, state and local resources to raise public awareness about the dangers of impaired driving and helps prevent needless tragedies along our roadways," WisDOT Secretary-designee Craig Thompson said. "We want everyone to have a safe, enjoyable holiday. Motorists can do their part by buckling up, driving sober and avoiding distractions."

In 2018, alcohol-related crashes in Wisconsin resulted in 160 deaths and more than 3,000 injuries. Also last year, there were nearly 23,000 OWI convictions in Wisconsin. While alcohol-impaired driving remains a concern, Wisconsin and many states see a growing challenge with drugged drivers - people whose ability to safely operate a motor vehicle is compromised by drugs including prescription or over-the-counter medications and illegal narcotics. To combat the problem, Wisconsin currently has:

- · 23 multi-jurisdictional, high-visibility OWI enforcement task forces that operate year-round across the state.
- · Nearly 6,000 law enforcement officers trained in Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) to help detect and remove impaired drivers from roadways.
- 301 highly-trained Drug Recognition Experts among the most in the nation.

How citizens can help:

- If you suspect a driver of being impaired, call 911. Be prepared to provide as much detail as possible about the driver, vehicle and location.
- · If you plan to celebrate, identify a sober designated driver. Never allow someone else to get behind the wheel impaired. · Download the free "Drive Sober" mobile app from the WisDOT website. It includes a "find a ride" feature to help locate transportation alternatives.

\$20/vehicle sticker. The passes are valid from April 1 to March 31 of the following year. If you have, and display, an interagency pass (senior, military or access) in your windshield or in the hangtag holder, your use of the facilities and trails are free of charge.

"The money the Forest collects from the use fees comes back to the forest," said Vetter. "This money is used to operate and maintain our facilities and trails for visitors to enjoy."

In addition to the ski trails, the Forest has a few other recreation areas open during the winter for hiking, fat tire biking, sledding, and snowshoeing, as well as to provide parking and access to snowmobile trails in the area. Baldwin gets increase in funding for **Great Lakes Restoration Initiative**

House of Representatives approves Baldwin's bipartisan reform to lower prescription drug costs

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Today, U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin's bipartisan FAIR Drug Pricing Act passed the U.S. House of Representatives. This bipartisan reform takes the first step in addressing skyrocketing prescription drug prices by requiring transparency for pharmaceutical corporations that plan to increase drug prices. Baldwin's legislation was included in H.R.3, The Elijah E. Cummings Lower Drug Costs Now Act, which passed the House by a vote of 230-192.

"For too long, I've heard story after story from Wisconsinites who are struggling to afford the life-saving medications they need. Drug corporations are making prescription drugs more expensive with no systematic transparency to taxpayers," said Senator Baldwin. "Today is a major step forward for my bipartisan reform, and brings us one step closer to holding drug companies accountable for jacking up the prices on medications that Americans need. Now, I am calling on the Senate to take action so we can take on the rising costs of medicine people depend on, and bring relief to American families."

In 2019, on average, drug prices have increased at five times the rate of inflation. AbbVie has increased the price of the top-selling anti-inflammatory drug, Humira, by almost 250 percent in the past five years to nearly \$40,000.

Pfizer regularly increases the price of its drugs – often twice a year. In 2017, Pfizer raised drug prices twice by an average of 20 percent for more than 90 drugs.

Meanwhile, American taxpayers continue to pay more each year because of the rising costs of drugs. Medicare spent nearly \$130 billion on prescription drugs in 2016, and Medicare's portion of U.S. national drug spending has increased from 18 percent in 2006 to 30 percent in 2017.

The Fair Accountability and Innovative Research (FAIR) Drug Pricing Act, which Baldwin introduced in May with Senators Mike Braun (R-IN), Lisa Murkowski (R-AK), and Tina Smith (D-MN), would require drug manufacturers to disclose and provide more information about planned drug price increases, including research and development costs. Increased transparency will help provide muchneeded context for taxpayers, consumers and policymakers about the costs and value of medications, and may also incentivize companies to reassess the longstanding practice of relentless drug price increases.

Specifically, the FAIR Drug Pricing Act would require drug manufacturers to notify the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and submit a transparency and justification report 30 days before they increase the price of certain drugs that cost at least \$100 by more than 10 percent in one year or 25 percent over three

years. The report will require manufacturers to provide a justification for each price increase, manufacturing, research and development costs for the qualifying drug, net profits attributable to the qualifying drug, marketing and advertising spending on the qualifying drug, and other information as deemed appropriate. The bill will not prohibit manufacturers from increasing prices, but it will, for the first time, give taxpayers notice of price increases and bring basic transparency to the market for prescription drugs.



Hunter and angler R3 Grants deadline January 3

MADISON, Wis. - An application deadline for the Hunter R3 Grant (previously known as the Hunter Recruitment, Development, Training, and Education grant program) and for the Angler R3 Grant is Friday, January 3,

DNR again is making \$200,000 in Wildlife Restoration funds (Pittman-Robertson) available to local clubs, organizations, communities, individuals, governments, tribes, and colleges and universities with proven and new ideas to recruit and retain safe, ethical hunters. Similarly, \$75,000 is available through the Sport Fish Restoration (Dingell-Johnson) fund for angler recruitment, retention and reactivation.

The state may reimburse grant recipients up to 75% of the total eligible project costs. No grant advances are possible. Preference will be given to projects that seek to increase diversity in the hunter and angler populations (i.e. projects intending to increase the number of adults. families, women, and/or minorities participating in hunting and fishing). Preference will also be given to projects that incorporate a plan to evaluate the outcomes of the project (i.e. projects that can provide evidence of reaching audiences who would not otherwise have had an opportunity to hunt or fish; or of providing a needed step in the process of learning to hunt or fish to which the participants would not normally have had access).

Pilot studies have shown that there is growing interest in these activities from adults and families who have never participated. In the past seven years, WDNR has shifted the focus of Wisconsin's hunter and angler training, development, and education programs to adults, females, families, and minorities in response to research
