Conservation Corner

Lately in Wisconsin media there has been a lot of talk about PFAS. I did some research and would like to share my findings.

What are PFAS and Why are They a Problem?

PFAS is a catch-all term for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, which is a group of more than 5,000 synthetic chemicals. They can make surfaces nonstick or waterproof, so these chemicals are used in furniture, carpets, paper products, textiles, cookware and cosmetics. They are also used in firefighting foams, chrome plating and in the production of fluoropolymers like Teflon.

Why should you be concerned about PFAS?

PFAS have drawn a lot of attention because of concerns about human and ecosystem health. There is also some evidence that ties PFAS to cancer, primarily among people who lived or worked near contaminated manufacturing locations.

Where are PFAS found?

PFAS are not just a Wisconsin issue. PFAS are commonly associated with military sites and airports due to the use of firefighting foams. The contamination near Marinette is associated with activity at the Tyco Fire Technology Center, which has led to high PFAS concentrations in private drinking water wells as well as nearby drainage ditches.

What is Wisconsin doing about PFAS?

At the state level, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is working on multiple fronts to determine the extent of PFAS contamination in Wisconsin. In Forest County, we are fortunate that Northern Lake Service has the method to test for PFAS and did the testing for the contaminants found in the Rhinelander wells. Given the active interest in PFAS and the persistence of these chemicals, Wisconsinites can expect to hear much more about them in the years to come.



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Ice safety

DNR Press Release

If you head out to one of Wisconsin's many lakes or rivers to ice fish, snowmobile, ATV, cross-country ski, or just to enjoy a winter day, we want you to have fun and be safe. A bit of advance planning and practicing basic ice precautions can help you return home safely.

When is ice safe?

There really is no sure answer, and no such thing as 100 percent safe ice. You cannot judge the strength of ice by one factor like its appearance, age, thickness, temperature or whether the ice is covered with snow. Ice strength is based on a combination of several factors, and they can vary from water body to water body. Ice strength can also vary in different areas of the same body of water. Know before you go

Because ice conditions vary, it is important to know before you go. The DNR does not monitor local ice conditions or the thickness of the ice. Local bait shops, fishing clubs and resorts serve winter anglers every day and often have the most up-to-date information on how thick the ice is on local lakes and rivers, as well as areas that are especially dangerous.

Safety tips

1. Dress warmly in layers.

- 2. Don't go alone. Head out with friends or family. Take a cell phone if available, and make sure someone knows where you are and when you are expected to return.
- 3. Know before you go. Don't travel in areas you are not familiar and don't travel at night or during reduced visibility. 4. Avoid inlets, outlets or narrow that may have current that can thin the ice.
- 5. Look for clear ice, which is generally stronger than ice with snow on it or bubbles in it.
- 6. Carry some basic safety gear: ice claws or picks, a cellphone in a waterproof bag or case, a life jacket and length of rope.

What to do if you fall through ice

- 1. If you fall through the ice, remain calm and act quickly.
- 2. Do not remove your winter clothing. Heavy clothes can trap air, which can help provide warmth and flotation. This is especially true in a snowmobile suit.
- 3. Go back toward the direction you came. That is probably where you will find the strongest ice and what lies ahead is unknown.
- 4. Place your hands and arms on the unbroken surface. This is where a pair of nails, sharpened screwdrivers or ice picks are handy in providing the extra traction you need to pull yourself up onto the ice.
- 5. Kick your feet and dig in your ice picks to work your way back onto the solid ice. If your clothes have trapped a lot of water, you may have to lift yourself partially out of the water on your elbows to let the water drain before starting forward.
- 6. Once back on the ice, don't try to stand up. Lie flat until you are completely out of the water, then roll away from the hole to keep your weight spread out. This may help prevent you from breaking through again.
- 7. Get to a warm, dry, sheltered area and warm yourself up immediately. In moderate to severe cases of cold-water hypothermia, you must seek medical attention. Cold blood trapped in your extremities can come rushing back to your heart after you begin to warm up. The shock of the chilled blood may cause ventricular fibrillation leading to a heart attack and death!



were also unanimous in their vote to put the \$10,000 paid by Hometown Trolley for a section of the fairgrounds in a reserve account for the repair and maintenance of the fairgrounds. Another unanimous vote was made to approve the 2020 Forestry Comprehensive Land Use Plan and send it to the DNR for their approval.

A discussion followed on a number of items, including Rules & Regulations and the county purchasing

Bunda spoke of the work of the Rules & Regulation Committee in updating the rule book, and said the work is about 90% complete. With the new rules, it would appear from the discussion that the responsibilities of some of the county board committees will be more clearly defined.

Highway Commissioner Bill Anderson was present and said that the amount of money that can be used for a purchase without board approval was raised from \$35,000 to \$60,000 in an effort to make the rule more practical due to the increased costs of equipment and material.

A purchasing policy was discussed by the board, and Bunda pointed out that the county had no clear cut policy. The Langlade County purchasing policy has been used as a starting point and being modified to work for Forest County.

Cigarillos most sold tobacco product to minors

New data from the Wisconsin Synar survey shows that little cigarillos are increasingly being sold to kids, even as the number of retailers selling any tobacco product to kids has gone down slightly.

The Synar survey, which monitors the percentage of retailers across the state that sell tobacco to minors shows that the overall sales rate of tobacco products has remained stable at 5.5% in 2019 (down from 5.8% in 2018). However, the product most often sold to youth was cigarillos for the second year in a row (7.4% in 2018 and 7% in 2019). Members of the Northwoods Tobacco Free Coalition expressed concern over that trend.

"Seeing that retailers are selling cigarillos more

these products are so attractive to young people," said Jacee Shepard, Forest County Health Director. "Many of these cigarillos can be bought for as cheap as three for 99 cents, and unlike cigarettes, they come in candy and fruit flavors like Grape and Cherry, making them more appealing to kids." In addition to their cheaper prices and kid-

often to minors is concerning, especially since we know

friendly flavors, the Northwoods Tobacco Free Coalition noted that, unlike cigarettes, these products don't need to be displayed behind the counter. In fact, many times they're placed near candy and snacks.

While cigarillos may be flavored and displayed differently than conventional cigarettes, they carry the same health harms. Cigarillos contain similar and sometimes higher levels of nicotine than cigarettes, making them addictive. Cigar smoke contains higher levels of carbon monoxide, ammonia, and tar than cigarette smoke. Cigar smoking is linked to many of the same diseases cigarettes are: cancer of the mouth, esophagus, larynx, and lungs.

"Any of these are reason enough for concern, but cigarillos are also increasing health disparities since they're often sold aggressively in communities that are already more impacted by tobacco," said Shepard.

The Forest County Health Department and the Northwoods Tobacco Free Coalition encourages tobacco retailers in Wisconsin to visit WITobaccoCheck.org to take advantage of free training to help them avoid future underage sales. "We know retailers want to do the right thing and help their community, and the training at WITobaccoCheck.org can help them do just that."



Smart, sober driving is the Snowmobile Safety Week

MADISON, Wis. - Snowmobilers enjoying Wisconsin's trails often hear conservation wardens stressing the importance of safety, staying sober and being smart, which also are among the top priorities promoted during International Snowmobile Safety Week, January 18-26.

Capt. April Dombrowski, who leads the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources' Bureau of Law Enforcement Recreational Safety and Outdoor Skills Section, says the awareness week spotlights the smart and safe methods all snowmobilers should use the entire season.

"One death during snowmobile season is one too many. Wisconsin is the birthplace of snowmobiling, and it is as much a state tradition as the gun deer season," Dombrowski said. "Because Wisconsin can have upwards of 25,000 groomed trails during winter, safety is a top priority for this outdoor recreational machine enjoyed by friends and families."

The DNR recorded 16 fatal snowmobile accidents in 2019. Eleven of those involved operation on public trails and roadways while four incidents occurred on frozen

Dombrowski said the wardens' goal is to help everyone have fun and make lifelong memories while enjoying Wisconsin's incredible trails, many of which are groomed by volunteers.

"Safe snowmobiling means riding within your capabilities, operating at safe and appropriate speeds for the terrain, machine and user capability, along with the element of daylight visibility versus night operation. Moreover, never drink alcoholic beverages before or while driving," Dombrowski said. "Always wear a helmet and adequate clothing, stay within designated riding areas and always snowmobile with another person, never alone."

Another factor in Wisconsin snowmobiling is the ice that covers the 15,000 lakes and other water bodies. Winter's fluctuating temperatures, snowfalls and snowmelts have made for often-changing terrain and mixed conditions on snowmobile trails. "Nobody wants the sudden surprise of breaking through ice or riding into open water conditions," she said. "Your best pre-ride action is to contact those local fishing clubs, snowmobile clubs or outfitters and inquire about the ice conditions. The DNR does not monitor conditions."

Here are more easy-to-follow ice safety tips from Capt. Dombrowski:

- **In all likelihood, the ice looks thicker and safer than it
- **The best advice to follow is no matter what the month, consider all ice unpredictable.
- **There can be cracks and changes in the thickness you may not be able to see. This is especially true after the first cold nights, and the early ice is spotted.
- **Always remember that ice is never completely safe under any conditions.
- **Go with a friend. It is safer and more fun.
- **Carry a cellphone and let people know where you are going and when you will return home.

Wear proper clothing and equipment, including a life jacket or a float coat to help you stay afloat and to help slow body heat loss.

- **Carry a couple of spikes and a length of light rope in an easily accessible pocket to help pull yourself - or others -
- **Do not travel in unfamiliar areas or at night. **Know if the lake has inlets, outlets or narrows that have
- currents, which can thin the ice. **Take extra mittens or gloves, so you always have a dry

The DNR wants you to be safe enjoying the outdoors. Common sense is the greatest ally in preventing ice-related accidents.

Looking Forward, Looking Back

Wisconsin's commitment to good roads and reliable transportation goes back more than a century and is built into our identity.

We would not have become the Dairy State if farmers did not have a reliable way to get milk from farms to bottling plants and cheese factories. Dairy farming doesn't quit in winter, and cows don't take a day off. Out of necessity, gravel roads gave way to pavement as Wisconsin invested in infrastructure and made our state stand out in the Midwest for its ease of reliable travel.

Agriculture, industry and tourism are the state's economic pillars; each relying on good infrastructure. For decades, Wisconsin's proud commitment to make our state easy to travel strengthened all parts of our economy and enhanced our way of life.

Because of a strong bipartisan effort, we are getting back on track and making the most of our resources to serve Wisconsin. The direction we are taking is an important first step for fixing our roads.

Governor Tony Evers signed a Transportation Budget that cuts the level of borrowing and finds efficiencies in government. It invests an additional \$320 million in state highway improvements, which is part of \$465 million in new funding. It provides a 10 percent increase in available funding for general transportation aids paid to local governments and, at the same time, represents the lowest level of bonding in the last 20 years.

This budget allows us to drive forward with more than 1,200 miles of highway repair and more than 35 bridge projects that otherwise would have waited years longer. These long awaited projects are based in more than 58 counties across Wisconsin and will improve safety and mobility around the state.

Wisconsin's economic future does not rely solely on roads, and we are supporting the efforts of local governments to build options that work in their communities. The current budget supports all modes of transportation including harbors, railroads, air traffic control systems, and transit projects for the disabled, seniors and others.

By leveraging federal grants and finding efficiencies, we are improving passenger rail service along the Hiawatha Line and extending its reach through bus service along the I-41 Corridor to Fond du Lac, Oshkosh, the Fox Valley and Green Bay.

These successes come from leadership and a commitment to make state government work better for the people of Wisconsin. Here are some of the achievements of 2019:

Safety is our highest priority. We brought back and rebranded the "Zero in Wisconsin" campaign to remind drivers to follow speed limits, buckle up, and avoid distractions. We are grateful that traffic deaths in 2019 were at a five-year low and we will continue to make every effort to remind drivers that we can be, and should be, more careful out there.

We have acted to stop the decline in road conditions and moved toward sustainable funding for Wisconsin's transportation needs.

To better serve our local partners, we are piloting a new program that cuts red tape and reduces costs for local bridge repair. Straightforward bridge repair that can be done without serious environmental risks should not be to wait

Internally, the Department of Transportation expanded its Lean Government program to save or avoid hundreds of thousands of dollars of costs per year and put staff hours into where they are most needed. For the first time in years, the Department of Transportation is conducting risk-based internal audits and program reviews to improve efficiency and compliance.

For the first time in five years, Gov. Evers convened the state's Transportation Projects Commission (TPC). The bipartisan group of legislators and citizen members reviews the status of major highway studies and projects. In their last meeting, they agreed to remove three studies, saving taxpayers money. The TPC also improves transparency and communication between Department of Transportation and the state legislature.

Our work reflects the values and hard work that paved our roads in the first place. Safe, efficient transportation moves goods and services, gets people to work and school, and brings tourists and travelers to their destinations. As we move ahead into 2020, and beyond, we will continue to look for innovative and cost-saving ways to take care of the roads and bridges that connect us and to expand what our infrastructure offers. This year marks an important first step. We are not there yet, but transportation in Wisconsin is moving in the right direction.

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI), Dan Sullivan (R-AK), Jon Tester (D-MT), and Steve Daines (D-MT) introduced bipartisan legislation to expand community-based outreach that will help veterans access services to improve their health and wellness and prevent suicides.

The number of veteran suicides nationwide continues to rise, and approximately 14 of the 20 veterans who die by suicide each day are not receiving care from the Veterans Health Administration. County Veteran Service Officers (CVSOs) are often the first point of contact in the community for veterans and are on the frontlines in this battle against veteran suicides by helping enroll veterans into the VA Health Administration. The Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach (CVSO) Act will increase resources for CVSOs that will better connect more veterans to the services they need.

"In 2017 alone, more than 6,100 veterans died by suicide, an amount nearly equal to the number of servicemembers killed in action in Iraq and Afghanistan since 2001. The veteran suicide rate has stayed relatively constant for the past 10 years and we need to do something about it," said Senator Baldwin. "County Veteran Service Officers are on the frontlines everyday working to combat this tragic crisis, and this bipartisan legislation will support their efforts to provide needed services and solutions for our veterans that will improve their health and well-being."

"Alaska is home to more than 75,000 veterans, yet less than half of them are currently enrolled in the VA system," said Senator Sullivan. "That means thousands of veterans are not connected to the benefits and health care services that they have earned Local partners and veteran service officers are crucial resources in states, like Alaska, to reaching these off-the-grid veterans. This bipartisan bill, along with the groundwork already being done at my request by the Veterans Benefits Administration in Alaska, will reinforce the VA's mission to expand its reach and ensure veterans who live in rural, frontier states do not get left behind."

"Too often our Montana veterans have to drive hundreds of miles one way to get to help with VA claims," said Senator Daines. "This bipartisan legislation provides critical resources to expand outreach for Montana veterans to help with their healthcare, benefits and wellness needs."

Veterans are not always aware of the benefits available to them and CVSOs are often the first to inform them of their eligibility. CVSOs are local county employees who are nationally accredited by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to help veterans process their VA claims. These employees are responsible for successfully processing more than \$22 billion in claims annually for direct compensation and pension benefits for veterans. They also provide assistance to veterans on a range of benefits and services, including compensation benefits, VA home loans, education benefits and available job placement assistance. However, there is currently no federal funding support directly available for CVSOs.

The CVSO Act authorizes \$50 million annually for five years to expand and support CVSOs or similar local entities, who currently assist veterans in obtaining critical benefits and services. The VA will award competitive grants to CVSOs, through the states, to create, expand, or support programs that promote health and wellness, prevent suicide and reach veterans who need help navigating the often-burdensome VA process. By increasing the number of CVSOs, states will be able to better leverage their local and federal resources to serve our veterans.

The legislation is supported by the National Association of Counties (NACo), the National Association of County Veteran Service Officers (NACVSO), the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs, and many individual CVSOs, local officials and stakeholders in Wisconsin and Alaska.

"Counties provide much-needed services to millions of veterans and their families," said National Association of Counties Executive Director Matthew Chase. "The Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act will help us better connect veterans to key health, housing and career readiness resources. We applaud Senators Baldwin and Sullivan's bipartisan efforts to support county veterans service officers, and we look forward to working with Congress to better serve veterans in our communities."

"We currently have lost more veterans by suicide than those we have lost in executing the current wars. It is imperative to have advocates in the counties and communities where veterans and their families live to connect them with their earned benefits. This legislation provides resources to market VA benefits, create new CVSO offices to reach those who are struggling, or provide training for current CVSO offices. This will enhance the services for our veterans and ensure they have access to well-trained professional advocates at the local level to connect them to their benefits and improve the quality of their lives. They deserve these services for their service to our great country," said Joseph G. Aulik, Director of Veterans Services for the Brown County CVSO in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

"This bill reflects a wonderful partnership between the Senate, the VA, and the states working together on behalf of veterans. It will go a long way to ensure the delivery of health and wellness programs, combat suicide, and increase a state's ability to improve outreach efforts and serve our veterans where they live – especially in frontier states, like Alaska. This is a huge step in keeping our nation's promise to our veterans." said Verdie Bowen, State of Alaska Director of the Office of Veterans Affairs and former President of the National Association of State Directors of Veterans Affairs.






