PHOSPHOROUS CHALLENGE

Phosphorous (P) is one of the most widespread pollutants of lakes and streams. High P concentrations are one of the main reasons behind algae blooms, lake eutrophication, and "dead zones." Although it is not a serious problem yet here in Northern Wisconsin, it is an issue we should avoid. Algae blooms can be toxic to animals and pets in some cases. Algae blooms have been affecting drinking water sources in Lake Winnebago and Lake Michigan.

Phosphorus is a great crop nutrient that is essential for plant growth but can turn bad as it transitions from farm fields to surface water. Although phosphorus occurs naturally in the soil, additional P is added in the form of chemical fertilizer or manure in hopes to increase crop yields.

Manure management can be a problem in different areas with concentrated livestock. This manure is not only from cattle but from all other livestock such as chickens, horses, goats, etc. The need to dispose of large quantities of manure, regardless of local crop nutrient needs and soil P levels, can cause excessive P applications to farm fields. Manure can pose direct spill and runoff risks if it is not carefully managed.

Manure storage is important to avoid runoff into our rivers and streams. The more animals you keep, the more likely it will be necessary to construct a special manure storage facility. The storage facility must be able to keep the manure from washing away and its nutrients from leaking into the ground water. It should also keep odors to a minimum.

Your Forest County Conservation Department has experienced conservationists and relationships with NRCS that can assist you with manure storage plans. We can also help you develop a Conservation Plan to solve other problems you may have identified on your farm. You may be eligible to receive financial assistance, through a state or federal program. Bruce Royal on bass. All members contribute to the vocal harmonies. The band honors the deep traditions of bluegrass but uses those as a launching pad, not a fence. "We enjoy playing a variety of musical genres including classic country, such as Hank Williams, the traditional bluegrass of Bill Monroe, and progressive bluegrass with roots in rock and roll," said Sue. "We mix in our own originals, as well." The band performs everything in its repertoire acoustically. And that adds to its charm, Sue believes.

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"Acoustic string music is real life music," she said. "Many of us have been surrounded by friends and family who play or played music, often on stringed instruments, and that might have been bluegrass or country music. This is one of the reasons bluegrass is so relatable."

She also thinks the more eclectic approach that Hand-Picked Bluegrass offers makes it appeal to a wide range of people and ages.

"It's music that comes from the heart, so no matter what your musical tastes, there is something for everyone," she said.

The group recently released its fifth CD, simply titled "V." A glowing review in the magazine Minnesota Bluegrass stated, "A band that is willing to play ... without posturing or copying styles seems like a rarity which makes Hand Picked Bluegrass such a pleasure to listen to. Fans of solid traditional bluegrass, instrumental polish and great three-part harmonies will not be disappointed. Their music is about soul and not playing songs as fast

This will be the group's second appearance at Nicolet College. They performed here in 2011 and recorded that show for a live album (still available). Sue remembers that show fondly.

"Nicolet is a magical place to play, and we're looking forward to the February 18th show," she said.

"Those of us who were here for that show in 2011 won't forget it." said Nicolet College Theatre Director Jim Nuttall. "Bluegrass is high-energy music but with a relaxed feel all the same, because of its laidback rhythms. Hand-Picked Bluegrass captures all of that, with beautiful vocal harmonies to boot. It's going to be a fun night."

Get your voting ID now!

Anyone who doesn't have an ID needed to vote in the Spring Primary should start the process now.

Wisconsin driver licenses or IDs are the most common form of identification used for voting purposes. Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) encourages voters to check and be sure that they have the proper identification needed to vote in this month's primary (February 19). A federally-compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes.

The Wisconsin Elections Commission notes other forms of identification are valid for voting purposes, such as military or student ID cards. To see if a card meets the requirements, visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website.

Voters looking to get their first Wisconsin ID can turn to DMV for help. To obtain an official ID card, there are documentation requirements such as a birth certificate. If all documentation is not readily available, the ID Petition Process (IDPP) can be used to obtain a receipt valid for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained. DMV offers this service and ID cards for voting purposes free of charge. DMV's toll-free Voter ID hotline at (844) 588-1069 is available for questions on obtaining an ID to vote.

DMV's website has a locator to help find the nearest DMV and check wait times (wisconsindmv.gov/centers).

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State requests public comment on electric vehicle charging station grant program

Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Secretary-designee Craig Thompson announced today that the VW Mitigation Program is seeking public input on the spending of \$10 million in Volkswagen Diesel Emissions Environmental Mitigation Trust funds for electric vehicle charging station (EVCS) grants.

"Wisconsin has an exciting opportunity to kickstart the adoption of electric vehicles (EV) by funding new charging stations with \$10 million of Wisconsin's VW Trust fund allocation," said Secretary-designee Thompson. "Creating a robust EV charging network will reduce emissions while boosting economic activity by allowing current and future EV owners to travel throughout the state to work, shop and play."

Volkswagen admitted to violating the federal Clean Air Act by selling diesel engine vehicles that that utilized an emissions test "defeat device" that resulted in the release of thousands of tons of nitrogen oxide (NOx) emissions in excess of regulated limits. Judicial settlements require Volkswagen to pay more than \$2.9 billion into an Environmental Mitigation Trust Fund. The State of Wisconsin is a designated beneficiary and will receive \$67.1 million over ten years to offset the excess pollution emitted by affected Volkswagen vehicles.

"The adoption of electric vehicles will significantly improve air quality, a prime objective of the VW Trust," said Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA) Secretary Joel Brennan. "A statewide network of charging stations will support the growing number of EV owners residing in and visiting Wisconsin."

Governor Evers' directed DOA to spend up to \$10 million in VW Settlement Trust funds for EVCS grants. DOA and the Volkswagen Mitigation Program released a Request for Information (RFI) to gather feedback from the public on the purchase and installation of light duty EVCS in Wisconsin. The deadline for comments is February 17, 2020

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Focusing on PFAS Pollution in Wisconsin

MADISON Senators Robert Cowles (R-Green Bay) and Jerry Petrowski (R-Marathon) a n d Representatives Joel Kitchens (R-Sturgeon Bay), Jeff Mursau (R-Crivitz), Todd Novak (R-Dodgeville), and Scott Krug (R-Rome) released the following joint statement on a new effort that was introduced by these Legislators to provide clean drinking water to people in areas of the state with the worst contamination and to study the extent of PFAS



pollution in Wisconsin. These areas of the state with the worst contamination, to be set by the Department of Natural Resources under proposed statutory guidelines, will be labeled 'PFAS Management Zones':

"PFAS contamination of water in a growing number of locations around the state is causing serious hardship for hundreds of Wisconsin households. As the Legislature continues discussions on addressing this emerging contaminant and the DNR begins the rulemaking process for certain PFAS compounds, we're concerned that the true extent of PFAS contamination in Wisconsin is yet to be determined. We're offering legislation to establish PFAS Management Zones as a solution to this lack of information and more importantly as a way to immediately remedy residents' concerns over access to clean drinking

"LRBs 5179 and 5180 provides the DNR with the structure and resources necessary to learn more about the scope of PFAS pollution in our communities. This bill is also the only bill that would begin providing clean water now by qualifying households with PFAS contamination for the Well Compensation Grant Program and making communities eligible for state loan programs to begin upgrading drinking water and wastewater facilities to address PFAS pollution as they prepare for permanent standards. The public data provided in these bills will help the Legislature and the DNR to create more sound policies that protect waterbodies, promote public health, and coordinate with our business community and municipal utilities.

"We applaud the efforts introduced on Friday by Representative Nygren and Senator Hansen, but no one bill can be the complete solution to PFAS contamination in Wisconsin. We believe that setting up PFAS Management Zones will complement and strengthen that effort as we work to make Wisconsin a leader in addressing PFAS pollution."

The proposals, LRB 5179 providing structure behind the effort and LRB 5180 providing resources to carry out these efforts, were submitted for introduction on Friday.

Absentee voting has begun!

The first of the five 2020 elections in our area is the Spring Primary on February 18, and in-person absentee voting -- commonly known as "early voting" -has already begun.

For the February 18 Election, early voting began on February 3 and ends on February 14. In Wisconsin, early voting for any election



begins 15 days before the election and ends 4 days BEFORE the election. Please keep this in mind so that you never miss your chance to vote when you are unable to go to your polling station on Election Day.

To vote early, contact your municipal clerk (not the county clerk) ASAP to arrange for voting in person. You can get the clerk's contact information by visiting vote 411.org or myvote.wi.gov. While there, you can also check your registration status. Each city, village and town sets its own dates and hours for in-person absentee voting.

If you have not yet registered to vote, you can do so at the clerk's office (it is too late to register online for the February 18 Election). Be sure to ask what documents you'll need, before you visit the clerk.

And mark your calendars for the other 2020 elections: April 7 - Spring Election & Presidential Preference Primary; May 12 - Congressional District 7 Special Election; August 11 - Partisan Primary; and November 3 - General & Presidential Election.

Candidates must also be available to attend a District Board Appointment Committee meeting and public hearing. Applicants are encouraged to attend the meeting and hearing scheduled for 3 p.m., Monday, March 23, in the Red Oak Center Fireside Room on the Rhinelander Campus. A second meeting and public hearing will take place at 3 p.m., Thursday, March 26, at the same location for any applicants unable to make the first meeting and hearing. It all candidates appear at the March 23 meeting, the March 26 meeting will be canceled.

The Nicolet District includes all of Oneida, Vilas and Forest counties and portions of Lincoln, Langlade and Iron counties.


James "Jim" L. Bunda, age 87, passed away peacefully on January 29, 9 months and 3 days after his wife Laurie.

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Governor Evers signs Executive Order #45 to create Retirement Security Task Force

Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers signed an executive order last month to create the Retirement Security Task Force. According to the Governor's press release, "Wisconsin's aging population is expected to increase by 60% by 2030, yet currently, one in seven registered voters in Wisconsin have no way to save for retirement at work."

The task force will be led by State Treasurer Sarah Godlewski who reported to Wisconsin Public Radio that "[t]he typical working age family has \$3,000 saved for retirement. That's it. And we know people can't live off of Social Security alone. So one of the things we're trying to understand (is) why is this? Why can't people save for retirement?"

The task force will take on the following objectives:

- Assess the overall preparedness of the state in supporting Wisconsinites' ability to retire in a financially secure manner.
- Evaluate the statewide financial impact of Wisconsin's current retirement system, as well as employer-sponsored and individual retirement plans.
- Identify challenges and obstacles facing Wisconsinites seeking to retire in a financially secure manner.
- Identify barriers to accessing existing employer-sponsored and individual retirement plans, and to partici-pation in public and private retirement options.
- Research best practices from industry, academia, and other states on retirement security.
- Provide guidance on the average amount a Wisconsinite should save to achieve a secure retirement.
- Provide various recommendations on how best the state can address the retirement crisis, reduce regulato-ry and operational burden on small businesses who want to offer payroll deduction retirement savings options to employees, encourage younger Wisconsinites to save early in life, and innovate reforms to help Wisconsinites to retire in a financial secure manner.





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USDA Reminds Producers of Deadline for Conservation Reserve Program Signup

WASHINGTON, D.C., February 3, 2020 The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reminds agricultural producers interested in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) 2020 general signup to enroll by February 28, 2020. This signup is available to farmers and private landowners who are either enrolling for the first time or reenrolling for another 10- to 15-year term.

"This is the first opportunity for general sign up since 2016, and we want producers and private landowners to know that we have just one month remaining," FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce said. "It is critical that they make their final determinations and submit offers very soon to take advantage of this popular conservation program."

Farmers and ranchers who enroll in CRP receive yearly rental payments for voluntarily establishing long-term, resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees (known as "covers"), which can control soil erosion, improve water quality and develop wildlife habitat on marginally productive agricultural

CRP has 22 million acres enrolled, but the 2018 Farm Bill lifted the cap to 27 million acres.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest private-lands conservation programs in the U.S. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. The program has evolved over the years, providing many conservation and economic benefits. Marking its 35th anniversary in 2020, CRP has had many successes, including: Preventing more than 9 billion tons of soil from eroding, enough soil to fill 600 million dump trucks;

** Reducing nitrogen and phosphorous runoff relative to annually tilled cropland by 95 and 85 percent respectively;

** Sequestering an annual average of 49 million tons of greenhouse gases, equal to taking 9 million cars off the road;

** Creating more than 3 million acres of restored wetlands while protecting more than 175,000 stream miles with riparian forest and grass buffers, enough to go around the world 7 times; and

** Benefiting bees and other pollinators and increased populations of ducks, pheasants, turkey, bobwhite quail, prairie chickens, grasshopper sparrows and many other birds.

The CRP continuous signup is ongoing, which enables producers to enroll for certain practices. FSA plans to open the Soil Health and Income Protection Program, a CRP pilot program, in early 2020, and the 2020 CRP Grasslands signup runs from March 16, 2020 to May 15, 2020.

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Nicolet College a finalist for national Bellwether Award

Nicolet College has been named one of 10 national finalists for the prestigious Bellwether Award in the Instructional Programs and Services category.

The college earned the distinction for its innovative

Nicolet MyWay initiative, which vastly adds to the flexibility students have regarding when and where they complete their college coursework.

"Many students juggle jobs and families and they

"Many students juggle jobs and families and they need flexible classes and services if they are going to attend college," said Kate Ferrel, executive vice president of Academic and Student Affairs.

"The Nicolet MyWay format provides exactly that. It combines online classes with flexible open labs where students receive one-on-one and small group instruction. In both cases, instructors and coaches are always there to help and support students so they can earn the college credential that will get them ahead in life."

Ferrel will lead a small team from Nicolet to give their finalist presentation before a panel of judges at the Bellwether Community College Futures Assembly Feb. 2 to 4 in San Antonio, Texas.

While variations of the Nicolet MyWay format has been around for decades in other parts of the country, Nicolet was the first technical college to bring it to Wisconsin when the Welding program adopted the format in January 2018. Information Technology instituted Nicolet MyWay that fall followed by the Accounting and Administrative Professional programs for the Fall Term of 2019 and Business Management for the Spring Term of 2020. Other academic programs at the college are in the process of aligning their curriculum to the Nicolet MyWay format.

"The entire concept focuses around students attending college on their own terms," Ferrel explained. "Students set their own schedules and progress through the coursework at their own pace, advancing through, and gaining mastery of, specific sets of employer-validated competencies."

She noted the skills students learn are the same as before. Only now they learn the skills in a more student-friendly, personalized format

"When students master one competency, they move on to the next," Ferrel said. "What's great is that if students already have some of the skills, they can get through those competencies pretty quickly. If they come across other competencies that are more challenging, they can take the time they need to master that skill set."

When all competencies are met, students pass the class and ultimately earn a college credential.

An added benefit of the Nicolet MyWay format is that students can start classes at numerous times throughout the year, typically at the beginning of most months, instead of the traditional three times a year at the beginning of the Spring, Fall, and Summer terms.

Accompanying Ferrel to the Bellwether Community College Futures Assembly will be Nicolet staffers Christin Van Kauwenberg, director of Business Intelligence, Di Wu, instructional designer, and Laura Prince, Economics and Social Science instructor.

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Protect Your Trees from Disease

MADISON, Wis. - With the new year upon us, healthy lifestyle habits are sure to be on many people's minds as they plan for changes in diet and exercise. The new year is also the perfect opportunity to make healthier choices for trees. Winter is the ideal time for tree pruning while avoiding harmful, disease-carrying pests such as the tiny beetles that carry oak wilt from one tree wound to another.

"The best time to prune trees that lose their leaves is during winter when the trees are dormant," said Paul Cigan, Department of Natural Resources Forest Health Specialist. "Not only is it easier to see where pruning is needed when leaves are gone, but disease-carrying pests are inactive due to the cold, making pruning both more effective and less likely to invite unwanted pests."

Although pruning in winter reduces the risk of spread through beetles, the disease can spread year-round in firewood.

"Several recent oak wilt discoveries in northern Wisconsin, including the first-ever discoveryin Forest County, may have been the result of infected firewood brought from areas with oak wilt," Cigan said. "Keep oak

firewood where it is cut for one year, or until the bark is naturally loose, to prevent the spread of oak wilt."



Pruning tips

Yard trees and trees in urban settings should be pruned throughout their entire life to maintain a strong structure and remove deadwood. Young trees should be pruned to establish a central trunk, proper trunk taper and good branch structure and spacing. Older trees should be pruned to remove dead and/or hazardous limbs.

"Pruning should not remove more than 25% of the live tree crown, and the lower third of deciduous tree trunks should be free of limbs," said Don Kissinger, DNR urban forestry coordinator.





Invite A Pal For Take A Friend Snowmobiling Week

MADISON, Wis. - Wisconsin's winter is in full swing on the snowmobile trails, making it prime time to introduce a friend or two to this family-friendly outdoor activity.

Feb. 8 - 17 is Take a Friend Snowmobiling Week, sponsored by the International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association and supported by snowmobile clubs nationwide.

The Department of Natural Resources urges all snowmobile enthusiasts to share Wisconsin's trails with someone who has never experienced the outdoor fun.

"Wisconsin has some of the nation's best snowmobile trails in the country, thanks to the landowners who open their property and the volunteers who sign and groom many of the nearly 25,000 miles that can be open if conditions allow," said DNR Conservation Warden Martin Stone, administrator for the DNR's Off-Highway Vehicle program. "And, safety is part of that fun. Wardens and partner law enforcement recreational patrols are on those trails, working to keep the trails safe and fun for all to enjoy."

Sober, Safe Speed, Helmets & Ice Conditions

An important goal for wardens is to help everyone have fun and make lifelong memories.

"Safe snowmobiling means you must operate within your specific capabilities, operating at safe following distances when riding with others and utilize appropriate speeds for the terrain, and of course whether it is daylight or night riding conditions," Stone said. "Practice 'Zero Alcohol' which is a personal choice to refrain from drinking any alcoholic beverages until you are done operating any motorized vehicle for the day or night and are back at your cabin, hotel or home."

Snowmobiling while impaired can have devastating consequences for you and others. Always wear a helmet, adequate clothing, and stay within designated riding areas.

The constant factor for any outdoor winter activity in Wisconsin is ice. Winter's fluctuating temperatures, snowfalls and snowmelts have made for often-changing terrain and mixed conditions on snowmobile trails.

"As you think about where you want to ride, please make sure you take the time to check in with the area's fishing clubs, snowmobile clubs or outfitters on the ice conditions. The DNR does not monitor those conditions, but those local experts will know," Stone said.

Here are more easy-to-follow snowmobile safety

tips:

The best advice to follow is no matter what the month, consider all ice unpredictable.

There can be cracks and changes in the thickness you may not be able to see. This is especially true after the first cold nights, and the early ice is spotted. Always remember that ice is never completely safe under any conditions.

Go with a friend. It is safer and more fun.

Carry a cellphone and let people know where you are going and when you will return home.

Wear proper clothing and equipment, including a life jacket or a float coat to help you stay afloat and to help slow body heat loss.

Carry a couple of spikes and a length of light rope in an easily accessible pocket to help pull yourself - or others - out of the ice.

Do not travel in unfamiliar areas - or at night.


Know if the lake has inlets, outlets or narrows that have currents, which can thin the ice.

Take extra mittens or gloves, so you always have a dry pair.

The DNR wants you to be safe enjoying the outdoors. Common sense is the greatest ally in preventing ice-related accidents.

And remember, snowmobile safety education is required in Wisconsin. All riders at least age 12 and born on or after January 1, 1985 are required to complete a course before they can legally operate. Riders age 16 and older may complete the course over the internet. Riders younger than that must complete the course in a class room setting.

The winners of this challenge were awarded a \$250 Amazon Web Services gift card and have been invited to the annual #HouseOfCode Festival on Capitol Hill on March 24, 2020. Students will demonstrate their apps for their Representatives and the broader DC Tech community.

This event will provide lawmakers and the global tech community a chance to interact with the next generation of Computer Science talent directly.

This year's Congressional App Challenge was the most successful to date. Over 10,000 students registered to participate in the competition, and this year's students created 2,177 fully functioning apps, with some congressional districts receiving over 50 applications. In total, 304 Members of Congress participated in the Congressional App Challenge. These districts spanned across 48 states, Puerto Rico, the Mariana Islands, and Washington, D.C.

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

DNR Approves 10-Year Trout Management Plan



A new trout management plan is intended to protect, develop, enhance, and restore trout populations and trout angling opportunities for the diverse preferences and needs of our participants.

MADISON, Wis. - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources recently approved its first statewide trout management plan. The plan provides direction for inland trout management in Wisconsin and will be in effect from 2020 to 2029.

The plan covers Brook Trout, Brown Trout, Rainbow Trout and Lake Trout in inland lakes, ponds and streams of Wisconsin, including tributaries of the Great Lakes upstream from impassible barriers such as dams and naturally occurring falls.

The inland trout management plan includes four primary goals:

Protect, enhance and restore sustainable coldwater aquatic habitats and ecosystems;

Protect, develop, enhance and restore trout populations and trout angling opportunities for the diverse preferences and needs of our participants;

Collect, develop and use the best science to guide trout management decisions; and

Maintain and expand partnerships and engage diverse anglers, stakeholders and the general public on trout management and angling opportunities.

The Wisconsin DNR trout team developed the trout management plan with the input of a stakeholder team composed of individuals representing various groups across the state, such as anglers, landowners and farmers. The trout team met twice with the stakeholder group at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point to create the plan, and the stakeholder team also reviewed the draft plan.

In spring 2019, the department released a draft of the plan to the public and presented it at statewide public meetings for additional public input. The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board approved the plan at the October 2019 meeting. The final version of the plan will be used to guide trout management in Wisconsin over the next 10 years.
