Conservation Corner

Have you noticed erosion along your shoreline? This is a challenge that many shoreland property owners face, we would like to share some tips on how to keep your shoreland property in place!

The best way to identify and assess erosion problems is to check your shoreline regularly and monitor changing conditions. Warning signs of accelerated erosion problems include:

**A large area of bare soil along the shore (especially on a steep/high shoreline bank).

**Nearshore gullies caused by overland runoff from rooftops, driveways, and access roads.

**A noticeable recession of the shoreline over

time.

**Large patches of unusually cloudy (turbid) water near a lakeshore, or unusually high stream turbidity (especially during periods of high water).

Choosing the best fit for your shoreland property depends on the quantity and speed of runoff from hard surfaces toward the water's edge, and the amount of energy along the shore. Shoreline erosion on low energy sites can frequently be addressed by limiting the amount of foot traffic to, and along, the water's edge. For example, you can create a purposeful path that meanders to the lake. You can also restore (or leave) native plants along the shore to create a no-mow zone. Further, you can allow aquatic plants to re-establish in the near shore area.

Best Practices for a Healthy Lake

Fish sticks are strategically placed groups of whole, dead trees that are partially or fully submerged and anchored to the shore to create fish and wildlife habitat. These large woody structures also help prevent bank erosion by reducing the energy to your shoreline.

Native plantings stabilize banks with trees, shrubs, grasses, and wildflowers that improve wildlife habitat, slow runoff, and promote natural beauty.

Diversion practices prevent runoff from getting into your lake or stream by redirecting water to areas (like a rain garden or rock infiltration pit) where it can soak into the ground instead.

Rain gardens create wildlife habitat and natural beauty while capturing and cleaning runoff.

Get Started

Before starting your erosion control project, consult with your county conservation and zoning department for local shoreland rules. It is also important to connect with the WDNR Water Management Specialist in

Forest County Board met on Tuesday, Feb. 18

The full board met at the courthouse last Tuesday and handled a number of issues. There were also presentations of awards, as well as a talk about the fate of the old jail and sheriff's residence.

Sheriff's Deputy Alex Walrath has competed for all seven years of the Law Enforcement Challenge, sponsored by the WCA insurance group. Josh Dirske was on hand to announce that Deputy Walrath placed third in the competition this past year, and that his third place finish brought in a \$6,000 check for the Forest County Sheriff's Department. The competition involves running, pistol and rifle shooting and dragging a dummy a certain distance to simulate a rescue. Dirske pointed out that there was a difference of two seconds between 1st and 3rd places in this event. He also said that because of Walrath's efforts over the last seven years, the Sheriff's Department has been awarded a total of \$14,500.

Walrath stated that it his goal to win. He said he has learned about his strengths and weaknesses in the competition and grinned when he said he would take first place next year.

Next up was Michelle Gobert, who did a presentation concerning the future of the old jail and sheriff's residence. She pointed out the need that the county has for a storage facility for community records.

Gobert said the old building was built in 1912 at a cost of \$25,000. The new jail was built 23 years ago, and in the interim, the old structure was literally abandoned, but after inspections, the building has been found to have structural integrity, asbestos has been removed, and the level of lead in the old paint is very low and easy to correct.

She said the archive in the Crandon Library is getting full, and she stated that it is important that a community save its historical records. The old structure would provide the space needed and provide a community space as well.

Board Member Bunda added that tearing down the structure and repairing the side of the 1909 courthouse would be very expensive. Bunda added that the storage space is needed and that it is logical to preserve it. He said that there is only one roof leak in the old jail part of the structure, and that the work can be done a little at a time, stretching the expense over that time.

Chairman Tallier said that the broadband issue is still quiet and explained that there is a lot of competition for the grant money.



Four towns Joint Public Library Board of Trustees to oversee Lakewood Library

Per the 2019 Joint Library Agreement reached by the Northern Oconto County townships of Doty, Lakewood, Riverview and Townsend, a new Lakes Country Public Library Board has begun its important work.

The new Board of Trustees began meeting in January to assume oversight of the Library which is located in Lakewood. Their charge, as defined in the Department of Public Instruction's Trustee Essentials Handbook, is to "protect and advance the interests of the broader community by effectively governing the operations and promoting the development of the local public library."

As stipulated in Wisconsin State Statutes, the eight recently-appointed trustees include seven from the four towns as determined by population density. The eighth was appointed by the Wabeno Area Schools District Administrator.

Representing Doty is Richard Kendall; Lakewood's representatives are Linda McKenna and Janet Strobush. Riverview will be represented by Joy Nelson and Jeanine Albers; Townsend's representatives are James Adamczyk and Kathleen Marsh. The School District representative is Kathleen Deboth.

The group will spend its first year completing what they anticipate is a smooth transition from the decadeslong, effective management provided by the previous Library Boards which operated under a similar representative configuration.

Hunters register 3,792 birds during 2019 Fall Turkey Hunt

MADISON, Wis. - With another wild turkey season complete, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources reports hunters registered 3,792 birds during the fall 2019 wild turkey season.

There were 74,775 harvest authorizations were issued for the 2019 fall season, an increase of 860 from 2018. Of those sold in 2019, 70,084 were awarded a fall turkey license and 4,691 were sold over the counter as bonus harvest authorizations.

As in 2018, the fall turkey drawing was waived in 2019. Anyone with a fall turkey license and stamp was awarded one harvest authorization for the zone of their choice. In addition to the harvest authorization included with a fall turkey license, a total of 13,000 bonus harvest authorizations were available for purchase in zones 1-4.

With a difference of only 10 more birds registered, the fall harvest in 2019 was almost identical to 2018. There were 3,782 turkeys registered during the 2018 fall season. This season's harvest success rate was 5.1%, also equal to 2018. The success rate is calculated based on the number of harvest authorizations sold and is not corrected for nonparticipation.

"Although this year's fall harvest is nearly identical to 2018, over the last decade, we have seen a steady decline in the number of turkeys harvested in the fall," said Mark Witecha, DNR upland wildlife ecologist. "Reductions in harvest over the last 10 years are largely due to a decline in hunter participation and effort. The annual fall hunter survey shows continued declines in fall turkey hunter numbers and a larger portion of those hunters are pursuing turkeys secondary to other species."

The wild turkey is truly one of Wisconsin's wildlife management success stories. A key role in the success of the wild turkey management program can be attributed to hunters through their purchase of the Wild Turkey Stamp which provides vital financial support in providing for future opportunities for turkey management and hunting in Wisconsin.

Since wild turkeys were first successfully reintroduced into Wisconsin in 1976, population levels continue to increase and expand statewide. Successful restoration of the wild turkey resulted from tremendous hunter and landowner support, good survival and high-quality habitat. The DNR first initiated a fall turkey season in 1989 after an increase and expansion of turkeys throughout the state. Since then, hunters have been able to pursue turkeys during

both fall and spring seasons.

unanimously. The rules were for: Risk Management, Rules and Regulations, Zoning, the Highway Committee, and the purchasing policy for the county Highway Department, which was raised to \$60,000 to help the department take care of immediate concerns for county roads.

The board unanimously approved a raise for county elected officers, namely, the positions of county clerk, register of deeds, and treasurer.

The Personnel Committee reviewed the current pay and recommended a 15% increase for 2021, a 3% increase for 2022, a 3% increase for 2023 and a 3% increase for 2024.

This translates into a salary of \$55,972.31 for 2021 and this will increase to \$61,162.45 in the year 2024. The measure was passed unanimously.

This salary increase brings our elected officials more in line with surrounding county's salaries. And it should be added that Forest County has ranked 68th in the state for salaries for county employees and elected officials.

A bid was accepted for the new generator for the Law Enforcement Center. The bid came in at \$232,893. There was also a discussion about a generator for the 1909 courthouse, and the Highway Department expressed an interest in the current generator. There will obviously be more discussion in the future on how to utilize the replaced generator as well as putting the generator to work. It was donated by the Meier family. All seem to be needed somewhere.

There was general discussion on some forestry issues and the meeting was adjourned.





Enroll in the Deer Management Assistance program by March 1 MADISON, Wis. - The Wisconsin Department of

Natural Resources is looking to partner with landowners for the Deer Management Assistance Program (DMAP) designed for healthy deer and habitat.

DMAP is a cooperative effort between the Department of Natural Resources, landowners, and hunters to provide habitat and deer herd management assistance to those interested in managing their property for wildlife. Wildlife and forestry professionals assist landowners with management practices that consider the ecological and social impacts white-tailed deer have on the landscape.

In return, DMAP participants can choose to share habitat information, collect biological data and participate in DMAP workshops. This one-on-one relationship, stressing communication and cooperation, makes DMAP a flexible and effective deer management program for private and public lands alike.

Although DMAP enrollment is open year-round, landowners, hunters and land managers with properties that are 160 acres or more are encouraged to enroll before March 1 to be eligible for a site visit with a DNR biologist and forester in 2020. Landowners who enroll by March 1 will also receive a management plan with recommendations to assist with reaching the goals for the property.

DMAP provides informational resources and professional assistance regarding wildlife habitat management for properties of any size to help participants improve habitat for wildlife. DMAP participants are invited to professional workshops on a variety of topics such as:

- **Financial assistance programs;
- **Natural forage for deer, deer ecology and management;
- **Chronic wasting disease (CWD); and
- **Deer research and predator effects on the deer herd.

DMAP participants receive regular updates on items of interest to land stewards and opportunities to participate in citizen science programs. Neighboring landowners with properties within one-half mile are encouraged to enroll as a DMAP cooperative.

Landowners who enroll in a DMAP cooperative with a combined acreage of 160 acres or more are eligible to receive a site visit and management plan. DMAP cooperatives also provide an opportunity to monitor local wildlife populations and share costs and equipment on habitat projects to benefit deer and other wildlife over a greater area.



What to do if you picked the wrong Medicare drug coverage

Each year, during an enrollment period that takes place from October 15 to December 7, Medicare beneficiaries can make changes to their Medicare coverage. Beneficiaries can switch between Original Medicare and private Medicare Advantage plans, they can switch between Medicare Advantage plans, and they can join or change stand-alone Part D prescription drug plans. These changes go into effect on January 1.

For the enrollment period that just ended this past December, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) rolled out a completely redesigned Medicare Plan Finder tool. Medicare beneficiaries can use this online tool to compare plan options, estimate costs, and enroll in plans. In late November 2019, CMS reported that Plan Finder traffic was 14% higher than in 2018.

However, you may have heard about reports of "glitches" with the new Plan Finder. These include inaccurate details about drug prices and pharmacy networks. Some people also reported difficulty sorting search results. Although CMS updated the Plan Finder almost daily, beneficiaries may have signed up for plans before the mistakes were caught. Unfortunately, now that their new coverage has started, some people are learning that the plans they chose do not work well for them. For example, their copays might be higher than estimated on the Plan Finder, or their preferred pharmacy might not be in their new plan's network.

If you chose a Medicare Advantage plan or Part D plan based on bad information, you may be able to change your plan. CMS has a process for you to request a special enrollment period that would allow you to change your plan. You can call 1-800-MEDICARE and explain that there is an issue with your plan choice. If your choice was based on inaccurate information, you might be granted a special enrollment period to change your coverage.

People who are enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan already have an opportunity to switch plans. Each year, from January 1 until March 31, beneficiaries enrolled in Advantage plans can change plans or switch to original Medicare and a stand-alone Part D plan.

In addition, some other circumstances will give you a special enrollment period to change plans. For example, people who recently moved to a new area with different coverage options, lost employer-sponsored drug coverage, or were recently released from jail may qualify for a special enrollment period. In addition, someone living in a skilled nursing facility can switch or drop plans. Finally, if you are enrolled in both Medicare and Medicaid, you have additional opportunities for a special enrollment period.

If you have any questions about whether you qualify for a special enrollment period or would like help choosing a new plan, please contact your local Aging and Disability Resource Center. If you have an urgent need for medication, and you cannot fill your prescription because your Medicare plan does not work the way you expected it to, please contact the Aging and Disability Resource Center right away.




In the last 13 years, she learned how to be kind and to care for others. She has learned how to be a leader and when to do the right thing.
