Using Tech to Learn in Nature

Just because you can't tell a Tufted Titmouse from a Coast Pignut Hickory doesn't mean your kid has to know you're not a walking Natural History Museum. With the following nature apps for smartphones and tablets, you can wander outdoors, day or night, and answer practically any question they have, from "What is that bright star on the horizon?" to "Is this bug that I'm putting in my mouth poisonous?" The window of time during which your kid thinks you know everything is vanishingly thin, so leverage technology to make it last as long as possible. Because, someday soon, they'll be all grown up and able to Google things for themselves.

These plant, animal and star identifying apps let you identify pieces of the world around you through your phone's camera feature or by asking you questions. They turn screen time into an opportunity to get out into nature and learn, giving your kid the gift of having a world of information at their fingertips. Some are free and some involve a fee.

Free COVID-19 testing in Forest County with National Guard

assistance

Forest County Health Department and Forest County Emergency Management is collaborating with the Wisconsin National Guard to provide free COVID-19 testing. The National Guard will be providing drive-through COVID-19 nasal swab testing in Crandon on Monday, June 22nd from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. at the Crandon School District parking lot.

No appointments are necessary. Anyone 5 years and older with at least one of the following symptoms: fever, cough, loss of taste/smell, shortness of breath, sore throat, fatigue, body aches, diarrhea, vomiting, nausea, chills, or muscle aches can get tested. This event is available for all Wisconsin residents.

Individuals getting tested should be prepared to provide a current address, county of residence, and phone number when they arrive. Please be aware that the testing will be provided on a first come, first served basis and that attendees may have to wait to be tested. Vehicles will form a line while waiting for testing and all attendees will need to stay in their vehicles at all times. No restroom facilities will be available so please plan accordingly.

The National Guard will be doing the testing. They will be in uniform and in full PPE (personal protective equipment, including gowns, mask, gloves, etc.) during this event. We have two goals with this event: 1) provide our communities with mass testing, and 2) give public health better insight into how widespread COVID-19 is in our communities. Following this event, we will continue to work closely with our local healthcare providers to continue building their capacity to meet patient demand.

Please note that anyone tested is required to stay home until test results come back. Test results will be provided via telephone by the National Guard or by your local public health department in a timely manner.

There are additional community testing sites in Wisconsin throughout June. Any Wisconsin resident is welcome to attend any one of the testing events. Information on community testing events can be found at https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/covid-19/communitytesting.htm

The Lakewood testing site will be open to any symptomatic or asymptomatic community member. Tests will be done via drive-through, with no appointment or provider order required.

Lakes Country adds appointments for library computers, browsing

Beginning June 22, the Lakes Country Library in Lakewood will take appointments by phone for library computer use and browsing. The sessions will be 40 minutes each, with a limited number of people allowed in for each session The library's phone number is 715-276-9020. No appointments will be taken at the door.

Appointments are limited to use of the library computers and browsing only. Wireless internet is available from outside the building, 24 hours a day; the library will also be adding tables behind the library for wireless use.

Staff will wear masks during appointment sessions, and highly encourage all patrons to wear masks as well. In addition, common spaces will be cleaned after appointment sessions, and materials will be quarantined for 3 days before shelving.

The library will continue to offer curbside pickup at the back of the library. Library staff can take requests by phone or email, and will select materials if requested.

"We wanted to add services that our patrons can only get inside the building." Director Nicole Lowery said, "And we wanted to offer those services in the safest way possible for our community and staff." She noted that there is some always risk involved when going into a small building with others, especially for those in high-risk groups, "but if everyone follows the health guidelines, we can lower that risk somewhat."

Bird Apps

Merlin Bird ID - Merlin asks you 4 simple questions about any bird you happen upon and delivers a small selection of potential species. Assuming you can see and/or hear it, you can quickly identify whatever it was that just pooped on you. Merlin cross-references your answers with a massive database of bird sightings that's maintained by thousands of hardcore bird geeks, and only suggest species known to have been seen recently near your location. However, while suggested species will include samples of their song, the nature app can't identify a bird based on its song, which some less-free apps can (free iOS, Android).

Stars and Planets Apps

Skyview - Point your phone's camera at the night sky and SkyView will determine your location via GPS and identify all the planets, constellations, stars and satellites that are currently visible. A robust search function that helps you find things like the International Space Station, the Hubble telescope, or the Big Dipper. It also has daily updates that point out when new things have become visible. SkyView is one of the top-rated nature apps of all time in the App Store. (\$1.99 iOS, Android).

construction that will provide high-speed internet to those areas of the county that are in need. It appears that the first tower will be constructed near Hiles, and will service not only Hiles, but Argonne and part of the Town of Crandon.

There will be a total of 17 towers and the project will take about two years.

In other business, Jerry Gibson has resigned from the Civil Service Commission, and Donna Pfeifer was appointed to take his place. Penny Carter was appointed to fill the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) Steering Committee in the area of Judicial and Public Safety, and Cindy Gretzinger was appointed to represent the county with the WCA Personnel, Finance and County Organization Committee.

The first item on the agenda was the Chief Deputy Wage Structure. The wage increase will start in 2021, and is 1/25% increase that will match the wages of the lieutenant and captain. This was a unanimous vote.

Item two on the agenda was a raise for county board members who spend a day at a meeting. This is a \$10 raise for a meeting that uses up most of a day. This means that instead of a \$40 payment for the meeting, the pay goes to \$50. The vote was not unanimous, with two board members, Burl and Pethers voting no.

Item three, the funding for the broadband grant borrowing was voted in unanimously.

With summer's arrival, The Community Coalition of Forest County and the Forest County Health Department would like to remind everyone of the importance of keeping your medications locked up properly, and disposing of unused medications in a safe manner. The Forest County Sheriff department has a 24/7 drop box available for you to bring your unused medications to and dispose of them in a safe manner.

Items that can safely be disposed of include: Prescription medications, over the counter medications, ointments, patches, non-aerosol sprays, inhalers, creams, vials, and pet medications. These items can safely be disposed of by bringing them to the 24/7 drop box located in the Forest County Sheriff department lobby.

You should not bring: Illegal drugs, needles/sharps, aerosol cans, biohazardous material (anything containing bodily liquid or blood), mercury thermometers or personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, ect), household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas).

By properly disposing of your unused medications, you can help protect our community members, and the environment.

From baseball tournaments to the biggest fireworks in the Northwoods, she was passionate about making the summer a great one and one that visitors and locals could have a good time. Her voice could be heard far and wide on the PA announcing someone's order from concessions or the countdown to the fireworks.

In April of 1991 Susie became the first, and longest running, female Town Chairperson in Townsend. She continued her work in the festival committee as well as helped pave many roads, figuratively, for the town. She got Townsend and four other towns to combine to be the Five Most Northern Towns. This meant that people could conduct many activities without having to travel 60+ miles to do so.

The family hopes to have a bench made and dedicated to Susie at the ballpark and do something special for her on July 4, 2021, this was her favorite holiday in Townsend. Special thanks to everyone at St. Luke's South Shore for making sure her last moments were not alone and were peaceful. Thanks, as well for all of the calls and texts of kinds words and funny stories. Susie was a talker and a character, and the world will not be the same without her.







State moratorium on utility disconnections to end July 25

MADISON - On Thursday, the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC) voted unanimously to lift the temporary moratorium on utility disconnections for nonpayment during the COVID-19 public health emergency. The move comes as the state continues to reopen and nearly a month after the state Supreme Court struck down

Safer at Home. The PSC strongly encourages customers behind on payments to arrange for a payment plan, or apply for assistance.

"As our state's businesses reopen and people return to work by following the steps in the Badger Bounce Back plan, we must calibrate consumer protections with costs to all utility customers. The longer deferral of payments are allowed, the more it will impact utility bills for everyone. Our actions today will ensure that those who are able to pay will continue do so, and those who are struggling can seek a payment plan or apply for energy assistance," said Rebecca Cameron Valcq, Chairperson of the PSC. "When working out payment plans with customers, I strongly encourage utilities to provide extra flexibility for those whose lives and employment continue to be severely impacted by this disease." To avoid disconnection, customers who have fallen behind on payments are encouraged to first contact their utility to set up a payment plan. Contact information for the largest utilities in Wisconsin is listed below:

To determine eligibility or find out where to apply for assistance, go to http://homeenergyplus.wi.gov/ or call 1-866-HEATWIS."

If full payment or a payment plan cannot be agreed on, utilities will be allowed to send disconnection notices starting July 15. Customers who have a medical condition or are infected and sick with COVID-19 can still avoid disconnection with a temporary waiver from their utility. Additionally, the PSC voted to allow utilities to commence

charging late payment fees on debts incurred after July 15, refuse service for failure to provide documentation to prove identity and residency after July 25, and allow utilities to require a cash deposit as a condition of new service starting July 31.

On March 23, 2020, Governor Tony Evers and Andrea Palm, Secretary-designee of the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, ordered residents in the state to stay at home except when performing essential

If customers cannot reach an agreement with their utility, they may contact the PSC by calling 1-800-225-7729, or by filing a complaint on the PSC website.

If a customer is having difficulty paying their energy bill or receives a disconnection notice, they may be eligible for assistance from the Wisconsin Home Energy Assistance Program (WHEAP).

activities or accessing essential services.

In response to Governor Evers' initial Safer at Home order, the PSC met on March 24 and ordered that:

--No public utility may disconnect or refuse service to any customer for nonpayment;

--No public utility may refuse service to a new customer for failure to provide documentation to prove identity and residency;

--Every public utility shall offer to any customer a deferred payment agreement;

No public utility may assess upon any customer any fee or charge for late payment; and

--No public utility may require a cash deposit or other guarantee as a condition of new service.

On May 13, 2020, the Wisconsin Supreme Court struck down Safer at Home, ending measures put in place to manage the spread of COVID-19. The utility disconnection moratorium, however, remained in place.

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



Nicolet Medical Assistant gradsfar exceed national average on certification exam





Animal Track Apps

iTrack Wildlife Pro - Another app version of an old school field guide, iTrack Wildlife lets you search a database of 69 North American mammals based on some basic information about their foot, paw, or claw prints. The app will not only help you identify animals based on their prints, but also on their skulls. However, tiered pricing means you can access a handful of species with the free "Lite" version and a handful more with the "Basic" version. The whole package is pretty spendy for an app (\$14.99 iOS, Android).

Trees Apps

Leafsnap Leafsnap uses software similar to facial recognition to scan a photo of leaf that you take with your phone and compare it with a database with hundreds of different tree species. The resulting match includes everything you could ever want to know about that tree. Leafsnap will help you see (and name) the trees from the forest. It currently works best in the Northeastern U.S. and Canada, as well as the U.K. Also, it's iOS only, although the Audubon Society has a less robust tree app for Android (Free iOS).
