The Big Christmas Present



The early homesteads wouldn't be featured in Good Housekeeping magazine, but they kept most of the rain and snow off, and many of these early homesteads grew into prosperous farms as the decades passed.

Work was about 100 miles away from his home in Bear Creek, but the money was good, and that money was surely needed to be sure that he and his wife could keep their subsistence farm operating. If it took following the big sawmill 100 miles north to skid logs for the winter, he couldn't turn it down. He knew they paid their help and didn't miss paydays. He worked in the woods for the company when they operated the mill in nearby New London. So, when winter started its approach in mid-November, he bundled up his work clothes, Kissed the wife and two kids goodbye and boarded the train headed north.

He left with some trepidation, but he was reasonably sure that his wife, son and daughter would be able to feed and milk the six cows that were the start of what he hoped would be a large dairy herd someday. Of course, there were the two pigs and chickens to look after as well, but he had plenty of hay and grain put up, and if they were going to be successful, there had to be some sacrifices. One of those sacrifices was his winter away in the Northwoods, living in a camp that smelled like wet wool and sweat, little opportunity for bathing, and eating pancakes every morning and evening even if you were sure you couldn't choke down another one.

He stepped off the C&NW train in Pelican Lake and had to wait for the train that would take him to Crandon, where he would step out of the railcar a short walk to the new Page & Landeck sawmill. Once at the mill, he was loaded in a buckboard and taken to a new logging camp about five miles from the sawmill.

The first order of business after leaving the sack of oats that had served as his chair on a rough ride over frozen ruts, was to be assigned a bed in the bunkhouse. He had to wait until the crews came in for the evening meal before he met his foreman for the winter. He was happy to find out that Big George, the foreman, was somebody he had worked for around New London. When he visited the camp office, he was also happy to see that he too was somebody who had made the move north with the sawmill. He was greeted with a big smile, and a "Hello Frenchie, glad to have you back!"

That evening, in the bunkhouse, he found out he was bunking next to Otto, a friend from Bear Creek. Otto was equally pleased to see another friendly face. He hadn't seen Otto for quite some time. Otto had bought cutover land from the company and has been busy for the last year or so digging stumps and trying to make a farm on the rough glacial till that was common in the area. He was happy with his venture, however, as the price of this future farmland was a fraction of what it was in the New London/Bear Creek area.

The next day, work was started. Frenchie found himself on a road crew, cutting tote roads that led to the main landing near the almost completed narrow gauge line that would ultimately haul the hardwood logs to the sawmill on the edge of a small lake in Crandon. It was work with axe, grubhoe, one-man and crosscutt saws, with teams of horses skidding off the merchantable timber along with the pole wood and brush. The roads were

Crystal Lake is pumped to get the water level back to normal

Earlier in the year we reported on the abnormally high water in Crystal Lake near Pickerel. This is an unusual year for water levels. Swamps are full of water and have been all through the warm months. It looks like the water levels in spring breakup.

With some cottages flooded and many others with water close to the door, The Crystal Lake Association took on the big job of pumping the lake to get the water levels down. The water is being pumped over a mile to Pickerel Lake according to Bob Schuster, a Crystal Lake resident, who was manning the pump when I stopped. Pickerel Lake is drained by Pickerel Creek, but Crystal Lake has no outlet.

About five Lake Association members provide the volunteer help to keep the pump running. The Association has taken on the cost of the job with DNR approval. Donations to the Association keep the rent paid on the pump, but the hose was purchased and will be sold later, according to Schuster.

We live in an area where the weather can be extreme. All remember the drought years, when lake levels dropped many feet in some locations. Maybe a drought will replace the wet season we are now in. We will just have to wait and see.



What does the Senior Nutrition Program meal cost?

Starting January 1, 2021, Forest County Nutrition Program "suggested donation" for carry out and home delivered meal programs will increase. Carryout/congregate will increase to \$3.50 and home delivered meal will increase to \$4.25. I would like to share with you how the cost of a meal is determined.

Let's start with some important numbers. In the past 12 months, October 1, 2019-September 30, 2020 we served 19.728 meals to seniors. I often hear the meal program described as a "free" meal program, when nothing could be further from the truth. The cost to prepare, deliver and serve a home delivered meal is \$10.04 and a congregate or "carry out" meal cost \$9.50 per meal. The cost to prepare all 19,728 meals was approximately \$170,000.00. In 2020, we have served 18,238 meals as of the end of November. We estimate spending \$160,000.00. However, you need to take into consideration we had one site closed due to COVID and we served carry out meals for the last ten months. If we had not endured this pandemic, our cost would have been much

Actually, the expenses this year are extremely high considering congregate dining has been closed since the middle of March and we have been bulk delivering Meals on Wheels since than as well. We have all seen rising costs in groceries and everyday supplies for our family budgets. This program is no different. Our cost includes, raw food and materials, preparation, and delivery of the meal to the meal sites by the caterer. It further includes the staffing and other costs incurred by the site to serve the meal at dining site.

For home delivered meals it includes the additional packaging, supplies and delivery equipment needed to safely provide home delivered meals to the homebound. Our staff try very hard to keep our cost down by making sure there is minimum of wasted food and creating efficiencies whenever possible. Please take time to congratulate them on a job well done! We have a group of amazing dining site

So where does the money come from?

Congregate meal program allocation from federal/state funding is \$61,588. Home delivered meal program allocation is \$9,831 from federal/state. We receive Nutrition Supplemental Income Program funding for every meal we serve. It is about \$11,782 per fiscal year which is federal funding. County levy contributes about \$30,000 annually. The rest of our funding comes from the donations from all of you. In 2019, our donations and revenue from Family Care was \$64,989.15, which was 15% of our budget. Without the donations and revenue, we would be overbudget and we would have to implement waitlist for home delivered meal program and possibly make other cuts.

So why set a suggested minimum contribution

First and foremost, this is what it says: a suggestion. We understand that individual finances will determine the amount, if any, a person can contribute. We set this for those that would simply like a guide. If half of the persons served a meal contribute this amount, while others contribute a little more, a little less, or none at all based upon what their finances will allow, we could continue the program at the current level of service. While you are asked to anonymously contribute what you can to the program for your meal, if your circumstances do not allow for this, a contribution is not required. Regardless of your contribution, you are always welcome at our table or to receive a home-delivered meal.

leveled enough so that the coming snows would make a hard and level sleigh-road to the landing. It was hard work, but Frenchie told himself that he was increasing the family income, and making sure that future mortgage payments on the farm could be met. He realized that he had likely bit off more than he could chew on that mortgage, but with hard work he hoped to make it.

The work went on. The skid trails were done and the heavy logging had started. Otto was working a crosscut saw with Frenchie, and their old friendship grew stronger. Otto, however, probably wasn't cut out to be a lumberjack. When a tree was going over, he never got far enough away. Frenchie suggested he be more careful, but Otto just shrugged. Then it happened.

A hard maple with a seam up the trunk and good lean exploded. The tree barberchaired and split about 12 feet up, then rolled off to the ground. Frenchie had given the tree lots of room when it started its split, but Otto didn't. His lower leg had a fracture with a piece of bone breaking the skin. An artery was also broken, and the blood was gushing. Frenchie quickly removed his belt and made a tourniquet, slowing the blood loss to a trickle, then he went for help. Otto was carried from the woods, put on a bobsled and hauled to Doc Diamond. The doctor did his best setting the bones and stitching up the torn flesh. He said that if wasn't for the tourniquet, he probably would have lost his leg. He also said his days of lumberjacking were likely at an end, because he thought he would have a limp the rest of his life.

Frenchie hated to admit it, but he was homesick. Christmas was just a few days away, and he was told to take a few days off and visit home. Many of the jacks did the same. He also had to pick Otto up at the little hospital and help him get home to Bear Creek.

The time arrived. Catching a ride to town on the caboose of the narrow gauge, he headed for the company store to buy a few Christmas gifts for his family. He was frugal, and only purchased things that would fit in his backpack. Then he stopped for Otto so he could help him to the depot. It was a chore. Otto only had a boot on his good leg. He didn't know what happened to the other boot, but it wouldn't fit on his swollen foot anyway. Two wool socks took the place of a boot. Otto said, "I have a Christmas present for you. It will be the biggest Christmas present you will ever get! I am going to give you my homestead. Don't argue! I know I can't work it with this leg. The Doc said my days of logging and stump pulling are over. And, don't worry. It is all paid for. My uncle in Milwaukee paid it off for me. He said if I was dumb enough to do that kind of work instead of learning to be a machinist in his shop in Milwaukee, the least he could do was pay off the mortgage. We will do the paper work when we get home. My uncle thinks it is a good idea too."

Frenchie was flabbergasted. He said, "Otto, I already have a farm started in Bear Creek."

Otto replied, "I know that. I listened to you fret about the mortgage since you came north. Land back home is expensive compared to land up here in the woods. This will be paid for. Of course, there are some stumps to pull. There is a cabin I built over the last two years, and I did pull enough stumps for a garden. Don't worry about me. When I heal up, I will have a limp, but Uncle is going to put me to work in his shop and teach me to be a machinist. I will spend most of my day sitting on a stool."

Frenchie explained that he had to discuss it with his wife, but being without a mortgage sounded good to him, even if it was rough ground with stones to pick. Otto spent Christmas with Frenchie and his family, and when the holiday was over, Frenchie's wife was sold on the idea of starting over up north.

Otto was right when he said it was the biggest Christmas present he ever gave. He also laughed when he apologized for not wrapping it up with a bright red bow.

This joke was often repeated through the years, when Frenchie and his family celebrated Christmas.

When the winter's logging was done, Frenchie headed back to Bear Creek. He found a buyer for his beginners farm, and put some money in his pocket. He sold all but two cows, that he brought north, along with the team of horses he used in Bear Creek. He had the money to rent space in a boxcar to haul their animals and personal possessions north. When he arrived, he started to work on improving his "Christmas present."

Frenchie and Otto kept in touch, sending post cards back and forth. There were usually letters exchanged at Christmas, with Frenchie updating Otto on the progress of the Christmas homestead and Otto telling about what he was learning in his new trade.

Life wasn't easy on the new homestead. He learned to use dynamite on the stumps, added new acreage every year, and supplemented his income in the winter months with the same logging and sawmill company that lured him to the Northwoods. A decent house was built eventually, along with a barn, chicken coop and and other needed outbuildings. The farm flourished the best when it was inherited by the son.
