# **Election results for Forest** County

The election results for Forest County are as follows: Deborah Kerr had a total of 135 votes, followed by Jill Underly with 105 votes for State Superintendent of Schools.

The Town of Laona, Wards 1-3 had Mark Chrisman winning the primary for Town Board Chair with a total of 149 votes. He was followed by Roger Wilson with 57 votes and Terry Lukas with 46 votes. For Town Board Supervisor, the vote was 140 for Jennifer Thornton-Spencer, 113 for Steve Matuszewski, 81 for Todd Kalata, 60 for Jack Matuszewski, and 52 for Raymond Collins.

# **Conservation Corner**

Geographic Information Systems (GIS) are the most modern way of mapmaking. GIS analyzes spatial data from Remote Sensing. Remote sensing is the acquisition of information about an object or phenomenon without making physical contact with the object and thus is in contrast to on-site observation. The term is applied especially to acquiring information about the Earth. GIS also uses Global Positioning Systems (GPS). GPS is a system of 30+ navigation satellites circling Earth. A GPS receiver in your phone listens for these signals. Once the receiver calculates its distance from four or more GPS satellites, it can figure out where you are.

With tricky terminology like raster and vector data, GIS can seem like a very technical application, but modern software has made it very user-friendly to apply the benefits of GIS to your property. This winter might be a good time to familiarize yourself with some of these programs so you can create your own map!

#### Smart Phone Apps:

On X Hunt:

This app is the very user-friendly. The app uses a mix of GPS satellite and topographic maps. You can view private and public property land ownership, roads and trails, and US topographic maps. You can also track your location and download areas for mapping offline. Other features include weather conditions, hunting zones, acreage measurement tools, coordinates, and ability to export your data. After a 7-day trial, there is a \$30/year subscription price. Gaia:

While a little more advanced, this app has many of the same features as On-X Hunt and has a free version. With the free version, you can plan, record, and use the free topographic maps. You can add points, track routes and areas, download maps, take pictures while you track, and import files from Google Maps. Avenza:

This is the most advanced GPS app, but it also has a free version. It has been used by forestry professionals, so it has many features. To begin, you have to "purchase" a map in their store, although some are free to download. Once you open one of these maps, you can add points, track routes, see where you are on the map, and record coordinates. You can also track your altitude, speed, and bearing as well as upload your own maps. Although this is advanced, there are helpful guides if you want to try it out.

# Wolf season in Wisconsin February 22-28

MADISON, Wis. - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced Monday that a wolf harvest season will take place Feb. 22-28, 2021.

All hunters and trappers interested in obtaining a wolf harvest permit or preference point must apply beginning at 12:01 a.m. Tuesday, Feb. 16. The application period will close at 11:59 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 20. Customers may apply through their Go Wild account or by visiting a participating license agent. The application permit fee is \$10 plus \$49 (\$251 non-resident) for a wolf license if selected.

The department will post application results to each applicant's Go Wild account the morning of Monday, Feb. 22. Customers may commence the harvest season once they secure their license and carcass/pelt tag.

The DNR will post the updated rules and regulations for the February 2021 wolf harvest season on the wolf hunting and trapping webpage no later than Friday, Feb. 19. Printed copies will not be available in time for the February wolf harvest season.

Customers interested in applying for a harvest permit or preference point should note that the Go Wild website will be down for previously scheduled maintenance 2-6 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 20.

During the Natural Resources Board Special Meeting on Feb. 15, the board unanimously voted for a harvest quota of 200 wolves outside reservation lands.

The department's approved quota considered 2020 wolf population data, population response to previous harvest seasons, scientific literature, and population model projections. The proposed quota objective is to allow for a sustainable harvest that neither increases nor decreases the state's wolf population.

Before any licenses are issued, the department will take steps to honor the Ojibwe Tribes' right to declare up to half of the harvestable surplus in the Ceded Territory, per the Tribes' treaty rights and court rulings.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service removed gray wolves from the federal endangered species list on Jan. 4, 2021, returning management authority to the lower 48 states and tribes. The Wisconsin DNR has successfully managed gray wolves for decades and will continue to do so under our state's laws and the best science available.

### Forest County COVID vaccine update

The Forest County Health Department is currently helping to provide COVID-19 vaccine to frontline healthcare personnel, EMS, those who provide direct patient service or other healthcare services, law enforcement, fire personnel, and anyone 65 and older.

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has announced the following groups to be eligible tentatively starting March 1st, 2021:

Educators and child care

Individuals enrolled in Medicaid long-term care programs

Some public facing essential workers including 911 operators, utility and communications infrastructure, public transit, and food supply chain

- Non-frontline essential health care personnel
- Congregate living facility staff and residents

FCHD is currently receiving weekly vaccine allocations from the state. Individuals are then scheduled based on that allocation and their eligibility. We will continue to share more information about vaccine availability for other individuals and as it becomes available from DHS.

If you are interested in receiving the vaccine, please call our office at 715-478-3371 to be added to our waitlist. You can also contact your healthcare provider to ask about vaccine availability.

## 920 cases of covid-19 (1 active) confirmed in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) for a total of 920 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of today, Forest County has 4,296 negative test results. There is currently 1 active case in isolation, 895 released from isolation, 1 hospitalized, and 26 deaths related to COVID-19.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page daily and local newspapers weekly with current COVID-19 case counts. Just like GIS and GPS, Google Earth has been around awhile, but now they have versions for the web, a mobile device, or a desktop. The aerial images are detailed enough to get a good idea of the landscape, so it can be good for prospecting, hunting, or seeing where improvements can be made. Here are some great things you can do with Google Earth:

- Drop a pin to get exact coordinates
- Draw paths and measure the distances between points
- Aerial and roadside views
- Create and save map images that you can print
- Add layers of data (street names, geographic borders)

 Pro version shows tax lot boundaries and you can calculate the area of a shape

The only downside of Google Earth is that some of the images can be up to a few years old and small trails, roads, and ponds do not stand out due to canopy cover. Public Sources:

#### Sen. Felzkowski and Rep. Callahan Joint **Statement on Wolf Hunt Ruling**

Madison, WI-Yesterday, Jefferson County Circuit Court ruled in favor of Wisconsinites across the state who have been negatively impacted by an unmanaged wolf population and the Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) blatant disregard to follow the law and implement a hunting season this winter. Sen. Mary Felzkowski (R-Tomahawk) and Rep. Calvin Callahan (R-Tomahawk) made the following statement:

'It's refreshing to see that the law, as written by the Legislature, means something once again. Our statutes require a wolf hunting season if the animal is delisted from the federal Endangered Species Act period."

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service proposed their final rule to delist the gray wolf on November 3, 2020 - that was 101 days ago.

"The DNR had ample time to make this happen and they chose to sit on their hands. Today, the rule of law prevailed and we look forward to their immediate implementation of a wolf hunting season."



#### Who's for putting a price on carbon? by Bill Bussev

Media references to "putting a price on carbon" or "carbon pricing" as a means of addressing the climate crisis seem to be on the increase recently. Doing soeither by putting a carbon tax on fossil fuels or by implementing a "cap and trade" system, also known as an emissions trading systemwould result in higher prices for fossil fuelbased goods and services, which would provide us with a financial incentive to reduce our carbon footprints, and provide entrepreneurs with an incentive to develop less carbon-intensive products. Depending on the pricing design, the result could be a dramatic reduction in carbon emissions, and if the resulting revenues were returned to American households, the majority of them, including most lower to moderate income households, would come out ahead financially.

That's the idea, but a significant amount of political opinion sees its near-term chances in Congress as slim at best. Who's in favor of it anyway? Anyone? Here's a pop quiz:

1. How many countries already have some form of carbon pricing in place or have passed legislation to implement it: (a) none, (b) 4, or (c) 46?

Answer: (c), including our neighbors Mexico, which has a very modest carbon tax, and Canada, which has a much more ambitious combined system; China, which is transitioning to a national emissions trading system from a number of pilot projects; members of the European Union; and a host of other countries, including Columbia, Chile, Argentina, South Africa, South Korea, and Japan. published in the Wall Street Journal states that "global climate change is a serious problem calling for immediate national action;" that "a carbon tax offers the most costeffective lever to reduce carbon emissions at the scale and speed that is necessary." # Senior Chatter Beware of Suspicious Phone Calls and

Protect Your Personal Information The Wisconsin Senior Medicare Patrol has received numerous reports from people in northeastern Wisconsin about concerning phone calls from people identifying themselves as representatives from their health care provider or Medicare. While the purpose of the call appears helpful, it is important to remember to be vigilant and not share personal information over the phone with anyone who calls you unexpectedly or who is unfamiliar to you. In some cases, it has been reported that the caller had a significant amount of personal information already, which is very alarming.

This particular scam seems to go one step further than most, in that, the caller appears to know some of your HIPPA protected information. The caller sounds very friendly and authentic. The caller states they are calling and checking to see how your specific medical condition, i.e., neck, shoulder, knee, hip, etc., is doing after being seen at your doctor's office for this very condition. The caller knows the name and location of your medical facility and in some instances your medication list. It appears the caller is attempting to get your Medicare number and to send braces for your medical condition.

Fraudsters spend lots of time searching the internet and other sources to piece together as much information about you as possible before calling. The hope is that they sound legitimate when calling so that you will feel comfortable talking with them and ultimately sharing additional information, which is often a Medicare number.

If you receive these types of phone calls, just hang up! Medicare will never call you with such an offer. Treat your Medicare number like a credit card. If you do need a brace or medical equipment, talk to your doctor. Sellers on the phone do not know what you need. If the caller has identified themselves as being a representative from your health care provider, call your provider and ask if they have called. If your provider has not called, ask to speak to your provider's facility manager to report this serious incident. Also, please report this call to the Wisconsin Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) by calling tollfree 1-888-818-2611 to help prevent Medicare fraud. 

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

maintained by counties. The features of these sites differ from county to country, but most have property boundaries, size of lots, and who owns them. The property lines are overdrawn on the aerial images. Sometimes the boundary lines don't match up exactly with the pictures. Some might even have archived aerial surveys to compare.

Forest County recently updated their aerial survey after hiring a company to fly and photograph the county in Spring of 2020. The data is all compiled and should be available on the County website shortly.

A very useful government site is the USDA's Web Soil Survey. This is great for woodland property owners, farmers, or gardeners who want to analyze what kind of activities your soil is suitable for (optimize for wildlife, recreation, timber production, etc.).

Dear Community Members,

### The School District of Wabeno Area is proposing an operational referendum on April 6, 2021.

This referendum will be used to support existing District operations and improve student opportunities. We are asking permission for a maximum of \$2.5 million over each of the next five school years (2022-2023, 2023-2024, 2024-2025, 2025-2026 and 2026-2027.) We need this referendum as the current funding formula used by the State of Wisconsin does not provide the dollars necessary for us to continue to offer a high level of educational programs and services for our students.

Previously approved referendum monies have allowed for greater student access to technology and revised courses aligned to higher academic standards. Our ability to stay up-to-date with technology has allowed our District to transition to At-Home Learning efficiently when needed.

The Board of Education plans to hold public informational meetings in February and March. The dates and times are as follows:

- Tuesday, March 2, Wabeno Town Hall 6 p.m.
- Monday, March 22, WHS Auditorium, 6 p.m.
- Tuesday, March 9, Blackwell Town Hall 6 p.m. • Tuesday, March 23, Freedom Town Hall 7 p.m.
- Wednesday, March 10, WHS Auditorium, 6 p.m.

The School District has been financially frugal with general spending, staff reductions, and changes of insurance. These reductions have had a minimal impact on the School District. Further reductions will be detrimental to the educational success of our students and community.

If we fail to pass this referendum, the District will have several options: another referendum next spring, continued staff reductions, cuts in extra-curricular activities, fees for food service programs, or dissolution of our School District. If the District dissolves, your taxes do not disappear. You will pay taxes at the mill rate of the new district where your property is located. Currently, the mill rates of our neighboring school districts are higher than the mill rate would be in our District with this referendum. The following chart provides mill rate information.


