Shoreland Lighting: A Special Concern

As Spring approaches and our lakes open up, one of the issues that came to my attention is Shoreland Lighting. During the daytime Shorelands are heavily used for recreation. Artifcial lighting allows us to engage in nighttime activities that would be impossible or unsafe under normal nighttime conditions. Whether it's boating, fishing or simply sitting on the porch to read, our enjoyment of the night is enhanced by the use of artifcial light. At the same time, our rivers and lakes at night provide a quiet open dark space that gives us privacy and an opportunity to enjoy the heavens. Balancing the ability to see at night with the desire to preserve the beauty of the night is the goal of sensible shoreland lighting.

Sensible lighting can minimize the three most serious problems along our shorelands: Glare: The first principle of good lighting is to illuminate only what we wish to see. When we see a distant point of light across the water, when we are seeing light from the fixture itself rather than what the fixture is meant to illuminate, we are observing glare. Poorly-designed or poorly installed lighting causes glare that can severely hamper the vision of boaters, pedestrians, cyclists, and drivers, creating a hazard rather than increasing safety. Light Trespass: Light trespass is a light fixture on one property that illuminates an adjacent or nearby property. Light trespass is not a legal concept, but rather a description of the nuisance effect of improperly aimed lights on someone else's property. We all have seen street lights, commercial lights or residential lights spilling over onto adjacent property, causing illumination where it was

Forest County COVID Vaccine Update

The Forest County Health Department is currently helping to provide COVID-19 vaccine to eligible individuals as determined by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS). This includes:

- Frontline healthcare personnel
- EMS
- Those who provide direct patient service or other healthcare services
- Law enforcement/Fire personnel
- Anyone 65 and older
- Educators and child care
- Individuals enrolled in Medicaid long-term care programs including Family Care, Family Care Partnership, IRIS, Wisconsin's Children's Long-term Support Waiver, and Katie Beckett
- Some public facing essential workers including 911 operators, utility and communications infrastructure, public transit, and food supply chain, restaurant workers, and spiritual care providers/clergy
- Non-frontline essential health care personnel
- Congregate living facility staff and residents including employer-based housing, housing serving the elderly or people with disabilities, shelters, transitional housing, and incarcerated individuals

Wisconsin DHS has announced that individuals age 16 and older with certain medical conditions will be eligible for the vaccine beginning March 22nd, 2021. These medical conditions are associated with an increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19 and includes:

- Asthma (moderate-to-severe)
- Cancer
- Cerebrovascular disease (affects blood vessels and blood supply to the brain)
- Chronic kidney disease
 COPD (chronic obstruct
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
 - Cystic fibrosis
- Down syndrome
- Heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies
- Hypertension or high blood pressure
- Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system) from solid organ transplant, blood or bone marrow transplant, immune deficiencies, HIV, use of corticosteroids, or use of other immune weakening medicines
 - Liver disease
- Neurologic conditions, such as dementia
- Obesity (body mass index [BMI] of 30-39 kg/m2)
 Obesity (BMI of 35, 30 kg/m2)
- Overweight (BMI of 25-29 kg/m2)
- Pregnancy
- Pulmonary fibrosis (having damaged or scarred lung tissues)
- Severe Obesity (BMI 40 kg/m2 or more)
- Sickle cell disease
- Type 1 or 2 diabetes mellitus
- Thalassemia (a type of blood disorder)

The Forest County Health Department continues to receive weekly vaccine allocations from the state. Individuals are then scheduled based on that allocation and their eligibility.

FCHD has provided 1,837 COVID vaccines as of March 19th, 2021.

If you are interested in receiving the vaccine, please call our office at 715-478-3371 to be added to our waitlist. You can also contact your healthcare provider or local pharmacy to ask about vaccine availability.

937 cases of COVID-19 (7 active) in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) for a total of 937 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of Friday, March 19, Forest County has 4,554 negative test results. There are currently 7 active cases in isolation, 907 released from isolation, 0 hospitalized, and 26 deaths related to COVID-19.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to use caution.

Spring into Better Health

After a long winter, the signs of spring are sprouting up all around us. Now is a good time to focus on your health so you can enjoy all that this season has to offer. And taking advantage of Medicare preventive benefits is the perfect way to spring into better health!

Preventive services can help you prevent illnesses and detect health problems early, when treatment works best. People with Medicare have access to a wide range of preventive tests and screenings, most at no extra cost. If you're new to Medicare, a "Welcome to Medicare" preventive visit is covered during the first 12 months you are enrolled in Part B. The visit includes a review of your medical and social history as well as education and counseling about preventive services, including certain screenings, shots and referrals for other care, if needed. Once you've had Part B for longer than 12 months, you can get a yearly "Wellness" visit to develop or update a personalized prevention plan based on your current health and risk factors. Note: The Wellness visit is not the same as an annual physical exam.

You pay nothing for the "Welcome to Medicare" visit or yearly "Wellness" visit if your doctor or other health care provider accepts Medicare assignment. If additional tests or services are performed during the same visit that aren't covered under the preventive benefit, you may have to pay coinsurance, and the Part B deductible may apply.

Medicare also covers screening tests for breast cancer, diabetes, heart disease, obesity management, and osteoporosis, just to name a few. You can find a complete list of Medicare-covered preventive services in your Medicare and You 2021 handbook or on the Medicare website at www.medicare.gov. Talk to your doctor about what screenings and shots are right for you.

not meant to be. Because the waterfront is unobstructed. water reflects glare from shoreland lights over the water to trespass on distant properties.

Sky Glow: Much of our exterior lighting shines directly upward, causing the sky above our cities to glow and washing out our view of the dark night sky. Billboard lights that shine upward, street lights that bounce light off pavement, and commercial and residential lighting open to the sky all contribute to sky glow.

Installing sensible shoreland lighting can be especially challenging because of the ability of water to both reflect light and provide an unobstructed view from far away. Anyone who has seen the moon rise over the water appreciates how reflective the water can be. Artificial light placed at the shoreland is free to carry across the water for long distances.

Waterfront lighting is often used to identify a pier or marina for boaters on the water after dark. Taverns and restaurants use neon signs to attract customers off the water. Dams and other structures use lights to warn of dangers to navigation. Mills, factories, ballfields and other facilities near the water also light the shoreland. While these uses of artificial lighting are legitimate, we must also take into con-sideration those people who can see those lights, but are not using them.

The most common shoreland lights are attached to homes, garages, piers and other structures on waterfront residential property. While we may notice the glare from an unshielded garage light across the lake, it's likely that we've never ventured across the lake at night to see how our own home lights the night. Let's start by making our own lighting sensible and unobtrusive, only then helping our neighbors "see the light."

Solving shoreland lighting problems always involves working with our neighbors. You may have spent some time working on this problem, others may not have thought about it at all. An easy first step to educating our neighbors and ourselves about a perceived lighting problem is to identify all the sources of glare along the shoreland.

If you are talking individually to a neighbor about a lighting problem, a careful explanation may be all that's needed. Keep in mind that your neighbor probably has concerns about their safety and security and feels that their bright light is a good solution to their concerns. Above all, be tactful and courteous. Understand some of the facts about different lighting fixtures, energy savings, and the differences between a good security light and a light that is just very bright. Most people like to be helpful and cooperative when approached in a friendly and cooperative manner.

Municipalities in a number of states have enacted lighting control ordinances. These measures prohibit inefficient, low-quality lighting. Lake and homeowner associations or municipalities interested in regulating shoreland lighting can take example from the following section of the Oneida County, Wisconsin zoning code, which focuses on pier lighting:

Flashing and rotating lights are prohibited.

Lighting inside a boathouse and intended to illuminate its interior is permitted.

Lighting on exteriors of berthing structures shall be fitted with opaque shields to prevent direct visibility of the lamp to persons on public waters or adjacent lands more than 50 feet beyond the berthing structure.

Lighting not mounted on a berthing structure but designed to illuminate a berthing structure or its immediate vicinity shall comply with subparagraph 3

Lighting installed on, or intended to illuminate seasonally-used berthing structures shall be turned off when not required for safety or security.

Public marinas may install illuminated signs with opaque shaded or shielded lighting that provide information pertaining to applicable federal state or municipal rules and regulations relating to electrical, fueling, waste and sewage disposal or other safety and environmental matters. Such sign illumination shall not be visible off the berth structure.

Eliminating glare and light pollution saves money while reducing our impact upon our neighbors and creatures of the night.

State driver licenses and IDs are most common forms of ID at the polls

Anyone who doesn't have an ID to vote in the Spring Election should start the process now


Wisconsin driver licenses or IDs are the most common form of identification used for voting purposes. Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) encourages voters to check and be sure that they have the proper identification needed to vote in next month's election (April 6). A federally compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes.

The Wisconsin Elections Commission notes other forms of identification are valid for voting purposes, such as military or student ID cards. To see if a card meets the requirements, visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website.

Voters looking to get their first Wisconsin ID can turn to DMV for help. To obtain an official ID card, there are documentation requirements such as a birth certificate. If all documentation is not readily available, the ID Petition Process (IDPP) can be used to obtain a receipt valid for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained. DMV offers this service and ID cards for voting purposes free of charge. DMV's toll-free Voter ID hotline at (844) 588-1069 is available for questions on obtaining an ID to vote.

DMV's website has a locator to help find the nearest DMV and check wait times (wisconsindmv.gov/centers).

For Old Time's Sake



Before the hardwood timber was logged in this area, the pine was cut and floated down the rivers to the sawmills when spring arrived. This picture is of the driving crew on a Wolf River drive. They are posed on the raft that carried the cook shack. The photo is marked as "about 1890." The logs were driven to Oshkosh, where 14 large sawmills converted the logs into lumber for use in cities like Milwaukee, Chicago, and St. Louis and many more. There are still people living in old houses built with lumber sawn from pine trees floated down the Wolf.

When the railroads eventually made their way into the Northwoods, hardwood logs and lumber was produced for markets in the same population centers. When the logging was done, the Northwoods was a land of stumps, rocks and brush. This made way for some homesteaders and made for some great grouse and deer hunting, as well as poverty for many Northwoods residents.

Nicolet first began purchasing patient simulators a dozen years ago. These included an adult male, a young boy for pediatric education, and a several-month-old

"Like everything the technology advances so quickly," St. Louis said. "We saw a need to bring in these nextgeneration level of simulators and expand our training experiences in OB and pediatrics."

The mother-daughter simulators can be programmed to give students a wide variety of birthing situations, everything from a normal delivery to ones that present with complications.

Features include the ability to recognize and react to medications, respond to intubation and CPR, produce normal and abnormal heart and lung sounds, and present different respiratory and oxygen-level scenarios, along with other advanced features.

"It really does give them hands-on, near-real-world experience and bridges the gap between the theory students learn from a textbook theory and what they'll experience when treating actual patients," St. Louis said.
