#### **Conservation Corner**

As the last of the ice is finally gone, many people look forward to getting their boats back in the water. This also means groups will once again head to boat launches in an effort to keep Aquatic Invasive Species [AIS] out of the lakes. AIS can be determinantal to a lake's health.

Eurasian Water Milfoil, Rusty Crayfish and Zebra Mussels have all been found in lakes in Forest County. Once they're in there it is very hard to get them out. Most of the time you're just not going to, but luckily most of them can at least be managed.

The Clean Boats, Clean Waters program is a large part of that effort. The county conservation office works with them and other agencies, lake associations, and volunteers to monitor boats coming in and out and public boat launches.

Last year, volunteers and paid staff spent their summers monitoring lakes in Forest County. One of the more challenging parts of the effort to stop AIS spread is securing the funding. Historically, counties were in that position where they have someone hired and then they put in for another competitive grant and then they don't get it. Somebody ranks higher and they end up having staff leave because of the job goes away.

Fortunately, the DNR's new Lake Monitoring and Protection Network will help. It sets up AIS funding more like a contract and less like a grant. The DNR will distribute the funds based on a number of factors like AIS presence, the amount of surface water, and public access availability.

The state is also encouraging neighboring counties to work together to monitor lakes in the area. The DNR just can't afford to give full time aquatic invasive species coordinator program money to every county. So, they're counting on counties to either cover the gaps or to regionalize.

Forest County recently agreed to work with Langlade and Oconto County to help fight AIS. The new program will be managed by the Lumberjack Resource Conservation and Development Council (RC&D). The agreement allows the three counties to combine their funding and hire a full-time tri-county AIS Coordinator. A new coordinator was recently hired and will maintain an office in Langlade County, but expect to see him/her out and about throughout the county.

#### COVID-19 vaccine update

The Forest County Health Department continues to receive weekly allocations from the State of Wisconsin of the Pfizer vaccine to aid in the response to the current pandemic. As of April 12th, 2021 there have been 3,542,552 vaccines administered across the State of Wisconsin. In Forest County, 35.1% (3,159) of our residents have received at least one dose of the vaccine and 27.1% (2,439) have completed the vaccine series. As of April 5th all persons over the age of 16 are eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine. Currently, Pfizer is the only vaccine that persons 16-17 years old are eligible to receive. We ask that you call the Forest County Health Department if you are interested in having your 16-17 year-old vaccinated.

In Forest County, there are many options available to get vaccinated including local and tribal health departments, community-based vaccination clinics and healthcare providers. To find a local vaccine provider visit the COVID vaccine provider map or visit https://vaccinefinder.org.

With the spread of variants of COVID occurring in our neighboring counties and states, it is very important to get vaccinated. Hospitals in larger cities are reporting that more infections are being seen in younger people. Please call today and set up an appointment to receive the COVID vaccine at 715-478-3371.

To continue to keep residents of Forest County safe and healthy, please continue using good infection control habits such as washing your hands, wearing a mask in public, avoiding large crowds, and staying home if you are sick and getting tested.

## 943 cases of covid-19 (4 active) confirmed in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) for a total of 943 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of Friday, April 8th, Forest County has 4,672 negative test results. There are currently 4 active cases in isolation, 916 released from isolation, 0 hospitalized, and 26 deaths related to COVID-19. As of April 12th.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to minimize their contact with others by staying home when possible, practice physical distancing and good personal hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers weekly on Friday's with current COVID-19 case counts. This will include the number of negative and positive cases in Forest County. Every Monday there will be an updated vaccine report on our Facebook page to update residents on the progress being made on vaccinating community members. ## DNR seeks public comment on Wild Rice Management

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is seeking public input on a draft Statewide Strategic Analysis of Wild Rice Management through June 7, 2021.

Wild rice is part of Wisconsin's natural landscape. Beds of wild rice help maintain good water quality, and they provide food and habitat for waterfowl and many other types of wildlife. Protecting and managing wild rice will help ensure many wildlife species persevere for all to enjoy. Wild rice is also a culturally significant plant to Wisconsin's Native American tribes, which have a personal and longstanding connection to wild rice.

The management of wild rice intersects with several DNR programs. The department chose to use the strategic analysis process to evaluate the range of scientific, natural resource and socioeconomic factors involved with protecting and encouraging the growth of wild rice. The purpose of the strategic analysis is to inform decision-makers and the public about current wild rice conditions, authorities and management practices, information gaps and alternative approaches.

A strategic analysis does not establish DNR policy or change existing rules. Instead, it will assist decision-makers, stakeholders and the public to better understand wild rice issues and make informed decisions about its management. This strategic analysis is the precursor to the development of a Statewide Wild Rice Management Plan.

"Wild rice is an amazing plant. Each year it grows from seed and transforms open waters into seas of grass, teeming with birds, mammals, insects, fish and other aquatic species," said Jon Simonsen, DNR Environmental Analysis and Review Specialist. "Whether you are familiar with wild rice or not, this analysis is intended to help anyone interested learn about wild rice and wild rice management."

#### Statewide media campaign takes on skyrocketing disposable e-cigarette use amongst youth

Crandon, WI The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Federal Drug Administration's (FDA) Center for Tobacco Products (CTP) recently declared youth use of disposable e-cigarettes an emerging public health challenge in a letter submitted to the New England Journal of Medicine. The letter cited 400% and 1000% increases in disposable e-cigarette use among U.S. middle and high school students between 2019 and 2020. The timing of the CDC and FDA's letter coincides with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services' relaunch of the Tobacco is Changing campaign, which features a video and other materials on disposable e-cigarettes.

Disposable e-cigarettes are devices that come ready to use and are then discarded once the user is finished with them. They are not refillable. Many are flavored and feature colorful designs.

Meanwhile, Wisconsin's Tobacco is Changing campaign's newest ads focus on products gaining traction with young people, including disposable e-cigarettes, and e-cigarettes disguised as smart watches and makeup compacts. The campaign also informs parents about hoodies and backpacks that hide e-cigarette devices. One video highlights the fact that disposable e-cigarettes contain hundreds of puffs of nicotine.

"We are glad to see disposable e-cigarettes highlighted in the new campaign materials," said Kincaid. "While disposable e-cigarettes have been on public health's radar for a while, it's important for parents to know about them as well."

Parents, as well as teachers and mentors, can see samples of disposable e-cigarettes and other tobacco products gaining in popularity with youth by visiting www.tobaccoischanging.com. Visitors can also find out about tactics like fruity flavors and shiny packaging, learn about resources to help teens quit, and get connected with local prevention efforts at the site.

"Parents should be aware of the tactics and aggressive marketing tobacco companies use to draw attention to their products. Those tactics can be read about at


#### WI a 2nd Amendment Sanctuary Stare proposed in legislature

Senator Mary Felzkowski (R-Tomahawk) joined Representative Treig Pronschinske (R-Mondovi) in authoring legislation that would make Wisconsin a Second Amendment sanctuary state - preventing the federal government from infringing on the rights of legal gun owners across Wisconsin.

Felzkowski commented: "Today, we witnessed a blatant overreach and attack on our second amendment rights. The sitting president of the United States of America signed six executive orders aimed at stripping millions of legal gun owners across the country of their sacred, unalienable rights."

Felzkowski's bill would prohibit the government from confiscating firearms, firearm accessories and ammunition that are legally owned and made in Wisconsin. It would also prohibit state public funds and state employees from assisting in the confiscation of legally owned, Second Amendment protected firearms, firearm accessories, and ammunition.

Felzkowski continued: "It's been said time and again - our Second Amendment right to bear arms is the only thing protecting the American people from an overreaching government. ### Senior Chatter FoodShare Updates Additional Benefits

Wisconsin's public health emergency remained in effect for March, 2021. This means that households not receiving the maximum Foodshare benefit amount in March received additional benefits, bringing them up to the maximum amount. The additional funds should have been made available on QUEST cards on March 21, 2021.\* Households already receiving the maximum amount do not receive these additional benefits. In addition, the amount

households receive may be lower than the maximum amount if they are repaying benefits due to an error. The Department of Health Services (DHS) will be checking in May that all households eligible for the March benefits received them. As a result, some new applicants or households reestablishing eligibility for March may receive the

additional March benefits on May 9, 2021. Additional benefits for months after March will depend on the length of Wisconsin's public health emergency and approval

from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service. \* There is also the additional Foodshare benefit from the federal law passed in 2020 giving beneficiaries up to 15% more in

benefits from January-June, 2021.

 Renewals due in March, April, May and June 2021 are postponed for six months. If your renewal was due in March, April, May or June, 2021, you will now need to complete the renewal process in September, October, November, or December

- 2021, respectively. You will get a letter in the mail about 45 days before your renewal is due. · Some FoodShare renewals are starting again in April 2021. Based on federal law FoodShare renewals can only be
- postponed for a certain amount of time. As a result, members who had renewals postponed in 2020 will need to complete the renewal process in 2021. If you need to complete the renewal process, you will get a letter in the mail about 45 days before your renewal is due. Renewals cannot be postponed starting in July 2021. Starting in July 2021, any renewals originally due in July 2021 and



MADISON, Wis. – Gov. Tony Evers has declared April 12-16 Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week in Wisconsin, and ReadyWisconsin wants everyone to take time to talk about weather safety with their families. ReadyWisconsin, the National Weather Service (NWS), Wisconsin Broadcasters Association, and Wisconsin Emergency Alert System Committee also encourage everyone in the state to participate in statewide tornado drills on April 15.

"Tornadoes and severe thunderstorms are a frequent weather threat across the state each year, and it's important that people know what to do when the skies darken and warnings are issued," said Dr. Darrell L. Williams, Wisconsin Emergency Management administrator. "During the statewide tornado drill, we ask everyone to practice their plan by going to their emergency shelter location."

Wisconsin averages 23 tornadoes annually. During the 2020 season, the NWS confirmed 20 tornadoes touched down in the state. While spring and summer are the most active time of the year for tornadoes, they can happen in any month.

To stay safe from severe weather, ReadyWisconsin encourages people to do the following:

- Create an emergency plan and practice it. Know where designated shelters are located at home, work, and school, and be ready to go there when a tornado warning is issued.
- Have multiple ways to receive alerts about approaching severe weather. Outdoor warning sirens, a NOAA Weather Radio, local media, and smart phone apps are all important tools. Don't rely on any single source for important life-saving alerts.
- •If you have a mobile device, make sure it is enabled to receive Wireless Emergency Alerts. On many devices, that option is available in the settings menu.
- Keep up to date on the daily forecast for your area. It can help ensure you are ready for potential severe weather threats.
- Create an emergency kit for your home, with supplies such as food, water, a flashlight, and first aid kit. Find tips for building a kit at <a href="https://readywisconsin.wi.gov">https://readywisconsin.wi.gov</a>

On April 15, Wisconsin will once again conduct its annual statewide tornado drill. At 1:45 p.m. and 6:45 p.m., everyone is encouraged to pause what they are doing and practice going to their designated shelter location. If there is severe weather expected anywhere in the state on April 15, the drill would be postponed to April 16. If you are unable to participate at those times or need to stagger practices due to concerns about COVID-19, ReadyWisconsin encourages everyone to make time on the date of the drill to practice your plan.

"While the statewide drills provide a coordinated time to practice what they should do during a tornado, the most important thing people can do is exercise their plan when they can safely do so," said Dr. Williams. "Even if you have to participate in a drill earlier or later in the day, we want everyone to spend a few minutes going over what they should be doing in the event a tornado warning is issued for their area."

One change people may notice this year is the

drill will not include a mock tornado warning issued as a live code test of the Emergency Alert System. As a result, there will be no test alerts sounded on NOAA Weather Radios. While some television and radio stations may break into coverage or display information on screen during the drill times, many may choose to address the drill during their regular local news programming instead. Some communities may still choose to test their outdoor warning sirens during the drill times. However, it is expected many will instead rely on their regular testing schedules to ensure those devices are working properly. In place of those alerts, you can expect to see messages from ReadyWisconsin and its partners across social media at 1:45 p.m. and 6:45 p.m. that encourage everyone to participate in the drill. ReadyWisconsin also encourages people to add the drill times to their calendar

"While many of the alarms people are used to hearing during the statewide drill may not sound this year, everyone can rest assured that those systems are still being regularly tested in other ways throughout the year," Williams said. "They can have confidence that they will be ready to notify people about danger when they are needed."

#### DNR seeks public input on the Wolf Management Plan

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) today announced it is seeking public input on the next 10 years of wolf management in Wisconsin. The DNR simultaneously requests public comment on the fall 2021 wolf harvest season through the same online input tool.

The public comment period will be open April 15 to May 15 during which the online input tool will available on the DNR Wolf management plan webpage.

As part of the management plan revision process, the DNR will convene a Wolf Management Plan Committee (WMPC). Ahead of the summer WMPC meetings, the DNR encourages the public to provide input on the next 10 years of wolf management in Wisconsin.

Following the public comment period on wolf management's future in Wisconsin, the WMPC will provide input to the DNR for developing an updated wolf management plan. The committee will comprise stakeholder groups, including hunting/trapping organizations, wolf advocacy/education organizations and agricultural/ranching organizations. The DNR also reserves additional seats on the WMPC for invited tribal and governmental agencies, the Wisconsin Conservation Congress and DNR technical staff support.

The DNR will write an initial draft of the wolf plan, guided by science and input from the WMPC and the public. The draft plan will be made available for public review and comment. The DNR will then submit a final draft to the Natural Resources Board (NRB) for approval in mid-2022.

The DNR is also simultaneously working to prepare for a fall 2021 wolf harvest season through a transparent and science-based process. The DNR has convened a 2021 Wolf Harvest Advisory Committee to provide input on the fall season's management objectives and harvest quota. The committee will consider the current management plan, state statute and the February 2021 season report in providing input to the department.

Throughout the process, the DNR will also coordinate with tribal partners and seek further public input on harvest objectives.
