Dhs now tracking SARS-cov-2 variant of concern b.1.617.2, the delta variant With the addition of new variant of concern, DHS urges vaccination to combat COVID-19

On June 16, 2021, The Wisconsin Department of Health Services released new information about the newest variant of, variant B.1.617.2, also known as the Delta variant. Following the CDC's recent classification update on June 14, DHS will begin reporting current case counts that are updated weekly, starting tomorrow, June 17. This strain was previously classified as a variant of interest, but has since been raised to a variant of concern. The CDC has established criteria for identifying variants that may be more worrisome than others. Variants are most commonly raised to variants of concern if they show evidence of being more contagious, causing more severe illness, or are more difficult to treat using known therapies. DHS, using CDC's criteria, publicly reports on variants of concern.

To date, 26 cases of the Delta variant have been identified in Wisconsin since April 2021. Variants are identified through a process called whole genome sequencing. Whole genome sequencing takes a sample of the virus from a positive SARS-CoV-2 test specimen and reads its genetic code. DHS, the Wisconsin State Laboratory of Hygiene, and other laboratory partners regularly perform whole genome sequencing on a portion of positive tests.

"Wisconsin continues to report an increasing proportion of COVID-19 cases across the state that are variants of concern," said DHS Secretary-designee Karen Timberlake. "We urge Wisconsinites to protect themselves, their families, and their communities by getting vaccinated. The sooner people get vaccinated against COVID-19, the less opportunity for the virus to keep mutating."

The Delta variant was first discovered to be circulating in India in samples from October 2020, and has continued to spread to other parts of the world. It is attributed as the cause of a recent rise in cases in the U.K.

According to recent data, researchers believe the Delta variant spreads more rapidly and easily than the original strain of SARS-CoV-2. It is not yet known if this variant has any impact on disease severity. There is some evidence to suggest that therapeutics, such as monoclonal antibody treatments, may be less effective against this variant because of its unique mutations. Some laboratory studies have suggested that antibodies produced by the body in response to natural infection or a COVID-19 vaccine may be less effective at defending against the Delta variant virus than the original strain. Fortunately, the COVID-19 vaccines available in the U.S. have shown they provide some protection against the Delta variant.

Brush Run this weekend in Crandon



CRANDON, Wisconsin (June 22, 2021) -- For racers, fans and corporate supporters, the short-course off-road landscape over the past decade was tumultuous at best. One of auto racing's most dynamic and viscerally exciting disciplines, the sport's ultimate potential has also been hindered by a lack of cohesiveness and focus and consistency.

But, as Crandon International Raceway prepares to host its 28th annual Forest County Potawatomi Brush Run weekend, all of those hindrances seem a thing of the past.

I n only its second season since being formed at the end of 2019, the AMSOIL Champ Off-Road series has quickly cultivated a culture of inclusion and success as short-course racing in the Midwest is stronger than it has been for a decade or more. This weekend's second round of racing at Crandon will bring a huge field of competitors in a wide variety of truck, buggy and UTV categories, as well as a growing and impressive list of top-tier corporate supporters.

Led my ISOC President Carl Shubitzke and managed by Series Director Frank DeAngelo, the AMSOIL Champ Off-Road series comes to Crandon this weekend bolstered by the largest field of racers at the Brush Run event in decades. Approximately 250 Sportsman and Pro teams have nabbed all the track's asphalt and grass pit locations. In fact, for the first time in memory more competitors are expected at the Brush Run than competed in the previous year's Polaris Crandon World Championship Off-Road Races held on Labor Day weekend.

Armed with the momentum of successfully promoting a nearly complete inaugural schedule despite the worldwide pandemic, the off-season brought news of a new title sponsor in Minnesota-based AMSOIL and an impressive gathering of tire company partnerships that include Cooper, Falken, Kenda, Maxxis, Toyo and Yokohama.

That support resulted in the series inking a deal to broadcast its Pro category classes on the CBS Sports network. ISOC's production arm (Long Haul Productions) had already perfected its live stream shows in 2020, including the use of a live action drone that was one of the first ever seen in professional motorsports.

ISOC is no stranger to live action sports, as the company has long promoted the most successful snowmobile series (the AMSOIL Snocross series) in the world. A unique partnership with the United States Air Force has now also crossed over from the Snocross series to the Champ Off-Road series in 2021. "We are extremely pleased with the momentum that the Champ Off-Road group is carrying into this weekend's 28th annual Crandon Brush Run races," explained Crandon Promoter Marty Fiolka. "For our fans, participants and corporate partners the single most important element in entertaining our guests is with great, competitive racing. In 2021 we can focus more on adding to our customer experience than worrying about not having enough racers, especially in the Pro truck classes. We want to provide a world class product on the race track. Now the best of best will be at Crandon for both our events ' The packed schedule for this weekend includes 33 races in two days, with a wide variety of competitors young and old competing in a wide range of truck, buggy and UTV categories. A gathering of over 20 unlimited Pro 2 category trucks are expected to take the green flag this weekend at Crandon, and with an equally impressive field of unlimited Pro 4 and Pro-Lite trucks also taking place.

967 cases of covid-19 (0 active) confirmed in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 1 additional person has been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) for a total of 967 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of Friday, June 18th, Forest County has 5,009 negative test results. There are currently 0 active cases in isolation, 944 released from isolation, 0 hospitalized, and 26 deaths related to COVID-19.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to minimize their contact with others by staying home when possible, practice physical distancing and good personal hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers weekly on Friday's with current COVID-19 case counts. Mickey Lewis

What does a lunch lady serve? During the three decades that Mrs. Mickey Lewis was a lunch lady at the Crandon Elementary School, she did much more than feed hundreds and maybe thousands of children. Every child and teacher who passed through the lunchline received carefully planned, well prepared, nourishing food and also served a brilliant smile that said, "You are cared for and everything will be okay." All of the dishes Mrs. Lewis served were accompanied with side dishes that offered encouragement to get throughout the day. Everyone felt comfort and encouragement, but most of all they felt loved.



Tom Thielke

Tom began his career in education at

Meadowdale School in Community Unit School District 300 in Carpentersville, Illinois in 1968. The next year, 1969, he moved back to Northeastern Wisconsin and took a position teaching and coaching in the Crandon Jr./Sr. High School. During his years in Crandon he served as a teacher, coach, athletic director and principal. Tom also coached Little League in both Lakewood and Crandon, coached Jr. High basketball, was an assistant football coach, Varsity Girls Volleyball coach for one year, and Varsity Boys Basketball Coach for three years. While working at Crandon, Tom met his future wife, Faye Lee, and they were married in 1971.

In 1985, Tom moved to Eagle River to become the principal at Northland Pines Middle School. While he was there, he led two teams of teachers to the summer Middle School Northland Pines Middle School was honored as one of three Family Friendly Middle Schools in Wisconsin. The spring of 1996 saw Tom return to the School District of Crandon, this time as the District Administrator, a position he held until 2002. During his last five years as superintendent in Crandon, Tom was twice elected to the Board of Control of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association.

He also served on the Board of Directors of the Nicolet Distance Education Network (NDEN), where he served one year as the Board's President. Tom also wrote the original planning grant application for the Crandon Alternative Resource School (CARS). During his time in Eagle River and in Crandon, he served as a reader of Kohl Student Scholarship and Teacher Fellowship applications at both CESA 9 in Tomahawk and CESA 8 in Gillett. He retired from the Crandon School District in 2002. In addition to his involvement in education, Tom was involved in many community events and activities. In Crandon, he was a member of the Crandon Ski Serpents Water Ski Club, the Crandon Yellow Jackets Snowmobile Racing Team, and the Crandon Jaycees when they started the Brush Run 101 Off-Road Races, for which he was a volunteer worker for many years. He was a member of the Crandon Area Chamber of Commerce, and with his wife and other family members, oversaw the Kentuck Classic Car Show for a few years. He is presently a member of the Historical Societies in both Oconto County and Forest County and gave a series of historical presentations before the COVID pandemic. Tom served as the Chair of the Community Relations Council of the Blackwell Job Corps for 10 years. He was elected to the Crandon City Council, where he served a total of six years, and was elected to the Forest County Board of Supervisors, where he served four years. He is presently a member of the Wisconsin Retired Educators Association (WREA) and its local affiliate,



Gary Cyrus

Mr. Gary Cyrus taught with the School District of Crandon from 1966-1998, with 25 of those years being in Special Education in the first middle/high school program in our area. He was instrumental in the operation or creation of many programs including the thirteenth Wisconsin Work/Study program via DVR special needs and work study for Seniors, school year and summer JTPA program for careers, off campus GED program, and coop program with Blackwell Job Corp Center. He also organized dinners for seniors, parents, and employers and was a special education designee for the thirteen programs offered at CHS for six years. After retirement, Gary continued his education career in Madison for at risk individuals from ages 16-24. Outside of school, Gary was affiliated with many organizations including Noah's Ark and Tommy Bartlett Water Ski Shows, Tombstone Pizza, EEA Museum, Yaukey Art Museum, Trees for Tomorrow, Ropes Course, and numerous projects for Brush Run. He was a concerned citizen of Crandon and served on the Board of Supervisors of Forest County, Crandon City Council, and was a cocreator of the Brush Run.

Besides all of Gary's involvement, he was a patient father to five children all who are graduates of Crandon High School.

Wearing white polished shoes, a white uniform, and a hairnet, the love and concern she had for the children and staff was well received. Children frequently sent her notes of appreciation and these Mrs. Lewis kept in a box for the rest of her life.

Nicolet College honored by 2nd national Promising Places to Work diversity award

For the second consecutive year, Nicolet College has been named a Promising Places to Work award winner by two national organizations that support diversity efforts by community colleges across the country.

The National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD) partnered with Diverse: Issues in Higher Education to recognize Nicolet for its "best-in-class student and staff recruitment and retention practices, inclusive learning and working environments, and meaningful community service and engagement opportunities."

Nicolet was the only college in Wisconsin and one of 16 across the country to receive a Promising Places to Work in Community Colleges award in both 2020 and 2021.

"We are proud to honor Nicolet College for its sustained commitment to diversity," said Edward J. Leach, NISOD's executive director. "We are also pleased about the large number of applications this year. It shows that a growing number of colleges appreciate how critical diversity and inclusion initiatives are to their campuses and communities."

Nearly 12 percent of Nicolet students are racial and ethnic minorities. This is compared to about 5 percent for the general population of the Nicolet College District.

The college also serves a population of students with disabilities, with 11.6 percent reporting a disability compared to 7.5 percent of the general population.

Highlights of recent efforts that led the college to receive the latest honor include:

Started a ten-member Diversity, Equity and Inclusion committee on campus to work to advance, embrace and promote differences in order to cultivate an atmosphere of social equity and civility. Introduced Interviewer Bias training for staff on hiring committees and added diversity-related questions to the interview portion of the college's hiring process. Through a Lumina Foundation grant, Nicolet held several all-campus professional development workshops by indigenous presenters to increase cultural knowledge and awareness.

The college also welcomes students of the LGBTQ community and has supported the formation of the Rainbow Hodags student group, which partnered with the Northwoods Pride community group to hold the Rainbow Pride Festival on the Nicolet Campus.

In 2019, Nicolet received a \$350,000 grant from the Lumina Foundation to build clearer pathways to degrees and other credentials for adults, especially for people of color and Native American learners. Nicolet received one of nine grants awarded nationwide from a pool of 78 applicants.

Nicolet has partnered with the Wisconsin Indian Education Association to implement The Many Ways of Knowing: American Indian Culture Competencies for Community College Career Pathways project.

"The project designs curriculum that reflects American Indian cultural competencies across liberal arts and general education courses," said Susie Crazy Thunder, Nicolet tribal outreach coordinator. "It will also create a methodology for recognizing indigenous community learning and knowledge toward increasing the number of tribal members qualified to teach American Indian Studies curriculum."

In addition to diversity of students, Nicolet strives to ensure diversity in employment and its Board of Trustees. The College maintains a five-year Affirmative Action Plan that establishes goals and strategies for attracting and employing people with diverse backgrounds.

Eventually, that too was destroyed by fire. The Uihleins eventually sold their land holdings to the big sawmill company in Crandon, the Keith & Hiles Lbr. Co. At any rate, the view of Stone Lake/Lake Lucerne is still great from the north end of the lake. And yes, you may be right. We may have used this photo in the past, but it is still good to look at.




