# **Conservation Corner**

Wisconsin is blessed with many kinds of wetlands. As you get out to explore, you may find yourself wondering just what type of wetland you're in. I hope this article will help you more easily identify some of Wisconsin's common wetland types.

Wetland classification systems are based on soil type, vegetation, and hydrology (the timing, frequency, and level of flooding or soil saturation). While some classification systems divide the state's wetlands into more than 30 types, I'll keep it to eight broad types of wetlands (four in this issue and four in the next). Remember, most wetland areas are actually a complex of types.

### Marshes

Marshes are the type that most often come to mind when people hear the word "wetland." Marshes are dominated by aquatic plants growing in water that is six inches to six feet deep. Some marshes have standing water year-round and others for only part of the year. Fluctuating water levels is the norm. Marshes can be small to very large and are found throughout Wisconsin, commonly along lakes and rivers. Shallow marshes support cattail, bulrush, lake sedges, arrowhead, and burreed. Deeper marshes support submerged and floating aquatic plants, including pondweeds and water lilies. Marshes are among the most productive habitats for waterfowl, other water birds, furbearers, and aquatic insects, and they provide spawning and nursery habitat for some fish species. They are important stopover sites for birds during migration because their submerged plants and aquatic insects provide an abundant food source.

### Wooded Swamps

These wetlands have abundant mature trees and soils that are saturated during much of the growing

# 1300 Cases Of Covid-19 (66 Active) Confirmed In Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 221 additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) in the month of September, for a total of 1300 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of Friday, October 1st, Forest County has 6,080 negative test results. There are currently 66 active cases in isolation, 1,206 released from isolation, 1 hospitalized, and 27 deaths related to COVID-19.

The Forest County Health Department continues to encourage community members to practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please stay home and contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, please call our office or your primary care provider.

The vaccines work. The COVID-19 vaccines continue to be remarkably effective in reducing risk of severe disease, hospitalization, and death, including against the delta variant. We continue to see highly effective protection against hospitalizations and severe outcomes for people who are fully vaccinated. Booster doses are now recommended by the CDC for some groups of people 6 months after their second dose including:

•Older adults age 65+ and those living in long term care facilities.

•Adults ages 50-64 at high risk of severe COVID-19, due to underlying medical conditions.

Adults ages 18-49 at high risk of severe COVID-19 due to underlying medical conditions in consultation with their Doctor.
Adults age 18-64 for people whose jobs put them at high risk for COVID-19.

As the science and the virus evolves, so do our policies and recommendations. Booster doses are common for many vaccines. The scientists and medical experts who developed the COVID-19 vaccines continue to watch for signs of waning immunity, how well the vaccines protect against new mutations of the virus, and how that data differs across age groups and risk factors. Millions of Americans are now eligible for booster shots, but there's more guidance for others.

Pfizer was the first vaccine to be authorized, and therefore its data on any waning effectiveness was also available first. Guidance is still forthcoming about boosters for the Johnson & Johnson and Moderna vaccines and the safety of mixing different vaccines.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers every two weeks with current COVID-19 case counts. This will include the number of negative and positive cases in Forest County. Please call our office at 715-478-3371 with any questions or concerns.

season. In the spring, they may have as much as a foot of standing water. Lowland hardwood swamps are dominated by deciduous hardwood trees, including black ash, red maple, yellow birch, and silver maple. The invasive emerald ash borer beetle threatens ash trees in these swamps.

Coniferous swamps are dominated by northern white cedar and/or tamarack and support abundant sphagnum moss (although not the continuous moss mat you might find in a coniferous bog). Coniferous swamps occur primarily in northern Wisconsin, although several large examples occur in the southern part of the state. Herbaceous plants in wooded swamps include royal fern, lady fern, jack-in-the-pulpit, numerous sedges, many flowering plants, and some rare orchids. Beware of poison sumac!

### **Floodplain forests**

Floodplain forests are wooded wetlands associated with stream and river corridors and dominated by mature, deciduous hardwood trees. During times of high water, rivers spread out into floodplain forests, inundating soils that are otherwise well-drained or even dry for much of the growing season. A characteristic feature of floodplains is the fine-grained and fertile soil deposited during flood events. Dominant trees include silver maple, green ash, river birch, eastern cottonwood, one through four, taught by one teacher. In the other room, the upper room, there were grades five through eight, taught by a second teacher.

One of those years when perhaps I was in third grade, I learned about the experience of this upper room teacher. He had come up looking for a job that he'd heard was available in our little settlement.

Back in the early 30s, a lot of people didn't have automobiles, but we still had train service.

This prospective teacher lived in southern Wisconsin. In order to come up and interview for the job, he had to board the train and get a ride up to Pelican Lake. From Pelican Lake, the Chicago Northwestern had a spur line that ran to Crandon. On the way to Crandon, it made a stop at the little community where we lived, Nashville, Wisconsin.

Well, the teacher boarded the train, and it just happened to be the first weekend of deer season. Before he came to our area to interview for the job, he made some inquiries. He had found out that most of the people in our settlement were people who had moved up from Kentucky.

He heard stories about the so-called Kentucks. How they were a pretty rough people. That they feuded and carried guns, and that it was almost like a wild west settlement. Kentucks were all possessors of firearms and OSHKOSH — U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) announced that his staff will be available for mobile office hours at the time and location listed below. 

I know that rescue personnel and fire fighters from several different locations assisted me at the scene, along with Sheriff's Department deputies and 911 dispatch. I will never know all of the many people that helped me that night.

So I want to say "Thank You" to ALL our local service providers, ALL the people that staff our Sheriff's Department, local Fire Departments, local Rescue Squads...in other words, everyone that assists in keeping us all safe. In our small communities, these people are our friends, and neighbors, all there with the attitude of "Protect and Serve." Without their help, I would have lain in the road and died.

My motorcycle must have landed on me at some point in the wreck. I ended up with "numerous" broken ribs, a collapsed lung, a totally shredded spleen, and other injuries. The Rhinelander hospital staff was honest with me, and told me later that my injuries were severe enough that I should have been transferred into a trauma facility. However, every Hospital in the State is full, and no beds were available. So to the Staff of the Rhinelander Hospital--"Thank You" for stepping up, and literally saving my life.

One more group of people I would like to thank,---Blood Donors. I am a lifetime blood donor, but with all of my previous injuries and accidents, I had never needed a blood transfusion. In this case, I needed many pints of blood. I never got a full count, but to those of you who donate blood, "Thank You." By giving of yourself, you have given me the gift of life. 

you'd better not fool around with 'em. You'd just better be darn careful about what you said and did that might offend somebody.

Now, remember the young man had all of this background information about our community. He boarded the train to come north to get the interview, but the train would stop periodically. As it got closer to the north area, why, some extra passengers started getting on. They got on carrying cases with rifles and shotguns. The train continued to stop at every small town to unload mail, bring on milk, or whatever they carried along with passengers, and a few more people would get on with their weapons.

When the teacher got to Antigo, he was almost petrified because a heck of a big bunch got on and they were coming up into the Pelican Lake area, which isn't too far from Nashville. That was the way to get there. The hunters, undoubtedly, had made arrangements or knew somebody they were going to live with and participate in the fall hunt.

Without knowing anything about hunting season, it's easy to imagine the fright he underwent when he saw all of these fellow travelers getting aboard the same train on which he was riding, all bringing their weapons, some taking them out, oiling them, priming them and getting them in tiptop shape ready for the hunt. It occurred to him that they may be coming up to wage some kind of a war or campaign, and he was almost petrified by the time he got to his destination. He began to think that he was getting into a nightmarish situation he wouldn't be equipped temperamentally or skillwise to cope with. He was not a hunter. He was not a gun lover. It shows how one's imagination can run away with someone when they are unaware of the circumstances surrounding the frightful events that are going on before their eyes.

He got the job, all right, and it was a couple years later when we heard him talking. We laughed about it time and time again because it was an unusual thing.

Actually, the people that he was coming to serve and teach were pretty peace loving. They did like to hunt, true enough, but weren't always 'a feudin' like the Martins and the McCoys who were legendary as a feuding society.

(Note: In 1946, The Martins and the Coys was an animated feature produced by Disney. It was a thinly disguised Hatfield–McCoy feud story and probably accounts for Dad's use of "Martins" in the sentence above.)

This story is a chapter from Win Abney's book, "Win Abney Tells a Good Story." This book is available at the Forest County Historical Society in the museum and on their website.



common here than in other wooded wetlands and include wild grape, Virginia creeper, and moonseed. Herbaceous plants can be sparse and include jewelweed, nettle, and some sedges. Within floodplains, ephemeral ponds, side sloughs, beaver ponds, "islands" of upland habitats, and areas of open sand provide diverse habitat for many wildlife species. During high water, these forests also provide important feeding and breeding habitat for fish.

### **Ephermeral ponds**

Ephemeral ponds form in low spots on the land. They capture, store, and slowly release runoff from rain and snowmelt. They're wet in spring and dry by late summer, and they're often small. Together, they hold and manage a lot of water, slowing the flow and allowing the water to soak into the ground. Ephemeral ponds can provide important stopover habitat for migratory waterfowl and shorebirds because they provide protein-rich seed and insect food sources. Ephemeral ponds in forested areas are abundant in northern Wisconsin but often do not show up on wetland maps. These areas have bottomland trees (you may see water stain marks several feet up on their trunks and most trees will have shallow root systems) but few ground-layer plants. Ephemeral ponds in open and agricultural areas may have seed-rich plants like nutsedge, smartweeds, grasses, and beggerticks.

## PSC Accepting Applications for WI Refueling Readiness Grant Program Applications are due on Wednesday, November 3, 2021

MADISON – The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC or Commission) is now accepting applications for the third round of Wisconsin's Refueling Readiness Grant Program. The program is designed to foster fueling infrastructure resilience and assist Fueling Points of Distribution or Designated Disaster Fueling Facilities to stay open in long-term power outages or declared emergencies. The Commission is expected to award up to \$215,000 by December 2021. Applications are due on Wednesday, November 3, 2021, by 4:30 p.m. "Investing in facilities that provide essential services to our first responders and utility line trucks during an emergency is critical to protecting public safety," said PSC Chairperson Rebecca Cameron Valcq.

The program is part of the PSC's ongoing coordination of energy assurance planning and exercise activities with other key agencies such as Wisconsin Emergency Management; the Wisconsin National Guard; the Wisconsin Department of Transportation; the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection, as well as Tribal and county emergency managers. Grants could be awarded to fund general electrical panels, labor of electricians, transfer switches, tap switches and other necessary accessories to maintain access to vehicle fuel during power outages. Eligible facilities for funding include:

• Privately, municipally, and Tribally-owned convenience stores with both unleaded and diesel fuel availability;

• Municipally and Tribally-owned highway shops;

•Bulk Petroleum Storage Facilities: A privately owned facility used in the storage or marketing of petroleum products (including propane), which has a total bulk storage capacity of less than 50,000 barrels and receives product by rail, barge, or truck.
