

The only logging job in the City of Crandon



Deward Ison falls a nice maple tree

What do retired teachers and school administrators do after retirement. They go logging of course! Actually, the two fellows logging in these photos are Meinrad Marti and Deward Ison. Marti was the music teacher at Crandon High and Deward was an administrator after teaching a number of years. They are logging a very nice stand of hardwood that surrounds the Marti home on Hwy 55 on Crandon's southwest side.

The stand, according to Marti, was last logged back in 1955. The trees that need cutting are being selected and turned into sawlogs and firewood. Ison is doing the sawing and Marti has started a new career as a cable skidder operator.

The timber is being lightly cut, and it is doubtful if anybody driving by will ever notice that it has been logged. The cutting will allow younger trees to add growth, get a little more sunlight into the Marti homestead and obviously turn trees into cash that would be lost if the trees are allowed to get older and deteriorate. As far as we know, it is the only logging job operating in the city limits of Crandon.

1,390 cases of covid-19 (36 active) confirmed in forest county

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 15 additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) as of October 19th at 9:30 AM, for a total of 1,390 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. There are currently 36 active cases in isolation, 2 hospitalized, 27 confirmed, and 4 probable deaths related to COVID-19. There has been 97 positive cases so far in October. This is a snapshot of numbers, but they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Forest County Health Department continues to encourage community members to practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. Everyone in the community needs to do what they can to help to stop the spread of illness, including staying home when ill, and avoiding large crowded places. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested.

If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, please call our office or your primary care provider for information on where to find a vaccine. The Pfizer vaccine has been approved as a booster dose for those that qualify. Information on the Moderna and Johnson and Johnson boosters have not been released by the Department of Health Services yet, but will be coming, we are told.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers as much as possible with current COVID-19 case counts. Please call our office at 715-478-3371 with any questions or concerns.





Sentenced to 14 years for drug charges

If you recall from previous press releases on Thursday April 1, 2021 Lagene C McGhee 48 years old from Milwaukee was arrested at a hotel in the City of Crandon with a combination of approximately 2 pounds of crack and powder cocaine, a loaded firearm, marijuana and drug paraphernalia.

On Tuesday May 4, 2021 Detectives with the Forest County Drug Task Force testified before a Grand Jury in United States Federal Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin.

Lagene McGhee was indicted in Federal Court for possession with intent to distribute cocaine, possession of a firearm in furtherance of a drug trafficking offense and felon in possession of a firearm.

On Monday October 18, 2021 Lagene C McGhee now 49 years old was sentenced in United States Federal Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin. Lagene was sentenced to 14 years in the Federal system where he will serve 8 years confinement in a federal prison facility followed by 6 years of federal supervision. It was further ordered that \$4,594 in cash that Lagene had on his person when he was arrested would be forfeited to law enforcement.

Deb had many hobbies but especially loved gardening, canning and quilting. Her yard is full of beautiful flowers and rock gardens that she nurtured tirelessly. Many of her plants were rescued from others and brought back to beautiful life again. She also would start many of her plants from seed and grow them to be truly breathtaking. She loved working in her vegetable garden; and was proud to harvest and can all of the vegetables. In the fall, she could be found in the kitchen cooking and canning all of her grown produce. Her goal was to have enough food canned to take care of her whole family. Whenever any of her children needed vegetables or fruit, they always knew where to go because Mom always had them covered. Each of her children and grandchildren were honored to receive a handmade, sewn quilt that Deb made specifically for each of them. She put so much time and love into each and every quilt that she made and most were sewn by hand.

Deb was a devoted and loving wife, mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. Family was very important to her and she loved each and every one of them. She was so happy to be able to spend each day babysitting for her great-grandchildren. When she did not have them, she could be heard saying how much she missed them when they were not there. She loved teaching them new things and involving them in her hobbies. She truly had a love in her heart for everyone that ever crossed her path.

Deb is survived by Lynn, her husband of 41 years; her children, Crystal (Curt) Cooper of Laona, Missy (Paul) Widucki of Crandon and Matt (Jessie) Bellamy of Laona; grandchildren, Zach, Courtney and Jessalyn Peterson, Colten Cooper, Jade Widucki (Leif Gunderson), Dalton and Dani Bellamy; and great-grandchildren Pyper, Remie and Capone Gunderson. 



County receives Major **Broadband Grant Award**

The Wisconsin Public Service Commission announced a significant Broadband Expansion grant award on October 15th; with a huge impact on Forest County. Northwoods Connect of Rhinelander is the recipient of a \$2,283,772.00 grant with a major focus of the grant being in Forest County. In total, with Forest County providing a match of \$1.748,000 from its' ARPA funds and a provider match of \$3,792,000, the total build-out of the project will be \$7,823,772.00. The award to Northwoods is the seventh largest award in this grant cycle. Even more significant is the combined efforts of Forest County and Northwoods make it the largest build-out of all applicants receiving awards.

The county is at the half-way point of an approximate \$2,000,000 broadband build-out with Northwoods Connect doing the work on the current project. The new project will bring the total broadband work to a figure of approximately \$9.8 million.

This specific project will utilize a fiber to the premise service to reach an estimated 65 businesses and 1268 residential locations in the Reservation of Mole Lake Sokaogan, and the towns of Lincoln, Laona, Blackwell, Argonne, Hiles, Crandon, Nashville, Three Lakes, and Washington impacting Forest, Vilas, and Oneida counties. It should be noted that the major impact and priority will be made for the benefit of Forest County residents and businesses. In particular, it should be noted this project will go a long way in resolving the issues of connecting the unserved in Blackwell, Bear Lake area, Peshtigo River Road area, and the Town of Lincoln in the Lake Lucerne area. There are many challenges we have faced in solving the broadband issues in Forest County and this is another big step in the right direction.

The Forest County Broadband Commission believes the ongoing relationship with Northwoods Connect has been critically important in the awards serving Forest County. FCEDP Executive Director and Broadband Commission Chairman Mark Ferris states, 'We are incredibly happy for Forest County. Northwoods has been creative; forming some additional partnerships, which will serve our residents and businesses well. This project will vastly improve connectivity within the county and will also extend the network into Oneida and Vilas to

Forest County is the big winner in this endeavor and we cannot overstate that fact. Fiber will now reach areas where there have been major challenges and we will continue to work with Northwoods Connect and other partners to further connect the unconnected." Ferris further noted, "it is a real source of pride that the total combined financial output on this project is the largest, by far, of the 83 total projects awarded in this \$100 million grant cycle."

DOT Transportation Payments

Governor Tony Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) today announced that municipalities across the state received nearly \$130 million in the fourth quarterly payments for 2021 for General Transportation, Connecting Highway, and Expressway Policing Aids.

For calendar year 2020, local governments received more than \$505 million in general transportation aids (GTA) financial assistance to support transportation related projects, a 10% increase over calendar year 2019 allocations. Total funding for all local programs makes up almost one-third of the state transportation budget.

"Working cooperatively with local governments is essential to a good transportation system that delivers all the way through the last mile," WisDOT Secretary Craig Thompson said. "We are dedicated to making good investments together that improve safety, economic opportunity and quality of life."

The local assistance increase was part of more than \$465 million in additional funding for transportation projects included in the last (2019-2021) state budget, which was the largest dedication of new, ongoing revenue to the transportation fund in a generation. In addition to the 10% GTA increase, the budget included \$320 million in additional funding for the State Highway Rehabilitation program and provided \$90 million in one-time funding for the Local Roads Improvement Program-Supplement grant program.

The fourth quarter payments, made on October 4, totaled \$129,698,459.77 and included:

General Transportation Aids - \$126,426,608.70 to all local units of government

Connecting Highway Aids - \$3,015,876.07 in CHA to 116 eligible municipalities.

Expressway Policing Aids - \$255,975.00 to Milwaukee County

General Transportation Aids help cover the costs of constructing, maintaining, and operating roads and streets under local jurisdiction. Connecting Highway Aids reimburse municipalities for maintenance and traffic control of certain state highways within municipalities.

Quarterly payments for cities, villages and towns are sent the first Monday in January, April, July and October. County payments are made in three installments, with 25 percent of the total annual payment on the first Monday in January; 50 percent on the first Monday in July; and 25 percent on the first Monday in October.

Baldwin supports legislation to curb youth e-cigarette and tobacco use More than 2 million youth used e-cigarettes in the past year & majority use flavored e-cigarettes

Washington, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin is supporting the introduction of the Preventing Opportunities for Teen E-Cigarette and Tobacco Addiction (PROTECT) Act to address the tobacco epidemic harming millions of teens across the country. E-cigarettes and other nicotine-containing tobacco products have been linked to adverse effects on long-term health and harms to adolescent brain development. According to the newly released 2021 National Youth Tobacco Survey, more than 2 million youth used e-cigarettes in the past year, with 1 in 4 high school students reporting daily use. Disposable e-cigarettes, inexpensive and designed for single use, were the most commonly used e-cigarette device among young adults, and nearly 85 percent of youth users reported using flavored e-cigarettes.

The PROTECT Act would establish a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) initiative that authorizes \$500 million over five years for enhanced research and education about the harmful effects of tobacco products. The bill would also identify effective messaging aimed at teens and young adults, and allocate funds via grants, cooperative agreements, or contracts to state, local, tribal, and national organizations for preventing and reducing youth e-cigarette use.

"The rise of teen vaping is a public health crisis that demands action. We must do more educate teens and their families about the dangers of vaping and enhance efforts to keep harmful tobacco products out of our kids' hands," said Senator Baldwin. "This legislation is an important step forward to fund enhanced research and education about the harmful effects of tobacco products. This is about intervention, prevention, and protecting the health of our children."

The PROTECT Act is endorsed by a wide range of advocacy groups, including the American Lung Association, American Heart Association, American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network, American Academy of Pediatrics, Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, Parents Against Vaping (PAVe), and the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

"Over the past five years, we have seen an alarming rise in youth vaping. In fact, almost 20% of high school students use e-cigarettes, according to the 2020 National Youth Tobacco Survey. Steps must be taken by parents, educators and especially policymakers to end the youth e-cigarette epidemic," said President and CEO of the American Lung Association, Harold Wimmer. "The introduction of the PROTECT Act will give us the tools we need to help kids quit and prevent another generation of Americans from becoming addicted to tobacco."

"Pediatricians across the country have witnessed the harmful health impacts of e-cigarette use in their patients. Young people are using e-cigarettes at alarming rates, leading to dangerous short- and long-term health consequences, including nicotine addiction. The PROTECT Act will help confront the issue of youth e-cigarette use through increased

peak colors. Click into your county or a county you are headed through to see if you will get the opportunity to view the abundance of beautiful colors our deciduous trees have to offer this season.

The key to strong leaf coloration is bright, sunny, and dry days followed by cool nights. The bright sunny days contribute to the change in coloration by breaking down chlorophyll. Chlorophyll is the green pigments in leaves. The plant isn't able to synthesize and replenish its chlorophyll due to the dryness of the fall air. The bright sunny, and dry days together increase the sugar content in leaves which favors the increase in anthocyanins within the leaves. Anthocyanins are the pigments that create the red to purple colorations. Carotenoids is another group of pigments that may be revealed which creates bright vellow to orange colors. The cool nights contribute to the activation of a zone in the petiole of the leaf called the abscission zone which is the point where the leaf separates from the tree and flutters to the ground. There is a large science behind why leaves change colors that is quite fascinating and in-depth!

For years, scientists have worked to understand the changes that occur in trees and shrubs during autumn.

Although we don't know all the details, we do know enough to explain the basics to help you enjoy nature's multicolored display. Three factors influence autumn leaf color:

Leaf pigments length of night weather:

The timing of color changes and the beginning of falling leaves is controlled by the calendar as nights become longer. None of the other environmental influences - such as temperature, rainfall, food supply are as unvarying as the steadily increasing length of night during autumn. As days grow shorter, and nights grow longer and cooler, biochemical processes in the leaf begin to paint the landscape with Nature's autumn palette.

A color palette needs pigments, and there are three types that are involved in autumn color:

Carotenoids:

Produces yellow, orange, and brown colors in such things as corn, carrots, and daffodils, as well as rutabagas, buttercups, and bananas. Anthocyanin: Gives color to such familiar things as cranberries, red apples, concord grapes, blueberries, cherries, strawberries, and plums. They are water soluble and appear in the watery liquid of leaf cells. Chlorophyll: Gives leaves a basic green color. It is necessary for photosynthesis, the chemical reaction that enables plants to use sunlight to manufacture sugars for food.

Certain colors are characteristic of particular species: Oaks: red, brown, or russet Hickories: golden Aspen and yellow-poplar: golden yellow Dogwood: purplish red Beech: light tan Sourwood and black tupelo: crimson

The color of maples leaves differs species by

The amount and brilliance of the colors that develop in any particular autumn season are related to weather conditions that occur before and during the time the chlorophyll in the leaves is dwindling. Temperature and moisture are the main influences. A succession of warm, sunny days and cool, crisp but not freezing nights seems to bring about the most spectacular color displays. During these days, lots of sugars are produced in the leaf but the cool nights and the gradual closing of veins going into the leaf prevent these sugars from moving out. These conditions - lots of sugar and light - spur production of the brilliant anthocyanin pigments, which tint reds, purples, and crimson. Because carotenoids are always present in leaves, the yellow and gold colors remain fairly constant from year to

The amount of moisture in the soil also affects autumn colors. Like the weather, soil moisture varies greatly from year to year. The countless combinations of these two highly variable factors assure that no two autumns can be exactly alike. A late spring, or a severe summer drought, can delay the onset of fall color by a few weeks. A warm period during fall will also lower the intensity of autumn colors. A warm wet spring, favorable summer weather, and warm sunny fall days with cool nights should produce the most brilliant autumn colors.
