Last week was Forest Products Week in Wisconsin. Gov. Tony Evers proclaimed the third week in October as Forest Products Week in Wisconsin to recognize forests' essential role in the state's environment and economy.

"The forest products industry contributes \$24.5 billion in goods and services and provides \$7.1 billion in value-added each year," said Collin Buntrock, DNR forest products team leader. "On top of the monetary contribution to the state's economy, the industry accounts for 3.8% of state output with 64,000 jobs directly contributed and represents almost 12% of total manufacturing jobs. In 31 counties, the forest products industry is one of the top ten employers."

Forest Products Week highlighted the importance of Wisconsin's 17 million acres of forested land – both public and private – that provide raw materials to the forest products industry, recreational opportunities and ecosystem. Through the DNR's use of sustainable forestry practices, trees are grown and harvested responsibly ensuring the economic, social and ecological benefits of the forest products industry.

1,409 cases of covid-19 (34 active) confirmed in forest county

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 116 additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) in October as of October 22nd, for a total of 1,409 cases in Forest County. There have been 8 probable cases, this month, as well. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of Friday, October 22nd, Forest County has 6,266 negative test results. There are currently 34 active cases in isolation, 1,345 released from isolation, 3 hospitalized, and 27 deaths related to COVID-19. This is a snapshot of numbers, but they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, please call our office or your primary

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers every two weeks with current COVID-19 case counts. This will include the number of negative and positive cases in Forest County. Please call our office at 715-478-3371 with any questions or concerns.

WI to offer COVID-19 Moderna & Johnson & Johnson vaccine booster

DHS supports CDC recommendation to expand eligibility for COVID-19 booster shots

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) supports the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) recommendation that certain populations who have increased risk of exposure to or transmission of COVID-19 receive a booster shot of Moderna COVID-19 vaccine at least six months after having received their second dose of the Moderna vaccine, and that individuals age 18 and older who received the J & J COVID-19 vaccine receive a booster dose at least two months after their primary vaccine dose.

"With three COVID-19 booster dose options now available, our national medical experts have given us additional tools to help stop the spread of the highly transmissible Delta variant and slow the spread of COVID-19 in communities throughout Wisconsin," said DHS Secretary-designee Karen Timberlake. "We ask that eligible Wisconsinites be patient as it may take time for everyone who needs a booster dose to get one."

DHS continues to await publication of the CDC clinical guidance for Moderna and J&J booster doses. Once those are published, vaccinators in Wisconsin will be able to begin providing booster doses and ensure they are following the safest protocols.

The CDC also recommended that health care professionals be allowed to provide a different COVID-19 vaccine as a booster than the one initially received, providing flexibility to health care providers and additional options for individuals. This recommendation applies to all three COVID-19 vaccines currently available in the United States.

Moderna and Pfizer COVID-19 booster recommendation:

DHS recommends that the following populations receive a booster dose of Moderna or Pfizer at least six months after receiving their second dose of Moderna or Pfizer in order to further strengthen their immunity:

- People 65 years and older
- All residents in long-term care
- People ages 18 and older with certain underlying medical conditions (link is external)
- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- Chronic lung diseases, including COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease), asthma (moderate-tosevere), interstitial lung disease, cystic fibrosis, and pulmonary hypertension
- Dementia or other neurological conditions
- Diabetes (type 1 or type 2)





He attended Crandon



2021 BEAR SEASON SHOWS RETURN TO RECENT HARVEST AVERAGE

MADISON, Wis. – Early results from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) show hunters harvested 3,802 bears during the 2021 black bear season, a decrease from the 4,306 taken last year.

The 2021 harvest results are similar to the 2018 and 2019 harvests. While overall numbers fell short of the total quota, several zones were at or near harvest objectives, and statewide hunter success (32%) remained nearly equal to the last several years.

"This fall marked the first season using new harvest zones as outlined in the black bear management plan," said Randy Johnson, DNR Large Carnivore Specialist. "The reconfigured zones better reflect the bear population distribution across the state and allow a more fine-tuned approach to management based upon conditions in each zone."

The 2020 season saw above-average hunter success rates contributing to a higher harvest. Harvested bear data from hunters is critical to tracking bear population trends and in ensuring the population remains healthy while also achieving population management objectives.

Harvest data indicates Zones A and B in the north and northeastern parts of the state performed well, with hunter success at 62% and 56%, respectively. Zone C located in the central part of the state fell short of its quota, with hunter success a bit lower than expected.

In the northwestern part of the state, the Zone D quota and license levels were increased significantly this fall to reduce the bear population across the zone and agricultural damage issues in the area. Despite only taking 70% of the quota in this zone, the 1,251 bears harvested represent the highest harvest in the area in at least a decade. In Zone D, harvest projections indicate this level of harvest is likely to result in a slight population reduction.

Finally, while neither Zones E nor F in the western and southern parts of the state reached their harvest quotas, the actual number of bears taken in those areas was at or above levels in recent years.

Nearly 130,000 people applied for a bear hunting license or preference point for the 2021 season, setting a record number of applicants.

"Interest in bear hunting continues to grow in Wisconsin and across the nation," said Johnson. "With growing demand and a limited number of licenses, we encourage the public to review management zone boundaries and license wait times as they make their hunting plans."

A full breakdown of the 2021 bear license drawing is available on the DNR website.

Hunters wishing to obtain a license or preference point for the 2022 season are encouraged to apply through Go Wild before the Dec. 10 deadline. Hunters should make sure to check the new zone map before selecting their zone in Go Wild.

"Booster doses are intended to help people who are vaccinated maintain the highest possible level of immune system protection for as long as possible," said Dr. Ryan Westergaard, Chief Medical Officer for the Bureau of Communicable Diseases. "It's important to remember that all the authorized COVID-19 vaccines offer strong protection after the primary series. Getting every eligible person vaccinated continues to be our most important strategy for preventing severe illness, hospitalization, and death."

A booster dose serves a different purpose than the additional dose recommended for certain immunocompromised people in early August. The additional doses are for people with certain medical conditions or who are receiving certain treatments leaving them moderately or severely immunocompromised and who may not have built a strong enough immune response after their initial vaccine. In contrast, a 'booster dose' refers to another dose of a vaccine that is given to someone who built enough protection after their initial vaccination, but then that protection decreased over timealso referred to as waning immunity. Evidence suggests that immunity is waning over time for some people who were initially wellprotected by the vaccine. For those people, a booster dose will strengthen and extend their protection against infection, serious illness, hospitalization, and death from COVID-19.

For additional information about booster doses, additional doses, and help accessing your COVID-19 vaccine record to determine when you may be recommended for a booster, visit the DHS Additional Doses and Booster Doses webpage.

With the high-level of disease transmission in Wisconsin, DHS continues to urge everyone who is not vaccinated to get the COVID-19 vaccine, and for all people to add additional layers of protection including masking up indoors, staying home when feeling sick, and avoiding large indoor gatherings.
