As you head out to your deer stand this week, you may want to think about what tree you have it in. It is becoming increasingly important for Wisconsin hunters to avoid placing tree stands in ash trees or near ash trees. Emerald ash borer (EAB) is an invasive wood-boring beetle that feeds on the tissues under the bark ultimately causing the ash tree to die. The infestation of EAB has caused profound death in Wisconsin ash trees, especially so in the southern half of Wisconsin, Door County, and the Mississippi River counties. These dead and dying ash trees could suddenly snap or drop large branches posing a safety risk to hunters and those spending time in the woods throughout the year. There are cases in Wisconsin where these instances have lead to permanent harm and fatal accidents. "Dead and dying ash are structurally weaker than healthy trees, so they are not safe places to put deer stands," said Bill McNee, WI DNR Forest Health Specialist. "At this time of year, it can be hard to tell if a tree has been infested by emerald ash borer, so hunters should place deer stands in other types of trees instead." The overall recommendation is to ensure you are not placing a stand in an ash tree or near ash trees that are dead or dying as ones bodily safety is at risk and harm of a great impact could occur. The wearing of a harness while using a tree stand is also highly recommended for personal safety. It is too often that people put themselves in dangerous and risky situations thinking something drastic won't happen to them, especially so when you have your sights set on a big buck or filling the freezer with meat, but do not make that mistake. Educate yourself so you can maintain safety and pass on your knowledge to others whether it be a hunter renting your land for the hunting



(Editor's Note) The following article is a true story of a deer hunt back in 1967. The story ran in this paper back in 2004. Enough time has passed to repeat this tale, and even if you read it back then, you might enjoy it again with the passage of time.

Deer hunting is an institution here in northern Wisconsin. I am a deer hunter. I like it, but I have admit, I am not passionate about the sport. I much prefer the company of bird dogs and sunny days of autumn to the gray, cold days of November. While gunning whitetails might not be my first choice, I have only missed one deer season in the forty-odd years I've hunted, and I was in the hospital, so I had a good reason.

To me, deer hunting can be endless hours of boredom, punctuated with surges of adrenaline when a deer finally decides to make himself visible. It is usually the companionship that makes the season worthwhile. A good campfire at noon with plenty of BS flying through the smoke can make a drab day quite pleasant.

While the memories of most deer seasons blend together, with none of the memories unpleasant, a few stand out. Such was one day in the deer hunt of 1967. I was a college kid. I couldn't afford a 'good' deer rifle, and I was

1,473 cases of covid-19 (33 active) confirmed in forest county

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 45 persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) in November as of November 15th, for a total of 1,473 cases in Forest County. There have been 9 probable cases this month for a total of 83 probable cases. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of Monday, November 15th, Forest County has 6,412 negative test results. There are currently 33 active cases in isolation, 1,414 released from isolation, 4 hospitalized, and 29 deaths related to COVID-19. This is a snapshot of numbers, but they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, please call our office or your primary care provider.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers every two weeks with current COVID-19 case counts. This will include the number of negative and positive cases in Forest County. Please call our office at 715-478-3371 with any questions or concerns

Getting your flu vaccine at least two weeks before a gathering gives your body time to build the immunity it needs to fight infection.

"This year, it is critical to make sure you and your family are protected," said Dr. Jasmine Zapata, Chief Medical Officer in the DHS Bureau of Community Health Promotion. "Research shows that getting your flu vaccine can reduce rates of hospitalizations, prevent illness and missed work, and save lives including for children."

The flu vaccine is safe and effective, and is recommended for people ages six months and older. Flu vaccination is especially important for people who are younger than 5 years old, over the age of 65, pregnant, or have a chronic health condition. But it is also important for others to get the flu vaccine to protect themselves, avoid spreading the flu to more vulnerable family members and friends.

You can get your flu vaccine at the same time as other vaccines, including the COVID-19 vaccine. Vaccines work just as well and are just as safe if you get them alone or with other vaccines. You can find flu and COVID-19 vaccine locations by visiting vaccines.gov or calling 211.

In addition to getting a flu vaccine, other things you can do to prevent the flu include washing your hands regularly, cleaning surfaces, and taking good care of your body. This also includes getting good sleep, drinking plenty of water, managing stress, and exercising regularly. The holiday season is rapidly approaching. We'll soon be spending more time with our families and loved ones. Don't let the flu stop you. Get your vaccine today. season or your children or grandchildren building a tree fort or playing on a rope swing in your woods.

Likely by the opening of deer season the ash trees will have entirely dropped their foliage so it is important for hunters and woodland owners to be able to identify ash trees without fully intact leaves above or absence of leaves altogether.

There are four native ash tree species within Wisconsin: White ash, Green ash, Black ash, and Blue ash. There are many available online identification resources: UW-Stevens Point LEAF Tree ID Tool containing dichotomous keys, Virginia Tech Dendrology ID Keys available in an app and website form, UW-Green Bay Gary A. Fewless Herbarium Trees of Wisconsin.

These are some terrific informational ID guides with clear images for assistance.

Bark

Younger ash trees have smoother bark becoming rough and forming distinct diamond-shaped ridges with maturity. Seeds

Single, flattened, paddle shaped (samaras) that occur in clusters. Typically remain on trees until late fall or early winter.

Branching and Bud Arrangement

Ash trees have an opposite branching pattern, meaning branches originate directly across from each other. Lateral buds (the buds along a twig) are also oriented across from each other.

Buds

Chocolate chip shaped terminal bud with visible leaf scars below the lateral buds.

Leaves

(if present)Compound leaves with typically 5-11 leaflets. The leaflet's margin (edge) may be smooth or toothed
