Positive cases of covid-19 in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 664 individuals have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) since January 1, 2022 with either a PCR, antigen, or home test. County health officials and local partners are contacting individuals who test positive as able. There have been 4 deaths this year related to COVID-19. This is a snapshot of the numbers as they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to get vaccinated, practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If positive, please isolate yourself away from others for 5 days since symptom onset and wear a mask for the 5 days following your release from isolation.

If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, the Forest County Health Department is having a Moderna vaccine clinic on Friday, March 4th from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. in the county board room located inside the Forest County courthouse.

In an effort to keep our community members upto-date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page and local newspapers every Friday with current COVID-19 case counts as capacity allows. FCEDP Rolls out new Revolving Loan Fund

Forest County Economic Development Partnership has announced a new Revolving Loan Fund targeted to Forest County businesses looking to make improvements and build on their presence in the county. Earlier in 2021, FCEDP presented a plan to the Forest County Board to fund a \$200,000 fund for this purpose. The Board of Directors of FCEDP had many discussions on ways to show support for the economic climate in the county. This included conversations with other counties and professionals in the economic development world. Revolving Loan Funds are often a tool used by many counties to support local economic development.

Upon formal recommendation by the FCEDP Board, the decision- making process moved to the County Board. That process initially moved to County Finance, which after lengthy discussion and review, forwarded their approval and recommendation to the County Board. The County Board concurred and approved a set aside of \$200,000.00 to FCEDP. Mark Ferris, Executive Director of FCEDP commented, 'the working relationship between FCEDP and our County Board has been key in them approving this monumental loan fund'. Honestly, the discussions have gone on for a period of time. Both Boards had long discussions; leading to strong support for this program.' Personally, I'm very proud of our county leaders in taking this important step.'

With the establishment of the Revolving Loan Fund, FCEDP now has two lending options for Forest County businesses looking for financial funding. The Microloan program, which offers up to \$10,000.00 in funding, has been extremely successful; in place for several years. The success of that program was a factor in the new loan program. The new RLF program offers lending possibilities at a higher amount. Ferris commented, 'this new fund is one that requires more on the business owner's part in terms of the detail required to secure a loan. Typically, we've discussed a targeted loan amount in very general terms of somewhere in the \$50,000 range. That said, every loan is different; meaning we are flexible. We've developed a very specific RLF manual that provides assurances that our commitment is secured. Our RLF Board includes professionals from accounting, banking, legal, and consulting from the UW Green Bay Small Business center. 'That goes to protecting the County's and FCEDP's interest as it is so important in the County Board's decision to support the program.'

Ferris went on to say, 'oftentimes this type of fund is used as a 'bridge loan', working with other lenders on financing for a higher amount than what the FCEDP loan offers. The question that businesses will always want to know is regarding the RLF interest rate. 'As a Board, our answer to that is the rate we offer is variable. Without locking into a specific rate, due to the current questions with the Federal Reserve on expected rate increases, the Board has stated, 'we're committed to offering a very competitive rate. So, what's the difference between weather and climate? Weather and climate are closely related, but they aren't the same thing. In simple terms, Climate is what you expect and Weather is what actually happens.

Weather is the mix of events or occurrences that happen each day. Around the world, there is one atmosphere, but all kinds of different weather. Weather occurs in the part of the atmosphere closest to the ground called the troposphere. There are many different things that can affect the weather. Air pressure, temperature, humidity, wind speed and direction are just a few things that affect weather. Together, they determine what the weather is like at a given time at a given location.

If weather refers to the short-term changes in the atmosphere, Climate then describes what the Weather is like over a long period of time in a specific area. Different regions can have different climates. To describe the climate of a place, you might say what the temperatures are during different seasons or how much show they get.

When scientists talk about climate, they're often looking at averages. It may be average temperature,



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

Three dynamic roles that explore life behind the scenes at a fast-paced Broadway show are available for local actors when the Nicolet Players returns to hold auditions Feb. 13 and 15 for The Understudy.

"Theresa Rebeck has always been one of my favorite playwrights," said director K. Woodzick, "Her plays have been produced on Broadway and on regional stages across the country. I saw The Understudy at Whidbey Island Center for the Arts and fell in love with the script. It's one of the most magical nights I have spent at the theatre, and I honestly can't remember the last time I laughed that hard."

The Wisconsin Brass Quintet performs A Night at the Movies at Nicolet

Northwoods audiences will have the opportunity to experience cinematic musical masterpieces when the celebrated Wisconsin Brass Quintet performs A Night at the Movies at 7:30 p.m., Monday, Feb. 14, in the Nicolet College Theatre.

Selections for this concert will include pieces from Austin Powers, The Incredibles, La La Land, On the Waterfront, Raiders of the Lost Ark, Soul, West Side Story, and more.

Regarded as one of the "superb brass ensembles in the USA" by MusicWeb International and praised for "remarkable musicianship and versatility" by International Trumpet Guild Journal, the widely acclaimed Wisconsin Brass Quintet (WBQ) has maintained a position at the forefront of brass chamber music since the group's founding in 1972.

"The play is about a stage manager (Roxanne) wrangling two actors (Harry and Jake) at an understudy rehearsal for a hit Broadway show described as an undiscovered masterpiece by Kafka," Woodzick explained. "It gives the audience a peek behind the curtain to show that sometimes more drama happens offstage than onstage. It provides the cast the opportunity to work with profoundly human moments of drama and also fast-paced comedy, often switching between the two at rapid speed."

The selection of this play is a timely one, as theatres across the country, including Broadway, are relying on the skill of understudies more than ever, Woodzick explained.

Cast members can expect rehearsals to start on Feb. 22. The rehearsal schedule will be comprised of weekday evening rehearsals, held from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. There will be an average of three rehearsals a week, until tech week begins on April 2.

Public performances are scheduled for April 8 to 10 and 14 to 17, with Sunday performances at 2 p.m. and all others at 7:30 p.m.





average precipitation, sunshine, wind and other measurements related to weather that occur over a long period of time in a particular place. Often, they'll look at these averages over a 30 year period. These periods are called Climate Normals.

Looking at Climate Normals can help us describe whether the summers are hot and humid and whether the winters are cold and snowy at a particular place. They can also tell us when we might expect the warmest day of the year or the coldest day of the year at that location. But, while descriptions of an area's climate provide a sense of what to expect, they don't provide any specific details about what the weather will be on any given day.

An easy way to visualize the difference between weather and climate is to think what am I going to wear outside today...that's weather. Climate describes what wardrobe or types of clothes to have in your closet for the place you're living.

You may ask how does weather become climate? Across the globe, observers and automated stations measure weather conditions at thousands of locations every day of the year. Some observations are made hourly, others just once a day. Over time, these weather observations allow us to quantify long-term average conditions, which provide insight into an area's climate. In many locations around the United States, systematic weather records have been kept for over 140 years. With these long-term records, we can detect patterns and trends.

Today, climates are changing. Our Earth is warming more quickly than it has in the past according to the research of scientists. Hot summer days may be quite typical of climates in many regions of the world, but warming is causing Earth's average global temperature to increase. The amount of solar radiation, the chemistry of the atmosphere, clouds, and the biosphere all affect Earth's climate.

Climate, climate change, and their impacts on weather events affect people all around the world. Rising global temperatures are expected to further raise sea levels and change precipitation patterns and other local climate conditions. Changing regional climates could alter forests, crop yields, and water supplies. They could also affect human health, animals, and many types of ecosystems. Deserts may expand into existing rangelands, and features of some of our National Parks and National Forests may be permanently altered.

When you were riding the C&NW north and stopped in Pelican Lake, this is the scene you would have observed when stepping out of the train. There probably wouldn't have been this crowd who had gathered for a picture taking event, but these would have been some of the buildings on the main street, now Hwy 45.

Fred Miner's saloon was able to be open day and night. This would have made it handy for train passengers stepping from the train at odd hours or for the railroad crews who ended their shift and needed a beer or two. Obviously there weren't regulations in place or they were ignored in the "wild" north. The dry goods store on the right says Nagel Brothers on the awning.

Judging by the dress on the lady on the porch to the left and the cut of the suits worn by the men, this was an early picture, maybe before 1900.

If you were traveling to Crandon, a town that had no rail service back then, you would have caught a ride on Mr. Webb's stagecoach and enjoyed a very bumpy and long ride to that new town on Big Sand Lake, soon to be called Lake Metonga. According to old stories, the road was so rough that many of the passengers walked, only using the stage to carry their luggage. This changed in 1901, when a spur was run from Pelican Lake to Crandon. This happened because the big Page & Landeck sawmill on Clear Lake needed transport for their hardwood lumber to market.



common forms of ID to show at polls

Wisconsin driver licenses or IDs are the most common form of identification used for voting purposes. Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) encourages voters to check and be sure that they have the proper identification needed to vote in the Spring Primary (February 15). A federally-compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes. Anyone who doesn't have an ID to vote in the Spring Primary should start the process now.

The Wisconsin Elections Commission notes other forms of identification, such as military or student ID cards, are valid for voting purposes. To see if a card meets the requirements, visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website.


Voters looking to get their first Wisconsin ID can turn to DMV for help. To obtain an official ID card, there are documentation requirements such as a birth certificate. If all documentation is not readily available, the ID Petition Process can be used to obtain a receipt valid for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained. DMV offers this service and ID cards for voting purposes free of charge. DMV's toll-free Voter ID hotline at (844) 588-1069 is available for questions on obtaining an ID to vote.


